## Big pile of garbage draws wrath

There comes a point when dumping of garbage goes too far, and a Duffys Lane man thinks that point has been reached.

Ryan Gulyas lives near the CP Rail line that crosses Duffys Lane, and he was furious to discover a big pile of apparently contaminated garbage had been dumped just off the road, in the clear area by the tracks. He said it happened either late last Thursday night or early Friday. He said a man on Humber Station Road reported hearing what sounded like a dump truck in the area at about 2:30 Friday morning.

He also pointed out there is a distinct petrol-like smell coming from the pile.

Gulyas was joined Tuesday morning by his children, area resident Edna Sears, Mayor Allan Thompson and Council-

lor Nick deBoer, looking over the pile, and none of them were pleased with what they saw.

"It's Caledon's constant problem," Thompson commented.

It wasn't clear where the debris would have come from. Thompson suggested it might have come from a wrecking yard, as there appeared to be some items that looked like they might have come from cars.

"Someone's probably cleaned out an old house or garage or something," he remarked.

Gulyas was angry at the impact something like this could have on local property values, as well as the state of the area.

He was concerned that people would see a pile like that and get the idea that it's acceptable for them to dump too.

"This is one of the most disgraceful piles of you-know-what I've ever seen in my life," he declared. "This is a dump truck full of contaminated waste."

"The reality is the public shouldn't think this is something acceptable," deBoer observed.

Gulyas was hopeful that drawing attention to these incidents might prompt people to be more vigilant and pay attention.

"We just need a vigilant neighbourhood," Thompson commented, adding people who see such activity going on

should call their councillor, or Caledon OPP. He added if they see dumping in process, they should call 9-1-1.

"Don't engage the individual," he advised.

"If you want to keep Caledon beautiful, you've got to step up," he added.

The matter was also brought up at Tuesday's Town Council meeting.

"We've been having it or years," Councillor Jennifer Innis observed, agreeing residents have to be vigilant to deal with it. "It's sort of a Neighbourhood Watch."

General Manager of Strategic Initiatives David Arbuckle told her that staff, for the last little while, has been highlighting the fact that people have tell the police when they see illegal dumping.

He added it's happening in other places.

"It's a concern, but it's not just a concern for us," he said.

Innis agreed a lot of residents might not realize they should call the police.

Councillor Barb Shaughnessy added there has been a lot of illegal dumping going on at Tottenham Pit.

# Macville’s car will help fund other school projects

Schools are always winning athletic championships, academic awards, artistic competitions, etc., but cars?

Macville Public School did win a car, but it has been sold to Fines Ford Lincoln, and the money will be going to the benefit of the facility.

Principal Kelly Kawabe said they regularly have Pizza Day every Wednesday, with the food coming from Pizza Pizza. The company was running a

promotion in the fall, and the Nov. 29 lunch carried a special surprise, namely a coupon announcing the holder was the winner of a Hyundai Elantra. She added the car was donated by famed Toronto Raptor supporter The Super-fan.

The sale of the car to Fines Ford means “the school has made a ton of money,” Kawabe said.

The winning coupon was found in Jessie Donohue’s Grade 6 and 7 class.

Students Manroop Tut and Arnaan Khakh found it. It read “You’ve won a 2017 Hyundai Elantra!”

Manroop, 11, said he wasn’t sure what it was at first, but he had some idea.

“I was trying not to get my hopes too high,” he said.

His friend Arnaan saw it, and he recalled he became excited, adding the teacher reacted similarly when she found out what they had found.

Kawabe said Trustee Stan Cameron did the negotiations with Fines Ford.

Fines Ford General Manager Carlos Martins said they were happy to help out, adding they have taken part in events at Macville in the past.

“We’re happy to be involved,” he said.

Cameron pointed out Fines have been supportive of several school programs in the area, including the Drug Abuse

Resistance Education (DARE).

Superintendent of Schools Michael Logue, who used to be principal at Macville, said there has always been a strong relationship between the school and the community.

“This school has always had a really rich tradition of partnerships with the community,” he said. “It just fits that Macville won.”

Kawabe said there are some plans for the money. The school has a regional science and technology program, and there are plans for a communications tech lab. She said they are fund-raising for that project which is likely to cost about \$35,000.

“This will go a long way towards it,” she said, adding the new lab will be available to the whole school.

“We’re still having Pizza Days,” she added.

# Throne speech impressed Liberals, but that’s about it

The Wynne government set out a list of priorities Monday when Lt.-Gov. Elizabeth Dowdeswell delivered the speech from the Throne, but others are wondering what was the point of it all.

“I think you’d be hard pressed to call it more than a political ploy,” Dufferin-Caledon MPP Sylvia Jones remarked.

The government said it is investing more in the care and services that people across the province rely on, according to a release issued from Queen’s Park shortly after the speech.

It added the upcoming Budget will focus on doing more in health care, home care, mental health care and child care services, as well as expanding a number other programs. It also maintained the economy is strong, with unemployment at its lowest level in almost two decades.

“I hear from people every day who put caring first — whether it’s at home, caring for their families, or at work, caring for patients, students or society’s most vulnerable people,” Premier Kathleen Wynne said. “The people of Ontario are our greatest strength, and our government doesn’t ac-

cept that anyone should be left to fend for themselves, particularly in this turbulent, changing economy.”

“We’re taking bold steps to ensure the best care for our children, our seniors and our friends and family members,” she added. “Our plan will relieve pressure on families by making it easier for people to care for themselves and for each other.”

But Jones wasn’t impressed with such an event taking place this close to the upcoming June election, as she wondered why they staged this.

“They didn’t have a lot of their legislative agenda,” Jones pointed out. “They didn’t lose a great deal.”

“It gives them a bit of a media bump,” she added.

The contents of the speech didn’t come as much of a surprise to Jones, won noted the government has been making announcements and promises for years, then repeating them a year or so later.

“I guess we all feel a little jaded,” she remarked.

Jones said there have been rumours that the government wants to pass it’s Budget, scheduled to be brought down March 28, be-

fore the election, while other suggest they want to take it before the voters. She said Finance Minister Charles Sousa has said he wants it passed before the election.

“Who knows?” she said.

“With the strong economy and the lowest unemployment rate in a decade, now is the time to invest in the quality of family life — in care and not in cuts,” Dufferin-Caledon Liberal candidate Bob Gordanier stated Tuesday. “Yesterday’s throne speech promised more support to families — hospital funding, home care, dental care, pharmacare, improved mental health and addiction services and help with child care costs. I am proud to be associated with better supports for families. It a fast-changing world and families need help to thrive.”

“It’s definitely a case of how much can we throw at the people of Ontario,” Trillium Party candidate Andrew Nowell observed.

He said it offers nice things, like free tuition, but there are no details on how it’s to be paid for. He said he expects it will be through higher taxes.

“Its like free tickets on the Titanic,” he remarked.

“This isn’t something for the people of

Ontario,” he said. “Just buying votes.”

“It’s very expensive,” Dufferin-Caledon Green party candidate Laura Campbell commented. “It’s using taxpayers’ money to unveil a little bit of their election platform.”

She pointed out, for example, the government already has a pharmacare plan, wondering why they didn’t do it right the first time.

“It seems like kind of a desperate gamble to steal some of the limelight from the very progressive NDP platform,” she added.

# Police warn people to beware of Canada Revenue Agency scams

Ontario Provincial Police want people to confirm who they're dealing with before sending any money anywhere for any reason.

As part of the annual Fraud Prevention Month awareness campaign, Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) and other agency-related extortion threats have continued to inflict significant financial losses on unsuspecting victims. In 2017, the extortion and phishing scam claimed 1,544 victims in Ontario, with losses totalling approximately \$3 million from more than 8,576 complaints. Police admit only five per cent of these crimes are actually reported.

In the typical CRA scam, the criminals extort money from their victims by telephone, mail, text message or email,

a fraudulent communication that claims to be from the Canada Revenue Agency requesting personal information such as a social insurance number, credit card number, bank account number or passport number. A new twist is that fraudsters will leave a prerecorded, clear message on a victim's voicemail, impersonating the real CRA. Fraudsters are either phishing for identification or asking that outstanding taxes be paid by a money service business or by pre-paid debit/credit cards. They may insist that this personal information is needed so that the taxpayer can receive a refund or a benefit payment. Cases of fraudulent communication could also involve threatening or coercive language to scare individuals into paying

fictitious debt to the CRA. Other communications, such as texting, urge taxpayers to visit a fake CRA website where the taxpayer is then asked to verify their identity by entering personal information. Before responding to any type of communication, think first that this is a scam. Individuals should never respond to these fraudulent communications nor click on any of the links provided.

Here are some warning signs:

- Urgency — The scammer always makes the request sound very urgent, which may cause the victim to not verify the story. For example, they may say "the police are on their way to arrest you."
- Request for money transfer — Money is usually requested to be sent by a money transfer company such as Money Gram,

Western Union or even through your own bank institution.

CRA will never request by email, text or phone, any personal information such as passport, credit card or bank account information.

To avoid becoming a victim, police advise people to hang up, check and verify the information with CRA by calling a trusted phone number, and not the number provided by the caller.

If you or someone you know suspect they've been a victim of the CRA scam, check with a Canada Revenue Agency official, and contact your local police service and the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre, Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477 (TIPS), or online at <https://www.tipsubmit.com/start.htm>

# Romance scam is the most emotionally devastating fraud

Many hearts are broken in the quest for love, leaving some people financially wounded.

Romance scams cause victims severe financial loss and, due to the emotional impact and personal embarrassment, these crimes are not reported to police.

Members of the OPP Anti-Rackets Branch say criminals use the romance scam to find potential victims online, generally single or recently unattached people of all ages. Usually this form of mass marketing fraud occurs through singles and dating-related "meet" websites, social media platforms, or email blasts. In some cases, prolonged interaction with individuals has cost some victims tens of thousands of dollars before the "relationship" suddenly ends, usually without ever meeting in person. Among the most vulnerable are seniors.

In 2017, the romance scam generated 352 complaints and caused 250 victims to lose \$6.2 million in Ontario alone. The dollar value is the second highest fraud in the province and police admit that this may represent just five per cent of the total number of victims.

As part of the annual Fraud Prevention Month campaign, OPP and its partners

at the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre have some tips to help people avoid becoming a victim of the romance scam.

First, ask "Would someone I have never met, really declare their love for me after only a few letters or emails?" If the answer is no, report it to police.

Don't give out any personal information in an email or when chatting online. Educate yourself. Check the person's name, the company name, and the addresses used.

Never send money, or give personal credit card or online account details to anyone you do not know and trust. A request to send money to a foreign country or to someone you have never personally met should be a red flag.

Check website addresses carefully. Scammers often set up fake websites with addresses that are very similar to legitimate dating websites.

If you or someone you know suspect they've been a victim of the romance scam, contact police. You can also file a complaint through the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre, Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477 (TIPS), or online at <https://www.tipsubmit.com/start.htm>

# Man charged twice the same day

A 42-year-old man from Bolton and a Caledon OPP officer have to stop meeting.

They met twice the afternoon of March 18 in Bolton, and the man received two tickets for distracted driving for his troubles.

Police said the officer from the Traffic Unit was conducting distracted driving enforcement on Queen Street. Just before 2 p.m., he saw a blue 2006 Toyota Highlander heading south. The officer followed and noticed the driver was holding a cell phone in his hand.

He was pulled over and charged under the highway Traffic Act with driving with an hand-held communication device.

A little more than an hour later, at about 3:05, the same officer observed the same vehicle and driver heading north on Queen, near King Street, committing the same offence, according to police. He was charged again.

Police report 2017 marked the fifth consecutive year that inattentive drivers were behind the highest number of lives

lost on OPP-patrolled roads over the other three main road death causal factors (impaired driving, aggressive driving and lack of seat belt use). Every driver has a responsibility to direct their entire attention to driving safely, they stress.

## Young driver charged with racing

A Caledon OPP officer was able to catch a driver going almost 100 km-h over the posted speed limit Feb. 14.

Police report the officer was conducting radar enforcement on Highway 9, near Kennedy Road at about 7:20 p.m., when he saw a white 2008 Dodge travelling eastbound. The officer activated the radar unit and determined the speed of the vehicle to be 158 km-h in a posted 60 zone.

A 20-year-old man from Caledon was charged with racing a motor vehicle. His licence was suspended for seven days, and the vehicle was impounded for seven days.

# Lafarge gets approval for expanded operation

Caledon Council has given its approval to expanding Lafarge Canada Inc.'s gravel operation near Caledon village into the Limebeer property, but not without opposition.

Former councillor Ian Sinclair voiced his concerns over the move before Council before the final vote was taken, and Councillor Barb Shaughnessy spent considerable time making her views known.

The staff report, which had gone before councillors early in February, pointed out the lands in question are at the southeast corner of Charleston Sideroad and McLaren Road. The Limebeer Pit will see an extraction area of approximately 32 hectares (79 acres).

"Extraction would occur to a maximum depth remaining above, but within 1.5 metres of the water table," the staff report said. "There is an estimated total aggregate reserve of 5.2 million tonnes available within the proposed extraction limits and the applicant anticipates a 10 to 12 year operational lifespan, pending market demand and other factors

Representatives with the Green Lake Property Owners Association voiced their support for what Lafarge had proposed.

Association member Richard Barnett had addressed councillors, stating they were asked to enter into talks over the proposal about eight years ago. People around the lake initially objected to the application, but that resulted in a series of meetings over the years. He said they involved Mayor Allan Thompson, Councillor Doug Beffort, Shaughnessy and Sinclair, who he said was most helpful.

There have been revisions to the plan, and Barnett said that as of November, the Association is fine with what Lafarge has in mind and objections have been withdrawn.

He also told Thompson nether side completely got what it wanted, but the result was reasonable.

Thompson expressed appreciation to the group for working with the Town and Lafarge.

"I think you've set a new standard in Caledon," he commented.

Councillors also heard from Brian Zeeman, a consultant with MERC Planning Urban Design and Landscape Architecture, appearing on behalf of Lafarge.

He expressed appreciation to the Association, as well as for the thorough review from Town staff.

"It was a tremendous process and a great outcome," he remarked.

The modifications to the application, according to material in Zeman's presentation, included increased buffers to environmental features, a reduction in the licensed area to accommodate Association members, additional plantings in the rehabilitation plan, expanding the scope of the public liaison committee, and enhanced water monitoring program, etc.

Councillor Doug Beffort complimented both sides for the work they did to bring the agreements about, especially when it came to protecting Green Lake. He called it "a nice, long, beautiful lake."

"Green Lake has got a little bit of history," he added.

But not everyone was as enthused. Sinclair addressed Council two weeks later as the committee recommendations were about to be ratified, stressing he was speaking on his own behalf, and not for the Association or landowners.

He did point out there are a lot of cottages on Green Lake, "totally surrounded" by strip mining operations. He added there's been no attempt on the part of the Town to support the people who own land in the area. He added the negotiations between Lafarge and the land owners have been "totally one-sided."

Sinclair cited the staff report as stating there is no requirement for a standalone social impact study in Caledon's Official Plan. He argued there is a requirement on the part of the applicant to assess social impacts for a new extraction operation or expansion of an existing one.

"It's very clear they are to be considered," he argued.

Sinclair also cited the staff report as stating the application is consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement, but he said the staff report wasn't.

Councillor Annette Groves was curious how such apparent inconsistencies had not been addressed.

Sinclair told Shaughnessy the plan is to have the pit operating from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. five days per week, and from 7 a.m. to noon Saturdays. No mining is planned in the winter. But he said the plan is to having a strip mine operating when people are trying to enjoy the lake.

"I find it amazing," he said. Beffort pointed out, however, that members of the Green Lake Association had approved what's being planned, and had actually signed off on it.

Senior Planner Brandon Ward said the staff report addressed in detail the issues that were raised by the public.

Groves expressed concern that land owners might not have the resources to fight something like this.

"The aggregate industry is Goliath and these folks are David," she remarked.

Shaughnessy added this is a very important issue for Ward 1 residents.

She added she's talked to some Green Lake residents and they hadn't realized what they were facing with the aggregate industry.

"These people were there long before aggregate was there," she said.

Shaughnessy unsuccessfully moved that the report be referred back to staff to see if more work was required to bring the proposal in line with the Pro-

vincial Policy Statement.

"A little more time won't hurt," she argued.

Ward commented the report reflected expert, professional planning recommendations, adding parts of it have been peer-reviewed.

He told Councillor Nick deBoer there had been a public information meeting, as well as a public information centre under the Aggregate Resources Act. He said that was a very involved process.

Beffort was concerned with a possible suggestion that residents had been duped in the process, believing the staff report addressed all the necessary items. He added the residents "were sharp enough to put together a lot of good things."

He also said people along Green Lake did their work and kept themselves informed.

"They asked questions and they got answers," he observed.



# Celebrate Earth Hour this Saturday in Caledon

Turn out the lights for Earth Hour. This year marks the 10th annual Earth Hour, which will take place this Saturday (March 24) from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. The Town will be participating in a “lights out” campaign in an effort to demonstrate its commitment to climate change action.

“We have actively participated in Earth Hour since 2008 and throughout the years, I’ve learned that every little bit counts,” Mayor Allan Thompson said. “I encourage everyone to participate in Earth Hour and share your stories online by using #EarthHourCaledon.”

The Town will participate in this year’s campaign by, turning off all un-

necessary lighting in unoccupied areas at Town Hall, Mayfield Recreation Complex, the Fire Administration offices, Lloyd Wilson Arena, OPP Detachment (subject to events), Cheltenham Community Hall, Fire Halls (subject to events), Margaret Dunn Library, Caledon East Community Complex, Inglewood Community Centre (with the exception of the stage performance area), Alton Community Centre, Caledon Village Place, Caledon Centre for Recreation and Wellness, Victoria Parks Community Centre and Albion-Bolton Community Centre.

The ice arenas will be shut down when unoccupied during the hour at

Lloyd Wilson Arena, Mayfield Recreation Complex, Albion-Bolton Community Centre and Caledon East Community Complex.

The Mayfield Recreation Complex and Lloyd Wilson Arena will be taking additional measures beyond just “lights out” by shutting down and unplugging all unnecessary equipment, including compressors for the arena, shower water heaters and appliances; turning down and shutting off the furnace and baseboard and wall heaters; unplugging the ice scraping equipment and water heater; and turning off the parking lot and road sign lights.

The Town encourages the community and businesses to participate in Earth Hour’s “lights out” campaign. Last year, according to Hydro One records, the Caledon community’s electricity reduction beat 2016 results by 5.1 per cent.

# A perfect time for run-offs?

All the recent polls show that the June 7 Ontario election will produce a Progressive Conservative government, and as we see it the only questions remaining are how big the Tory majority will be and which party will form the Official Opposition.

Assuming that support for the PCs and new leader Doug Ford will be maintained at more than 40 per cent of the electorate, there's good reason to believe that we'll witness a return to the situation in the 1950s and 1960s, when the Ontario Legislature had no effective opposition.

The classic example was in 1951, when the government of Tory premier Leslie Frost won 79 of the 90 seats in the House after garnering 48.5 per cent of the popular vote. At that time, the Liberals got 31.5 per cent of the popular vote but only eight seats and the CCF (not yet renamed the NDP) fared even more poorly, with 19.1 per cent of the popular vote but only two seats, one more than the (Communist) Labor Progressive party.

Last week, one opinion poll showed that the Tories currently have almost as much support as they had with Premier Frost in 1951, with 43 per cent of those polled saying they planned to vote Conservative, compared with 27 per cent who favoured the Liberals and 23 per cent who endorsed the New Democrats.

Of course, that was before NDP Leader Andrea Horwath effectively announced the party's platform, promising that as a government her party would not just bring in pharmacare but also universal dental care and measures that would somehow get patients out of hospital hallways, while providing affordable child care and improved care for seniors in nursing homes.

One difference between the current situation and that in 1951 is the existence of the Green Party, with support from about five per cent of the electorate.

As we see it, that and the roughly even support enjoyed by the Liberals and NDP, will mean that the three centre-left parties will tend to kill one another off,

even more so than in 1951 when the CCF was well to the left of the Liberals and preached socialism.

In the circumstances, a fairly safe prediction would be that the only opposition members who'll survive after the June 7 vote will be those so popular and well-known that they will get votes from those who otherwise would have supported another party.

Another safe prediction is that this time none of the three main parties will have credible platforms.

The PCs appear to have abandoned the platform worked out by former leader Patrick Brown, which included a tax on carbon that would provide revenue to pay for costly planks in the platform. The Ford promise of simply finding the needed revenue from program cuts that wouldn't require layoffs hasn't found much support among economists.

A similar situation exists with the NDP platform, details of which are to be released this week. We can't see how the promised pharmacare and dental programs and a return of Hydro One to government ownership could be accomplished by simply increasing taxation of wealthy individuals and corporations.

As for the Liberals, their promises in Monday's Throne Speech mean little or nothing, since everyone surely knows they will not be in government after June 7.

In the circumstances, this would be the perfect time for the Wynne government to come up with an electoral reform that should also be tried by the Trudeau Liberals in Ottawa.

With the PCs' victory virtually inevitable and the three other parties all being of the centre-left variety, this is the time for an experiment with run-offs in ridings where the "first past the post" failed to get 50 per cent of the votes. The result would be a legislature in which every member had won the support of a majority of those voting.

While it would still result in a PC majority, the run-offs might mean more Liberal and NDP seats in the House.

## Beware of scams

The message was ridiculous. I knew that from the get go.

But I listened to it, and replayed it a couple of times.

"I need you to get back to me on my department division number," the man, who doesn't identify himself, says, before giving the number to call, twice. "If I don't get a call from you, we will have to issue an arrest warrant under your name and get you arrested. So get back to me as soon as possible."

And since politeness always pays, the man ends with a very courteous "Thank you."

I received such a call last Thursday afternoon on my cell phone. It took a couple of seconds before the recorded message started. I was on the verge of hanging up when I heard the voice began. As the message was progressing, I mentioned to one of the women in the office what the call was all about. She seemed a little annoyed that I didn't hang up immediately. It's a fact these calls amuse me.

But I subsequently learned that about 24 hours later my wife had received the exact same message on her cell. Her phone indicated the call was coming from Belleville, and since she couldn't figure out who would be calling her from there, she let the call go to voice mail. That meant she was able to play it back for me.

It was the same message. Some of the phrasing was wrong in both messages, considering this was supposed to be some professional official who was calling me on a supposedly very serious legal matter. Such an official would not tell me or my wife that they were going to "get you arrested." I think the choice of words would have been a little more proper if this situation were legitimate. If I had handed in a composition with that phrase to my Grade 5 teacher, he would have handed it back to me with "D.O." scrawled across it, and probably given me a cuffing across the head for good measure (teachers were allowed to do that when I was in Grade 5). "D.O." stood for "Do Over."

Also the message gave no indication who was calling, which one would supposedly expect from someone with the power to have me arrested. I hadn't noticed that when I first heard it, but realized it when I transcribed the message from Beth's phone.

When I first heard it on my phone, I thought it might purport to be from Canada Revenue Agency (CRA). In fact, that's what I said when I mentioned in the office what message I was listening to. I guess I could call the number I was given twice, but I think it's wise to minimize the contact I have with these people.

And needless to say, I am not in the slightest degree worried about the prospect of being arrested, because I haven't done anything to merit that. The closest I come to committing crimes usually involves speed laws.

And anyone who knows Beth knows she's even less likely to get hauled in by the authorities.

I have received calls like this before. Indeed, I was half expecting to get one on my home phone, which is where I normally get such messages (getting it on my cell was something of a rarity).

I have been told in the past that the police are on their way to arrest me. And since callers in the past have said they were calling from CRA, they would also tell me there's a problem with my taxes. Of course they don't address me by name. And if memory serves, the caller never identifies himself (it's always a man's voice — I guess that's to make it sound more ominous).

I think the facts are simple. This is a scam, as just about anyone should realize. The problem is there are probably people out there who wouldn't realize that, and possibly act out of fear. These messages are constantly being left on people's phones for some reason, so one can assume there some ill-gotten gain to be realized by the people responsible for

them. The calls wouldn't keep coming if there weren't people out there falling for the scam.

I feel sorry for these victims, because it is a fact that successful scam artists are good at what they do.

I think it's ironic that Beth and I got these calls during Fraud Prevention Month. Indeed, it was about a week after Caledon OPP issued a release warning people about such scams, which supposedly come from CRA, or other similar agencies.

I was a little surprised to read there were more than 1,500 victims of such scams in Ontario last year, with losses amounting to about \$3 million.

I was not surprised, however, to read in the release that only about five per cent of these crimes are ever reported. Part of the tragedy in cases like this is the victims are too embarrassed to admit to the authorities that they have been taken in.

But there are ways to avoid being ripped off by the scumbags making these calls. It seems to me some of them are obvious. For one thing, if the call is legit, the caller will know enough to address you by name, and would certainly not have a problem with identifying themselves by name. And actually, just about all the correspondence I've had with CRA has been through the mail. There have been a few communications over the phone, but I've initiated all of them.

Actually, the release from the police was clear that "CRA will never request by email, text or phone, any personal information such as passport, credit card or bank account information."

Police also suggest you hang up right away. At the risk of seeming to defy the constabulary, I'll listen to the whole message, if only for the entertainment value.

## March is Fraud Prevention Month

March is Fraud Prevention Month, which means it's the perfect time for all of us to remind ourselves to be aware of all types of fraud out there, how to guard against it and report it when we come across it.

It's especially important to maintain our awareness of the problem, as there always seems to be a new scam on the horizon.

Fraud comes in many shapes and forms and recognizing this fact is an important first step in protecting ourselves. There are various types of fraud, which include internet, email, mail and telephone scams. Each type can be emotionally and financially devastating for those who fall victim to it.

There are countless internet, email, mail and phone scams, which are associated with identity theft and fraud. Identity theft takes place when a perpetrator obtains someone else's personal information for the purpose of criminal activity. This activity can include mail theft, tax scams, phishing, bank investigator scams, etc. Computer spyware and viruses are also used to collect personal information.

You can help protect yourself from identity theft by watching out for unsolicited

emails, text messages, telephone calls or mail trying to solicit personal information from you. You can also periodically check your credit reports, bank and credit card statements, and quickly report anything unusual to your bank or financial institution. Never take your eyes off your cards during transactions; cover your hand when entering your personal identification number (PIN) when using an ATM or PIN pad; memorize all PINs; take note of when your monthly bank and credit card statements are mailed; shred personal and financial documents before throwing them in the garbage; and ensure you notify the post office and all relevant financial institutions when you change your address.

Identity fraud is when a perpetrator actually uses the personal identity information of another person to commit fraud, including impersonating another person and deceptively using debit and credit card data. Criminals can use stolen or reproduced personal or financial information to access your computer/email; access your bank accounts; open a new bank account; transfer bank balances; apply for loans, credit cards and other goods and services; make purchases; hide their criminal activities; and obtain passports or receive government benefits.

You can protect yourself against identity fraud by limiting the opportunities for criminals to access your personal information. Some warning signs to look out

for include being contacted by a creditor informing you that they received a credit application in your name, however, you know you never applied for such credit; you receive telephone calls or letters suggesting you've either been approved or denied by a creditor when you never applied; you receive credit card statements or other bills for accounts you don't have; you're missing your regular credit and/or bank statements; or you're contacted by a collection agency seeking to collect on a defaulted account which you never set up.

## Proroguing and throne speech shows a Liberal government out of ideas

I plan on reintroducing many of my proposed private member's bills that were removed by the Liberals. They include the Sewage Bypass Reporting Act, which would ensure that Ontarians know when partially treated or untreated sewage is bypassed into their local waterways. The Organic Products Act, which would create a standard for organic products in Ontario. The End the Public Funding of Partisan Government Advertising Act, which would stop the government's ability to spend tax-

payer dollars on partisan ads. Finally, I plan on reintroducing the Recycled Aggregate Promotion Act, which will ensure that all infrastructure projects in Ontario must consider using recycled aggregate in their projects.



**CALIFORNIA DREAMING**

When Mustang first hit the streets in 1964, owners clubs sprang up around the country, with many regional dealers creating their own personalized pony car designs. One – inspired by the 1967 Shelby GT

notchback coupe prototype – came to be called the California Special.

That original version featured blacked-out grille, fog lamps and a side racing stripe that ended ahead of a new rear fender scoop. It wore a Shelby-inspired spoiler, custom taillamps and twist-lock hood fasteners. Impressed, Ford put a limited number of California Special cars into production for 1968. Before long, the California Special had joined the ranks of Shelby, Boss and Mach 1 special-edition Mustangs.

Today, the 2019 California Special for Mustang GT is a visual standout, featuring a trademark fading stripe that traces from the 5.0 side badge to the rear fender scoop. A signature Ebony Black and Race Red script California Special badge adorns the trunk lid. At the front, the car follows the blacked-out open grille and picks up the Mustang Performance Pack 1 splitter. The California Special wears unique five-spoke painted machined wheels.

Inside are rich black Miko® suede-trimmed seats with embossed GT/CS insignia and contrast red accent stitching, along with custom embroidered GT/CS floor mats. Signature California Special script badging appears on the passenger-side dash panel.

“Few things are more satisfying than dropping the top on a California Special and taking a drive down the majestic Pacific Coast Highway,” said Mark Conforzi, Ford designer. “This signature design takes its cues from the original California Special, while enhancing the personality of today’s Mustang.”

# Crossovers and crowd-pleasers make for big reveals in march

After the eventful North American International Auto Show, Chicago and Toronto Auto Shows, many new 2019 and future models have been revealed. March promises to be another busy month as well, with the Geneva Auto Show being held this week with many reveals, along with the New York Auto Show later this month just before Easter.

Freshly revealed this month, GMC has taken the wraps off of its 2019 Sierra SLT and Denali models at a private event last week. The new truck is all-new from the ground up and features many firsts in the pickup truck segment. The new Sierra has the first optional Carbon-Fibre bed to reduce weight and also has many new towing technologies that are a first. Plenty of new infotainment options as well as new powertrains make

the Sierra even more competitive in the segment. A cool new tailgate design is also equipped with a dual-type tailgate opening for many different purposes.

Other trims will be revealed at New York Auto Show this month. Buick also released images of the redesigned 2019 Buick Envision, which features a revised front and rear fascia, more in-line with the current Buick design language. A new 9-speed transmission has also been added to reduce fuel consumption and the base price has been lowered about \$2000.

We expect to see many other new models hitting showrooms this spring, such as the F-150 diesel and more reveals at the New York Auto Show such as the all-new 2019 Nissan Altima, the all-new 2019 Cadillac XT4 crossover, the Lexus UX crossover as well as

potentially a new Toyota RAV4 reveal.

At Geneva, some other new models have made a reveal in Switzerland and while not all the new models released there will make it over to our shores, these vehicles will. Mercedes revealed the all-new Mercedes-AMG GT 4-Door Coupe, a beautiful sleek new exotic for the family. This beautiful sedan features a 4.0L twin turbo V8 with up to 630hp in the GT 63 S or a 3.0L turbo I-6 with 429hp in the GT 53. Mercedes wants this car to be viewed as a 4-door version of its AMG GT coupe and it certainly does well to appeal to the same buyers. BMW also followed suit, revealing a concept M8 Gran Coupe, a sedan version of their upcoming, unreleased 8-series coupe. This beautiful sedan, alike the Mercedes, is very striking but details are scarce about powertrain. The new M5 powertrain however is very likely. The 8 Coupe and Gran Coupe will be shown sometime next year.

Lastly, Toyota previewed the vehicle many enthusiasts have been waiting for, the Toyota Supra. The concept shown at Geneva in race guise shows the new styling of the modern Supra, which has been co-developed with BMW on their new Z4 platform. The new Supra pays homage to the original with a turbo inline-6, now likely with 50-50 weight distribution but the drawback to many purists, no manual gearbox in the Supra. The production vehicle will make its launch sometime this year and expect a lot of interest when Toyota does so.

The Accord Hybrid lineup will come in two trim levels: Hybrid, and Hybrid Touring. The Accord Hybrid still offers a lengthy list of standard equipment, such as 17-inch alloy wheels, LED headlights (low beam) and taillights, dual-zone climate control, Smart entry with Push-button Start, a 7-inch TFT digital driver's metre, a multi-angle rearview camera, and the Honda Sensing<sup>®</sup> suite of advanced safety and driver-assistive technologies, which bundles together Adaptive Cruise Control with Low-Speed Follow, Collision Mitigation Braking System<sup>™</sup>, Road Departure Mitigation, Lane Departure Warning, and Traffic Sign Recognition.

The 2018 Accord Hybrid is powered by the third generation of Honda's innovative two-motor hybrid powertrain, which pairs a 2.0-litre DOHC i-VTEC<sup>®</sup> Atkinson-cycle inline-4 engine with 40-percent thermal efficiency to an electric propulsion motor that churns out 232 lb.-ft. of torque for a class-leading total system output of 212 horsepower. As before, the Accord two-motor system operates without the need for a conventional automatic transmission.

Helping to maximize energy generation are steering wheel-mounted Deceleration Selectors. Similar to transmission paddle shifters, the Accord Hybrid's Deceleration Selectors allow the driver to easily toggle between four levels of regenerative braking performance. The right selector increases regenerative braking and the left selector reduces regenerative braking. The system simultaneously helps reduce stress on the brakes while increasing battery charging via regeneration.

The Accord Hybrid's powertrain operates by seamlessly shifting between three distinct drive operations: EV Drive (100-percent electric motor), Hybrid Drive (electric motor and gasoline engine driving the generator motor) and Engine Drive (gasoline engine), utilizing power from the gasoline engine and electric motors to accommodate the current driving conditions.

# How can you secure your road safety this spring?



When people think about driving, they often think about the car and forget about the tires that connect and transport the vehicle's performance.

There are proactive steps any vehicle owner can take once a month to make sure they are safeguarding themselves from tire related issues. Inspecting your tires is an inexpensive and easy act that could be lifesaving and there are three essential steps to doing it right.

First, start with a visual inspection of your tire. This means checking for uneven wear and cuts or bulges that could affect your tire's relationship to the road and consequently, affect your driving in a surprising and unwanted way.

Second, you're going to convert quintessential pocket change, the trusty Canadian quarter, into a precious tool to help you check tread depth. Holding the quarter between your thumb and forefinger with the quarter's figurehead pointing downward, find a point on your tire where tread appears the lowest. Insert the quarter with the figurehead first into one of the grooves and if the top of the figurehead is covered by tread, you're driving with the legal and safe amount of tread. If your tread depth gets below that, your car's ability to grip the road is substantially reduced. Having the right amount of tread, especially as spring approaches, is essential because drivers are going to be facing more rain and therefore, more risk of hydroplaning.

Third, checking your tire's pressure is crucial because having your tires inflated to the correct pressure affects their performance and safety. The maximum load of the vehicle is the main factor used in establishing the recommended pressure, but there are many others that are taken into consideration.

Tires have been known to lose up to 1 psi (pounds per square inch) of pressure every month. So use a proper pressure gauge to check pressure when tires are 'cold' (before driving or three hours after driving). Make sure your tires are inflated to the psi on the sticker inside the driver's door of your car. This number has been carefully chosen for your vehicle, so respecting it is very important.

Once you've taken these measures, you will be better equipped to spring forward this March. However, the changes in temperature and road conditions may still send some unknowns your ways, so here are two additional safety tips to keep in mind:

- Slow down to dramatically decrease the risk of accidents in rain.

- If hydroplaning, do not accelerate or brake suddenly. Keep your foot lightly on the gas and steer the car forward until your tires regain traction.
