


Parking Regulations

When it comes to parking in residential driveways, the primary purpose of Town By-laws is to keep neighbourhoods safe.

SIDEWALKS

Vehicles parked in driveways shall not block a sidewalk. This is to ensure that vehicles don't pose a danger to those using the sidewalk by getting in the way of strollers, wheelchairs and pedestrians.



CURBS

Parked vehicles shall not overhang the curb, grassed areas or obstruct the boulevard in any way. Doing this can cause a dangerous problem for traffic. If necessary, the vehicle may be parked parallel to the curb on the part of the driveway between the sidewalk and the road. Be sure that your vehicle does not block the road or the sidewalk and is not on the grass or landscaped area.



LAWNS

Parking on the front lawn or any grassed area of a property is not permitted. Vehicles parked on the front lawn can damage the lawn, detract from the streetscape and allow automotive fluids (i.e. gas, oil) to leak into the soil and groundwater.





Sisters leading the pack as they climb world rugby ladder

Hailing from Bolton, the Russell sisters have dominated the provincial and national rugby landscape over the past decade, providing a leading duo rarely seen at such a high level of sport.

Yet Kelly, the former captain of Team Canada, stepped down in retirement in November of 2017, leaving Russell to captain the Ontario blue to what she hopes would be a back-to-back championship for the province.

OVER THE PAST FEW MONTHS, tensions have grown over the Trump administration and his talk about tariffs being placed on steel and also vehicles as well. With these talks and the math done on certain vehicles, it is said that some vehicles could see an increase of about \$8000 on the sticker price depending on where they are manufactured.

Automakers are seeking to find resolutions and to avoid the tariffs which will drive some more vehicle production Stateside, but a rising question is "How much will that increase our vehicle prices by?" Unfortunately, it is a question that is still up in the air and with no sure answer as of yet. We have also seen many Canadians shifting their buying habits to be more conscious of what is Canadianmade to retaliate back at these tariffs. Many Canadians do not know that we still build many vehicles in Canada as well. Here is a list and description of what vehicles can still be bought that are Canadian-made.

Fiat Chrysler Automobiles produces the largest number of models in Canada still with two plants, one in Brampton, Ontario and one in Windsor, Ontario. In Brampton, FCA assembles and produces the Chrysler 300, the Dodge Charger, as well as the retro Dodge Challenger. These offerings give you great choices for a full-size sedan that is either rear wheel drive or all wheel drive, V6 or V8 and also offer a high-performance muscle car with the Hellcat models, the now produced Demon and the upcoming Redeye Challenger with 797 hp. In Windsor, FCA still produces the best-selling minivan, the Dodge Grand Caravan as well as the new, luxurious Chrysler Pacifica and Pacifica plug-in hybrid.

Ford also produces a large lineup of vehicles out of its Oakville plant beside their Canadian headquarters. Ford produces the Ford Flex and Lincoln MKT, three-row crossovers with plenty of space but also unsure futures as the products are aging. The new Ford Edge is also produced here as well as the upcoming Lincoln Nautilus, the luxury crossover based on the Edge that replaces the MKX. In Markham, Ford has also produced its limited-run supercar, the Ford GT, with a division of Multimatic. General Motors is the next large producer of Canadian-made vehicles with two plants, one in Oshawa and one in Ingersoll. General Motors produces the Chevrolet Impala and Cadillac XTS in Oshawa and has also recently added Chevrolet Silverado and GMC Sierra Double Cab production in both 1500 and 2500 gas-powered variations, making the Silverado and Sierra Double

Cabs the only Canadian-made pickups. Ingersoll also builds the very-popular Chevrolet Equinox.

Honda and Toyota are the last two automakers who still assemble largely in Canada. Honda operates its Alliston assembly plant to build Honda Civics and CRVs as well for a great variation of vehicles. This plant has had a long history of building Civics in Canada. Toyota also operates three plants in Ontario, two in Cambridge and one in Woodstock. In Cambridge, the Toyota Corolla is built and has been for 6 generations since 1997. The Lexus RX, hybrid and gas models are also assembled in Cambridge, but at the other plant. Lastly, Woodstock produces the Toyota RAV4 and is Toyota's largest assembly plant in North America, and Toyota's second largest plant worldwide. A great feat to know as Canadians.



In perfect weather, there is nothing like driving with the roof down. No helmet needed. Just the wind in your hair (assuming you still have). Listen to that sweet exhaust note.

Other names for convertibles include roadster, cabriolet/cabrio, spider/spyder, rag/drop/open/soft top, or open two-seater.

HISTORY OF CONVERTIBLES

The first automobiles were open-air vehicles without any roof or sides. As car engines became more powerful by the end of the 19th century, folding textile or leather roofs (examples are victoria or landau carriages) began to appear on cars. Examples of early cars with roofs include the phaeton (a two-seat car with a temporary roof), the brougham, or a coup'e de ville (having an enclosed passenger compartment at the rear, while the driver sat in front either in the open) or the landaulet (where the driver has a fixed roof and the passenger compartment has a folding roof). Less expensive cars remained either completely open air or were fitted with a rudimentary folding top and detachable side curtains.

In the 1920s, when steel bodies began to be mass-produced, closed cars became available to the average buyer and fully open cars began to disappear from the mainstream market. By the mid 1930s, the remaining small number of convertibles sold were high priced luxury models.

In 1939, Chrysler's Plymouth introduced the first mechanically operated convertible roof.

Demand for convertibles increased as a result of American soldiers in France and the United Kingdom during World War II. The soldiers experienced the small roadster cars which were not available in the United States. These roadsters included the MG Midget and Triumph Roadster. United States automakers manufactured a broad range of models during the 1950s and 1960's– from economical compact-sized models such as the Rambler American and the Studebaker Lark, to the more expensive models such as the Packard Caribbean, Oldsmobile 98, and Chrysler Imperial. In the mid-1960's, don't forget Ford's ultra popular and well-priced Mustang.

During the 1970s, popularity of convertibles was severely reduced by the increased travel speeds on roads (resulting in more wind and noise for occupants). Proposed vehicle crash safety standards in the United States, were suggested during the mid-1970s for the 1980 model year. Standards proposed a 50-mile-per-hour (80 km/h) crash to the front; at 25 mph (40 km/h) on the sides; and a rollover at 30 miles per hour (48km/h). This was a test that opentop convertibles would unlikely be able to pass.

Air conditioning, "T" tops, and sun/moon roofs were also becoming popular, reducing the demand for convertibles.

Other downsides to old convertibles, include poor body/chassis rigidity, smaller trunks, and additional weight. Most older convertibles had rear plastic windows. Over time they'd go foggy and/or crack. Now glass rear windows are the norm. Some feature a rear window defroster.

In 1989, Mazda released the first generation (NA series) Mazda MX-5 (called "Miata" in North America), which has become the best selling convertible with over 1 million cars sold. The basic sportscar design took hints from the Lotus Elan. Unlike it's British relatives, the Miata's are very reliable! A factory option was a very light-weight hardtop roof, for cold weather. Now in its fourth generation, Mazda still builds them. While the trunk is small, at least you get one. GM's (now defunct) Solstice or Sky, wouldn't let you put a toothbrush in the trunk. Miata's brilliant roof is effortless to drop or raise. You may recall, last year I wrote about my trip from Lunenburg, NS, to Orangeville, ON. We travelled in my friend's 2006 Miata. It performed flawlessly!

Also in 1989, Toyota released the Soarer Aerocabin, which used an electrically operated retractable hardtop roof (PRT). Only 500 were produced, however the retractable hardtop design has become increasingly popular in the 21st century. Back in 1959, Ford offered the Fairlane 500 Skyliner.

Today, many makes and models offer retractable

hardtop roof cars. While they offer year-round comfort, they tend to lose the true "sportscar feel." They also have too many "goodies." My uncle has a 2015 BMW Z4, with PRT. He agrees. PRT's are an engineering marvel. They're quick and quiet.

My convertible take? We get so few perfect days. Before I bought my 2006 Mustang in 2007, I considered a triple black Stang. Then I thought: black is sharp only when really clean. In the dog days of summer, I'll roast! The roof will be up with the AC on. I bought a coupe/fastback. No regrets.

I did own a 1964 Sunbeam Alpine convertible. It felt like you were flying a WWII fighter...when it ran. This was thanks to (dreadful) Lucas electrics...The manual convertible roof was a pain, to lower and raise!

So, if your lucky enough to own a convertible, relish those few perfect days annually.

If you're considering buying one, do a pro and con list. Research the brand and model. Talk to owners. Contact the many clubs. PTR's will require very expensive repairs...someday. Test drive many and decide.
