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## Residents still seeking review of pit approval

Residents are still planning to seek a judicial review of the site plan approval granted Brock Aggregates for its expansion of the Tottenham Pit, but it looks like the Town won't be joining them on this one.

Caledon councillors Tuesday night received a verbal update in closed session on the matter from lawyer Signe Leisk. Once back in open session, councillors voted to drop the usual solicitor-client privilege and allowed the legal opinion to be made public.

In it, Leisk said they had

reviewed the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Act, the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan and the Planning Act. The conclusions, she said, is there wouldn't be much grounds on which to seek a judicial review.

Councillors were sitting in Planning and Development Committee Tuesday night, so no action was taken at that time.

The Province, last June, approved the Aggregate Resources Act (ARA) site plan amendment for the property, submitted by Brock Aggregates. The pit is in the north-

east corner of Caledon (near Highway 9 and Mount Wolfe Road).

Cheryl Connors, of Protect Caledon Inc., was one of two residents to make a delegation to the committee Tuesday night, and she later said they will go ahead with the push for a judicial review.

"We have a very strong legal opinion and we're going to win," she declared.

"We'll see where they go with it," Mayor Allan Thompson commented later, pointing to the legal opinion that said they didn't have a strong enough case.

Connors had told council-

lors she had received an email this week indicating there are plans to use the property for a commercial fill operation, adding she was "horrified" at the news. She also said she had heard stories the property has been sold.

Councillor Nick deBoer, who chairs the committee, said he's not aware that the property has been sold. He did say there are people who have been researching the site. There was a meeting with them, attended by deBoer, Mayor Allan Thompson and Councillor Jennifer Innis, as well as Town planning staff.

Manager of Development Casey Blakely told Councillor Barb Shaughnessy she was at the meeting.

She added fill operations are not specifically addressed in the Town's Official Plan, which staff is working on updating. But she did say that for such an operation, planning staff believes a rezoning and Official Plan amendment would be needed, requiring a full public process.

# Region will continue studying governance issue

Despite recent developments from Mississauga City council, it appears Peel Region is going ahead with its review of local governance.

Mississauga Mayor Bonnie Crombie had announced about two weeks ago it was time for Mississauga to go it alone as a single-tier municipality, without having to deal with the regional component. Mississauga councillors voted to undertake a study to look into the matter.

That ruffled some feathers in other parts of the region.

## Region not doing survey on governance

Peel Region is not surveying residents on matters of governance.

Regional CAO David Szwarc gave the assurances at last Thursday's Regional council meeting to Barb Shaughnessy of Caledon.

The Ward 1 councillor expressed concern that some Caledon residents have been contacted to take part in a survey on regional governance, supposedly being conducted by the Region.

That was news to Szwarc.

"There's no staff-initiated survey about governance under way," he told Shaughnessy.

He added the Region does customer service surveys every two years, but the last one was completed late last year.

The Region has been involved in a facilitation process aimed at addressing Regional government, including seat allocation, the method of selecting a Regional Chair, etc. The facilitation is being run by a task force consisting of the three mayors, Regional Chair Frank Dale, the four CAOs and the Regional Clerk.

Dale brought the matter up at the start of last Thursday's Regional council meeting, alluding to what he referred to as a "somewhat interesting news week."

He referred to the announcement of the study that Mississauga wanted to look into, along with the response from the City of Brampton. Mayor Linda Jeffrey had issued a statement in response, commenting that her City had entered the facilitation in good faith, and commented the actions taken by Crombie "appears to be contradictory to the spirit of this facilitation process."

Dale commented that while he respects Mississauga's right to study the issue, he expects the mayors of all three municipalities to continue to take part in good faith in the facilitation process to benefit Peel residents. He added he had spoken to all three mayors and all three had agreed the process will continue.

He also said he had spoken to Municipal Affairs and Housing Minister Ted McMeekin, and he will let the process unfold.

"We are moving forward with the process that was agreed upon by this council," Dale declared, adding the ultimate goal is to find the best way to represent Peel residents.

Mississauga Councillor Pat Saito, agreed with Dale's comments, clarifying that it was not the intention of all Missis-

sauga councillors to announce they were pulling out of Peel. She said some simply supported a motion to update studies that were done in the past, adding the media ignored that point.

"I feel very strongly that our future must be a discussion of the task force," she declared, adding Brampton councillors have certain wishes and Mississauga is committed to working with them.

Saito added the media tried to overshadow the real work that's being done.

"We provide excellent service to our constituents," she said, adding there will always be a little parochialism, but everyone is ultimately working for the whole region.

"That is nice to hear," responded Caledon Councillor Barb Shaughnessy.

"We're all here to serve the residents of Peel," Caledon Mayor Allan Thompson added. "Caledon's here to work with everybody to find a fair result."

Brampton Councillor Gael Miles thanked Saito for the clarification, commenting that Brampton councillors didn't know what to make about the intent of the move from Mississauga.

Jeffrey observed there are strong feelings regarding this issue, adding Brampton plans to continue with the facilitation.

"We will continue to sit at the table," she said.

## Celebrate Oral Health Month in April

As the country celebrates Oral Health Month in April, the Region of Peel is highlighting the importance of children's dental health.


The Region is promoting the Healthy Smiles Ontario (HSO) program, which is helping make healthy teeth and gums a reality for Peel children.

"Three out of five Canadian children ages six to 11 have had cavities," said Dr. Eileen de Villa, Medical Officer of Health for the Region. "Left untreated, cavities can lead to pain, infection, difficulty eating and difficulty concentrating. This is why the Region of Peel recommends that children visit a dental clinic every year for a check-up, starting at one year of age. Doing so helps to avoid unnecessary pain and suffering and contributes to children's overall health and well-being."

Approximately six million Canadi-

ans avoid visiting the dentist every year simply because of the cost. To help ease the burden of expensive dental care on families, the government-funded Healthy Smiles Ontario program offers free dental cleanings, check-ups, treatment and emergency services for children who qualify. Although the Healthy Smiles Ontario program is being promoted during Oral Health Month (April), it is available to help residents all year round and the Region is encouraging residents to apply. Children 17 years of age and under are eligible for the program if they live in Ontario and their family is experiencing financial hardship.

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# Don't forget you're supposed to stop for school buses

Caledon OPP are reminding motorists that they are supposed to stop for school buses when their red signal-lights are flashing. Police report there have been complaints about vehicles failing to stop for school buses.

The Highway Traffic Act (HTA) states that when a driver meets a stopped school bus with overhead red signal-lights flashing on a highway, other than one that has a median strip, "shall stop before reaching the bus and shall not proceed until the bus moves or the overhead red signal-lights have stopped flashing."

HTA adds that every driver who is approaching a stopped school bus from the rear with its overhead red lights flashing, "shall stop at least 20 metres before reaching the bus and shall not proceed until the bus moves of the overhead red signal-lights have stopped flashing."

For a first offence, a driver can be fined from \$400 to \$2,000 and lose six demerit points.

## Police catch suspects on You Tube

A You Tube video is getting credit for assisting Caledon OPP make an arrest in a March 31 break-in.

Police were sent to a home on Innis Lake Road, and during their investigation, they received multiple tips from the public as to the identity of the suspects, thanks to a You Tube video posted online of the surveillance footage. The Street Crime Unit (SCU) linked evidence from a separate police investigation to this incident. As a result, the SCU successfully executed a search warrant at two different premises in Brampton. Upon conducting the searches, the SCU recovered approximately \$20,000 worth of assets owned by the company that owns the CMV.

A 19-year-old Brampton man was charged with unauthorized possession of a weapon, mischief, theft over \$5,000 from a motor vehicle and possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000.

Further, two youths, aged 15 and 17, have also been charged with mischief, theft over \$5,000 from a motor vehicle, and possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000.

# Asphalt will be replaced on King Street in Bolton

Road improvements are in the works for King Street in Bolton this summer, but the plan is to make them as inobtrusive as possible.

Peel Region hosted an information session last week in Bolton to outline what is planned.

The plan is to replace all existing asphalt on King between Deer Valley Drive and Humber Lea Road. There will also be sidewalk replacement and repairs to a storm culvert under the street east of Queen Street. As well, there will be a short section of sanitary sewer replaced on Queen, north of King. Street lights and crosswalks will be upgraded at the intersection of King and Queen.

Information presented at the session indicated summer is the best time to do this work. Asphalt paving and concrete work require warm temperatures for a better quality of product. As well, the longer days of summer allow for more hours to get the work done, and since it's vacation time, there promises to be less disruption.

The plan is to do the work in stages, with the road being closed during each

stage. Trying to work with partial road closures would shorten the amount of work that can be done during the day, thus lengthening the construction period. Full road closures allow for a larger work area and longer work days, meaning the project should be completed sooner.

There are plans to use the Bolton Arterial Road (BAR) to the south to deal with through traffic along King. Local traffic will use side streets while sections of the road are closed.


Project Manager Olek Garbos said the work will be done in 11 sections or stages. He added it will take between a couple of days and a week to do each section, depending on what complications arise.

"It will be fairly short duration," he said.

Construction is scheduled to start in May and June, with partial road closures while work begins on sewer repair, electrical work on other minor tasks. The full road closures should take place in July and August, with asphalt replacement and road base repairs. Everything should be done in time for the start of the new school year.

# Ryan Cook to perform at concert in aid of King refugees

Big music talent is coming to King tomorrow (Friday).

The King concert combines thumb-picking guitar and harmonies inspired by American jazz and country music from the 1940s and ‘50s, backed up by guitarist and bandmate Rob Moore.

“We’ll be performing songs from my new live album as well as traditional folk/jazz and swing music that has that special old-time feeling,” said Cook. “I am very excited to be performing in King City for the first time for such a positive event.”

Organizers hope Cook’s star power will bring essential funds and attention to a community initiative. King for Refugees is a grassroots volunteer group helping

Canadian newcomers begin new lives in King Township. Currently the group is sponsoring and supporting two families in King City.

The families are already making progress. All five children of the first fami-

ly are attending school and the oldest has landed a part-time job. When not working to get settled or improve their English, the families are eagerly participating in new community experiences around King such as the farm tour and a potluck dinner.

But the road ahead is still challenging and every ticket sold for this concert will help.

The under-40-dollar ticket in King may just transport

the audience to a choice seat in Nashville.

# City of Peel is not out of the question

Although the issue has sort of chilled out over the last week, the fact remains that Mississauga Mayor Bonnie Crombie has expressed a desire to get Mississauga out of regional government. What exactly might replace the current form of running things if the big city to the south were to go it alone is not yet clear, and that includes the future of Caledon and Brampton. Crombie, like her predecessor Hazel McCallion, might believe Mississauga has matured to the point where it can handle things on its own, but we also believe Caledon Mayor Allan Thompson made a very good point when he advised her to be careful for what she wishes. Aspirations to take Mississauga out of Peel could result in that City being abolished, to be replaced by a City of Peel. Some might wonder if that's very likely. The problem is there is precedent.

About 20 years ago, some politicians within the former City of Toronto were hankering to get out from under the Metro level of government. This was in the days when Toronto consisted of 16 wards, and was surrounded by four cities (Etobicoke, York, North York and Scarborough) and one borough (East York). The cry went up from some in the Toronto council chambers for deliverance from Metro, and an aspiring premier named Mike Harris heard their cries, and promised to look into scrapping Metro if he was elected. He was, and about a year and a half later, he started to make good on his promise.

He didn't exactly scrap Metro. He announced he would abolish the six component municipalities in Metro, amalgamating them into what was commonly referred to as the Megacity. And to add insult to injury, he basically announced the merger was a done deal. Angry residents, led by several active community leaders like Kathleen Wynne, voiced their opposition, and even organized a referendum, the results of which Harris simply ignored. No one envisioned a Megacity 20 years ago, yet they got one. Thus a City of Peel is not very far-fetched.

The creation of such an entity would be entirely the work of the Province. Granted, given the fight she helped lead some 20 years ago, it's doubtful that such changes would take place on Wynne's watch. But minds can change, and Wynne will not be in office forever.

"Be careful what you ask for," was the way Thompson phrased his warning to Crombie. How right he is.

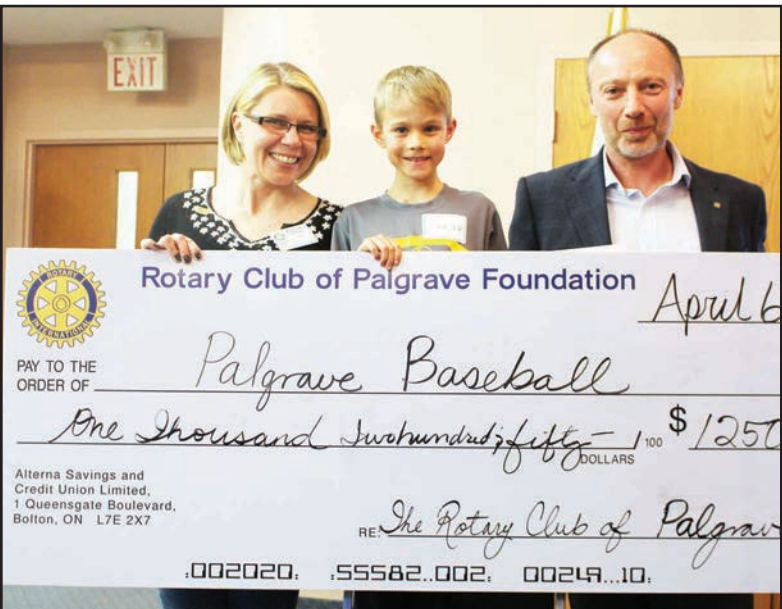

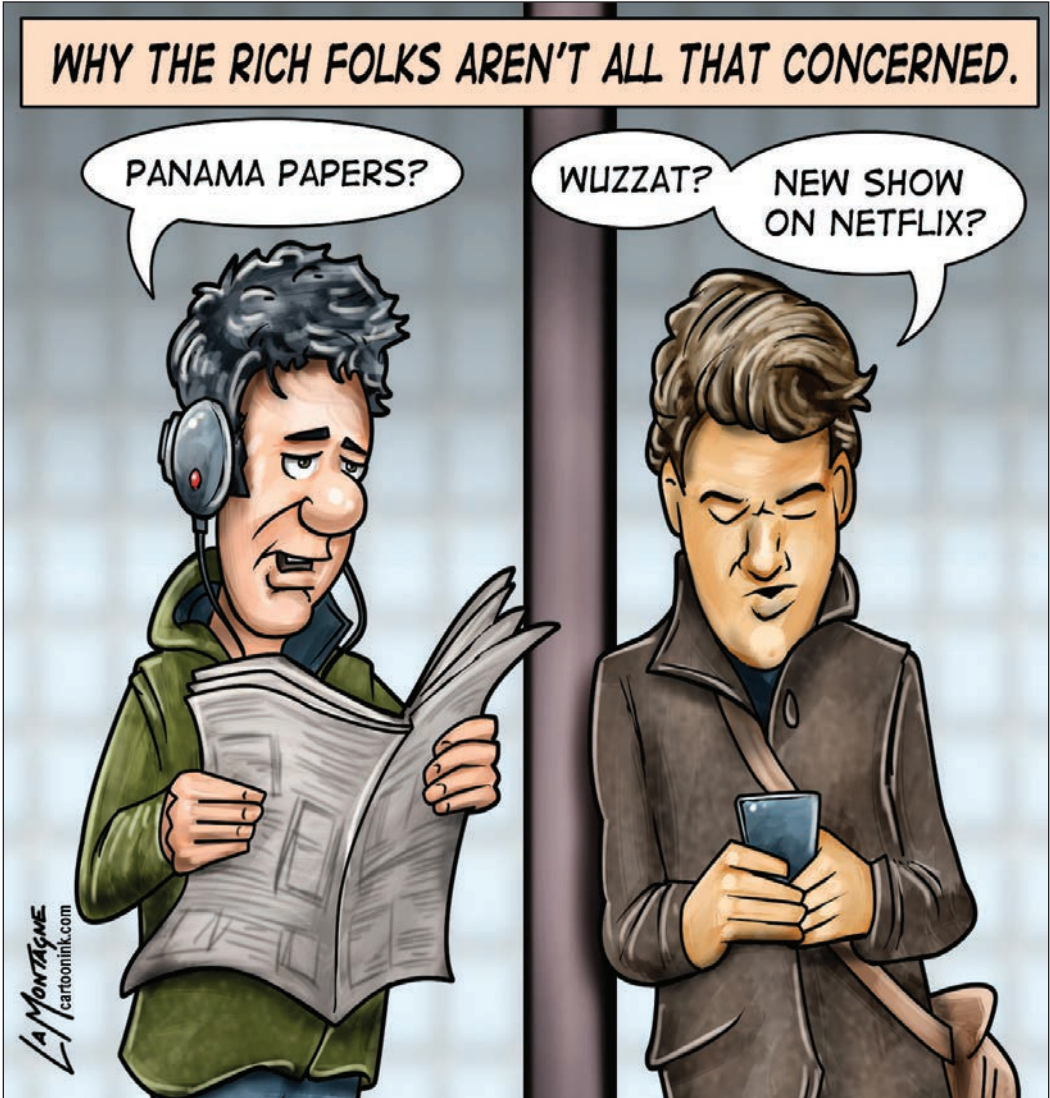

## Is vaping the alternative?

It's nice to know there are alternatives to conventional smoking, such as these electronic cigarettes (e-cigarettes) that we've been hearing about lately.

On the other hand, are they an alternative to the hazards of cigarettes?

Of late, I've been told of a man of my acquaintance who's been having some health issues. True, I haven't seen him in more than 20 years, and it's been about five years since we last spoke on the phone.

During the years when we spent a lot of time in each other's company, we were both heavy smokers. But it is a fact that things change over time. I quit smoking more than 20 years ago. From what I'm hearing these days, he did not. Also from the information I'm getting (and I stress it's at least second-hand), he switched to e-cigarettes. But it looks like his failure to quit smoking has caused him health issues. The advent of age might have something to do with it too. He's in his mid-60s. And it is also true that there could be a host of other factors impacting this guy's health of which I am unaware.

It appears there are still a lot of unanswered questions when it comes to e-cigarettes. I confess I'm not too up on the concept either. Since I am no longer a smoke, there's been no real reason to delve too much into the topic. I have no desire to take up smoking again. I am too well aware of how easy it is to get hooked.

I started smoking in high school during my teens because many of the people I hung around with at the time smoked, and anything that would make me feel "in" with any crowd was worthwhile. That went on until I was in my early 30s. I made several half-hearted and unsuccessful attempts to quit, although when I finally got serious about it, I was a little surprised at how easy it was. And the urge to smoke has never completely gone away. Writing these words has made me recall the time when I smoked, and those memories have caused cravings. Not to worry, though. I have been resisting them for more than 20 years, and this time will be no different.

I would certainly not want to go through being hooked and trying to quit again.

Besides, I can't afford to smoke, and I sometimes wonder how I was able to afford it when I smoked throughout my 20s and early 30s.

Moreover, my wife won't let me take it up again.

I have done a bit of research into e-cigarettes, and the information I have come up with seems at best vague.

Peel Regional council last week approved a staff recommendation to support proposed changes to Ontario's smoking laws to cover e-cigarettes, as well as the use of medicinal marijuana. Essentially, the new rules would see bans imposed on the use of these materials in all enclosed public spaces, enclosed workplaces and certain other specified outdoor areas. There would also be restrictions on the marketing of e-cigarettes.

It seems to me the new proposed rules would mean you're only allowed to use an e-cigarette in a fashion that you're allowed to use a conventional cigarette.

I also note these recommendations come from people far more knowledgeable about the subject matter than I.

But it would seem to me that smoke is smoke, and in most cases, we try to avoid it.

If we come upon some open air burning, I think most of us try to position ourselves in such a way that the smoke is not being blown toward us. True, if the fire is part of a winter celebration on a cold day or night,

some of us might try going downwind for a brief period, simply because it will be warm there. But it's been my experience that's not a good place to hang around for too long. It gets too hot pretty fast, and you're breathing in smoke, which is not very pleasant.

Yet there are certain types of smoke, such as that from tobacco, that people not only tolerate going into their lungs, but that they will pay a lot of money to obtain. Like I stated above, I can't afford the cost of a deck of smokes, and still can't figure out how I smoked a pack and a half a day in my prime.

But one of the key points I learned is e-cigarettes do not create smoke, but vapour, which I guess explains why the act of smoking an e-cigarette is sometimes called vaping. So while there is no tobacco, the vapour apparently contains nicotine, which is addictive. And since it's a liquid source of nicotine, that can present some problems too.

One source I consulted, a website called health.howstuffworks.com, states that liquid nicotine can be deadly.

And according to the American Lung Association, e-cigarettes don't seem to be very useful when it comes to helping smokers quit.

"Instead of quitting, many e-cigarette users are continuing to use e-cigarettes while still using conventional cigarettes," according to the Association's website. "In 2013, 76.8 percent of the people who recently used e-cigarettes also currently smoked conventional cigarettes."

The staff report that went to council last week noted that second-hand smoke from tobacco can create health problems for non-smokers. That is nothing new. We've been hearing that for years. That's one of the main reasons why there are so few places where one can smoke.

And it's also clear that there's a lot that's not yet understood about vaping, and what it might do to people's health.

"The evidence for negative health impacts of vaping through the use of e-cigarettes is still emerging and inconclusive," the report added. "Smokers exhale some of the nicotine and ultrafine particles delivered by e-cigarettes, which exposes bystanders to 'passive vaping.' E-cigarette particles are small enough to reach deep into the lungs; however, the health risks from e-cigarettes' toxicants are still unknown, but can be considered a source of air pollution."

If we're going to allow cigarettes, along with other tobacco products, to be consumed with various restrictions, then we can't very well get more restrictive on vaping, at least not until we have more information.

Should there be more restrictions of tobacco? I'm inclined to think there should be, but I'm not ready to sign on to a crusade to have it banned outright.

Tobacco, as it has been said many times, is a product that can cause serious illness or death if used as directed. But there are also people who smoke for decades and live to very impressive ages, like into their 90s. I can't see the benefits of forcing such a person to give up their tobacco. Indeed, I would think the strain of forcing them to quit would probably be harmful in itself.

The answer, I think, is finding ways to discourage people from taking up the habit in the first place. Steps have been taken in that direction. When I started smoking, cigarettes were prominently displayed in any variety store. Now they are not. Increasing taxes is not a bad idea either. And neither is putting restrictions on vaping. If people don't get into the alternatives, they might not be inclined to try the real thing.

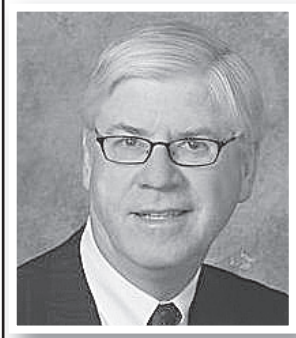
# Tilson points to example of questionable Liberal ethics

Multiple media outlets reported April 5 that Minister of Justice Jody Wilson-Raybould was scheduled to attend a \$500/ ticket fundraiser at Torys LLP offices in Toronto April 7, 2016.

Several of the firm’s members were registered to lobby the federal government, including senior partner John Tobin, who since 2010 had been listed as lobbying the Justice department on taxation of mutual funds on behalf of client Invesco Trimark, among others.

The Minister of Justice has exercised poor judgment by putting herself in such a blatant conflict of interest. How are Canadians supposed to trust the decision-making of a government that has such poor judgment? The Minister of Justice has a duty not only to be independent, but to be perceived as independent, which the minister has clearly compromised.

The Official Opposition introduced the following motion in the House of Com-

mons April 19 for an all-day debate:

“That the House urge the Minister of Justice to: (a) follow her government’s own guidelines for Ministers and Ministers of State as described in Annex B OF ‘Open and Accountable Government 2015,’ that ‘Ministers and Parliamentary Secretaries must ensure that political fundraising activities or considerations do not affect, or appear to affect, the exercise of their official duties or the ac-

cess of individuals or organizations to government,’ that ‘There should be no preferential access to government, or appearance of preferential access, accorded to individuals or organizations because they have made financial contributions to politicians and political parties,’ and that ‘There should be no singling out, or appearance of singling out, of individuals or organizations as targets of political fundraising because they have official dealings with Ministers and Parliamentary Secretaries, or their staff or departments;’ (b) apologize for the fundraising event on behalf of the Liberal Party with one of the top law firms in Canada; and (c) return all funds collected from the event, as was done in 2014 for the event involving the former Minister of Canadian Heritage.”

I made the following comment in the House during that debate.

“Mr. Speaker, one of the principles in the justice system is that justice must be done and must appear to be done, and yet we have a bunch of lawyers getting together and paying \$500 to talk to the justice minister.”

“Is it possible that some of those lawyers are looking for appointments?”

“They are not supposed to lobby a jus-

tice minister or a member of government to become judges, but, in my opinion — and I would like to hear the members’ comments on this — it puts the whole justice system into disrepute by saying, ‘Okay, lawyers, pay \$500, we will give you access to the justice minister, tell the justice minister how wonderful you are and possibly what a great judge you would make’.”

It is essential that Ministers keep their duties as Minister separate from any fundraising they may be involved with as a representative of a political party. When we were in government, we did the right thing and returned every penny from a fundraiser after the Ethics Commissioner expressed concern.

Although this Prime Minister promised a different kind of government, he has no problem with his Minister of Justice participating in a Liberal Party fundraiser at \$500 a plate. The independence of the Minister of Justice has been compromised and her credibility is diminished. She is headlining a \$1,000-per-head fundraiser later this month. Copying the Wynne Liberals, the current government is creating a whole new scheme of paying for access to cabinet ministers. Will the minister stop the excuses and return the pay-to-play cash?

The Liberals are refusing to tell us who attended the event, saying that we have to wait until July to see it on the Elections Canada website. Why does the Liberal Party want to hide behind the Elections Canada website if they have nothing to hide? If the Liberals really believed their promises on transparency, they would release the list of attendees. The fact that they haven’t speaks volumes.

## Hypocrisy that makes the head hurt

Ah, how the worms turn.

In the early 1970s, as leader of the Ontario NDP, Stephen Lewis used all the political muscle at his disposal to crush a nascent internal group of radical lefties calling themselves The Waffle.

They, too — much like the current NDP Leap group — had a manifesto which would have yanked the party far to the left of where it already was, a scary prospect even for people who already tilted considerably left.

Lewis got the party convention in Orillia to order the Waffle to either disown their beliefs or leave the party. Some stayed on. Many left. But the move, which Lewis had hoped would lead his party to an election victory, did not appear to help him.

Fast forward to the current federal NDP blood-letting in Alberta, where the party, upset that leader Thomas Mulcair had overseen a collapse in party fortunes — unceremoniously voted to send him packing.

This, despite the fact there is no obvious contender for the job and also — something that is widely ignored — the NDP showing in the last election wasn’t even close to being as poor as many of their results and in fact was pretty close to the national average for that party’s electoral history.

No matter. He couldn’t duplicate the once-in-a-lifetime results of the late Jack Layton, so he was toast. Shut the door on your way out Tom, we’re too busy making damn sure we won’t get elected next time, either.

Which brings us once again to the same Stephen Lewis — son of former federal NDP leader David Lewis — and father of current NDP left-wing activist Avi Lewis.

Lewis, as a major speaker at the convention — and I have to say, that whether you like what Lewis says or not (and I rarely do) he’s the best political speaker I’ve covered in my decades in journalism — was advocating for son Avi and his group’s so-called Leap manifesto, the highlight (lowlight?) of which is essentially to shut down Canada’s oil industry on the rather tendentious grounds that it will help save the earth from environmental disaster.

To bring such a platform to an Edmonton audience — Edmonton, for heaven’s sake — would be tantamount to rushing off to Oshawa to advocate the end of the auto industry.

But that didn’t seem to matter to the super wealthy Lewis clan and their fellow travelers, none of whom would be particularly impacted by shutting down the oil industry.

Oh yes, this Leap manifesto — supported by the elite of the left-wing loonies in this country — was actually advertised as a “non-partisan” document. Avi Lewis himself wrote a piece bragging about the wide spectrum of interests that went into making it. Wide indeed. From the far left to the absolutely maniacal left and everything in between.

This was way too much for Alberta’s NDP Premier Rachel Notley, who denounced the manifesto in rather direct terms. This may be because her province has already lost about 100,000 jobs in the oil industry — much of it thanks to the implacable and unjustified opposition to fossil fuels (which we simply can’t live without) in the guise of saving the planet.

We are told, of course, that the oil and gas people displaced would be retrained for other jobs. Which jobs would they be you may ask? Even if you buy the notion that fossil fuels are the root of all evil, there is nothing — absolutely nothing — that can currently replace them. There may come a day. But it hasn’t arrived yet. And in the meantime, Albertans like to eat as well as the rest of us do.

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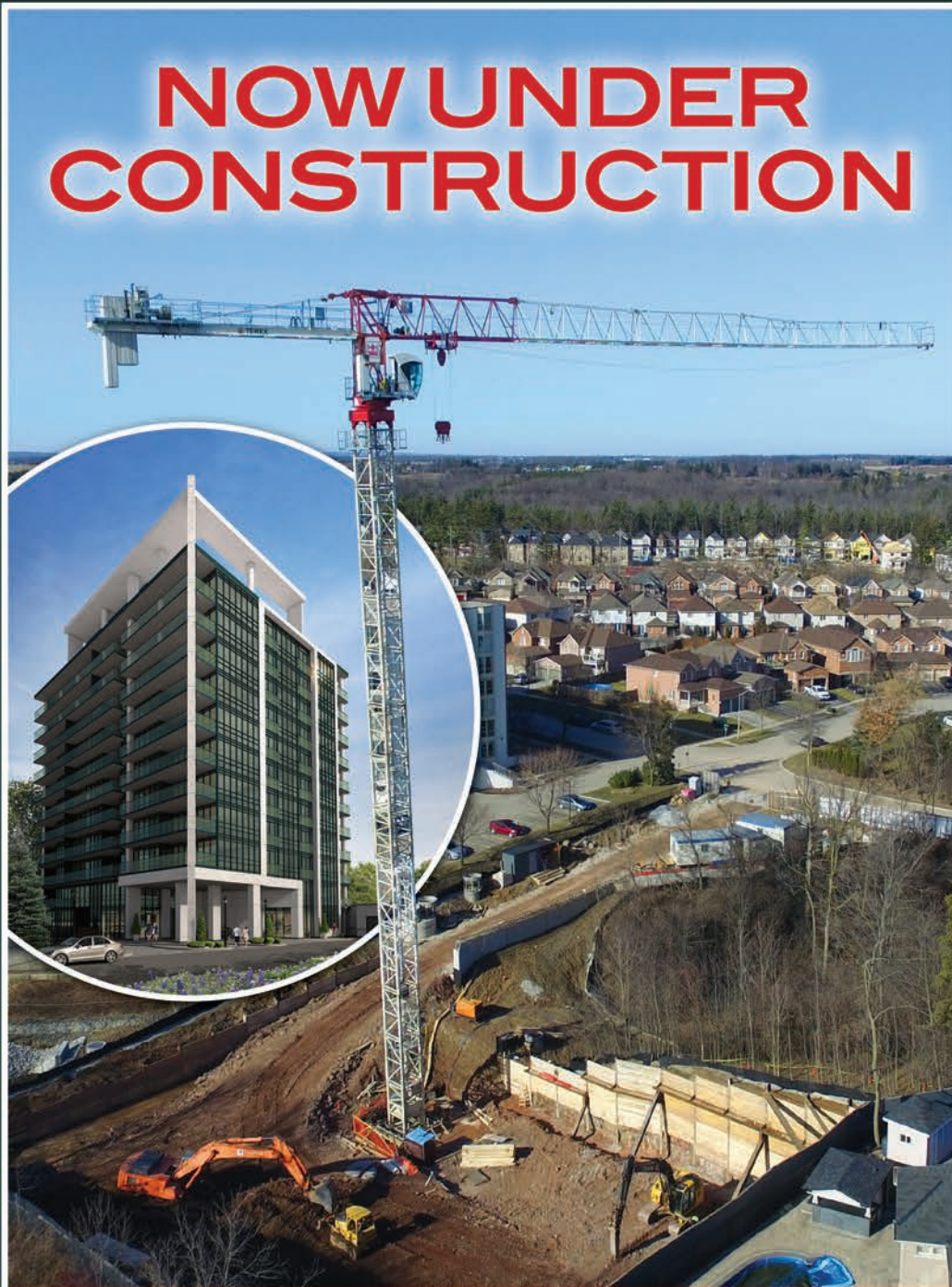
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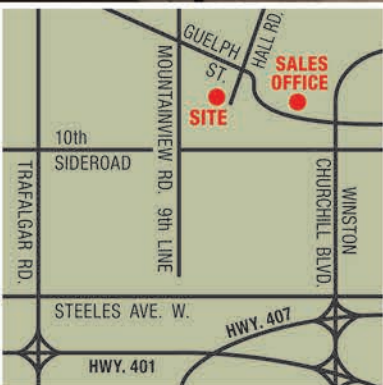


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## Spring Fair in Mayfield West Saturday

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# Recycling and garbage cart exchange has started

Got a problem with the size of cart you've been using this year to get your garbage and recycling to the curb? Peel Region residents are now able to exchange for a smaller or larger carts. This exchange will run until April 30, without incurring fees. Organics (green) carts are one size only and cannot be exchanged.

"Now that our residents have used their carts for three months, they are likely more aware of the amount of waste their household generates," Peel's Director of Waste Management Norm Lee observed. "Making sure residents have cart sizes that are best suited to how much or little waste their household generates will help them successfully participate in the bi-weekly waste collection program."

To exchange garbage and/or recycling carts, residents must visit [peelregion.ca/waste](http://peelregion.ca/waste)

Due to the potential volume of carts exchange requests, the Region has advised that it may take approximately six to 12 weeks for carts to be exchanged. Residents who need to exchange both their garbage and recycling carts must process the request in one online transaction. Residents can only submit one request to change their cart sizes during April without incurring fees. Once one free transaction is completed in April, residents will not be permitted to process a second request. Carts must be empty, visible and accessible for the vendor to complete the exchange.

Garbage carts will be exchanged the day after residents' garbage day and recycling carts will be exchanged the day after their recycling day. Residents are advised that garbage and recycling carts will be exchanged separately and should be set out to the curb adhering to their alternating garbage and recycling collection schedule.


If residents' carts are not exchanged by 8 p.m. the day after their collection day, they must bring the cart back to their household for proper storage and continued use for two more weeks; set the cart out for collection according to their regular schedule; and leave the cart out until 8 p.m. the day that follows their regular scheduled garbage or recycling collection day.

Residents must repeat these steps until their carts are exchanged.

If residents do not need to exchange their carts, but require maintenance or to report a lost or stolen cart, they can visit [peelregion.ca/waste](http://peelregion.ca/waste) to process a request.



The church, with its appended bell tower, represents a high degree of craftsmanship and artistic merit. This property is a community landmark that maintains the character of the historic village.

17211 Old Main Street, Belfountain

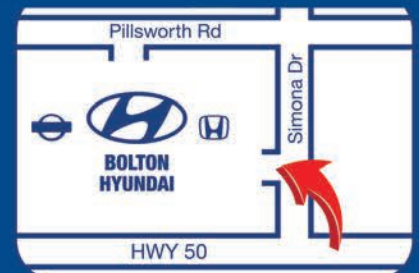

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# Local athletes hear from Olympian and Pan Am medalist

Members of 310 running in Bolton received an inspirational message about the sport recently from an expert.

Olympic 400-metre hurdler Sarah Wells was on hand with some reflections about her running career.

Wells, 26, originally from Markham, competed in the 2012 Olympic Games in London, where she made it in the top 24 in the world. She won the silver medal in the 400 metres hurdles at last year's 2015 Pan American Games.

She wasn't in her best form for the visit, having torn a hamstring the week before. But she was still upbeat for her young audience.

She said she got her start in track and field in high school. A friend was going out for the team, and Wells thought it looked like fun, so she went too.

"Fortunately, I found hurdles," she said, adding one nice thing about them is they offer a distraction from worrying how much farther she still has to run.

## Wells said she's still considered at Olympic champion to address Parkinson's group

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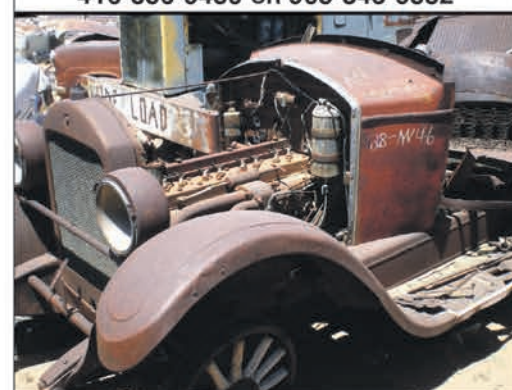

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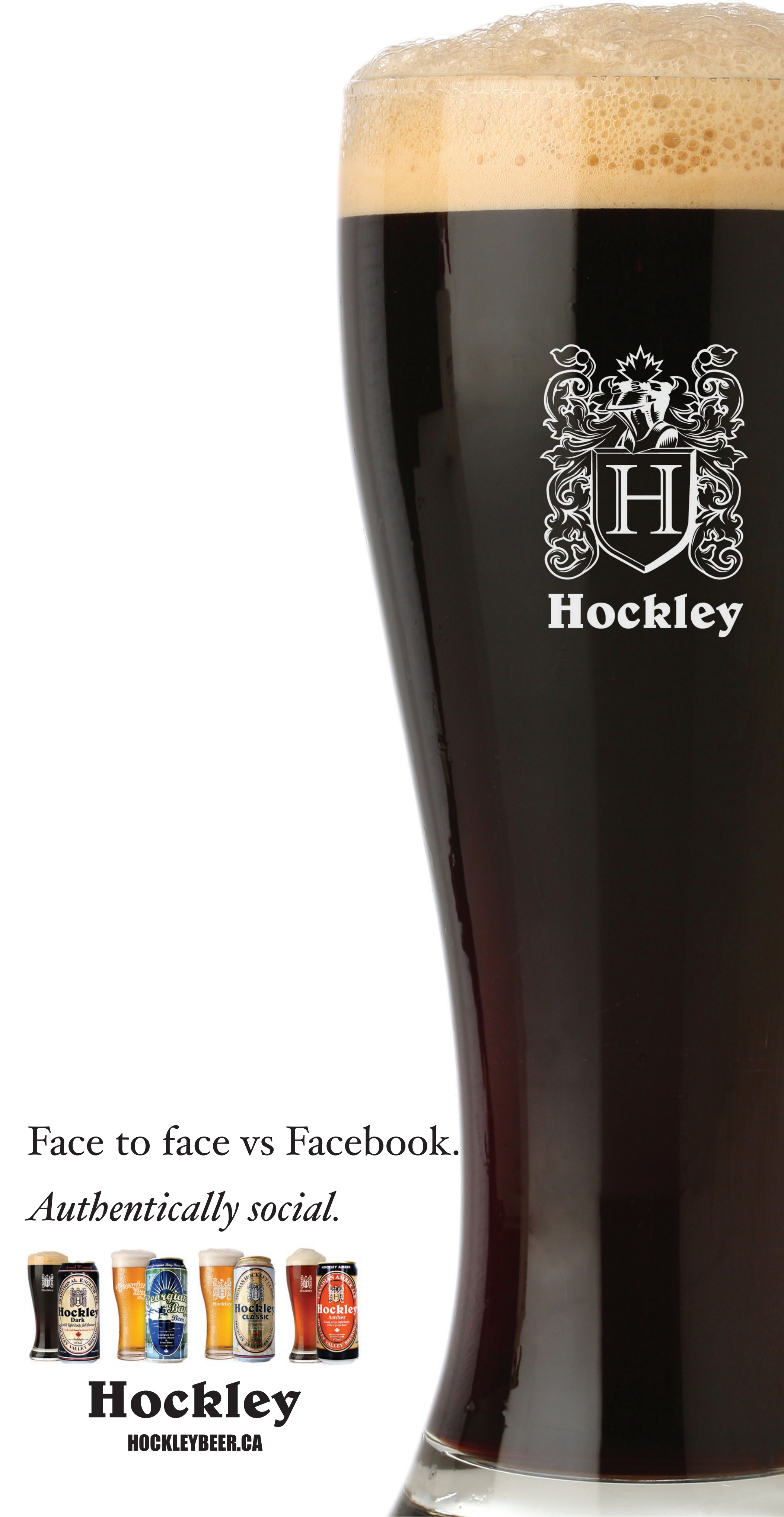

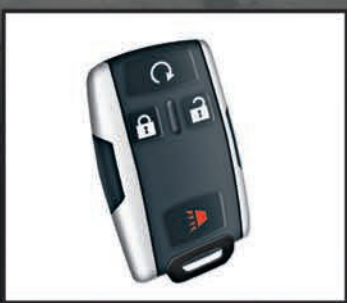

er disposal of potentially harmful products. Area recycling centers may have drop-off areas for stains and paints, used motor oil and other potentially harmful products.


Before discarding something, see if it can be donated or sold. This will result in fewer items ending up in landfills.

Springtime renovation and cleaning projects provide the perfect opportunity to adopt eco-friendly practices that pay dividends for years to come.



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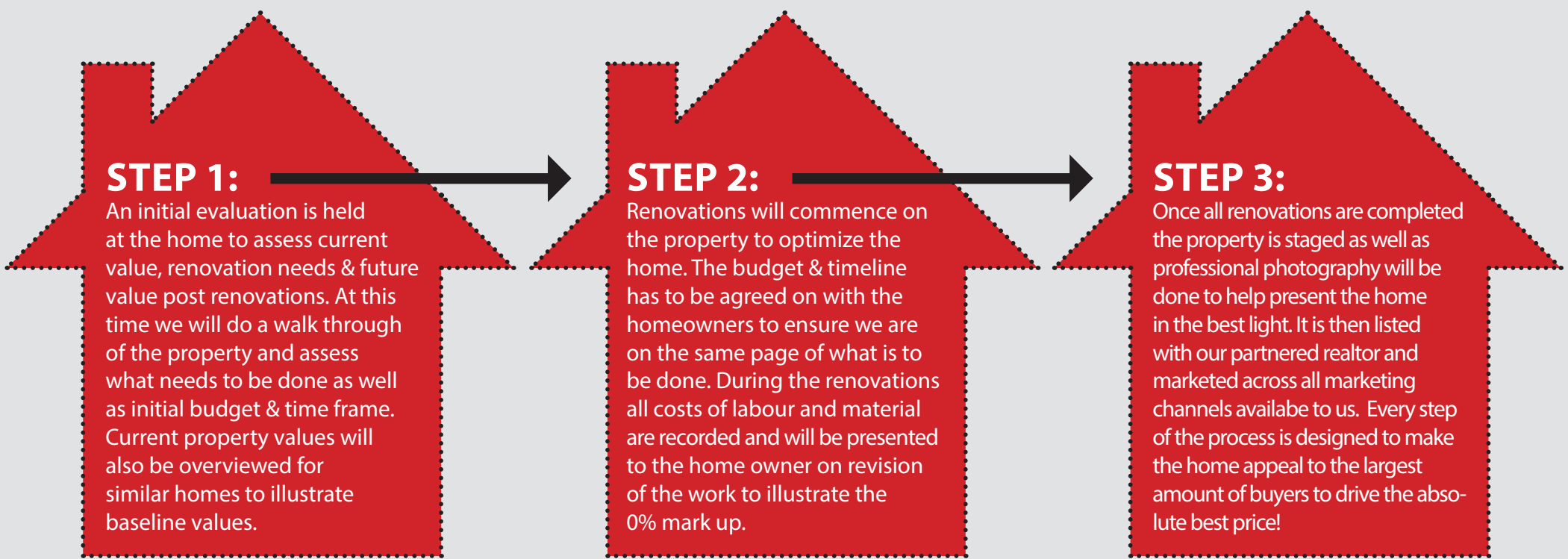

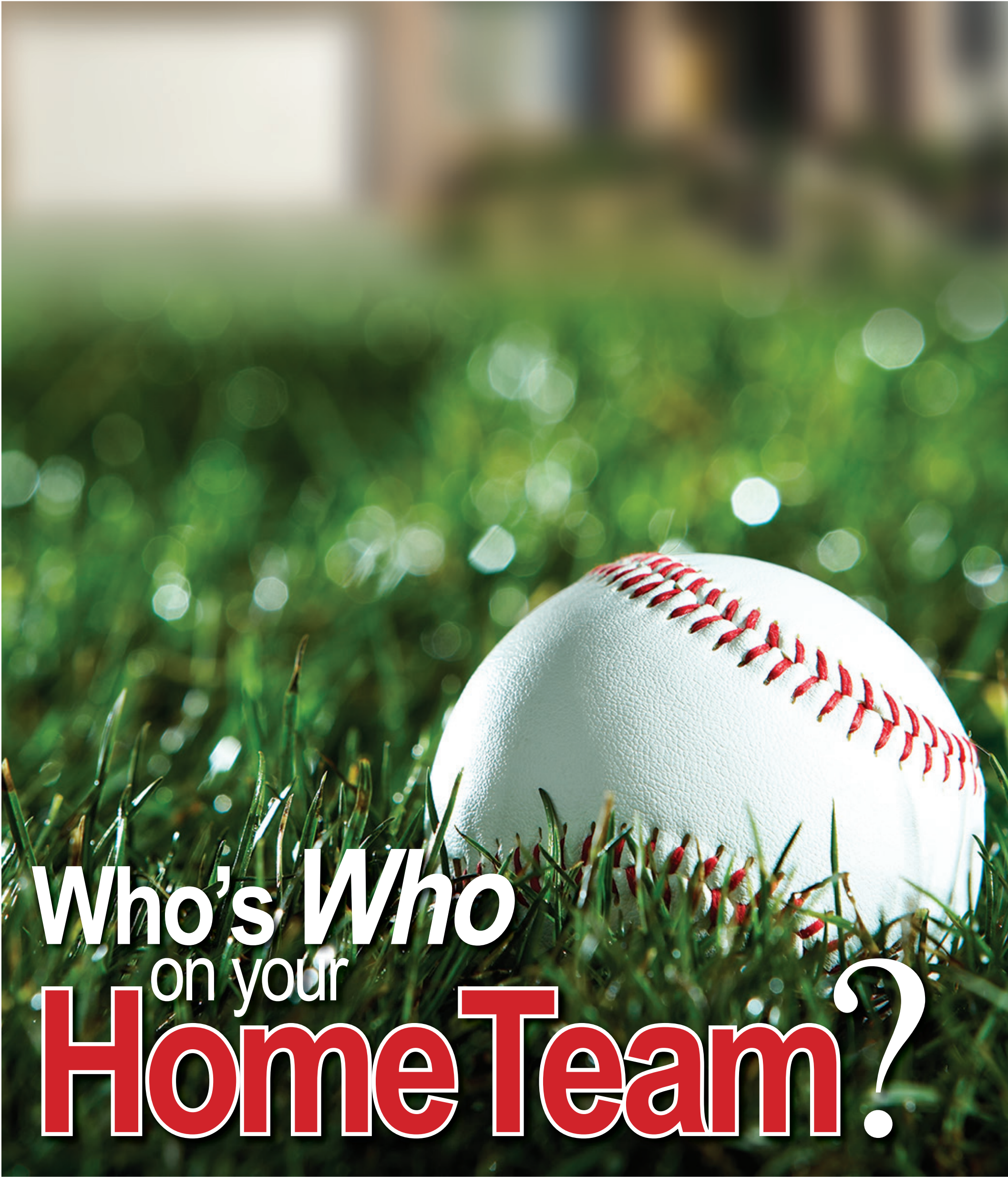
