

The bakery, famous for its pumpkin doughnuts, serves lunch every day, including pies, bread and baked goods fresh from the oven. The winery is open daily with free samplings of fruit and dessert wines. Their market sells only Ontario grown fruits and vegetables, plus home-

Downey's also offers pick-your-own strawberries and raspberries, and hosts company events, birthday parties, and school trips, as well as special events such as Easterfest, the Canada Day Strawberry Festival, Pumpkinfest and Lunch

Pumpkinfest runs on weekends from Sept. 22

to Oct. 31, and features entertainment, wagon rides, the boo barn, a straw jump, the corn maze, a skeleton band, dog shows, and of course 10,000 pumpkins. Lunch with Santa runs on weekends in December, when kids get one on one time with Santa and lunch.



Emilia Perri is staging her art show: Natural Wonder, The North, opening reception on Aug. 30, 2018 from 4 - 8 p.m. and running until Sept. 13 at her art supplies store, workshop and gallery, Maggiolly Studio Gallery at 158 Broadway in Orangeville.

Ms. Perri, a well known Headwaters artist, .received a Reed T. Cooper Art Bursary in 2016, meant to be used as a fund to new learning in the artistic field in which the artist works. In this case, Ms Perri made her application to help her pay for a Canoe North Adventure package which would take her to the Yukon with guides and hosts, Al Pace and Lin Ward.

The trip was a 12-day adventure, paddling in a canoe on the Yukon River from White Horse to Dawson City, camping on the way.

## Trudeau cries wolf

This is the definition of racism courtesy of Merriam-Webster: "A belief that race is the primary determinant of human traits and capacities and that racial differences produce an inherent superiority of a particular race." If you're still with me, here's what I'm getting at. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau was attending a corn roast in Sabrevois, Quebec Aug. 16 when a woman in the crowd began heckling him. Having spent the first 25 years of my life in Quebec, I know well of the intolerance some "old stock (her words) Quebecois" feel towards immigrants and even English-speaking Quebeckers. That said, refugees have poured across the border into Quebec causing great strain on social resources and

financing. There are tent cities, some of them have been housed inside Olympic Stadium and more arrive each day.

So at this joyous corn roast in the heart of Quebec came an uncomfortable question.

When are you going to pay us for all of this?

Finally, when he could stand it no more, he told the woman her "racism has no place here." It might be that she is a racist. It might be that she's frustrated, an older woman who doesn't like the change she's seeing in

But her words didn't express that. She asked a question that has been asked by the Conservatives many times in the House of Commons.

her province.

Trudeau's response, and his accusation of racism, belittled the woman and the general conversation about where these asylum seekers are going to go and how much it's going to cost Canadian taxpayers.

By lumping her into the crowd of far-right zealots, all Trudeau did was prove that he is the intolerant one. Not everything he attends is going to be a kumbaya photo op. Voters have the right to ask him hard questions and to demand thoughtful, truthful answers.

If Trudeau thinks it's racism to ask who's going to pay for all these many newcomers (remember, she didn't advocate sending them back, locking them up, or building a wall), then he still has a lot to learn about being the leader of a country. He has a lot to learn about being a leader for everyone, not just those that agree with him.

I'm lucky. Since my first time there for the Can Am in 1969, I loved the place. In the 80's, I raced many laps there. I even won 2 times and got 2 Pole Positions. I've even cross-country skied there. I saw many great, world class cars, and drivers. It's really special knowing that you've driven on the same asphalt as: Villeneuve; McLaren; Andretti (the back straight is named after him); Hunt; Lauda; Canadian Fellows (now co-owner); etc. I imagine it would be like playing hockey at the old Maple Leaf Gardens, where: Howe; Hull; Orr; Gretzky; etc. played.

#### **SATURDAY, JUNE 16, 2018**

My annual trip to the VARAC Vintage Grand Prix, was on Father's Day weekend. Next year is the 40th anniversary. Here you'll see many very old sportscar-race cars, usually driven by "older" drivers. Makes include: Lotus; Lola; Porsche; etc. Admission is \$20/day or \$40 for the

## 1971 Javelin AMX sports unique designer label

One thing's for sure, Paul Mercer's 1971 Javelin AMX was the only car at the Cruisin' on First Auto Show that has a designer label attached. IN FACT, you'd be hard pressed to find any other



classic auto that actually hooked up with a famous designer - in this case, Pierre Cardin, who gave the finishing touches to the interior of this car back when it was manufactured.

It may have been a gimmick at the time, but 48 years like the moniker is still attached to the inside of the driver's door.

The Javelin is named on the generally accepted list of 'highly collectable' cars.

Originally painted white, Mercer changed his to the original factory colour purple which really sets this car off as stand-out. Mercer has owned his Javelin since 1995.

"I built it from the ground up. It was an Arizona car so the body was mint. It never had any body issues, but the interior was melted," Mercer explained. "A guy had it at a show on a trailer and it was for sale. It was still in the original state. I ended up stripping it down to nothing. Every nut and bolt has been off

Time, however, wasn't kind to the interior. He spent around three years restoring the car, and

putting in a new motor. The Javelin came from the factory with a T-stripe

on the hood "Originally, it was white with a black T-stripe, and it had a red interior. The interior was shot, I couldn't use it so I had to use the Pierre Cardin interior from a '72.

This car came across the border from Arizon in 1989."

Mercer doesn't just use his Javelin as a show car, he puts it on the track and has raced on the drag strips in St. Thomas and Cayuga, although he now stays clear of the track as roll cages are required for cars in his Javelin's speed rating.

The original Javelin came with a choice of engines. There was a 232 cu. in. straight six, a 290 cu. in. V8, or an optional 343 cu. in. V8.

The Javelin AMX is one of the iconic muscle cars of the era with a low profile and long front end.

Mercer brought his Javelin to the Cruisin' on First Auto show and it was display with several other vehicles from the golden age of muscle cars from the late 60's and early 70's.

The Cruisin' on First show continues through the summer every Wednesday night in the parking lot at the Orangeville Canadian Tire.





## Remembering FCA CEO Sergio Marchionne

ON JULY 25, 2018, the automotive industry lost a great leader and businessman, Sergio Marchionne. Sergio was known more recently as the eccentric, yet very successful CEO of Fiat Chrysler Automobiles after Cerberus had left Chrysler for dead in 2009. Sergio Marchionne was also a dual citizen of Canada as well, immigrating to the country at age 13 with his family to Toronto. In his ear-

lier years, he attended numerous Toronto and Ontario institutions, building an education in different fields before heading up some global companies. Sergio was introduced into the automotive world as CEO in 2004 when he replaced the former, who was one of five different CEOs in a matter of two years at Fiat. Sergio managed to turn around Fiat very quickly by removing most of Fiat's executive staff, laying off thousands of workers and striking a deal with General Motors to sell its stake. In doing this, Sergio managed to turn a profit within a year at Fiat and also helped to head up the Fiat 500 project. He also reduced product launch time from 4 years to 18 months.

In 2009, Fiat acquired Chrysler after Cerberus had cleaned them out and left them struggling and needing restructuring. Chrysler was able to get the bailout from the U.S. government and Sergio took Robert Nardelli's position as CEO at Chrysler. Alike his start at Fiat, Sergio immediately put a plan in action and drastically changed Chrysler's executive board, developed some new product plans by merging Fiat and Chrysler technologies and platforms to develop new powertrains and platforms.

By 2011, Chrysler turned a profit for the first time in five years and quickly the company turned from having plenty of debt to profit. In 2014, Sergio also became CEO of Ferrari as well and sold off shares to the company to raise money to grow FCA into a global powerhouse with General Motors to overtake the likes of Volkswagen at the time. This was not successful as General Motors turned down the opportunity. Since then, FCA has continued to grow and turn a profit, especially with RAM and Jeep vehicles. In June, FCA showcased their 2021 plan to shareholders and Sergio showcased his pride in having a profit and money in the company by finally wearing a tie instead of his usually sweater. He presented the future plan to increase the Ram and Jeep brands as well as increasing profitability, vehicle options, hybrid and electric options, as well as global offerings from both brands. Marchionne was presenting this and the plan for FCA to continue successfully even after his retirement in early 2019.

This was Sergio's last public event before experiencing complications after a surgery in July. He passed away shortly thereafter, also being replaced a few days before



by Jeep and Ram CEO Mike Manley as FCA CEO. Sergio Marchionne was a great automotive businessman, a risk-taker and one who being eccentric worked in his favour with high intelligence. His legacy lives on in the turnaround of both these companies and at FCA where many were sad to hear of his passing.


