UPS to build \$200 million warehouse in Caledon

UPS (United Parcel Service) announced plants to construct a \$200 million, 850,000 square foot warehouse facility in Caledon.

The building will feature advanced scanning and sorting technology integrated with data-driven tools to increase efficiency and reliability, according to a UPS news release.

"I'm extremely pleased and proud to welcome the highly respected global logistics company United Parcel Service (UPS), to the town of Caledon," said Mayor Allan Thompson. "This development will create jobs, bolster our local economy and at 850,000 square feet, will be the largest UPS facility in Canada."

UPS is a logistic company that transports packages and freight, facilitating international trade and deploying advanced technology to more efficiently manage the business sector. Its headquarters are based in Atlanta and serves more than 220 countries and territories worldwide.

The release notes that the package operations hub will provide additional processing and service capacity to the Greater Toronto Area in order to meet growing business and residential customer demand.

The fully automated Caledon facility will sort up to 35,000 packages per hour and house a fleet of more than 200 package cars.

It will have close access to Highway 410 and Mayfield, according to a Town of Caledon news release. The facility is anticipated to open in late 2020.

The Town news release states the area itself is currently undergoing a major expansion eastward to Airport Road.

UPS is the second major logistics and distribution centre in 2015.

"Southern Ontario is an attractive hub for international trade and business," says a point of facilitation for the movement of jobs to the community, according to a Town Christoph Atz, president of UPS Canada. "This new facility will serve the growing needs of businesses and consumers today and into the future."





Caledon OPP has provided winter driving tips to safety navigate through the roads:

Check your tires: Worn and damaged tires air pressure decreases in cold weather, so be sure to check tire air pressure frequently. Snow tires are highly recommended and

must be on all four tires to be effective. Clean off your car: Clear snow and ice from all windows, lights, mirrors, and the roof. Once you have started your vehicle, wait for any fog to clear from the windows so you will have good visibility.

Top up your fluids: Make sure that you have plenty of gas and windshield washer fluid for your trip. Keep your gas tank sufficiently full - at least a half of a tank is recommended. Make sure that your windshield washer fluid is rated in the -40 degrees Celsius temperature range and always keep an extra jug in the vehicle. It is also recommended that you ensure that your windshield wipers are in good working order.



"You can't put a dollar value on your safety," says Amar Uppal, owner of the Tire Junction in Bolton.

ith colder weather approaching, many motorists are already making the switch to winter tires to get ready for the season and avoid the rush when the temperature takes a plunge.

Winter tires have different treads and have a rubber compound that is softer than summer or all season tires that allow them to grip the road more efficiently - especially when snow or ice is a factor.

"This year people are avoiding the line-ups that happen in November," Mr. Uppal said. "People are coming in a little early and getting things done. Winter tires are best for when the temperature drops to ten degrees or below. Snow tires also work in the rain. They work better in the rain than a normal tire. The rubber compound is different than with a summer tire. They have a better grip. The moisture on the road can make things slippery."

Mr. Uppal has been in the tire industry for 38 years. He learned the business while living in the UK then brought his knowledge to Bolton. He opened his Bolton shop in 2008 and has been outfitting drivers in Bolton and the surrounding area ever since.

Choosing your band and type of winter tires requires some knowledge and Mr. Uppal and his staff help customers select the right type and brand for their vehicle.

"We look at where the customer lives and where they will be driving and what type of terrain they will be driving on. From that, we recommend the right tread pattern and the right type of tire for them. There will be a difference for people who do mostly rural driving and those that are commuting. Commuters don't need quite as an aggressive tire and those are a little quieter for the highway."

Mr. Uppal recommends taking the time to have your car prepared for the winter season when you have your tires installed.

"You should have all your fluids and belts checked," Mr. Uppal explained. "The wipers should be checked and your oil change done as well as a general winter inspection done on the car. It's better to have it done sooner than later."

The shop carries a huge variety of tires for all vehicles and if they don't have a particular tire in stock, they can get it and usually there will very little delay.





GENERAL MOTORS Celebrates 100 years IN CANADA

ON NOVEMBER 8TH, 2018, General Motors of Canada celebrated 100 years of operation and innovation within Canada. General Motors of Canada has been a large part of Canadian history, largely due to being one of the first Canadian manufacturers of the motor car. In 1908, Sam and George McLaughlin engineered an all-Canadian Motor Car based on the Buick and built 154 McLaughlins that year. Eventually, McLaughlin had to cease carriage building operations due to the success of McLaughlin Motor Cars and Chevrolets being built alongside for Canada. The McLaughlin family had the largest carriage factory in the British Empire that was based out of Oshawa, where McLaughlin and GM of Canada got their start. In 1918, General Motors



Corp. bought McLaughlin Motor Car Company and merges them with Chevrolet Motor Car Company of Canada to create General Motors of Canada. Sam and George McLaughlin stayed on with the company to run operations in Canada.

In the 1920s, General Motors of Canada and Oshawa were booming as they were the export base to the British Commonwealth for Buicks, Oldsmobiles and Oaklands. The Oshawa production centre continued to see significant growth, despite strikes and the creation of unions in the labour workforce. In 1942, General Motors of Canada suspended civilian operations at Oshawa to build Otters and other military vehicles for the allies during WWII. After production continued in





1945, Oshawa still continued to produce large amounts of vehicles and new production facilities were built to withstand the demand. In 1965, Oshawa significantly increased production capacity and built many lines of GM vehicles for Canada and export due to the Canada-US Auto Products Trade Agreement which reduced tariffs. The plant was now building 730,000 vehicles annually and in 1973, Oshawa built its 2-millionth truck. With more expansion in the 1980s, Oshawa became one of the largest assembly plants in the

Moving towards recent times, General Motors of Canada did see some troubles with the recession and the shutting down of production lines at Oshawa. Without giving up on Canada or Oshawa, General Motors of Canada has since brought back GM Truck production to Oshawa, with the GMC Sierra and Silverado Double Cabs, and GM has created thousands of jobs with its new engineering centre in Markham, at Oshawa and a new facility coming in Toronto with a commitment to urban mobility. While the automotive $industry\, changes\, drastically, General\, Motors\, of\, Canada$ is at the forefront of the movement with Canada and Ontario being the epicentre of new technology development and engineering for GM vehicles worldwide. There are exciting innovations coming and the way we drive and move around is changing and it is being created here, in Canada.
