The area being eyed for the parking lot is there will solve another 40 per cent. a piece of tableland. The proposal, he said, has the support of Peel transportation staff, and all the Regional agencies.

Fraser said the lot will answer the demand for parking at the site about 90 per cent of the time. He said it won't solve all the problems, but added it would be a good first step.

Fraser told Brampton Councillor John Sprovieri there was a long process to look for a parking area. This is only part of the property that was deemed an approvable area.

"It's been a team effort," he said.

The private member's bill from Dufferin-Caledon MPP Sylvia Jones, Bill 36 - Private Property Act, passed second reading in the legislature with all party support, and has been referred to the Standing Committee for public consultation

Caledon Council recently received without comment details about the bill and how it's receiving support from residents and a wide range of stakeholders, including the Ontario Federation of Agriculture.

If enacted, Bill 36 would amend the Trespass to Property Act by creating a minimum fine of \$500 for trespassers and increase damages to \$25,000. Jones stated the current Act has no minimum fine for those who trespass and has a maximum limit of \$1,000 for compensation on damages. Bill 36 would ensure property owners are fairly compensated for destruction of their property and signal that trespassing will not be taken lightly in the justice system.

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Editorial When did the **Region become** unworkable?

There was a lot going on at last Thursday's meeting of Peel Regional council, with the most dramatic moment coming when the five Caledon representatives walked out of the Council Chambers.

They did it to break quorum as their colleagues were about to vote on a motion basically aimed at forcing Caledon to take part in provincial facilitation over the Bolton employment land expansion.

Mayor Allan Thompson remarked at one point in the session, which frequently got heated, that the debate could end the way the Region is governed.

An initial gut reaction could be such a statement was hyperbolic. But things continued on that line.

Mississauga Councillor Nando Iannicca spoke of "divorce." His fellow councillor from Mississauga George Carlson referred to a surveyor's mistake that was made years ago that put Caledon in with Peel Region.

And we are left wondering just when did the status quo become such a problem. There was very little complaining with the way Peel function during the days when it was a county. And when Regional government was formed, with a variety of villages and townships being amalgamated into three municipalities that would form the Region, the politicians were able to adjust.





Unclaimed money for Canadian families

The government of Canada estimates that about 69,000 families with children in Ontario who may be eligible for the enhanced Universal Child Care Benefit (UCCB) are at risk of not receiving it.

Under the proposed enhancements to the UCCB, families would receive almost \$2,000 per year for each child younger than six and \$720 per year for each child aged six through 17. The new benefit amounts would be retroactive to Jan. 1, 2015 and rein July 2015.






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kartSTART **Kick-starts Good Driving Habits in Kids**

kartSTART is an innovative young driver program that puts Canadian youth as young as 12 years old behind the wheel of a go-kart for their first driving experience. It's designed to give kids - and their families a true, real-world understanding of the physics behind driving a motorized vehicle.

he kartSTART program is very unique in several ways," says Russ Bond, owner of Russ Bond Agency. Russ Bond has been involved in the automobile industry for over 30 years. He is a wellrespected automotive journalist, as well as a retired professional racing driver. Bond brings his wealth of experience to aid new drivers in getting the most out of their first experience behind the wheel. "What we



teach here is how a vehicle works. What makes it go, what makes it stop, and what makes it turn. We teach our students what is happening to the vehicle as they travel down the road. The key here is we teach youngsters in vehicles that fit them, our karts."

The half-day course gives youngsters a driving experience in vehicles that fit them... go-karts. The driving experience includes Professional Racing Kart, Qualified Instructors, Use of Snell approved Helmet, Use of CIK Racing Suit, Safety Driving exercise for the whole Family and a Catered Lunch. Each expert instructor gives new drivers a clear understanding behind the physics and dynamics of driving a motorized vehicle in a closed course environment.

The karts are the perfect size for kids to get their first experience. It is not a 3,000lb car. It is a basic motorized vehicle that is proportionate to the size of the driver. kartSTART shows them how the kart works, with our instructors leading them as they drive they learn about how the steering works, how the throttle works, how the brakes work, and more importantly, understand how all these things work together.

"Karts are ideal for kids to get their first driving experience," Mike Goodyear, a past Chief Instructor for the kartSTART program and the brother of former Canadian Indy Car driver Scott Goodyear. Now in private karts business outside the program, his comments then still resonate today. "Driving is basically a two-part operation," Goodyear said. "The first part is learning about how a car acts when you turn, when you brake and when you accelerate. At kartSTART [we teach] kids the physics of how a car works and reacts to your inputs. We want them to learn to control a motorized vehicle, and that is easier to do in a kart, that is their 'size' instead of a full sized car."

The program here at kartSTART is very innovative," Bond adds. "I always put it into a hockey sense so it's easier for parents to understand. If you have two 16-year-olds and they want to start playing hockey, but one has been playing since he was 12 years old, and one has never been on skates, it's easy to tell who will be the better hockey player. It's the same thing with driving. Here, we help teenagers prepare for the daunting task of driving on today's roads with the masses...it's as simple as that." Bond sums it up perfectly with, "Driving is a life skill, and we give our students the first step in that process."

During the past four years, over 1,700 Canadians have participated in the ASN/FIA Canada Safety Endorsed kartSTART program. Understanding that safety is a product of both education and training, kartSTART places importance on educating the entire family, and not just the soon-to-be new drivers. This is why the half-day program also invites parents to experience safety through education by demonstrating the Toyota Star Safety system in action - out on the tracks and in Toyota vehicles. In addition, there are several "kids" that give our students a better understanding of just what can be accomplished with some proper training. "We put together a great group

of personnel to help our families get the most out of the day," Bond says. "Every journey is made with a first step; our job is to make sure that our families' first step is in the right direction."

"The kartSTART program has demonstrated every year, how vehicle safety can be made an educational and fun experience for the entire family," said Sandy Di Felice, Director, Toyota Canada Inc. "kartSTART brings Canadian youth and parents together around a halfday course, understanding the safety technology that is standard equipment in each new Toyota vehicle."





Roundabouts are already running Caledon, and more are coming.

eel Region has been holding a series of sessions aimed at helping members of the public get used to them.

When it comes to new things, Katya Seckar, an education specialist with the Region, agreed it's easy to not know what to do.

There are two new roundabouts in the Bolton area, at either end of the new Emil Kolb Parkway, which is not yet open. Once functional, she said they will help get truck traffic out of the village core.

Seckar said more roundabouts are appearing throughout Ontario.

"Roundabouts are really just another form of intersection," she remarked.

She added they are being promoted by both the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) and Transport Canada, mainly because they are safer. She said they reduce the risk of a fatal accident by 90 to 100 per cent, "which is huge." Seckar also cited statistics that state roundabouts are responsible for a 75 per cent reduction in injuries and 37 per cent fewer collisions.

Head-on and T-bone collisions are almost impossible in a roundabout. About the only mishaps that can take place are side-swipes and rear-enders. In addition, Seckar said speeds are lower in roundabout, meaning more reaction time and impacts aren't as hard.

As well, she said they are safer for pedestrians. Traffic only goes one way in a roundabout, so people walking across only have to look in one direction for on-coming vehicles.

Traffic entering a roundabout is expected to yield to vehicles already in it. As well, she said traffic is to yield to pedestrians when entering and leaving a roundabout.

Other benefits Seckar cited are reduced delays at intersections. She pointed out if there are no other vehicles already in the roundabout, the driver entering doesn't have to stop at all.

She added there are also less emissions involved, and less idling since there is no waiting for lights to turn green.

The Region opened a single-lane roundabout at the intersection of Dixie Road and Olde Base Line Road in 2011.

"I call it the tricycle of roundabouts," she said, adding it's hard to go wrong when using it.

Seckar pointed out there are plenty of signs warning the roundabout is coming, so drivers should know well in advance to slow down. It also has signs indicating which roads are available and how to get on them.

Seckar commented that the roundabout that will connect King Street in Bolton with the Emil Kolb Parkway will be a two-lane installation. "This is more like a bicycle," she said.

Again, she stressed the need to slow down when approaching the roundabout, making sure there's sufficient time to check what traffic is already there to vield to.

"You won't be able to blow through these things at 80 kilometres per hour," she said.

In addition to signs indicating which routes are available, Seckar said signs will also tell driving which lanes they should be in.

Heading into a four-way, two-lane roundabout, Seckar said traffic planning to turn right should stay in the right lane. Traffic planning to go straight ahead could use either lane, and it should be in the left lane to go left or make a U turn.

Even if it is a two-lane roundabout, Seckar said drivers entering should yield, even if they are just staying in the right lane and the other traffic is in the left. She also said people should avoid driving side-by-side in a roundabout because there is no escape route. For the same reason, she said people should not pass while driving around one.

She also said people shouldn't change lanes while in a roundabout, pointing out one is not allowed to do that in a conventional intersection.

When it comes to using turn signals while in a roundabout, Seckar said there are differences. She said MTO has indicated it's not necessary, but has suggested signaling right when approaching the exit the driver plans to take.

She also said drivers are encouraged not stop while in a roundabout, or to yield the right-of-way to traffic trying to get in.

When it comes to sharing a roundabout with big trucks, Seckar had some rules for people to keep in mind.

Unlike most cars, in two-lane roundabouts, large trucks are allowed to straddle the lanes because they have to, so it's wise to give them lots of space.

"Don't try to crowd them," she said. "Don't try to pass them. Just stay back."

When it comes to emergency vehicles, Seckar said if driver sees one approaching before entering the roundabout, they should pull over if they can and let it pass. If they are already in the roundabout, they should get out at the exit and pull over as soon as it's safe.

The two roundabouts going in around Bolton have seen plantings go in the middle. There were some complaints about that, with one man commenting it blocks views of what's in and approaching roundabouts, adding he's never seen such plantings in roundabouts in Europe. Seckar there's a strategic reason for the plantings.

She said they discourage pedestrians from crossing to the middle, reduces problems from headlight glare at night and make them more noticeable. Another advantage she cited that if drivers can see right through the roundabout, they might be less inclined to slow down.

"It's there for a reason," she said.

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
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
