

Bolton's new fire hall to go on north hill

By Bill Rea

Bolton is likely to have a new fire hall in the next two years. Caledon Fire and Emergency Services recently held a series of open house sessions to offer information on the planned site.

The facility is slated to go on the north hill of the village, at the northwest corner of Queen Street (Regional Road 50) and Cross Country Boulevard, opposite Bolton Heights Road.

The fire hall is currently on Ann Street in the valley. Councillor Rob Mezzapelli had observed that's in the flood plain of the Bolton Special Policy Area.

It was reported at the sessions that the Town and Peel Region undertook an internal investigation to look into the relocation of the station. The consultant retained for the job reviewed potential sites,

considering such factors as response times, property size, resource complements (including how long it would take to assem- Deputy Fire Chief Darryl Bailey was explaining some facts about ble volunteers) and alignment with the Town's Master fire plan. the planned site for the new fire hall in Bolton.

The current hall was constructed in 1989, and was originally designed to accommodate 20 volunteer firefighters. It now has 20 full-time firefighters, 40 volunteers and 16 paramedics. As well, there have been concerns that the roads in the area are narrow and congested.

Mezzapelli said they are looking at occupying the new facility in the fall of 2016.

Deputy Fire Chief Darryl Bailey said the main questions he's been hearing have dealt with traffic flows around the new site, and noise concerns for nearby residents.

The property is across Queen Street from baseball diamonds. As well, it's surrounded on the west side of the street by lands belonging to Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, so they are not likely to be developed.



Questions to Consider When Interviewing A Realtor:

1. How active have you been in the past few years in this area? 2. Have you received any recognized awards or from a reputable source; how long ago? Talk is cheap; don't just accept their word. Ask to see it, to verify their claims. Real Trends is an agency that tracks results for all realtors who submit their entries for "Best Realtor" for all companies. Other companies also offer a similar service.

3. Are there any other services included in your Service Fee, such as Free Home Staging? Is the Home Stager a CERTIFIED Home Stager/Expert Home Stager? Who is your photographer? A Professional Photographer who submits nothing but the best - bright professional photos with glossy feature sheets, and booklets. Do you provide extras such as moving boxes? Is someone from your office available to facilitate listing and selling, throughout the process if you are unavailable? Are any Insurance Packages available for the home owner's protection available, included, or do they cost extra?

4. What volume of property sales have you accomplished in the last few years? Volume speaks volume; top performers know how to sell with consistent results.

5. What type of marketing will you provide? (Feature Sheets, Booklets, Flyers, Postcards, Open Houses, Facebook,

6. What are you current Listings? Testimonials? Having other listings helps feed other listings. If someone calls for details about one listing but it is out of their budget, another may suit their needs better and someone with multiple listings will have many curious buyers inquiring with them on a regular basis, increasing the odds of getting top dollar on your property.

The organization in Canada is called Childhod Obesity Advocating Creative Hearts Foundation. She also said she wants to create an on-line platform for





One of the things that helped her was Elton John singing Someone Saved My Life Tonight.

"Someone else's creativity really helped me," she said.

Maxx is also working on a film about the effort, working with students from Canadian film schools, and she's also making contact with schools in other countries.

In addition, Maxx said she is trying to get hearts drawn by some pretty prominent people. She said she's made three attempts to get Pope Francis to draw one, and she's confident he eventually will. She added she's received a thank-you letter from American First Lady Michelle Obara. She planning to try and get a heart from Prime Minister Stephen Harper.

She added she's not in the habit of making appointments with these people. "I just show up at the door and say, 'Hi, I'm Gloria," she said, adding she tried that with the Pope.

Financing for the project is a bit precarious, but Maxx said she's not worried. She had been working for an advertising company, but found herself getting depressed, so she quit, and decided to start HeartEsteem, no matter what.

"Did it all on faith," she said. "When you live on faith like that, things come."

"I don't have dreams any more," she added. "I have goals."

Region hasn't got a prayer

In the great scheme of things, it wasn't that big a deal. Indeed, given how secular our society is supposed to be, it was probably to be expected.

The Supreme Curt of Canada ruled unanimously recently that the municipal council in Saguenay, Quebec, cannot open its council meetings with a prayer. Municipalities in this part of the country have lost little time announcing they will abide by the ruling, including Peel Region.

The issue came up April 16, with Brampton Mayor Linda Jeffrey putting forth a motion calling for a halt of what is commonly known as the "Regional Prayer" before meetings, but it was a split vote, with all of Caledon's representatives voting in favour of retaining the prayer.

The compelling argument in favour of shelving the prayer was practicality. There is the concern, articulated by Mississauga Mayor Bonnie Crombie, confirmed by Regional Solicitor Patrick O'Connor, that someone might raise a fuss about the prayer being recited, and if it results in a legal challenge, the Region would have very little to back up its position. As Crombie put it, "the Supreme Court has spoken."

The other argument, which we would argue is much weaker, is the concept that there must be separation between church and state. That means citizens should not be subjected to religious practices with which they do not agree. While we certainly agree with the notion, we would suggest a counter argument is possible, namely the courts should not be interfering in the traditional observances of citizens who also happen to be duly-elected officials simply because it has religious overtones. How soon will it be that a municipal councillor will be banned from wishing a constituent Merry Christmas?

The really bothersome part is the Regional Prayer is scarcely a proclamation of any faith. It is a brief, generic statement that has been recited at the start of Regional council meetings for more than 30 years, which calls on councillors to show "perception and patience," while avoiding parochialism.

If you're having trouble figuring out what's wrong with that,

Not surprisingly, there were a number of views expressed at the Regional council table.

"Generic prayer sucks," declared Mississauga Councillor Carolyn Parrish.

But Mayor Allan Thompson seemed almost angry, arguing that being able to recite a prayer is part of the fundamentals upon which this country was founded.

Brampton Councillor John Sprovieri seemed almost hoping for a challenge, treating the possibility as a dare. And Councillor Jennifer Innis likened it as a reminder of why councillors are there.

"For me, it was an affirmation of my oath," she said, discussing the matter a couple of days later.

We could understand the concern if it was a prayer that put one faith or denomination above another. The Lord's Prayer would be an example.

Indeed, Caledon councillors used to recite the Lord's Prayer before their meetings. That changed in the early 1990s, when they, for the most part, switched to a modified version of the Regional Prayer. It's still recited to this day (at least for now). At Tuesday's meeting, councillor Doug Beffort recited the prayer, although he edited out any religious references, commenting later that under the circumstances, it fit with his conscience. Thompson also said the Town has not taken an official position the final days of the year on the matter, stating it's been left up to "council's discretion."

And we are left to wonder what's wrong with that, and whether the courts gone too far.

The Supreme Court of Canada's decision to ensure the separation of church, synagogue, mosque, temple, wiccan sweat lodge and state in meetings of public governance is long overdue.

The citizens of Caledon are a diverse group of peoples with many different cultural backgrounds. It is true that the dominant religion of the Town is undeniably Christian; it is also true that Christianity is not the only religion to which citizens of Caledon offer their allegiance.

Since the Town Council is not a separate religious institution, it should not begin its public deliberations with a prayer derived from any one religion or non-religion. A universal prayer for guidance in thinking, discourse and action would be much more appropriate in this day and age of recognizing the diverse world in which we live and work.

I have heard the argument that the Lord's Prayer at council meetings is a tradition over 100 years old. More than 100 years ago, women were considered property and did not have the right to vote. Traditions change for good reason. The time has come to honour our diversity. A moment's silence, please.





Last December and January, Headwaters and Osler experienced a surge in patients due to a spike in flu activity. While seasonal surges occur every year, this year's arrived earlier than expected and meant that we treated and cared for more patients than ever before. There was a nearly 13 per cent increase in patient visits at Headwaters, a more than six per cent increase at Osler, and an almost 63 per cent increase in the number of patient referrals Central West CCAC received from those hospitals.

To ensure our patients continued to receive outstanding care, our organizations acted quickly and responded as a team. With the support of the Central West CCAC, Osler and Headwaters were able to discharge patients knowing those who needed excellent care at home would be able to receive it.

For patients undergoing dialysis in the Central West LHIN, this is a reality. However, through a new partnership involving the Ontario Renal Network, Osler and Headwaters, it is now more convenient for area patients to undergo the life-saving treatment. Through this partnership, more patients requiring dialysis are now able to receive this enhanced service. As a result, Headwaters patients have improved access to high-quality kidney specialists on-site, 24 hours a day and treatment closer to home.

Construction to begin soon at Headwaters

Our vision at Headwaters Health Care Centre is an Exceptional Experience Every Time. With the expansion and renovation of the hospital, we will be able to fulfill our patient-focused vision - providing our community with greater access to important services and offering care closer to home. The construction of a new outpatient area is set to begin this fall, and is anticipated to be complete in late summer/early fall 2017. The 8,200 square foot expansion will add new space for ambulatory care services.

Expanded and renovated facilities will include:

- A new operating room
- Upgrades to pre- and post-op areas
- Improved reception and recovery areas
- New space for outpatient services like cancer care and minor procedures
- New space for telemedicine and education

Last year alone, Central West CCAC provided 71,400 visits from physiotherapists, occupational therapists, and speech language pathologists, as well as 350,134 nursing visits at home and in clinics.

Last year, Central West CCAC helped 10,565 individuals safely transition from hospitals back into the community.

Central West CCAC care coordinators are regulated health professionals with additional, specialized training in coordinating care across the health care system.
