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## Provincial panel hears lots of ideas for review of plans

The reviews of the Province's various land use plans are drawing lots of interest, and plenty of differing opinions.

Some 400 people were on hand for the Regional town hall meeting last Thursday at the Royal Ambassador Event Centre near Caledon East.

The Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, Greenbelt Plan, Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan and Niagara Escarpment Plan are all currently up for review. The reviews are being run by an expert panel, led by former

Toronto mayor David Crombie. Northumberland-Quinte West MPP Lou Rinaldi, Parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, told last Thursday's crowd they were hoping to pick everyone's brain.

"It's really important to the government that we have a fulsome discussion," he said, adding it was a chance to share ideas. "Caledon is a vibrant area from agricultural lands in this area," Rinaldi remarked. He also stressed these reviews represent a historic event, as he reflected these

plans are award winning and internationally recognized.

Maya Harris, of the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH), told the crowd the plans are aimed at protecting important agricultural land and water resources.

The Greenbelt, she said, involves the countryside, as well as resources and recreation opportunities. Harris also said it's one of the world's largest and best protected greenbelts. She added there has been progress in protecting the lands, but there's room for improvement.

The discussions at the meeting were divided into questions, with the participants breaking into groups to discuss them individually. Some of those groups reported back at the end of the session.

One question was how can the plans better support the long-term protection of agricultural lands, water and natural areas?

The suggestions that came up included having clearer lines of authority when it comes to the various levels of government.

One man observed the Greenbelt was supposed to protect farmers, but it hasn't. He pointed out, too, that local municipalities have to deal with traffic passing through between the developed areas to the north and south, while the local authorities have to pay to maintain roads, etc.

One woman stated that intensification should be mandated in urban areas, while all prime agricultural land in the

Greenbelt is protected.

Another woman called for harmonization of the language in the various plans, mentioning the possibility of an umbrella plan to cover the others.

One man called for the plans to include incentives to protect the land and water resources.

Another man commented that protecting the agricultural land is "only a first step." They also have to protect the farmer.

Another question dealt with how can the plans be strengthened to ensure communities make the best use of key infrastructure, such as transit, roads, sewers and water?

One man referred to the need to harmonize the various plans, while one woman mentioned the need to consolidate plans to make them simple and easy to enforce. There were also calls for more commercial infrastructure, as well as more enforcement of truck routes and better and more frequent public transit.

Addressing that issue, one woman called for having the study areas made more specific, along with more coordination between levels of government.

She added the Greenbelt legislation needs to be better understood.

One of the other questions dealt with how can the plans continue to support the design of attractive, livable and healthy communities that are accessible to all at all stages of life?

One man stated it's essential to have public transit, so people have a way of getting around without their cars. He also called for more affordable internet access to help everyone "travel the information highway."

One woman called for a mixture of housing types, reflecting diversity and flexibility.

Another called for more green space, as well as integrating communities with natural heritage.

Another question was aimed at addressing how the plans can better support the development of communities that attract workers and the businesses that employ them.

One man suggested allowing more flexible zoning in certain areas.

Another said the plans should be more focused on implementation, as well as calling for provisions of a more diverse housing mix. He also said the plans should allow for more rural economic development.

Another man brought up the GTA West Transportation Corridor, which traverses

Caledon. He said there has to be study of all necessary servicing requirements in the area, including employment lands both north and south of the corridor. He also wasn't sure if there's much of a need for retail land, considering the growing popularity of on-line shopping.

In dealing with how the plans can help address climate change, one woman commented on the need to act, rather than just recognize it. She also commented on the need to limit infrastructure to invite the use of non-greenhouse gasses.

Another woman called for expanding the Greenbelt and freezing urban boundaries. She also called for the creation of more local employment opportunities to discourage people from driving to work. As well, she spoke to the need to address other pollutants than carbon dioxide.

Other issues raised at the meeting included whether spiritual leaders from the Aboriginal communities had been consulted. Adam Redish, of MMAH, said there has been a focus on Aboriginal engagement strategy.

Addressing the timelines of the review, Redish said the consultation period will be running until late May. After that, he said the panel will be going through the material, with the aim of presenting a report to the government in September.

There will be more consultation in the second phase of the project, with more public consultation.

Caledon Mayor Allan Thompson observed that Caledon is impacted directly by all these plans, so he said the challenge is harmonizing all the demands, since the different plans have different policies.

"They're all talking different languages," he said, adding it's frustrating for planners and municipal leaders.

That was an issue that a couple of other people raised from the floor.

Another man, who lives in northwest Caledon, complained about the increase of estate residential housing. "What a waste of land!" he declared, adding they should be curtailed in areas where they're planned for the future.

A Palgrave woman called for the enforcement of policies.

"Policies that are not enforced are just words on a piece of paper," she said. "Policies have to be enforced."

Former Caledon councillor Richard Paterak observed that about 78.5 per cent of Caledon is in either the Greenbelt, Niagara Escarpment or Oak Ridges Moraine Plans. He wondered if the Province was going to help the community filling the infrastructure needs that will be brought on where growth is restricted

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# Yard waste collection has resumed again in Caledon

Peel Region's yard waste collection services started this week in Caledon.

## Region will be on holiday hours this weekend

Region of Peel offices and non-emergency services will be closed for Good Friday April 3.

Some Regional offices will remain closed for Easter Monday April 6.

Caledon residents are advised that there will be no waste collection services Good Friday. Garbage, week A area yard waste and recycling (blue box and green bin) will be collected the next day. Regular waste collection services will resume the week of April 6.

All Community Recycling Centres (CRCs) will be closed Friday and Sunday (April 5). CRCs will reopen April 6 for regular hours of operation. Bolton CRC reopens for regular hours of operation Tuesday (April 7).

Human Services Reception, Employment Resource Centres, Peel Access to Housing, Service Access and Ontario Works will be closed Friday and Monday, reopening Tuesday. Peel Living and Rent Supplement offices will be closed Friday, reopening Monday.

The following Regional offices and services will be close Friday, reopening Monday: Access Peel, Dental Services at Peel Public Health Clinics, Healthy Sexuality Clinics (however, there will be no sexual health clinic services available except for needle exchange) and Public Works Reception.

Breastfeeding Clinics will be closed Friday and Monday, reopening Tuesday.

TransHelp service hours will be from 6 a.m. Friday to 1 a.m. the following morning. Service will be provided by taxi vendors, but not available by bus. Regular bus service will resume Saturday. Accessible Transportation offices will be closed Friday and reopen Monday.

The Peel Art Gallery, Museum and Archives (PAMA) will be closed Friday, reopening Saturday. Visit [pama.peelregion.ca](http://pama.peelregion.ca) for more information on PAMA's exhibits and programs.

For emergencies related to food, shelter, medication and personal supports, call the Ontario Works after-hours line at 905-793-9200 or the Region's main line at 905-791-7800.

In urban settlement areas and rural subdivisions, yard waste is collected every-other-week from April to November. To see their collection day schedule, residents should refer to their 2015 Annual Guide or visit [peelregion.ca/waste](http://peelregion.ca/waste) to view an online schedule for their address.

In rural areas, the Region collects unlimited amounts of acceptable yard waste three times in the spring and three times in the fall to help residents manage during peak seasons. The spring collection days this year will be April 27, May 25 and June 22. The fall collection days will be Oct. 26, Nov. 9 and Nov. 23.

Caledon residents may also drop off dedicated loads of residential yard waste, free of charge and year-round, at the Caledon and Bolton Community Recycling Centres (CRCs). Visit [peelregion.ca/waste](http://peelregion.ca/waste) for hours of operation and locations.

Businesses, such as lawn maintenance companies, disposing of yard waste are subject to standard drop-off fees.

### Yard waste collection tips

Residents are asked to follow these steps when putting yard waste at the curb for collection.

- Place yard waste in labelled, open, rigid

and reusable containers; bushel baskets; or paper yard waste bags.

- Set out yard waste and recyclable material on the opposite side of the driveway from garbage, if possible.
- Tie brush securely in bundles up to 1.2 metres (four feet) in length and 76 centimetres (30 inches) in width, weighing no more than 20 kilograms (44 pounds).
- Brush and tree trimmings must be 10 centimetres (four inches) or less in diameter.

Tree debris exceeding 1.2 metres (four feet) in length and 7.5 centimetres (three inches) in diameter and weighing more than 20 kilograms (44 pounds) needs to be cut into smaller pieces and bundled according to set-out standards in order to be collected curbside. Residents are reminded that cutting and removal of trees and related debris is a specialized skill, and are encouraged to hire a contractor to do the work for them.

- Additional guidelines**
- Leaves, garden

trimmings, plants, grass clippings, twigs, branches and lawn edgings (earth removed) can be set out as yard waste.

- Fruits and vegetables from the garden should be placed in backyard composters or set out as yard waste.
- Shredded paper should be placed loose in yard waste containers or green bins.
- Do not use plastic bags, cardboard boxes, green bins or blue boxes for yard waste.
- Do not include stumps, soil, sod or stones with yard waste.
- Stumps, soil, sod and stones can be taken to any of Peel's CRCs for disposal — drop-off fees apply.

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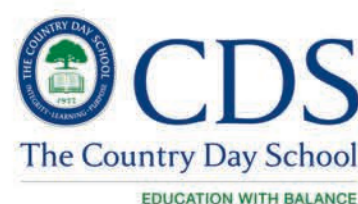
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# Police remind citizens not to fall for 'emergency' scam

OPP are reminding citizens that emergency scams target vulnerable persons and seniors by playing upon their emotions and rob them of their money.

Each year, emergency scam artists contact thousands of citizens and many people get scammed in their rush to help. Many victims are hesitant to say "no" or to hang up on someone on the phone, which makes them easy targets for criminals to access substantial sums of money.

In 2014, five per cent of all complaints received by the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre were victims of the "emergency scam" — sometimes referred to as the "grandparent scam." Of those 1,977 complaints, 737 people were identified as victims who reported a total loss of more than \$2.4 million.

In the typical emergency scam, the victim will receive a frantic phone call from someone claiming to be a grandchild or loved one. The caller will explain that they are involved in some sort of mishap or are having trouble returning from a foreign country and need money right away.

Scammers know how to gather your personal information for criminal means. They use phony social media accounts to find real names, real interests, real phone numbers and when you are going to be home or away. They'll even call in the middle of the night to take advantage of the confusion caused by awaking suddenly with the expectation its bad news at that hour. Most of all, they rely upon the victim's desire to help their loved ones, whatever the cost.

### Be aware of some warning signs

- Urgency — The scammer always makes the request sound very urgent, which may cause the victim to not verify the story.
- Fear — The scammer plays on the victim's emotions by generating a sense of fear. For instance they may say, "I am scared and I need help from you."

• Secrecy — The scammer pleads with the victim not to tell anyone about the situation, such as, "Please don't tell Dad, he would be so mad."

• Request for money transfer — Money is usually requested to be sent by a money transfer company such as Money Gram, Western Union or even through one's own bank institution.

To avoid becoming a victim, police advise people to first check with another family member or trusted friend to verify the information before sending money or providing credit card information by phone or email. It is important that the incident be reported every time it occurs, to allow police to investigate and prevent others from becoming victims.

Those who may have been the victim of an "emergency" scam, or know someone who might have been, should contact lo-

cal police or Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477 (TIPS).

"All consumers, regardless of age and gender, can take basic steps to protect themselves from becoming victims of fraud, such as never giving out personal information over the phone, the internet or social media," Deputy OPP Commissioner Scott Tod warned. "Remember, if it is too good to be true, it probably is."

"Knowledge is power," Detective Inspector Mike Bickerton, of the OPP Anti-Rackets Branch, added.

The key to prevent becoming a victim of fraud is to know the warning signs and share your knowledge with the people you care about. We encourage you to join the conversation on social media using #stop-fraud #fraudprevention and #dontbeavictim

# Social media engagement confirms distracted driving is a safety threat

OPP wrapped up their distracted driving campaign with strong support from the public, media and other road safety partners.

Throughout the campaign, they remained heavily engaged in OPP's continuous flow of messaging about distracted driving.

As OPP officers kept busy conducting targeted enforcement of distracted driving laws on roads and highways across the province, OPP's social media highway was equally busy with followers, including children who viewed, shared and chimed in on this road safety topic.

Over and above enforcement, public education is an important component of OPP's Provincial Traffic Safety Program and the traffic safety campaigns it supports.

"Whether you were a follower who showed support through social media, a driver who set a good example behind the wheel, or a passenger who spoke up to a distracted driver in the vehicle, thank you and please keep working towards making distracted driving a socially unacceptable behaviour on our roads," said Deputy Commissioner Brad Blair, provincial commander of traffic safety and operational support.

A 55-year-old woman from Caledon is facing charges after a concerned citizen reported a possible impaired driver to Caledon OPP March 17.

Police said they got the report shortly after 9:30 p.m., and it was regarding a vehicle heading south on Highway 10 in the Valleywood area.

Officers arrived in the area and found the vehicle parked inside the lit garage. Officers approached the front door and

were met by a female who displayed signs of impairment. The confirmed that she had just returned home and had consumed alcohol before driving. She further reported that she had not consumed any alcohol after arriving home.

The woman was arrested and charged with impaired operation of a motor vehicle and driving with more than the legal limit of alcohol in her system.

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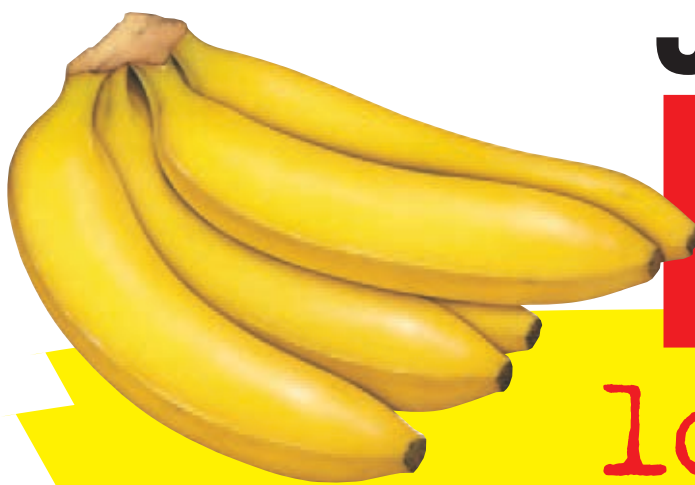

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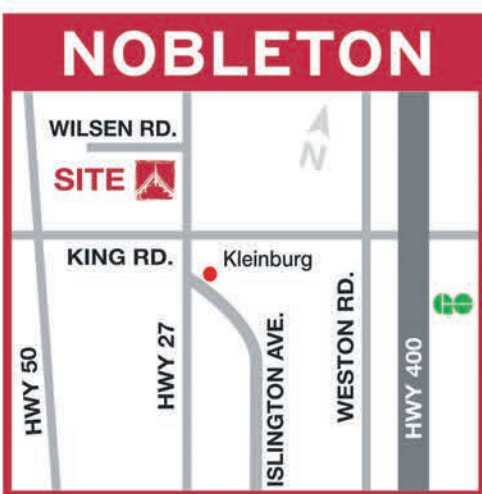

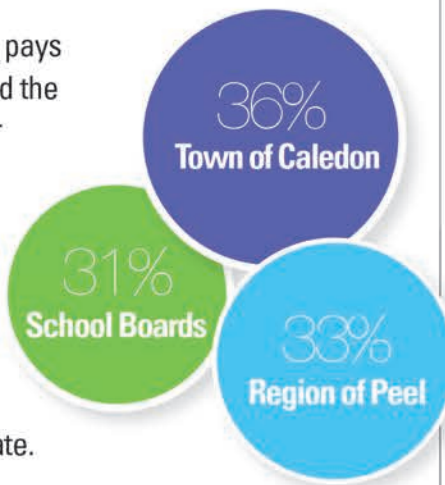

## 2015 Tax Assistance Program for Low Income Seniors and Persons with Disabilities

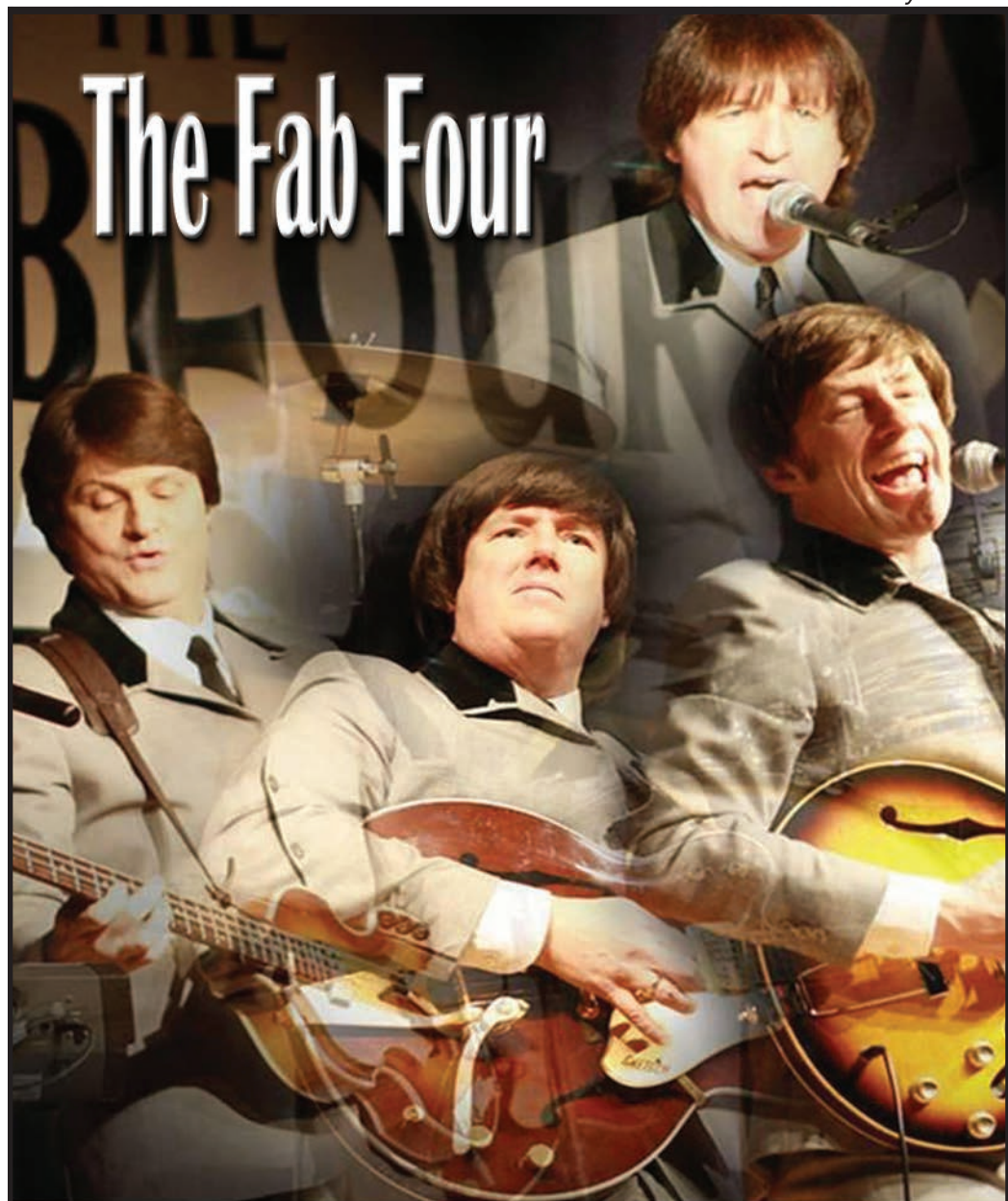

United Way also presented Spirit Awards to several organizations and in-

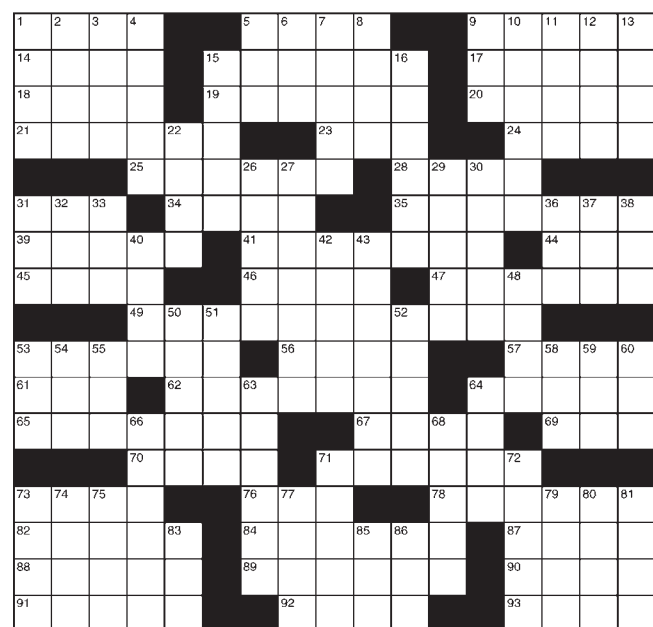
dividuals to recognize their efforts in the campaign and their volunteer work in the community.

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# Women's rights require society's endorsement

Last month saw the resurfacing of the case of the young woman who was raped and beaten on a bus in India and later died in hospital.

One of the accused, on death row, continues to believe he has no responsibility, that the woman, in fact, was to blame for his actions.

Our western values and culture have apparently transcended these arcane and prohibitive attitudes towards women, thanks to the women's movement of the 1970s.

Although women had already gained the right to an education, the right to vote, the right to employment, an increase in property rights and sexual freedom, anticipation remained. These theoretical rights and freedoms had not been realized. To address this issue, the women's movement emerged from the general movement to right all wrongs, sprung by the 1970s freedom generation.

Unfortunately, women's rights seem to be taken for granted today. The vast majority of women still do not have the freedom of choice when it comes to raising children or garnering gainful employment. They must do both if they wish to have children. The intent of the women's movement was to give women the choice to either remain housewives or work outside the home.

Another unforeseen effect of the movement manifested itself in developing a wedge amongst women, those who wanted to stay home and raise children and those who wanted to work outside the home. Proponents of the movement were labelled women's libbers. All too quickly, that label gained a negative connotation which remains to this day.

Did the women's movement backfire? Not entirely. We do have reforms in the family law act, pensions, and pay equity, only parts of which have worked. There is plenty of room and opportunity to further these reforms in the approach to true equity.

Nevertheless, our society is at risk of having women's rights diminished. Gradually, they have been weakened over the years. With every effort to increase women's rights, there seems to be a counter-effort to reduce them. The pay equity legislation of the 1980s fell apart as women continue to be paid less than men in equal — not simply equivalent — jobs, especially in upper executive positions. And only eight per cent of these positions are held by women in Canada.

Compounding these discouraging statistics is the threat of cultural gender inequities seeping in through immigration. If the type of man in the Indian jail is any indication of that cultural norm, then it becomes a responsibility of Canada to educate and enlighten the newcomers. Unfortunately, it takes more than one generation to overcome entrenched views, views that contravene Canada's philosophy and laws.

When women must wear a hijab or a niqab to cover their faces and bodies for religious reasons, do we question the reasoning or do we remain ignorant? In the Islam religion, the primary reason a woman is required by her God to cover her body is the preservation of respectful male and female relationships, especially with males outside of the family. There are other compelling arguments to support this attire, and I encourage the reader to educate him/herself on them. Succinctly, a woman's dress sends one

of two messages to others, either "pay attention to my looks" or the opposite.

It is the interpretation of this message that becomes subject to question? How often have we heard, "She asked for it" because of what she was wearing? This is an example of how the actions and decisions of women are more scrutinized and held to account than those of men. How does that mindset not affect our society's view of women as this practice moves into Canada, and old, denigrating attitudes subtly resurface?

Today, the Wynne government has made a notable effort to arm young people, especially young women, with the tools they need to make informed, positive decisions about their personal health, sexual and psychological, and to insist on respectful

treatment from the opposite sex. After all, women are and will always be more vulnerable than men.

If this society is to accomplish legitimacy in women's rights, it is not an option for women to consider one another as competition, but to come together and believe in one another. There is an opportunity today to build on what began in the 1970s, to make it a more level playing field for women, to have women viewed and respected as men are viewed and respected. Society must endorse women's rights.

The women's movement may require resurgence, not only to preserve the gains of the last century, but to continue to confront inequities and pave the way to a more enlightened future for all women and men in our society.

## Tilson on hand to celebrate Life for Youth

Many of today's youths have trouble finding a job and/or the experience most employers want.

LIFE for Youth (LFY) is a game changer for these youths.

LFY is operated by Caledon Community Services (CCS) it is a paid, six-month program run by project manager Mary Falcone. LFY provides an opportunity for youths to gain employability and life skills, through innovative classroom instruction and various in-house work placements.

This year, LFY is in its ninth cycle. It has been granted more than \$420,000 to aid 24 youths in Caledon toward getting skills and experience necessary to make a successful transition to the job market or return to school. To date 140 out of 190 students who took part in this program went on to graduate from post-secondary education.

Life for Youths ninth cycle was hosted at Chez Thrift in Bolton where Dufferin-Caledon MP David Tilson stepped to the stage to congratulate all the participants and showed his appreciation for the LFY program. "Life for Youth is one of the

Yard waste collection resumes **March 31** in the Town of Caledon.

#### Urban Settlement Areas and Rural Subdivisions

Yard waste is collected every other week from April to November in Caledon urban settlement areas and rural subdivisions.

#### Rural Areas

The Region of Peel collects unlimited amounts of acceptable yard waste in rural areas of Caledon three times in the spring and three times in the fall to help residents manage their yard waste during peak seasons.

#### Spring yard waste collection days:

- Monday, April 27
- Monday, May 25
- Monday, June 22



### Yard Waste Set-Out Tips

Residents are asked to follow these steps when putting yard waste at the curb for collection:

- Place yard waste in labelled, open, rigid and reusable containers; bushel baskets; or paper yard waste bags
- Set out yard waste and recyclable material on the opposite side of the driveway from garbage, if possible
- Tie brush securely in bundles up to 1.2 metres (4 feet) in length and 76 centimetres (30 inches) inches width, weighing no more than 20 kilograms (44 pounds)
- Brush and tree trimmings must be 10 centimetres (4 inches) or less in diameter

**Please note:** Tree debris exceeding 1.2 metres (4 feet) in length and 7.5 centimetres (3 inches) in diameter and weighing more than 20 kilograms (44 pounds) needs to be cut into smaller pieces and bundled according to set-out standards in order to be collected curbside. Residents are reminded that cutting and removal of trees and related debris is a specialized skill, and we encourage them to hire a contractor to do the work for them.

# Don't hope for the earth from plan reviews

It was heartening to see so many people out last Thursday for the public session on the reviews of the various Provincial land use plans.

The Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, Niagara Escarpment Plan, Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan and the Greenbelt Plan are all up for review, and we think there can be general agreement that there is some room for improvement.

The need to harmonize these plans so they don't conflict with each other was heard a lot at last week's session, as was the call for simplification and clarification of the language they contained.

As for where the plans go beyond that will remain to be seen.

There were some 400 people offering their input last week. Divided into tables for smaller discussion, we're sure there were many other points of input that were not announced at the general open portion that concluded the evening.

With so many points there to be made, we can't help but wonder how many of them got lost in the shuffle.

It shouldn't be surprising that some adjustment to these plans should be in order. For one thing, both the Greenbelt and Moraine plans are relatively new, meaning it's very realistic to assume there were some mistakes and oversights that occurred when they were established and put in place. It was impossible to please everyone from the start, and not everyone is going to be happy with the result of these reviews.

When the Moraine plan was unveiled more than 10 years ago, there were some who lobbied strongly for its creation, complaining it didn't go far enough. There were also complaints that the plan was flawed because it would be subject to review after a certain number of years, meaning it wasn't permanent.

What has to be appreciated is the number of varying and conflicting interests that come into play with these reviews. There are many who are mainly concerned with the well-being of the environment, but even among those people, there can be conflict. And all of that has to be balanced with the realization that several million people live in the area covered by these plans, and they all have to be housed, fed, employed, entertained and have to have the ability to move around.

While some will like the results of these reviews, others will be displeased.

And all of this has to be judged according to the conditions that exist today, not the thinking that was in place when these plans were formed, and not necessarily what the case will be years from now. None of us have the gift of prophecy (although some of us like to think we do), and if the results of these reviews are wanting, we at least have the comfort of knowing there will be other reviews in the years to come.

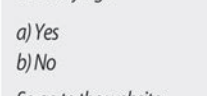

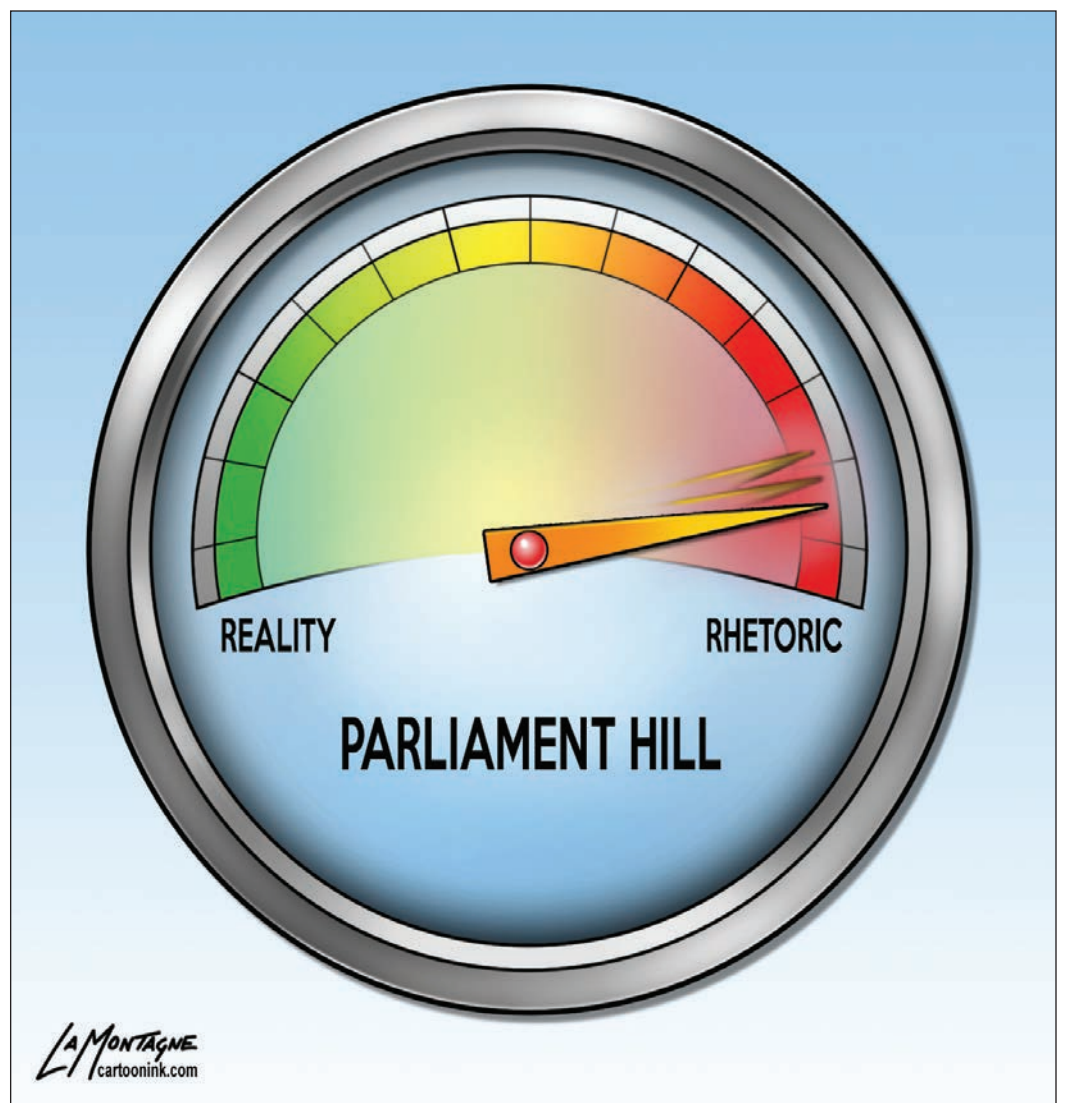

# Government wants a life sentence to mean a sentence for life

As Prime Minister Stephen Harper said, "Canadians want a country where justice, real justice, is at the heart of our legal system, where the hope for rehabilitation is balanced with appropriate punishment and prevention and with compassion for law-abiding people and their families."

This is just one reason why our government made a commitment in the 2013 Speech from the Throne to ensure a life sentence for Canada's most hardened criminals means exactly that — a sentence for life.

Our government is following through on this commitment and is introducing legislation to amend the Criminal Code to ensure that Canada's most heinous criminals — those whose actions means we cannot risk permitting them on our streets — remain imprisoned for the rest of their natural lives with no chance of parole.

This will include those convicted of high treason, as well as for first degree murders involving: sexual assault, kidnapping or forcible confinement, terrorism, the killing of police officers or corrections officers, or any first degree murders that are found to be particularly brutal in nature.

At the same time, to address constitutional concerns, this legislation will permit a

criminal serving life without parole to apply to the Minister of Public Safety for exceptional release after no less than 35 years. As Prime Minister Harper said, "This is not parole. Unlike parole, decisions will not rest with an appointed board, but with the federal cabinet, men and women fully accountable to their fellow citizens and to the families of the victims of these crimes."

This is legislation that builds on our government's record of protecting Canadians and putting victims first. For example, we've strengthened the law regarding people deemed not criminally responsible for violent acts. We repealed the faint hope clause that allowed for the application of early parole. Plus, we created mandatory prison sentences for violent offences, such as sexual crimes against children.

Meanwhile, to ensure the rights of victims come before the rights of criminals, we introduced our Victims' Bill of Rights. We also recently announced our government will introduce legislation that would end the practice of making early release available for repeat violent offenders.

Our government is working to hold violent offenders accountable, enhance the rights of victims, and help keep families and communities safe.

# Trust a victim of partisanship

Hoping to get opposing political parties to trust each other is analogous to what Mark Twain once said about trying to teach a pig to sing: it wastes your time and annoys the pig.

This is apropos of the current shouting and gnashing of teeth in Ottawa between Prime Minister Stephen Harper's Conservative government and the opposition NDP and Liberals when it comes to debating the merits — or demerits — of Bill C-51, the government's anti-terror legislation.

Everybody agrees that given the current sad realities we are facing, some sort of anti-terror legislation is in order.

What the opposition doesn't like — of course — is the legislation the Tories are offering to deal with what is clearly an extremely vexing problem.

The main complaint — and it is not without merit — is that the legislation a) goes too far in impinging on individual rights and b) lacks a parliamentary oversight provision which, in theory at least, would stop governments from overstepping their authority.

There is no doubt that the criticism from the Liberals and NDP — as well as from academia and media sources — has made some impact, since the Tories plan to roll back two significant proposals in the bill: one, broadening the definition of civil protest so that legitimate domestic protesters can't get caught up in the terrorism laws, and two, editing out a provision which, according to the critics, gave government departments and agencies unlimited freedom to share personal and commercial information about Canadians with foreign governments.

Naturally, when the Tories leaked their intentions over the weekend, the opposition parties complained that the amendments don't go far enough. For opposition parties, government amendments rarely do. But there you have it.

But one of the underlying problems with our current system — which is what the pig analogy is about — is that partisanship has become so intense that trying to teach politicians of different parties to trust each other, even when the stakes are as high as they are on the terrorism file, is virtually impossible.

What happens as a result is that governments — and not just the current one — feel they can't trust their political opponents enough to even attempt to run ideas past them without the opponents leaking these ideas to the media to make themselves look good and make the government look bad.

In serious matters of state, mutual trust can be an important tool for getting things done properly.

But when there is a lack of trust on both sides then, alas, things generally don't work out as well as they could and should.

It has become fashionable among the usual suspects to accuse Harper of being secretive and untrusting. And in many respects, it's true.

But on the other hand, can we really expect him to trust the Liberals and NDP with sensitive information only to see them rushing off to their favourite journalist to pass along whatever it is they've been asked to consider in private?

You'll recall the recent kerfuffle made by Ontario Premier Kathleen Wynne for a while over the fact that Harper, despite her many pleas — all of which she made through the media, which tells you how serious she really was about it — would not meet with her to discuss issues of importance to Ontario.

And although that issue has been dealt with — they did have a meeting — Wynne might ask herself why, a year earlier, she came out of a "private" meeting with Harper and immediately discussed what they'd been talking about and whined that he simply scoffed at her suggestions.

That's hardly the best way to assure a good working relationship, assuming — which is a big assumption — that she actually wants that with a Tory prime minister.

Just last week in Ottawa there were two other egregious examples of opposition politicians being unable to keep their big mouths shut over sensitive national security issues.

In the first instance, opposition politicians left a closed-door briefing on Iraq by Mark Gwozdecky, director of the Middle East bureau at Foreign Affairs, only to use the supposedly confidential briefing notes to attack Harper's plans for Iraq.

Earlier, after the Tories gave the opposition parties advance warning about their plans to extend the Iraq mission — a sign of political good faith, given the seriousness of the issue — opposition parties immediately leaked the details to their favourite media outlets.

As National Post columnist John Ivison wrote on Saturday, the Tories have been accused of using security as a wedge issue for political gain. "But there is a genuine lack of trust on the government side ... rooted in the hypocrisy of opposition parties who demand to be treated like grown-ups, while at the same time engaging in the kind of sophomoric shenanigans we have seen this week."

Indeed.

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## Tri-County gold for minor atom AE and midget AE Hawks

But their offence was shut down once again in Game 6, when they tried desperately to find the tying goal in an eventual 2-1 losing effort.

The top-tiered AA program experienced some success at the provincial level, sending two teams through a competitive OMHA schedule in March.

It was a smooth ride to the finals for the minor bantam AAs, going perfect in Tri-County divisional play before losing just one game on the way to facing the Barrie Colts in the championship.

Unfortunately, the powerhouse Colts' goaltending was just too much for the Hawks, as they managed only one goal in a three-game sweep.

The minor midget AAs also dominated their circuit, going almost six weeks

## Equestrian facility on time and on budget

The Caledon Equestrian Park is managing to stay on time and under budget for the upcoming Pan Am Games.

This building is one of several buildings needed for the Pan Am games.

"We've been able to remain under budget," Project Manager Sherry Brake said in a report that appeared on CTV News Barrie last week. "We stayed within our original guidelines."

Last week, electricians were installing overhead lighting and exit signs in the building. Constructing this facility has been a battle with Mother Nature. Site supervisor Jordan Celluci said they'd just recently got the roof on, so now workers can get the job done in a warmer environment.

There has been \$11 million put toward making this venue, the CTV report stated. When finished, it will be one of the largest equestrian facilities in Canada.

Inside the facility, there is a training area and a competition ring. Next to it there is an indoor stable that can

house more than 70 horses, and lastly the track for horse racing.

The substance being used for the track has been optimized for their running. Katherine Ward from CTV News said "officials say proper footing can make all the difference."

The track is made of sand textiles and natural products, so it is safe for the horses during competition.

Craig Collins, managing partner with Equine Management Group, said the sand on the track "gives the horses that ability to have that platform, but at the same time give them the ability to land softly."

By this week their goal is to have all electrical work done. After that it will take a month to assemble the temporary grand stands that will surround the track. Landscaping is to be finished by May 1

The matter came up at last Tuesday's meeting of Caledon council.

"We are on time, below budget and everything is moving along great." Parks and Recreation Director Laura Johnston told councillors.

## Coyotes howl at Sweethearts Tournament in Orangeville

From Jan. 30 to Feb. 1, the Caledon Coyotes peewee B rep team was victorious in the 37th annual Sweethearts Tournament.

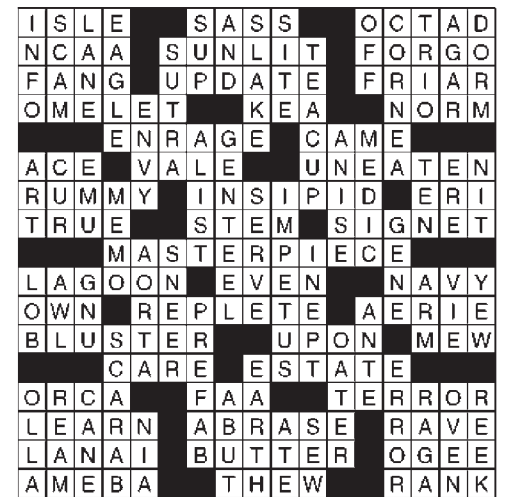
thusiasm never giving up and all achieving personal best performances. The game strategies that were presented to them by their opposition were taken in stride and handled with confidence.

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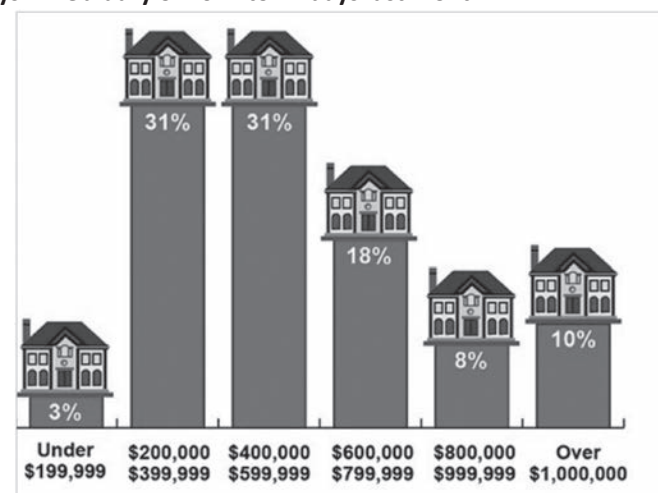
Average pricing in Toronto was \$576,000, according to the Canadian Real Estate Association. "There's these very low mortgage rates that make it cheaper than ever to borrow but the sums you have to borrow are just astronomical," Graham said. However, the Canadian Real Estate Association recently cut its outlook for home sales this year.

The association predicts the impact of declining oil prices on consumer confidence in some provinces will push down home sales by 1.1 per cent to 475,700 units countrywide. At the same time, household debt levels have hit a new record, according to figures released this month from Statistics Canada. Canadians now owe a record \$1.63 for every \$1 of disposable income. The Bank of Canada and its governor Stephen Poloz have repeatedly warned consumers to reduce their debt levels because interest rates will eventually rise. However, the central bank surprised markets by cutting its benchmark overnight rate in January, as part of an effort to shield the economy from the impact of collapsing prices for crude oil. Some observers worry that the interest rate cut will fuel already-blistering real estate markets in Toronto and Vancouver, encouraging some Canadians to take on more debt at record-low rates.

Despite one of the most bitterly nasty winters in recent memory, some 6,338 houses and condos sold in February, up from 5,696 a year ago, according to TREB figures. Top for transactions were detached homes in the 416 region, with sales up 16.9 per cent, no doubt further buoyed by the recent further drop in interest rates. Overall, detached home sales were up 13.9 per cent across the GTA.

The average sale price of a detached was up 8.9 per cent across the GTA, to an average of \$782,166. But demand for the holy grail of housing—a detached house close to work and transit in the highly coveted City of Toronto—saw average sale prices average an unprecedented \$1.04 million for the whole month. That compared to \$694,285 in the 905 regions.

The average days on market for all housing types dropped by 7.7 per cent in February—largely reflecting continued high demand in the face of a shortage of properties for sale—from 26 days in February of 2014 to 24 days last month.

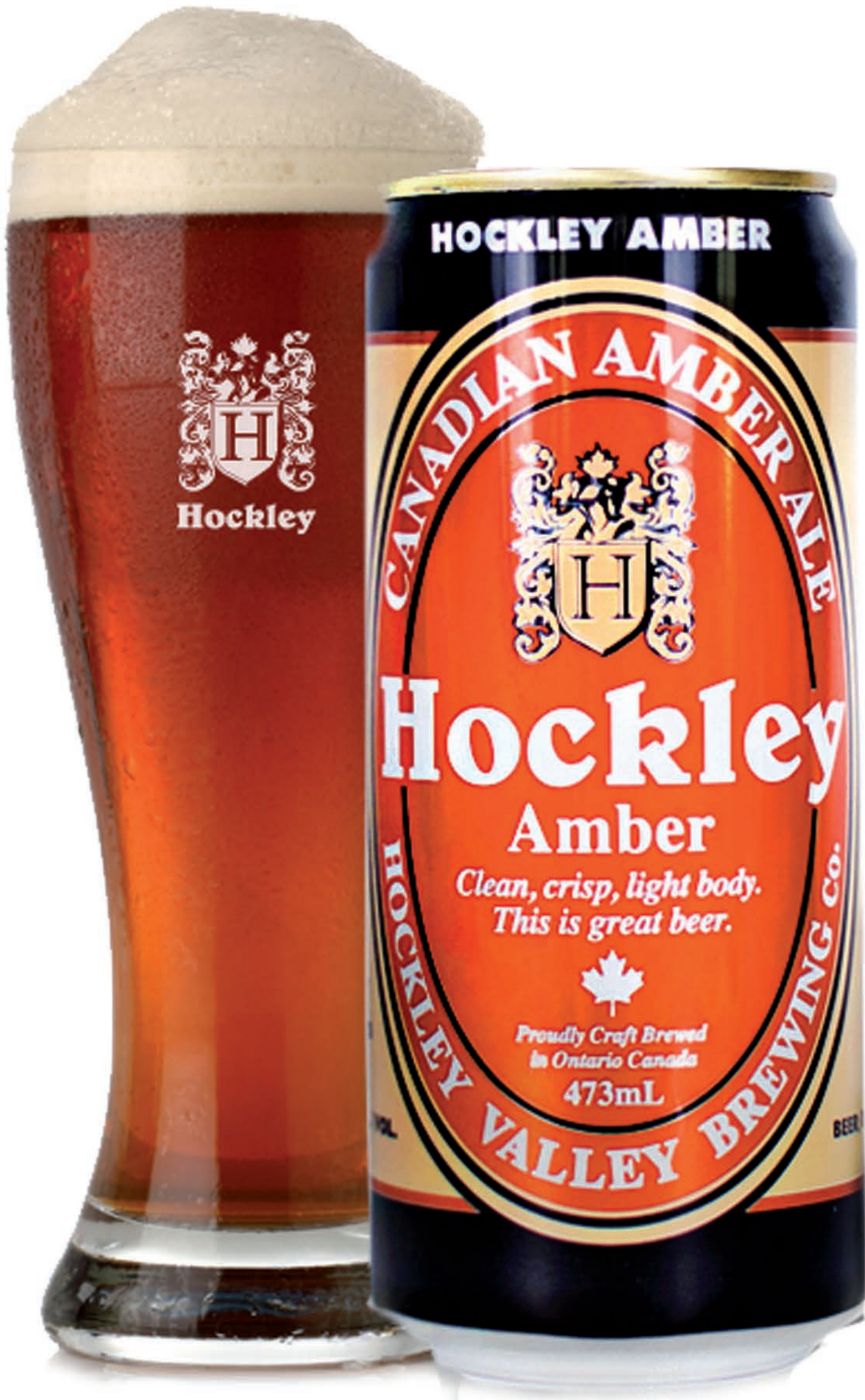
