Ellen enjoyed being able to work for an organization that provides service to the community like CCS. "It's been nice to work for my hometown and I feel like I've made a difference for the community."



## Property Tax Information for **Newly Constructed Homes**

The following is important information for residents that recently moved into a newly constructed home: Property Tax Due Dates are the first Thursday of March, May, July and September.

- If the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) has not assessed your house yet, the Town may calculate and bill your property taxes based on the value of your land only. • It may take up to 3 years after occupancy before your property assessment reflects both the value of the land and the house.
- The Town issues supplementary tax bills when MPAC has reassessed a property because of additions or improvements that increase its market value or when MPAC has assessed a new
- For newly constructed homes that are currently assessed at land only, once the full assessment information becomes available, the Town will send a supplementary tax bill.
- The supplementary tax bill can date back three years and will be for taxes payable less any taxes already billed which were based on the land value.

#### **Pre-Authorized Payment Plan (PAP)**

• Your PAP application will be included with your final tax bill. The PAP application form is also available on the Town's website at: www.caledon.ca/tax

• Pre-authorized payment withdrawals are made on the first of the month, January through October OR on tax installment due dates, based on the PAP plan selected.

#### Semi-detached and Townhomes

When a large piece of land, such as the land that semi-detached and townhomes are built on, is divided into a series of smaller parcels of land, it is often necessary to "apportion" taxes from the original land block to the new individual parcels. MPAC assigns each of the new parcels an individual roll number and an assessment value for the land. When the Town receives this apportionment information from MPAC, an adjustment to the taxes is created and bills are issued.





## Asylum claims costing the taxpayer millions

To say that the numbers are staggering is an understatement.

In July, the RCMP intercepted 2,996 people crossing illegally into Canada in order to claim asylum. The vast majority of those were at one crossing in Quebec. In August, that number rose to 5,330. The total to date this year is 13,211.

These numbers are in addition to the normal flow of asylum claims from overseas or those at legal points of entry. As of August, 27,440 claims for asylum a half months still to go in 2017.



"Currently, there is no requirement for public reporting when a bypass occurs, despite municipalities already reporting to the Ministry when they are forced to bypass," she added. "The Ministry won't share with Ontarians when partially treated sewage is in their local waterways."

She added her bill has been getting support from municipalities and conservations authorities all over the province. Peel Regional council passed a motion of support earlier this month.

"When you give to United Way, you're pulling someone to the safe side of a ledge," she added. "You're reaching out your hands and offering your support. In order to be a strong, healthy community, we all need to support one another — individually and as a whole."

Although the event touched on some of the issues affecting the community right now, such as the 235,000 people currently struggling with basic needs like food, housing and transportation, the atmosphere was a positive one of

Community members were joined by Lindsay Zier-Vogel of the Love Lettering project, which has had significant coverage on CTV and Global Television. Attendees wrote short love letters to Brampton, Caledon and Mississauga, reminding people why Peel is an amazing place to live, work, and play. The letters will be shared throughout the next few months across the community.

Everyone was challenged to complete random #actsofpossibility across the community, — holding doors open for people, volunteering and sending thank you letters, for instance — to create impact and possibility in Peel every day.

Possibility shone among the crowd throughout the morning, and the community was called on to dig deep, and share their experiences with people throughout the remainder of the year.

Creating possibility is part of United Way's mission to eradicate poverty in Peel by preventing poverty, reducing poverty and supporting people living in crisis right now.
