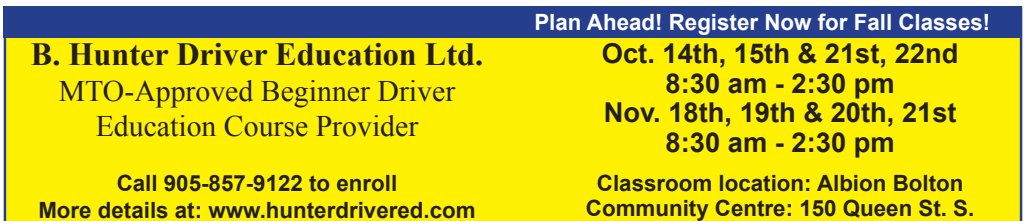

Police stated that stunt driving is one of the most serious and reckless forms of aggressive driving. It puts all road users at risk and carries steep penalties upon conviction: \$2,000 to \$10,000 fine, six demerit points, up to six months in jail with up to a two-year licence suspension.

An 18-year-old man from Toronto is facing charges after Caledon OPP officer spotted a case of excessive speeding on Highway 10 July 24.

Police report the officer was conducting radar enforcement shortly before 10 p.m. when she saw a black 2016 Mitsubishi Lancer traveling at high speed. She determined it was going 157 km/h in a posted 80 zone.

During the traffic stop, the officer conducted an investigation under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act which led to a 20-year-old passenger being charged with possession of a schedule II substance (cannabis marijuana) — under 30 grams and failing to comply with a probation order.

# Border road serves ‘regional function’

Councillor Rob Mezzapelli voiced his support for the uploading of Albi-on-Vaughan Road.

“It absolutely now serves a regional function,” he declared.

He added Queen Street is a key feature in Bolton.

General Manager of Finance and Infrastructure Services Fuwing Wong told Groves the Town has not had any talks with Vaughan or York on this matter, although he understood Peel staff had been in contact with their Regional counterparts in York.

Councillor Nick de Boer asked about the possibility of the Region taking over Caledon King Town Line north of King, noting it’s a boundary road, also pointing out Winston Churchill Boule-

vard on the west edge of town is a Regional road.

Wong said the traffic volumes to the north of King Street are not what they are to the south, adding he didn’t think Peel would be interested in taking that on.

Groves later defended the plan for the Town to take on just the portion of Queen south of King, commenting that had been discussed between staff at the Town and Region.

“That stretch we’re able to maintain,” she said, adding it made sense for the Region to keep responsibility for the road north of King in the core. The Region has done a lot of work in the core, including the development of the pavilion at Humber River Heritage Park and the pump house at the foot of the north hill.


“A lot of their infrastructure is there,” she said.

The 18-year-old student completed her foundation year program, studying ancient and contemporary texts at the University of King’s College in Halifax. Ellen plans to major in contemporary studies and philosophy or English.

For many years, Ellen has been interested in environmental issues with a passion for agriculture and food security. She shares another passion for literature and philosophy, which she believes tied into her summer position at CCS.

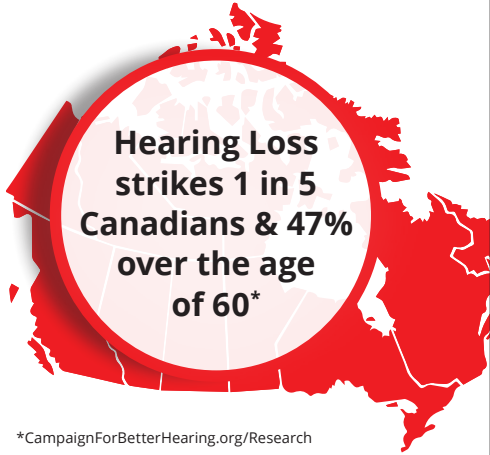

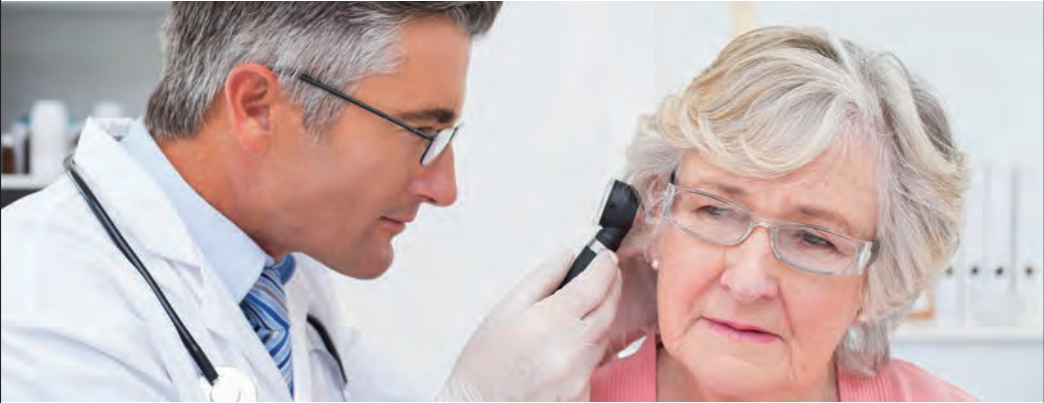

## Property Tax Information for Newly Constructed Homes

The following is important information for residents that recently moved into a newly constructed home: Property Tax Due Dates are the first Thursday of March, May, July and September.

### Tax Assessment

- If the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) has not assessed your house yet, the Town may calculate and bill your property taxes based on the value of your land only.
- It may take up to 3 years after occupancy before your property assessment reflects both the value of the land and the house.
- The Town issues supplementary tax bills when MPAC has reassessed a property because of additions or improvements that increase its market value or when MPAC has assessed a new home or building.
- For newly constructed homes that are currently assessed at land only, once the full assessment information becomes available, the Town will send a supplementary tax bill.
- The supplementary tax bill can date back three years and will be for taxes payable less any taxes already billed which were based on the land value.

### Pre-Authorized Payment Plan (PAP)

- Your PAP application will be included with your final tax bill. The PAP application form is also available on the Town's website at: [www.caledon.ca/tax](http://www.caledon.ca/tax)
- Pre-authorized payment withdrawals are made on the first of the month, January through October OR on tax installment due dates, based on the PAP plan selected.

### Semi-detached and Townhomes

When a large piece of land, such as the land that semi-detached and townhomes are built on, is divided into a series of smaller parcels of land, it is often necessary to "apportion" taxes from the original land block to the new individual parcels. MPAC assigns each of the new parcels an individual roll number and an assessment value for the land. When the Town receives this apportionment information from MPAC, an adjustment to the taxes is created and bills are issued.

# Jones favours proposed driving sanctions from government

The Province has announced plans to crack down on careless and distracted drivers, although details are still to be announced.  
“In principle, I support it,” Dufferin-Caledon MPP Sylvia Jones commented, although she too expressed the wish to see more details. “It’s only an announcement, so far.”  
Last Wednesday’s announcement promised tough new rules and penalties that would help improve road safety and keep the most vulnerable road users, including

pedestrians and cyclists, safe.  
The government plans to introduce new legislation this fall that, if passed, would help reduce the number of people killed or injured by impaired, distracted and dangerous drivers.  
The proposed measures include a new offence for careless driving causing death or bodily harm with penalties of fines, licence suspension and imprisonment; tougher penalties for distracted driving, including higher fines, more demerit points and licence suspensions; and heavier penalties for drivers who fail to yield for pedestrians and escalating fines for drivers who are convicted of multiple pedestrian-related offences within five years. As well, the government is looking into the use of cameras on school buses that can capture motorists illegally passing them in a way that can be admitted in court.  
Jones was enthused with the school bus provisions.  
“People blow by school buses,” she declared. “That would be a pretty quick fix to discourage that type of behaviour.”  
She also lamented that anyone who drives still sees people looking at their devices when they shouldn’t.  
“I’m happy that they’re trying to deal with that,” she said, adding police have reported that kind of behaviour is more dangerous than drinking and driving.  
The government reported that on aver-

age, a person is killed on Ontario roads every 17 hours, and about a quarter of those fatalities are either pedestrians or cyclists.  
“Ontario is taking action to reduce the number of people killed by impaired, distracted and dangerous drivers,” Transportation Minister Steven Del Cuca said. “These measures will help keep some of our most vulnerable road users safe and help us drive home the message that dangerous, impaired and distracted driving is unacceptable, and will not be tolerated.”  
Jones stated she does not text or talk on her phone while driving. She said there was an occasions some years ago when she had had a long phone conversation on the road, then realized how far she had travelled, not recalling many of the turns she would have made.  
“It scares you,” she said.

## Will new rules go too far?

I think there’s a lot to be said for the plans the Provincial government announced last week for cracking down on careless and distracted drivers.

But there are also legitimate questions as to whether the government is going too far in some respects and not far enough in others.

For example, the news releases I have seen make references to getting cameras mounted on school buses so vehicles that illegally pass them, such as when they are picking up and letting off youngsters, can be caught more easily, and in a way that would be admissible in court. What are they waiting for?

I know I’ve seen my fair share of cars that have just kept going when they should have stopped for a school bus. School buses are usually big and always bright yellow. When they are picking up or dropping off, they have big, red lights flashing at both ends and a stop sign protruding near the driver’s window. My point is these things are pretty hard to miss, yet there are a lot of people who accomplish the feat.

I can also go along with provisions to create a new offence of careless driving causing death or bodily harm. To be honest, I was little surprised when I read about that one, mainly because it dawned on me that such provisions were nor already on the books. They should have been there a long time ago.

The whole thing ties into being attentive when you’re driving, and that’s simply part of good common sense, is it not?

The main thing is this all reverts back to the concept of distracted driving, and there are plenty of statistics to indicate that’s a very serious menace on our roads. Police services, including Caledon OPP, raise that issue constantly, in the form of press releases, etc.

But my concerns come from the definition of distracted driving.

Granted, people who use hand-held devices to text messages while they’re driving are something of a problem. They are focusing on their message and not on the care and control they are supposed to be exercising over a couple of thousand pounds of machinery moving at an appreciable speed. The main problem with that is they take their eyes off the road while texting, making it easy for them to miss the little kid who has ventured on the road to retrieve the ball that has rolled there.

Yes, when it comes to texting, I’m hard pressed to think of anyone who would consider that proper activity while driving. Indeed, anyone who would consider it proper probably shouldn’t be driving in the first place.

But there are circumstances that I think lie in a grey area.

Case in point: I was driving last Saturday with my wife in the car when my cell phone rang. I usually carry my phone in the breast pocket of my shirt. I reached into the pock-

et, took out the phone glanced at it briefly to see the number of the person who was calling (it was my brother, with whom I had left a message to call me about an hour before) and handed it to Beth, asking her to answer it. She did all the talking on the phone.

Was I in violation of anything?

I don’t think I was. My eyes never left the road except for that brief glance at the number. I spend more time checking the blind spot when I change lanes (a practice that was drilled into me by the guy who taught me to drive about 43 years ago) than I did being distracted on this occasion. Yet I have spoken to a few people about it, and some of them think I was lucky a cop wasn’t around to watch what I did.

Incidentally, had Beth not been in the car with me last Saturday, I would have handled things in a significantly different fashion. I would have pulled off the road as soon as an opportunity presented itself, taken the car out of gear, put the parking brake on and turned on the flashers. And then I would have taken the phone from my pocket, looked at the number, then talked to my

brother.

Yet according to what we’re hearing, if the new legislation that we’re being told is to be proposed goes through, I could have had my licence suspended and faced a very hefty fine if an officer decided to get picky. That bothers me.

There is a big difference between people who glance at their devices and people who use them to get into an involved texting conversation.

And what exactly constitutes distracted driving?

Am I considered distracted if I put my transponder into position before going onto Highway 407?

If I take a second to change the station on the radio in my car to catch the hourly newscast, am I breaking the law? I shouldn’t have to be fooling around with air conditioning in my car in September, but as we all know, this is a unique September. Those of us who are trying to adjust the temperatures might be in violation. Am I committing an act that is contrary to the law because my radio (or the attached CD player) is playing a favourite song of mine, and I am enjoying same?

It’s a good thing I quit smoking more than 20 years ago, because the very acts of lighting up and flicking the ash away could be construed as distracting if one is also driving at the same time.

Part of the problem is there is, as yet, no legislation. There’s just been an announcement that something is coming.

Perhaps there are some changes to the rules of the road that are warranted, but they have to be tempered with common sense. Go after the stupid people who text lengthy messages while driving. I don’t want to share the road with them either. Leave the rest of us alone.

# Asylum claims costing the taxpayer millions

To say that the numbers are staggering is an understatement.

In July, the RCMP intercepted 2,996 people crossing illegally into Canada in order to claim asylum. The vast majority of those were at one crossing in Quebec. In August, that number rose to 5,330. The total to date this year is 13,211.

These numbers are in addition to the normal flow of asylum claims from overseas or those at legal points of entry. As of August, 27,440 claims for asylum had been made in Canada. This is at the highest levels since the record highs of 36,000 in 2008. And we have three and a half months still to go in 2017.

The cost of each asylum claim ranges between \$12,900 to more than \$20,000 according to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada. That puts the bill for this year between \$359.9 million to \$548.8 million — and we're only two thirds of the way through the year.

You may recall that earlier this summer, the Canadian Forces were called in to erect tent cities at the border with the U.S. in southern Quebec in order to

be able to handle the flow of illegal migrants. They are then being transferred to a facility in Ontario simply because there aren't enough resources to handle this level of influx.

It is illegal to enter Canada between official points of entry. People who are intercepted by the RCMP or local law enforcement after crossing the border illegally are brought to the nearest CBSA port of entry or inland CBSA or IRCC office (whichever is closest), where an immigration officer will conduct an immigration examination, including whether detention is warranted. At this

point, individuals undergo health check to address any immediate health needs, as well a security screenings to ensure that they do not pose a security threat to Canada and to determine whether they are eligible to make a refugee claim. These screenings include biometric checks (for example, fingerprinting). If required, a refugee claim will be started. If the claim is determined to be eligible, it will be referred to the Refugee Protection Division of the Immigration and Refugee Board of Canada (IRB) for a hearing.

In most cases, the foreign national

will be released on terms and conditions while they await their hearing. Individuals whose claim is found not to be eligible will be issued a removal order and released on conditions to report for a future removal hearing. The vast majority of these illegal border crossers will be deported, but only after draining resources intended for legitimate refugees and asylum seekers.

You may recall that the Prime Minister tweeted the following Jan. 28: "To those fleeing persecution, terror & war, Canadians will welcome you, regardless of your faith. Diversity is our strength #WelcomeToCanada."

This was in response to the messages coming out of the White House following President Trump's initial attempt at a travel ban on those from certain Muslim-majority countries. Conservatives would never have made such irresponsible proclamations as the Prime Minister did, nor given these people false hope. The Liberals have broken the system and stuck the taxpayer with a staggering bill. It's up to them to fix it.

## Government fails to spend 20 per cent of their promised infrastructure budget

The 2016-2017 public accounts documents show that the government of Ontario failed to spend nearly \$3.3 billion or 20 per cent of the infrastructure budget they had promised to Ontarians.

I asked the Minister of Infrastructure about this significant underspend, and to provide the list of infrastructure projects that the government had promised, but had been delayed or not started. The Minister instead chose to blame municipal and federal partners for the delays saying, "yes, there were some delays because of the processing with the federal government," and "some of those munic-

ipalities have not been able to deliver the actual shovel in the ground on time."

Now the Minister has continued this line and is quoted by Global News say-

ing "project review and federal approval has taken more time than expected."

Unfortunately for the Minister, this does not remove his responsibility. The government has never shied away from an opportunity to boast about its promises to communities. But time and time again, the government isn't getting the job done for Ontarians. It is ultimately up to the Minister of Infrastructure to keep the government's infrastructure moving. So far this government has failed to do so.

By not spending 20 per cent of their infrastructure budget, the government is adding onto a list of broken infrastructure promises. For instance, the government had promised two-way all-day GO train service to Kitchener by 2019, but significant delays mean that the revised timeline for this project is 2024. Nearly

10 years after its discovery, the government has still failed to develop the Ring of Fire.

This \$3.3 billion left on the table, is even more frustrating when I think about the important infrastructure projects communities in Dufferin-Caledon have been asking for, but have received little provincial support for. For instance, the Town of Mono has been asking for safety improvements on Highway 10 south of Primrose, but instead the government has decided to only provide culvert and maintenance work to Highway 10. Meanwhile, Shelburne and Bolton are looking investments in GO transit. Communities across Dufferin-Caledon are in need of support with their sewer and water treatment infrastructure. The Town of Shelburne is looking for an advanced green at Highway 89 and 124, and the needs continue to grow.

Communities across Dufferin-Caledon and Ontario expect the government to keep their infrastructure investment promises. However, their track record shows that the government is more interested in making promises than getting the job done. The government has promised investment in Ontario's infrastructure needs. It's time for them to deliver.

## A missed opportunity

Several decades ago, Rene Levesque, Canada's first separatist premier, replied to questions from what he saw as a hostile media by commenting that if he decided to walk across the St. Lawrence River from Levis to Quebec City, the headline would be "Levesque can't swim."

Enter U.S. President Donald Trump. In many respects, of course, his negative press is his own fault, but even when he does something good — or even neutral — the rabidly anti-Trump media finds fault.

As for our guy, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, it's almost the opposite. To be sure, he's been subject to some criticism — his flip-flop on voting changes and the current dispute about tax reform come to mind. But overall, his so-called "sunny ways" approach has been viewed favourably through a left-leaning media lens.

Take last week's appearances at the United Nations for example.

Trump went there, if not to bury the UN, certainly not to praise them. His message was that it's about time — indeed, well past time — that the world's largest gathering of politicians and bureaucrats actually did something concrete about some of the world's worst rogue regimes, particularly North Korea and Iran, rather than sitting around congratulating themselves on their own self-importance.

Much of the media reaction to his tough-talking speech was, as you'd expect, completely negative. The Toronto Star, for example, didn't cite any positive reviews from other political leaders — even though there were some — but did manage to find a former security advisor for former president Barack Obama to dump on Trump's approach. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, for example, who is used to the UN passing anti-Israeli resolutions — while ignoring horrible human rights abuses elsewhere — said, "In over 30 years in my experience with the UN, I never heard a bolder or more courageous speech."

But that doesn't matter. It's Trump after all, so any self-respecting journalist or liberal politician can't be seen being positive, which is likely why our newspapers reported that some people were upset with Trump's undiplomatic terminology, but couldn't find room in their publications to report that within days of his tough talking about North Korea, China, that regime's biggest enabler, announced new banking crackdowns against doing business with them.

Our man Trudeau, on the other hand, spent pretty much his entire speech apologizing to the world for this country's treatment of its aboriginals, the type of mea culpa that many UN members simply love to hear from Western leaders, conveniently ignoring the fact that this bloated body is doing virtually nothing about many of the world's current problem spots.

It is certainly true that Canada has not always treated its indigenous population well, but Trudeau's insulting inference that all previous governments were part

of an evil cabal to destroy them — which is essentially what he was saying — is a deliberate distortion of our real history. Governments continue to spend billions of tax dollars hoping to improve the lives of our First Nations. That it often doesn't work is self evident. But the effort has been there and for Trudeau to arrogantly suggest that he's the first prime minister to attempt to right historic wrongs is absolutely in keeping with his own gargantuan sense of self-importance.

According to Trudeau, "For Indigenous peoples in Canada, the experience was mostly one of humiliation, neglect and abuse."

While there certainly was a lot of that, it's simply not true to say that all governments who came before his enlightened gang were bent upon destroying the aboriginal way of life.

But Trudeau's approach, as we've said, is absolutely the type of empty rhetoric UN potentates love to hear. Why? Because they can shake their heads knowingly, pretend they give a damn, and not have to do anything about it.

Trump's direct call for action against various rogue regimes, on the other hand, forces them to look at their own record and actually make decisions, the sort of thing any self-respecting UN official hates to face.

By portraying Canada as a cold, heartless haven of anti-indigenous creeps, however, Trudeau absolved himself of even paying lip service to many of the urgent issues currently facing the rest of the world. He ignored North Korea and Iran, didn't mention Canada-U.S. relations and the current free trade talks. He said nothing about our current refugee/immigration problems, where so-called "refugees" are streaming over our borders, and also ignored international security and terrorism, including grave problems in Syria and Iraq. Worse, given that Myanmar leader Aung San Suu Kyi holds an honorary Canadian citizenship — and while held in captivity before emerging as leader, was a heroine of liberals everywhere — Trudeau avoided any mention of the Rohingya crisis, where Suu Kyi is complicit in the horror of some 400,000 Rohingya Muslims being forced to flee to Bangladesh. Oh sure, he had sent her a note a few days before, but apparently this human rights crisis wasn't worth a line in his speech.

He didn't even mention Canada's long-awaited decision to meet its announced plans to NATO and UN peacekeeping forces, or our current involvement in the Ukraine, Iraq or Syria.

It was the kind of speech you'd expect a prime minister to make in Canada, since it dealt only with domestic issues, rather than using a UN platform to shed some light on his thinking outside this country's borders, a decision so obvious that even the Star quoted academic Stephanie Carvin saying she was "baffled" by its domestic focus given that Canada is campaigning for a seat on the UN Security Council. She called it "haphazard" and "a missed opportunity."

But he looked pretty delivering it, and, unlike Trump, who was growling at them, that's apparently what counts the most.

# Green Party picks Laura Campbell for next year’s provincial election

There’s officially a third name in the running locally for next year’s provincial election.

Local business owner Laura Campbell last week secured the nomination for the Green Party of Ontario (GPO) right here in Dufferin-Caledon.

Set to do battle with Liberal nominee Bob Gordanier and Progressive Conservative incumbent Sylvia Jones, Campbell readily admitted she faces an uphill task as she seeks to become the first Green candidate to secure a seat at Queen’s Park.

A 31-year-old mother of two, Campbell owns and operates Pia’s on Broadway with her husband. On top of that, she is also a PhD student at the University of Toronto, studying international relations. At last Thursday’s meeting, Campbell was the only one to stand for nomination. She told the group of 20 onlookers, which included GPO Leader Mike Schreiner, that she hopes to inspire a new generation of voters in Dufferin-Caledon come June 7, 2018.

“This means so much to me,” an emotional Campbell told the crowd of cheering supporters. “I’m so excited to get to know even more people here in Dufferin-Caledon. I’m young, I’ve got lots of ideas and I’m really passionate about this. I feel pretty confident in saying I’m here to stay in the Green Party of Ontario.”

While she committed herself to running a “clean campaign” over the coming months, stating she looked forward to seeing what sort of platforms her opponents intend to run on, Campbell was not shy in letting people know where she believes the problems lie right now in Ontario politics.

She criticized both the Liberal and Conservative parties for their lack of action on environmental issues over the years, slamming both the Dalton McGuinty and Kathleen Wynne administrations for fumbling the Green Energy Act. She chastised the current government for failing to implement “proper” upgrades to the province’s transit system and, with its new controversial Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act, turning its back on Ontario’s small business community.

“Citizens feel so removed from the political process that they don’t want to get involved,” she observed. “I want to change that. I need to change that. I want politics to be accessible to everyone, I want everyone to feel like they can participate in the process. I want people to want to participate.”

“To do that, I need to engage people and tune them back into politics,” she added. “I will be going door to door, I will be compassionate and I will convince people that it’s the right decision to elect a Green candidate in this region.”

Schreiner took the time to officially welcome Campbell into the fold, expressing his belief that the time was now for the Green Party of Ontario to step up and finally secure a seat down

at Queen’s Park.

“Now more than ever, this is an exciting time to be Green,” he declared. “There’s a real wave starting to take place across this country, a wave which began with Elizabeth May in British Columbia.”

“I’m excited to be here in Dufferin-Caledon this evening to welcome an incredible candidate to our team,” he added. “Laura is a successful local business owner, she is a PhD candidate and, more importantly, she is a remarkable human being who I know will do a fantastic job for us in this riding.”

“To have someone like Laura on board, someone who is so passionate, so enthusiastic and who understands what small businesses mean to a community, it’s invaluable to the GPO,” Schreiner observed. “She has a real vision on how to be inclusive in politics and I truly believe she can energize the young voters in this riding. We trust that she will bring the Green message to the people of Dufferin-Caledon and, given the chance, will make an excellent MPP at Queen’s Park.”

Campbell said she will make a concerted effort to encourage the riding’s young populace to turn out in full force next year in an attempt to bring about much needed change in the provincial political spectrum. Over the next few months, she expects to engage with people over such things as spiralling hydro costs, burgeoning classroom sizes and dwindling local water sources.

As well as discussing what she refers to as “provincial issues,” Campbell said she will be discussing the federal government’s supposed commitment to fighting climate change. Speaking to local media, she didn’t believe Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and his team were doing enough to truly make a difference.

“I know, as a country, we’ve agreed to uphold a climate agreement, but I wonder what we’re actually doing to meet our targets. We’ve spent billions of dollars trying to find out what to do to combat climate change, but we already have the answers,” she said. “We’re just not moving on them and that’s infuriating to me.”

“Climate change is now,” she added. “This is not something that is going to happen in the future, it is something we’re living today. I have children I want to protect, as we all have people we’d like to protect. I believe we should be doing more to meet our targets, and I will be communicating that with people in Dufferin-Caledon.”

“More than anything though, I’m just excited to get started,” Campbell concluded. “This is something I’ve wanted to do for a while now. I’m excited to learn and I’m excited to share my ideas. Regardless of the stereotypes, the Green Party of Ontario is not a one issue party. We just feel if we start with the subject of environment, it reverberates into every facet of life.”

The junior C Caledon Golden Hawks can breathe a sigh of relief after picking up their first win of the season against Penetang Friday.

## Ali Ramsay claims Caledon Cup at Equestrian Park

It took an overpowering performance Sunday combined with an impressive outing Friday night to earn Ali Ramsay of Victoria, B.C. the Caledon Cup at the Canadian Show Jumping Tournament in Palgrave.

Ramsay, 25, won the \$86,000 Grand Prix and claimed the Cup Sunday after turning in two faultless performances on Hermelien VD Hooghoeve, her ten-year-old Belgian Warmblood mare.

Site of equestrian events for the 2015 Pan American Games, the Caledon Equestrian Park was hosting its fourth and final week of International Equestrian Federation (FEI) sanctioned competition for the 2017 season.

The Caledon Cup consisted of three separate events.

The first phase was held last Thursday, and was won by 22-year-old show jumping sensation Daniel Coyle of Ireland. Held as a speed class which saw the fastest round win, the \$10,000 Caledon Cup — Phase One attracted 32 entries. Coyle was fourth in the order and turned in a blistering fast round in a time of 67.85 riding Martha Louise, a 13-year-old Swedish Warmblood

game and handed Caledon the victory with only 33 seconds to spare.

In what is an experimental cross over phase for the second-year PJHL, the Hawks visited the Goderich Flyers of the Pollock division for the first time in the team's history Saturday.

While Caledon got on the board first with a goal from Sean Nottle, it was Goderich that took over the offence from there, taking a 4-3 lead into the final period.

Despite outshooting their opponents 19-5 in the third, Caledon failed to beat the hot hand of goaltender Brandon Bean, and came up short of evening their season record.

A busy weekend concluded Sunday with a visit from the division rival Alliston Hornets, ending in much of the same results as most teams find against the powerhouse squad.

The reigning division champions stayed perfect on the season in a 5-1 throttling of

the Hawks, led by perennial leading goal scorer Ryan Young's hat trick.

Mathiau Young scored the only Caledon goal, playing at a goal-per-game pace so far this season.

The Hornets and the Stayner Siskins have picked up right where they left off the previous season, dominating the rest of the Carruthers division. Holding records of 5-0 and 6-0 respectively, the two teams are already pulling away from the rest of the pack, with the Hawks tied for third at one win apiece with the Schomberg Cougars, Midland Flyers and Orillia Terriers.

Caledon continues their 2017-18 campaign Saturday with a visit to the Terriers, before Sunday's weekly home game at Caledon East, hosting the 4-1-1 Wingham Ironmen of the Pollock division.

mare, that would prove to be unbeatable. Ian Millar, 70, would come the closest to catching him, clocking in at 69.65 seconds to give owners Susan and Ariel Grange, who also own Martha Louise, a one-two finish. Francois Lamontagne, 33, of St. Eustache, Quebec, was the only other rider in the field to break the 70-second barrier, clocking in at 69.86 for third place with Chanel du Calvaire, his nine-year-old Belgian Sport Horse mare.

There were 28 entries taking to the course Friday night in the \$35,000 second phase of the competition. Eight of them rode clear, setting the stage for a most exciting jump-off. Seven of those riders were clear, but Hugh Graham of Schomberg set down a time that no one was going to beat, clearing all the jumps in 41.59 seconds aboard Knock Out 3E.

Olympian Amy Millar of Perth was a little more than a second off the pace on her 2016 Rio Olympic mount, Heros, while her father Ian was third on Dixon.

Fourth place that evening went to Ramsay.

“He jumped great and he’s a fast horse,” a victorious Graham declared after the ribbons were presented Friday night.

The jump-off course was tricky, with a very tight turn right after the second jump. Schomberg’s Beth Underhill ran into some trouble at that point when her horse Count Me In refused. But it was a different story for Graham.

“The tight turn is where I won it,” he observed. “I was able to negotiate tighter than anybody else.”

True to form, Graham took every risk with his an 11-year-old Canadian Sport Horse gelding owned and bred by King Ridge Stables near King City and galloped down to the final oxer as the crowd cheered him on, sailing over to move into the lead.

Ten-time Olympian Ian Millar was the last one to try and beat Graham’s time. Riding his veteran partner Dixon, a 14-year-old Belgian Warmblood gelding owned by the Granges, Millar pulled out all the stops in an effort to

claim the win, but crossed the timers in 42.89 seconds for a third-place finish.

Graham, a veteran of Olympic, World Championship, and Pan American Games competition, described his jump-off performance by saying, “I just put him belly to the ground, and didn’t leave much room tonight.”

“I had told the course designer that I didn’t like the track because it was too much running, but if I won it, I would change my mind!” laughed Graham, 68, who was inducted into the Jump Canada Hall of Fame in 2016. “My horse has a big stride and can cover the ground. He’s had a bunch of second and third place finishes recently and was due for a win.”

“He’s been coming along, getting better and better,” Graham said of his mount. “He won the seven and eight-year-old championship when he was eight, and he kept developing and kept showing a lot of scope and confidence. I think he likes his job as much as I like him!”

A total of 30 competitors took on Sunday’s challenge set by course designer Oscar Soberon of Mexico and when 13 pairs successfully negotiated the first-round track, the heat was on for the jump-off.

Nicole Walker or Aurora, who won last Year’s Caledon Cup, had a chance to repeat, making it to the jump-off on Excellent B. But they knocked down a rail on the last jump to collect four faults.

Ian Millar was the first rider to post a clear round in the jump-off, guiding Vittorio 8, a nine-year-old Hanoverian gelding owned by Future Adventures, home in a conservative time of 45.76 seconds.

Palgrave area resident Erynn Ballard, 37, quickly improved on Millar’s time, stopping the clock in 45.31 to move into the lead with Royale du Rouet, a 12-year-old selle francais stallion.

Her time would be eclipsed by the next rider in the ring, 38-year-old Isabelle Lapierre of Breakeyville, Quebec, who had the crowd cheering as she raced through the finish line in a time of 41.47, shaving almost four seconds off Ballard’s time to overtake top spot. Lapierre’s partner was the game 10-year-old

Dutch Warmblood mare owned by Ecuries de la Chaudiere.

The lead changed hands yet again when Ramsay made a daring move on course, cutting inside to a liverpool instead of taking the right-hand roll-back. The move paid off, as the scoreboard reflected the new leading time of 40.76 seconds.

Five more riders would attempt to catch Ramsay’s time, although none dared to try her inside turn.

“Honestly, I don’t think I could have done it that well if I had planned it!” said Ramsay of the inside turn riding Hermelien VD Hooghoeve, her partner of three years. “She drifts so far right and when we landed inside, I saw it, and she just went for it with me.”

She also said she had not expected to see so many in the jump off, although she later reflected it made sense, given the calibre of the competition.

“It was intimidating being in a field like that with all of the Millars and the other experienced riders, but I had a good feeling about today,” she said. “Normally, I peak early; whenever I win a class it’s been a Thursday or a Welcome class. When I was fourth on Friday night, I thought that maybe I was building it up right this time!”

In fact, her double-clear effort for a fourth-place finish Friday night combined with her victory Sunday, gave Ramsay a total of 33 points in the Caledon Cup standings over Ian Millar, who earned 32 points paired with Dixon.

“That was a bit of a surprise!” said Ramsay of hoisting the Cup. “I didn’t really think about it because everyone else had been so consistent. When we were all lined up waiting for them to announce who the winner was, I started to think that maybe it was a possibility. When I heard my name, it was a nice surprise.”

Ramsay was quick to credit her trainer, 2008 Canadian Olympian team silver medalist Jill Henselwood of Oxford Mills, Ontario, with her success.

“Jill is amazing,” she said. “She works just as hard as I do with my horses,

maybe harder somethings, and I owe a lot of it to her.”

In addition to claiming the victory, Ramsay also won the \$1,000 Henry Equestrian Plan (HEP) Rider Bonus, presented to the highest-placed competitor sporting the HEP saddle pad presented to all FEI competitors during the FEI horse inspection.

In another special presentation held prior to the start of Sunday’s Grand Prix, Alexanne Thibault of Boucherville, Quebec, was recognized as the recipient of the McKee-Pownall FEI Groom Appreciation Award. Selected during the FEI horse inspection, Thibault, who competed in all three phases of the Caledon Cup riding Chacco Prime, has the unique distinction of being her own groom.

Craig Collins of Equestrian Management Group (EMG) spoke to the success of this year’s Tournament.

“It was a great week with great turnout, and a great field of competitors with lots of good horses and riders,” he declared. “We had a huge crowd on Friday night in the indoor arena and when the times kept getting faster and faster in the jump-off, the crowd was going crazy! It was a lot of fun. And although it was a hot week, we are fortunate that, due to the legacy of hosting the Pan American Games, we were able to provide misting fans and other amenities to take top-care of the horses.

“It was great that the Town of Caledon was so well-represented and the Mayor, His Worship Allan Thompson, did an exceptional job judging our 17 headline entries,” Collins added. “We were also proud and appreciative to have so many of our sponsors present, and I would like to acknowledge all of the partners that support the Caledon Equestrian Park, not just this week, but on an ongoing basis throughout the season. Also, as this is our last big tournament of the year, I would like to recognize the EMG team who, once again, did a magnificent job. As far as I’m concerned, we have the best crew anywhere in North America.”




