## Town gets input on employments lands in Bolton

The Town is working on getting two plots of land in Bolton classified for employment, and last Wednesday was the time for public input. One point that was raised a couple of times at last week's public information involved some confusion that the two areas are some distance apart. One is on the north hill of the village, at the northeast corner of Regional Road 50 and Columbia Way. The other is a much larger parcel that takes in most of the west side of Coleraine Drive in the southern part of Bolton. Some people wondered why they weren't being treated as separate matters. Marisa Williams, senior policy planner with the Town, said the purpose of the meeting was to present the necessary proposed amendment to Caledon's Official Plan to the public, and to get input. She also said this is part of what has been a lengthy process which started some 10 years ago with the commencement of work on the South Albion Bolton Com-

munity Plan. The work has involved a Bolton Commercial Policy Review, Employment Land Needs Study, an expansion study for the village, etc. Williams said Town

staff was directed by Caledon council in 2009 to find preferred locations for additional employment lands, and council approved their recommendations in November that year. Expanding the settlement boundaries required

a comprehensive review, she said. Williams told the meeting a number of other studies were part of this project, looking into such matters as environmental, transportation and agricultural impacts. She also said there are a number of goals related to this work, with most of them relating to what's already called for in the Official Plan. One of them is to provide for a mix of high-quality employment uses to increase the Town's industrial and commercial assessment, provide for logical and orderly development on full municipal services, and ensure a high standard of community design along all arterial roads. Protecting significant environmental features and putting retail operation in the north hill area are among the goals too. There are certain environmental features in and around the Coleraine lands, and Williams said there are also provisions for a storm water management pond. The lands have also been set aside for both

prestige and general industrial development. She added the boundaries of the natural areas need more refinement and that will be taking place at future planning stages. There are also provisions to extend some existing east-west roads east of Coleraine into these lands. As well, she said the Town will be encouraging eco-business principles in the development of the site. In total, the Coleraine lands will see about 485 acres set aside for industrial development. The lands have also been set aside for both prestige and general industrial development. See 'Questions' on page A3

# Equestrian Park has one year to get ready for Games

It's still a work in progress, but things are definitely progressing.

It's now less than a year before the 2015 Pan American Games start, and the countdown event to mark the occasion took place Saturday at Caledon Equestrian Park in Palgrave.

"Welcome to this absolutely phenomenal site," declared Mayor Marolyn Morrison, as she expressed the excitement of the community for the Games that are coming.

She also urged the community to get involved in the coming event.

"Be excited," she said. "Get out there and participate. That's what it's all about."

The equestrian park is undergoing sub-

stantial renovations to get it ready for the coming games, and has been receiving very positive reviews from numerous observers. And the Town of Caledon has come in for much of the credit.

"This would not be here today, if not for Marolyn," remarked former premier David Peterson, TO2015 board chair. "Now we have something that's absolutely world-class."

He also cited Olympic medalist Ian Millar, who said this is as good a facility as he's seen anywhere in the world.

The point was made repeatedly that this is going to be the largest athletic event Canada has ever hosted, with more than 10,000 athletes, coaches and officials coming into the Greater Toronto Area

(GTA) for the Games. Peterson also observed the Games are going to generate some 26,000 new jobs in the area, "all because of the Pan Ams and people working together."

Events like this will always have critics, Peterson commented, but he predicted they will all be on side a year from now.

He also stressed the benefits to the human spirit from the Games.

"I never underestimate the power of sport to unite," he remarked, adding it brings families together, instills confidence in children and promotes healthy

living.

Peterson also pointed out the enhanced equestrian facility is going to remain in the community. "You will have this forever," he said.

"It's amazing how it's come about," declared Minister of State (Sport) Bal Gosal, who also stressed how the facilities will be used by future generations of athletes, adding that was one of the reasons what the government was proud to support the Games. "They're such role models and inspiration to Canadians," he said.

## Questions raised as to whether Bolton needs another supermarket

The north hill lands consist of about eight acres. The plan is for it to include about 40,000 square feet for a supermarket type of development, as well as another 20,000 for associated retail uses.

In terms of municipal services, Williams said there are ideas for a road network within the Coleraine lands, but they are just conceptual at this point. Other services will include sanitary and storm sewers, municipal water, hydro, etc.

There will also be provisions to encourage active transportation.

Williams said prestige industrial will mean campus-style development. Open storage adjacent to Coleraine, Healey and Mayfield Roads will be discouraged.

Former Town councillor Ian Sinclair observed the current conceptual plans call for one storm water management pond north of Healey. He said water flows in that area head south, adding there would be other facilities in place farther to the south.

Williams told him that would be considered in the next stage of the planning process, adding a lot will depend on the configuration of development south of Healey.

Sinclair also pointed to the landscaping features at the nearby Husky Injection Molding Systems site. He said it's like a nat-

ural forest feature which is appealing to look at from Queen Street, and wondered if that had been considered for these lands.

He also wondered about the plans for the north hill lands, commenting it's "astounding that anyone has found the need for more supermarkets in Bolton at this time."

Williams told him she was not aware of any company showing interest in setting up a store there, but said retail commercial studies identified a justifiable need for such development.

There were also some questions about the process. Sinclair argued boundaries in Bolton were being proposed for expansion to accommodate something that had already been approved.

Director of Development Approval and Planning Policy Mary Hall said expansion of the employment lands south to Mayfield Road and west of Coleraine has always been part of the plan. "We're just following through on something we already did," she said.

Planning consultant Alan Young, representing the owners of the lands on the north hill, said his clients are anxious for things to progress. He said they have not secured a tenant for the site because of the lack of planning status there. He also said he didn't understand why these lands are

tied to the Coleraine site.

Hall said the exercise includes doing studies for both sites, adding things can be split if it becomes necessary.

Williams told Councillor Nick deBoer the process has been part of one to amend Peel Region's Official Plan. Since the results of that are not yet known she said it was probably best to keep considering both lands together.

Young also said there are few problems with the 40,000 square feet being set aside for the supermarket, but he was less comfortable with 20,000 square feet being assigned for the related retail. He said he didn't want to "hamstring" the size of that retail area.

David Butler of The Butler Group said the commercial policy review of 2007 included all of Bolton. The biggest concern raised at the time involved downtown Bolton merchants. The 20,000 square foot cap was put in place to satisfy them, he said.

Local resident Sherry Brioschi observed the Province's Places to Grow documents call for complete communities coming from boundary expansions. Williams told her that to accommodate that, they need a certain amount of employment lands.

She added the current process includes amending the Official Plan to include cer-

tain lands to classify them. Mayor Marolyn Morrison added it's required under the Planning Act.

She added Town council voted unanimously to have the lands classified for employment in 2009, but the public meeting couldn't be held until the matter had gone to Peel Region.

"It's a bit weird," Brioschi remarked.

Williams told Councillor Rob Mezzapelli the development proposed for the west side of Coleraine will generally be comparable with that on the east.

Hall told him a 40,000 square foot store would be about two-thirds the size of the Zehrs store in Bolton.

Citizen Self Reporting comes to Ontario Provincial Police

In what is being seen as another move to improve efficiency within one of the largest deployed police services in North America, Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has unveiled a new online reporting system.

This new system will enable the public to report specific occurrences from a computer. Citizen Self Reporting will offer the public another way to report select incidents which are not an emergency, by completing a report online at their convenience.

OPP is one of several Ontario police services who have adopted an internet-based crime reporting system where people can report certain crimes such as lost property, theft from vehicles and property damage, without an officer having to be dispatched. Only occurrences that do not involve an injury, a suspect or evidence are applicable. An officer will attend if requested by the complainant.

It is expected that Citizen Self Reporting will be beneficial to both the public and the police. It will provide a convenient alternative to citizens, while allowing frontline officers to focus their efforts on other enforcement and crime prevention strategies within their communities.

By providing people with another option for reporting crimes, police are hopeful that more incidents will be reported, resulting in the collection of information to develop future crime prevention initiatives.

Police lay drinking driving charge

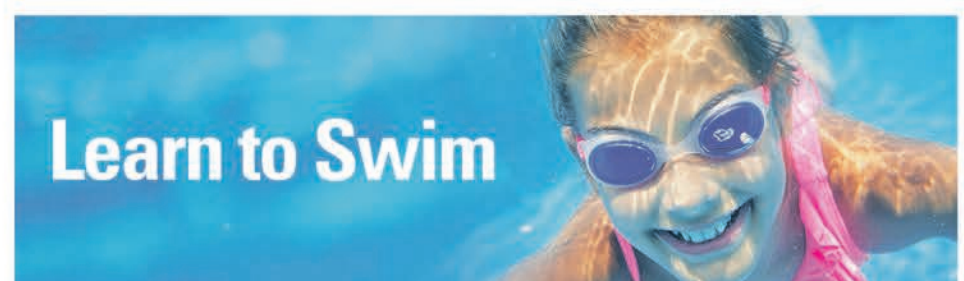

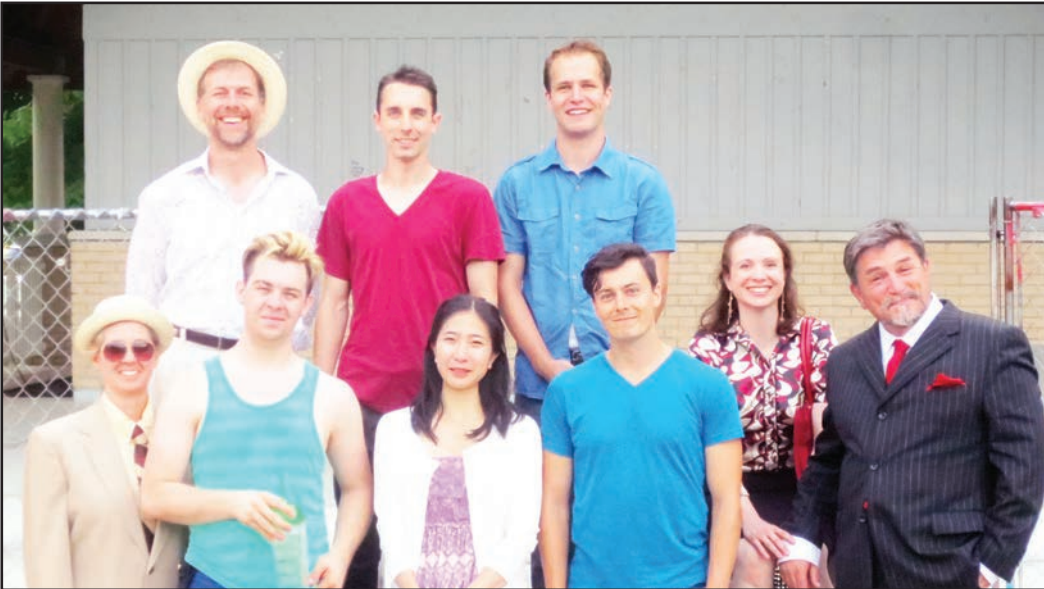

# Jones raises questions about alleged misconduct in Legislature

Dufferin-Caledon MPP Sylvia Jones last week questioned Attorney General Madeline Meilleur on why a Peel assistant crown attorney received double his annual pay in one year; despite the fact that there was a formal complaint lodged against him regarding his conduct around women in the workplace.

“There was a formal complaint lodged against one of your assistant crown attorneys concerning his conduct against women in the Peel crown’s office,” Jones charged in her question. “According to the sunshine list, this same crown attorney walked away with \$368,000 in 2013 — twice his annual salary.”

She asked if a full investigation was held on those allegations.

Meilleur, responding to Jones, agreed the matter was “very important.”

“We have a policy within the government, within our ministry, to make sure that these things are not happening,” the Minister said. “I can assure the member of the opposition that all of these accusations

are dealt with within the ministry on a fair and reasonable basis.

“But I want to reiterate the fact that we have a policy in place in this government to make sure that this does not happen and that when it does happen, proper measures are taken to make sure that it does not happen again,” she added.

Jones wondered if the victim in the case would think the handling was “fair and equitable if you doubled the salary and pay of this person.”

“In the same week you’re promoting your new accountability and transparency legislation in Ontario, the public has the right to know why an assistant crown in your ministry was given \$368,000, twice his annual salary,” Jones added, also pointed out there is information that this same person has been charged with criminal harassment and assault against two young women.

Meilleur replied by stressing the government has procedures in place to make

sure these things don’t happen. “With regard to how much was paid to this individual, this was dealt with the same way that

these cases were dealt with when you were in power,” she said, according to Hansard.

## Trudy Valier seeking council seat in Bolton

Bolton resident Trudy Valier is taking another shot at getting elected to Caledon council.

# A royal commission may be needed

With the Ontario Legislature back in session, one of the first jobs will be to appoint committees, one of which will resume hearings into the scandalous cancellation of natural gas power plants in Oakville and Mississauga.

Thus far, the Conservative and New Democrat members of the committee have succeeded in establishing that the cancellations will likely cost power consumers and/or taxpayers more than \$1 billion, and that an apparent coverup within the office of former premier Dalton McGuinty included the "wiping" of computer hard drives.

However, little or nothing has come to light concerning how it came to be that the two projects were located in areas where fierce local opposition should have been expected.

Now that the Liberals have a majority of Legislature seats, they can also dominate house committees and can thus be expected to cut off debate on both the costliness of the cancellations and the potential criminality involved in destroying emails, a matter properly being handled by the Ontario Provincial Police.

In the circumstances, we think the committee should delve rather deeply into the matter of the processes involved in the area of power planning, and not just in the particular process that led to the scandal.

And one of the first questions that ought to be addressed is whether the matter is sufficiently important and complex that it should be referred to a royal commission with a mandate to recommend not just how future power planning should be undertaken but what sort of entity should undertake the task, as well as what role should be played by the government and/or the Legislature.

Historically, that task was handled by Ontario Hydro, with the government's role mainly as a guarantor of the utility's debt and as the utility's bargaining agent with the federal governments of the day after it was decided to embark on a unique design of nuclear power plants that required close cooperation between Hydro and Atomic Energy of Canada Limited, which until recently was a federal agency.

Hydro's reputation in the area of power planning nose-dived in the 1970s when an expected growth in demand for electricity failed to materialize.

The result was abandonment of some projects and the costly slowing of construction on the Darlington Generating Station.

More recently, power planning became enormously politicized, with the Ontario Liberals promising to close all the province's coal-fired stations and to replace the lost generating capacity with "green energy," particularly wind and solar projects that produced no greenhouse gases.

That represented a marked departure from the "power at cost" theme championed by Hydro since the days of its founder, Sir Adam Beck, and happened in the absence of any planning expertise or mandate within what remained of Hydro after its dissolution by the Harris Conservatives. (All we had left was one agency, Ontario Power Generation, to produce power and a second, Hydro One, to transmit it.)

Today, the big issues facing us include the soaring price of electricity, the future of nuclear power, the potential preservation of the huge Nanticoke and Lambton generating stations through their conversion from coal to natural gas, and the strengthening of links with neighbouring utilities in Quebec, Manitoba and the United States.

There's no doubt such matters could be handled by an all-party legislature committee, but realistically only if the members agreed to put politics aside — something hard to imagine ever happening.

## It happened today

It was the first time Canada ever hosted the Olympics, and the games were characterized by Romanian gymnast Nadia Comaneci achieving perfect scores. It was also the first time a host country failed to win a gold medal in the Olympics.

The Games were opened by Queen Elizabeth II this day, July 17, 1976.

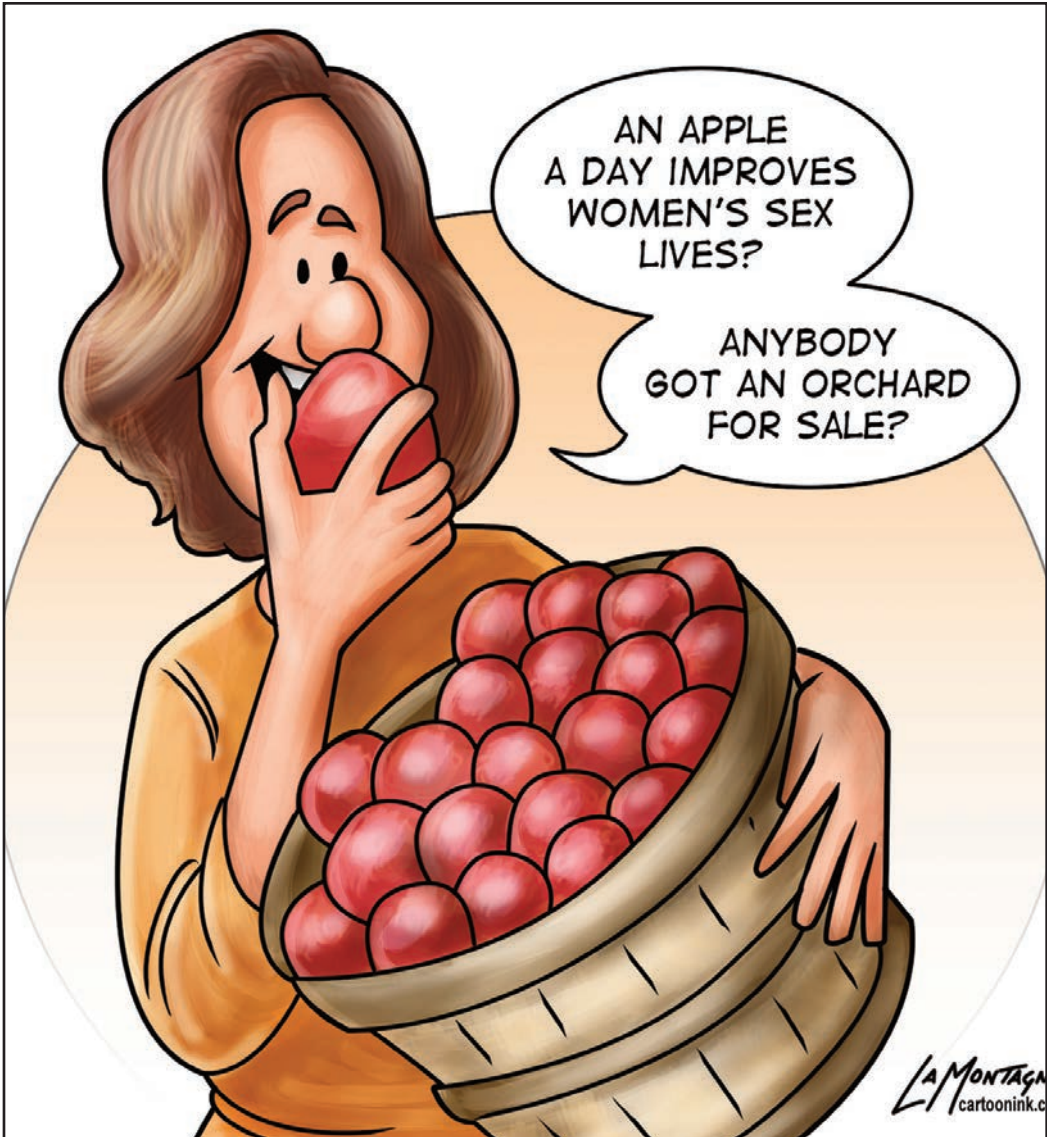

## My annual helping from the Bard

Having been a high school kid many, many years ago, I can still appreciate there are some points of the school year that a lot of kids dread.

I well remember the day in Grade 12 English class when the teacher, almost apologetically, announced we had reached the traditional least favourite time of the year for most students — We were about to start the annual delve into Shakespeare.

We studied Othello that year, and I would have to do some boning up before I could tell you what it was about. That year was not one the high points of my academic life.

But like most people, I did a bit of growing up, and now I look forward to my annual helping of the Bard.

That came Friday night as my wife and I took in the Humber River Shakespeare company's annual offering. It's Romeo and Juliet this year.

Taking in a helping of Shakespeare every year has become sort of a tradition since before we were married. Indeed, Beth was with me the first time I ever took in a play at Stratford (Richard III in June 1997). I remember the timeline because that was the weekend I popped the question (yes, that question). Since that time, we have taken in a number of offerings from Shakespeare, from making return trips to Stratford to a variety of performances put on by groups in the outdoors (there was one memorable evening when we watched a performance of Richard III with an all-female cast — They did a good job too).

In my high school days, they still had Grade 13. Yet while I had five years there, there were only four when we had to read anything by the Bard (for reasons I have never understood, we weren't subjected to it in Grade 9). Thus I was obliged to familiarize myself with the likes of Julius Caesar, Richard III (I keep running into that guy a lot), Othello and Hamlet. I rather enjoyed Caesar. Richard was another matter, because my English teacher in Grade 11, a woman who lived and breathed literature, pointed out that Shakespeare did his writing while the Tudors ruled England, and Richard was the guy they knocked off to get the throne. Bill Shakespeare would have known which side of the proverbial bread to butter up. Besides, the man was a playwright, not a historian. Othello came during a rough year, since my teachers spent a couple of months on strike. That's a year I have spent the last 40-something years trying

to forget, and I spent most of my Grade 13 year dealing with a lot of coming of age issues.

I sometimes think I'm a lot more typical than I'm given credit for being.

I've been told that Romeo and Juliet is commonly the work that Grade 9 kids are assigned to study (if that's true, then I was an exception). But I have seen several versions of the work, including ones performed in a couple of parks, and Beth and I also took in the 1996 film version. I think it was the first time I ever saw Leonardo DiCaprio in anything (he was Romeo). This was during the time when Beth and I were dating, when she was just my girlfriend (before she became my wife and girlfriend), and going to movies Friday nights was almost a ritual.

It was something of an eye-opening experience for me.

The theatre where we watched the picture, if memory serves, held about 300 people, and the place was packed. If there were 20 people in that theatre older than 30, I would be astonished. The hall was filled with kids, of high school age. And since I do recall we were all dressed in our winter gear, the recollection is clear school was in session, and I was sharing and auditorium with a bunch of kids who had Romeo and Juliet on their assignment sheets.

"Oh God!" I muttered in Beth's ear as the theatre began to fill up with adolescents. "This joint's going to be a zoo!"

I was very wrong (it happens occasionally). While the movie was playing, the theatre was a cathedral of silence. I believe Beth and I made more noise munching on our popcorn than the rest of the audience combined. For the most part, the kids were completely absorbed in the movie.

I will grant there was a bit of rowdiness toward the end of the movie, but I was impressed with how far we got into it before the kids started acting like kids. I reached what I thought was the obvious conclusion — namely these kids had Romeo and Juliet on the curriculum, and they had better bone up. When it comes to Shakespeare, actually watching the movie is even better than Coles Notes.

Beth and I took in the performance Friday Aurora. As the local editor, I would have preferred to go to one closer to home, but Mother Nature and production issues got in the way. The show was due to open last Tuesday at Dick's Dam Park in Bolton, but it rained that night (it is a fact that if you arrange outdoor events, you take your chances where the weather is concerned). And last Wednesday was production day for the Citizen. And it was one of those days that I had to fight down the urge to take a sledge hammer to my computer in the office, and then flush the remnants down the nearest toilet. Does that sound to you like a guy who was in an appropriate mood to take in Romeo and Juliet?

But it is still making the rounds, and if you get a chance, the show is highly recommended. It will be performed tonight (Thursday) at Fairy Lake in Newmarket, but will be back in Caledon tomorrow at Alton Mill Arts Centre, Saturday at Fairy Lake, Sunday at the McMichael Canadian Art Collection in Kleinburg, Monday and Tuesday at Thornlodge Park in Mississauga, next Thursday at Fairy Lake, next Friday and Saturday at Nineteen on the Park in Stouffville, July 27 at Montgomery's Inn in Etobicoke, July 29 and 30 at The Old Mill in Toronto, July 31 at Etienne Brulé Park in Toronto, and Aug. 1, 2 and 3 at Montgomery's Inn.

The performances start at 7 p.m. Admission is on a pay-what-you-can basis, but the suggested donation is \$20. That's what we paid, but don't tell anyone, okay?

## Games won't break even

That's pretty much the reaction I had upon picking up last Friday's Toronto Star and reading the main, front-page headline: "Games may not stay on budget, minister says."

Really?

The reference was to the upcoming Pan Am Games and cited Ontario's Minister of Sport Michael Coteau who, despite repeated claims that the \$2.5 billion event would be on budget, confessed, "I can't make that promise to you."

So what else is new? we ask. When in the history of large government projects has anything ever been both on time and on budget? It's just not part of the process.

So to claim it may be over budget is like a Homer Simpson "Doh!" moment. Of course it will be over budget. Government projects — and for that matter most private projects — are always more costly than their original proponents claim they're going to be. If they told the truth out of the gate, they might not get the approvals they want.

Earlier in the week, your correspondent was in Vancouver reading a report from the Vancouver Olympic Committee which claimed — straight up — that those Olympic games broke even. To arrive at this startling conclusion, alas, they simply ignored a host of big-ticket expenditures mostly on the specious grounds that the newly-built facilities will be used for things other than the Olympics themselves.

This sort of nonsense always happens with these mega projects. Why we wanted the Pan Am Games in the first place — having lost several times early on in pursuit of Toronto Olympics — remains a mystery to me.

And while it might be a wonderful thing, for example, for the town of Milton to have a world-class Velodrome cycling track, is that something that community really needed to spend \$56 million to build (up from the estimated \$50 million)? How much will it cost to maintain it after the games end? And who, pray tell, will use it on a regular basis?

A follow-up story in the Sunday Star

quotes the Games' CEO, Saad Rafi, claiming "It's absolutely fair to say we're under budget."

Really? For one thing, there's still close to a year to go and lots of construction snags ahead, and it says here there is absolutely no chance — none whatsoever — that this sports spectacle will end up either under or at budget. Not going to happen. Never does. Never will.

Even the vaunted Olympic Organizing Committee is quietly acknowledging that the cost of staging their games has grown to the point that fewer and fewer cities are interested in bidding for the alleged privilege of hosting them. They've grown so out of control — with an seemingly endless array of competitive "sports" being added (like, really, is synchronised diving something you'd want your son or daughter to devote their early years to?) — that the only way for them to pay for themselves is to have a tyrant like Russia's Vladimir Putin run them since he really doesn't have to worry about his costs being approved by anybody or publicly opposed either.

I feel the same about these giant "amateur" sport displays as I do professional sports, not because I don't like sports — I do, particularly baseball, golf and hockey — but because I think the people who patronise these things should pay for them. Same goes for opera, ballet and various concert venues.

Want to go? Then pony up the dough and go. Just don't take a free ride on the backs of taxpayers.

One more thing. While I'm being a tad grouchy and focussing on the subject of sport, I have to say that I'm glad the World Cup is finally over so that now the sports pages can get back to covering sports I care about.

And why is it that people who love a particular sport tend to get incensed with anybody who doesn't share their passion?

I was speaking to a man last week who asked who I was cheering for in the World Cup. When I said I didn't care who won — or lost — he got upset, launching into a lecture about what a great sport soccer is.

That's fine, for him. But not for me. I love baseball — the Yankees first and foremost — but I don't care if people say they find it boring or whatever. So what? Don't watch it.

There's room for all the sports anybody's heart desires. No need to lecture those who have different interests. Just as long as the public doesn't have to pay for your favourite pastime, that's fine with me.

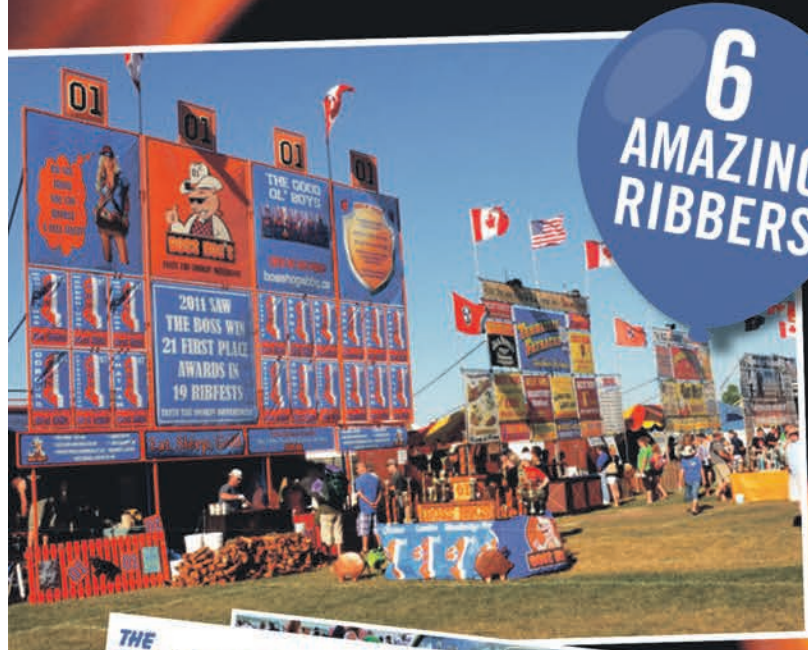
