Keeping Caledon Clean

The Town of Caledon's Clean Yards By-law sets out the minimum standards for property maintenance within the Town. The standards prescribed in this by-law are intended to ensure reasonable maintenance and care of land.

HIGHLIGHTS

- All property owners are to cut and maintain the grass on their lawns. Grass and weeds cannot exceed 8 inches or 20 centimeters.
- All properties are to be kept clear of garbage, yard waste, appliances, machinery and machinery equipment, containers, sewage and materials from construction or
- All properties are to be kept clear of derelict vehicles, unless the derelict vehicle and its parts are kept in an enclosed building.

The By-law provides the Town with the ability to issue Orders promptly to property owners and tenants upon receiving a complaint, to maintain compliance with the standards in accordance with the provisions of the Clean Yards By-law.



nual car trip to Texas, and in particular to various Houston supermarkets, your correspondent noticed two striking differences between their dairy sections and our local equivalents.

First, the price was just a fraction of what we're forced to pay for milk, cheese and other dairy products.

Second, the selection of various types and brands is absolutely enormous. Not to mention delightful for a foodie such as

A good part of the reason for this disparity, of course, can be traced directly to the cowardice of our domestic politicians — Liberals, Tories and New Democrats alike — who continue to honor a supply management scheme to the benefit of a small group of wealthy dairy farmers to the detriment of all Canadian consumers, plus farmers who specialize in other crops or products.

The University of Calgary, for one, estimates that this government-sponsored scam — which would likely be prosecuted as price-fixing and collusion if it weren't approved by the politicians — costs each and every Canadian more than \$300 a year in buying such staples as milk, cheese, butter, eggs and chicken, a situation which obviously hits poorer people much harder than those who really don't need to worry about the cost of feeding their families.

This absurd situation was recently brought to the attention of consumers and immediately sparked all sorts of defensive rationale from politicians and the dairy lobbyists — by none other than U.S. President Donald Trump who, whatever his other faults may be, was justified in railing against our system of preferential treatment for a small band of wealthy dairy farmers.

Canada's immediate reaction, of course, was that Trump had his facts wrong.

But even the Toronto Star — which can't even spell the name Trump without inserting an insult of one kind or another - conceded in an editorial that, oh my God, when it comes to dairy protectionism hurting consumers, Trump actually has a point.

Of course, The Star argued that it was accidental — that Trump couldn't possibly understand what he's talking about. But it conceded that he did "stumble onto a truth when he called supply management an 'unfair thing.' It is."

Just to illustrate how far the Star (and most other mainline publications) will go functions were valued and protected. to twist themselves into pretzels to criticize Trump, that same editorial, having conceded Trump had a point, nonetheless praised their hero, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, for dissenting.

Meanwhile, back at the main point, i.e. this outrageous collusion between governments and the dairy lobby, the only current domestic politician with the guts to leadership candidate Maxime Bernier (which would earn him my vote if I had a vote on the leadership.)

and Mail last week, Bernier wrote that Trump was right to dismiss our dairy supply management system as "unfair" to the dairy farmers of Wisconsin — which is what Trump specifically was addressing — but "You will excuse me if I say I am mostly sorry for a much larger group: the 35 million Canadians who are paying on average twice as much as they should for their eggs, chicken and dairy products

"I think it's very unfair that in order to keep a system that favors less than 10 per cent of Canadian farmers, our government has not been able to negotiate better trade deals for the other 90 per cent . . . export their goods.'

(In agreeing with Trump on dairy, however, Bernier pointed out the same arguments could/should be made against the U.S. tariffs and quotas on softwood lumber, which not only means higher costs for Canadian consumers but an extra \$1,000 to Americans for a new home. What's good for the goose . . .)

The fact is, there is no justification none whatsoever — for the system of tariffs and quotas which keeps our dairy prices high and virtually disqualifies any younger blood from getting into the business and introducing some competition.

For all the chatter we hear from politicians about their "deep concerns" for the poor, surely their ongoing support of a system which penalizes those people for families is really the most wicked hypocrisy of all.





End of era as Brayhill Farms Museum prepares for auction







Jazz artist Saunders and friends will get the toes tapping

"Life is a lot like jazz . . . it's best when you improvise." - George Gershwin

Music is immersing yourself in the moment. Jazz is bringing a smile to your nicknamed "Nicksieland." soul.

King's accomplished jazz pianist ders admitted. Adam Saunders exudes joy when he's tickling the ivories, bringing emotions to life. Jazz, he said, is about simplicity and easy listening. It's about feeling the beat and jumping in with both hands. The pure acoustical sounds are like soft clav in a musicians hands — you never know what form it's gonna take.

"Jazz to me is a living music. It's a music that since its beginning has expressed the feelings, the dreams, hopes, of the people." – Dexter Gordon

Saunders, a self-taught musical virtuoso, has been hooked on jazz since he was 15. The traditional Dixieland jazz is "happy stuff" to Saunders, who just can't get enough of this intoxicating blend. Saunders never learned how to read music and he even admits he uses "all the wrong fingers." But the result is almost magical, the moment he sits in front of his Stein-

chart," he said with a smile.

He learned how to play the piano simply by watching others at his boarding school. He picked it up like a prodigy. To this day, he improvises. He understands the cord progression and template, which he sees as a "trellis on which to hang the door. They're available from Brown Paper melody."

Saunders put together his first band in 1959 and kept "very busy having fun" at private functions, weddings and corporate events. By day, Saunders was the consummate professional — a commercial insurance expert. By night, he was footloose and fancy free, doing what came naturally. Saunders's music has been an important part of him all of his life.

As a purist, Saunders travelled around the world, playing with some of the industry's greats.

He visited the shrine of North American jazz — Preservation Hall in the French Quarter of New Orleans. His hosts coerced him to play for some time that night.

"I loved it," he said, recalling the night's impromptu performance.

Preservation Hall continues the mission today as a cornerstone of New Orleans music and culture. It draws visitors from all over to their nightly concerts.

Saunders also mentioned he spent 20

minutes speaking with jazz great Eddie Condon at his club in New York. Condon is credited with creating a sophisticated variation on Dixieland music, which was

At their home in rural King Township, Saunders and his wife Valerie have hosted many high-profile visitors and musicians from across the globe. Valerie joined Adam's love of jazz and she was the founder of the Classical Jazz Society of Toronto.

He has combined his love of flying with music and just might be seen landing his float plane in the Muskokas, Georgian Bay or Temagami for a gig.

The Adam Saunders' Jazz Band includes some of Saunders' most respected colleagues and friends. Distinguished performers in their own right, they are a dynamic team always promising a lively event. He is joined by Al Cox (trumpet), Peter Hysen (trombone), Micky Loran (clarinet/saxophone), 'Doc' Mike Walmsley, (Guitar/Banjo), Ron Johnson (bass) and Jamie Aug on drums.



About 80 per cent lock their cars

Ford continues to knock its competition out by focusing on the key traits their F-250's have been known for: brutish power and their payload capacity. But this year, the 2017 Ford Super Duty will have an aluminum construction bringing it into the modern era of trucks.

This redesign is the first one in quite a long time, and it has a lot of impressive changes, especially with it's up to 440 horsepower and 925 lb-ft of torque, and can carry up to 7630 pounds in the bed or 32,500 pounds on a trailer depending on the model.

The Super Duty comes standard with a 6.2-litre V-8 engine, and with an optional 6.7-litre turbo-diesel V-8 engine (the one capable of towing up to 32,500 l bs).


