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




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Carnage continues on area roads

Peel Regional Police say the driver had been trapped for about an hour before firefighters managed to extricate him.

No other vehicles were involved and police have not said if charges are forthcoming.

This crash comes on the heels of others in the area, including a tragic collision on August 4 at about 9:02 p.m. when an SUV and a sports car were both travelling on Hwy. 50 when they became involved in a collision.

As a result of the collision, a 47-yearold woman from Woodbridge, a 12-yearold girl from Woodbridge and a 7-yearold boy from Woodbridge all succumbed to their injuries.

A 12-year-old girl from Woodbridge, a 45-year-old man from Caledon and a 39-year-old woman from Toronto were transported to local hospitals in non-life threatening condition.

Peel Regional Police have not released any firther information concerning this incident.

Meanwhile, police are still investigating the horrific collision between a transport truck and a car on Aug. 6 that claimed the life of six-year-old Valentina Palermo of Aliston.

It's now known the car was stalled in a live lane on the roadway when the truck slammed into the rear of the vehicle.

The driver of the transport received only minor injuries.

Police in this case have also not yeat released their findings. It's unknown if charges will be laid.

By the notice, the completed Environmental Study Report (ESR) is being placed on public record for a 30-day review period in accordance with the requirements of the Municipal Class EA. Subject to comments received as a result of this Notice and the receipt of necessary approvals, the Town intends to proceed with detailed design, followed by construction pending budget approval.

Based on the evaluation of alternative designs and given consideration of public and agency input, it is recommended to extend George Bolton Parkway from Highway 50 to west Albion Vaughan Road, with stop control intersections at Industrial Road and Commercial Road. 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

Pommies cider naturally good

Strange as it may seem, ten years ago there was only one cidery in Ontario. Nick Sutcliffe, who hails from Yorkshire where cider is ubiquitous, was used to drinking a lot of it.

He saw the hole in the market and also the potential, so finally he listened to his wife who told him to "Just shut up and do something about it," and founded Pommies right here in Caledon. Thus Pommies became the second brand of cider to occupy the shelf at our LCBOs, reviving a long forgotten Ontario tradition.

Historically, cider had been a hugely popular drink in Ontario. Most farms had apple trees specifically for cider. In fact, Ontario has the best apples in the world for making the drink, as the cold climate produces more acidity in the fruit, giving Ontario cider a better mouthfeel and well-rounded character.

It is, in Nick Sutcliffe's opinion, the most drinkable cider in the world, but suffered for years from an inferiority complex, unlike the ciders from Europe and the U.K.

Before the twentieth century, cider had been more popular than beer, but due to prohibition and an influx of German immigration, among other factors, beer replaced cider as the drink of choice.

Nick describes cider as more like a wine that's consumed like beer. If you draw a line down the middle of the Pommies cidery in Bolton, there is a winery on one side and a brewery on the other. The cider is made like wine in the one half, then carbonation and packaging take place in the other.


Pommies is committed to using only Ontario produce, apples, pears, grapes, and cranberries, to make their original and seasonal products. In addition to using only Ontario fruit, the cider is made from 100 percent juice with no artificial additives.

Developing their original cider recipe, the Sutcliffes wanted to create a balanced cider that was drinkable and approachable.

Staying one step ahead of the curve in the bow wave of the industry that has since sprung forth, Nick and his twelve employees have fun experimenting with wine and other juices. From these experiments were born Perry (pear cider), Sangria in the summer season (made from Niagara grapes), and the cranberry flavour available from Thanksgiving to March.

Pommies is a family business run by Nick and his wife, Lindsay, who consider it essential to be part of the Caledon com-

Their mantra is "Anything needing support or cider- we're there." Both the LCBOs in Bolton and on Airport Road, as well as the one on Broadway in Orangeville, are in the top ten stores in terms of sales. Pommies Cider Company, currently located at 25 Nixon Road in Bolton, hopes to open a destination cidery in Caledon in the next year and a half, part of an overall effort to help Caledon grow as a journey's end for everyone. "If you invest in the community," says Nick, "you get the total support of the community. And it's lovely!"

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Good day for a long drive

Olympic gold medals are heavy. At least the ones Rosie MacLennan owns are. Heading towards Tokyo 2020, the King native is the twotime defending Olympic champion in trampoline — the first Canadian athlete to defend a gold medal in the Olympics.

I met with her at the Glen Eagle Charity Classic for Bethell Hospice Aug. 10 and was given the opportunity to hold her medals. Each one feels substantial, solid, and worth winning.

There's a story on the fundraiser elsewhere in this paper so I won't go on about the tournament in this space, but I do wish to talk a little about what hospices mean to residents and their families as the end of a life nears.

I first learned about what a hospice is when I worked for a community newspaper in the west island of Montreal in 2001 or so. The notion of a hospice wasn't well known back then and so the director wanted to start getting people educated because its own life expectancy was tied partially to government funding, partially to private donations and fundraisers. It couldn't survive without ordinary people digging deep to help, but it needed publicity for that to happen.

I asked if I could talk to a resident, which is to say a person who has only weeks or even days to live. It wasn't an easy request to make, but it was easy to fulfill. A man who would die about a week later was more than happy to share his experience. He raved about the care he was receiving and the relief that he would die in a proper bedroom with pictures of his family on the night table beside him instead of a sterile hospital room, along with all its foreign noises, odors, and endless activity.

His room at the hospice wasn't home, but it was like home, and that comforted him greatly. He wasn't

afraid of dying, but he had been concerned about how he would die. On that day, he wasn't concerned any

His story had the impact we all hoped for, and a year later some of us from the paper organized a fundraiser of our own, called WestFest (I'm sure there must have been some trademark violation there, but we were too dumb to think of it) which raised almost \$40,000 for the hospice and the nearby hospital.

Eventually, I moved on to other cities and other jobs. Even the newspaper, the West Island Chronicle, which won Best Newspaper in the Quebec Community Newspaper Awards five years running, was picked apart by its corporate owners until it was shuttered, not even a shadow of its former self.

The hospice, however, is still there and still doing the important work it needs to do. And so is Bethell Hospice doing that work. I've been offered a tour sometime soon and I'm eagerly looking forward to it. I'm looking forward to speaking with the volunteers, the angels who craft the magic that makes residents and their friends and families as comfortable and worry-free as possible. It's not easy to work in a place where people are always going to die, especially after you get to know them and a bond is forged.

Rosie MacLennan is from these parts, and she's sponsored by Bolton's Fines Lincoln. A local golf club went to great lengths to put on a good show. And they all did it for the local hospice because they know how important it is to the communi-

ries that community papers can still share. It's been a dark couple of weeks around here as far as crime is concerned, but the fundraiser — and the triumphant return of Midnight Madness — have been a strong anti-

This is but one of the many projects that Rotary is involved in internationally that helps improve the lives of women and children abroad. There are many more way to get involved in Rotary and potentially


