

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

## Throne speech impressed Liberals, but that's about it

The Wynne government set out a list of priorities Monday when Lt.-Gov. Elizabeth Dowdeswell delivered the speech from the Throne, but others are wondering what was the point of it all.

"I think you'd be hard pressed to call it more than a political ploy," Dufferin-Caledon MPP Sylvia Jones remarked.

The government said it is investing more in the care and services that people across the province rely on, according to a release issued from Queen's Park shortly after the

It added the upcoming Budget will focus on doing more in health care, home care, mental health care and child care services, as well as expanding a number other programs. It also maintained the economy is strong, with unemployment at its lowest level in almost two decades.

"I hear from people every day who put caring first — whether it's at home, caring for their families, or at work, caring for patients, students or society's most vulnerable people," Premier Kathleen Wynne said.

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## Eric Lamaze scores 28th WEF Challenge Cup career victory

\$35,000 CSI3\* Equinimity WEF Chal- Germany's Marcus Beerbaum, Lamaze now and have basically tried to make retirement, Chesney couldn't have taking the top prize for the third time 2017 season. this season in the weekly feature at the 12-week Winter Equestrian Festival (WEF) in Wellington, Florida.

Having scored back-to-back wins during weeks two and three riding Chacco Kid, Lamaze earned victory last week partnered with Chesney, owned by Andy and Carlene Ziegler's Artisan Farms.

Tied with three-time U.S. Olympic medalist McLain Ward for the most WEF Challenge Cup wins at 27 apiece before the event, Lamaze, also a threetime Olympic medalist, now sits alone at the top of the leaderboard with a total of 28 career victories to his credit.

The course for the WEF Challenge Cup Round 10 was designed by Michel Vaillancourt, the only person other than Lamaze to win an individual Olympic medal for Canada. Vaillancourt won the individual silver at the 1976 Olympic Games, held in Lamaze's birthplace of Montreal. Lamaze went on to win the individual gold in addition to team silver at the 2008 Beijing Olympics, riding Hickstead, and claimed the individual bronze medal at the 2016 Rio Olympic Games with Fine Lady 5.

A total of 84 entries attempted Vaillancourt's track with nine jumping clear to qualify for the jump-off. Lamaze and Chesney flew around the shortened jump-off course in a time of 36.59 seconds to take the win over Amber Harte, riding Austria 2, who stopped the clock at 37.07 for second place. New York's Georgina Bloomberg finished third with a clear jump-off effort in a time of 37.50, riding Manodie II H. Canadians filled the next two spots with 10time Olympian Ian Millar of Perth taking fourth riding Dixson and Jennifer Mattell of Milton producing the fastest four-fault effort in the jump-off for fifth place aboard Cherokee.

While Lamaze has ridden various mounts to victory in the WEF Challenge Cup series, Thursday marked the first time that Chesney made the trip



I'm not big on crowds, but love the Canadian International Auto Show. Which could have been a problem if I didn't have a media pass, allowing me to show up the day before its official opening.

Indeed, CIAS Media Day – which draws mainly 457.94 km/h. Try explaining that to the officer. journalists and industry types - accounted for only a small fraction of the 358,842 that jammed the aisles from February 16-25. And although it may not be the 'greatest show on earth', it's a darned good one for those who enjoy all things automotive.

I could drone on about the 1,000-plus cars, trucks, SUVs, concepts, exotics, classics, muscle cars, and electrics found throughout the more than 650,000 square feet at the Metro Toronto Convention Centre. But for me, it's about the unveilings – 40 of them this year. These new models, production-ready concepts, and flights of fancy define the cutting edge and possible future of this industry.

Forty vehicles are still a bit much, so I hand-picked a few favourites from my day at the Show. These are in no particular order, but are vehicles I found interesting for a variety of reasons.

Price tags may be a little steep for most of us - Hyundai excluded - but auto shows are about more than just practical matters. Like shopping for your next ride. They give us a chance to dream...

## Koenigsegg Agera RS

So, on that note, I'll start with the Koenigsegg Agera RS: the world's fastest production vehicle.

Indeed, this Swedish hypercar, powered by a twin-turbo 5.0-litre V8 that pumps out a whopping 1,160 hp and 944 lb/ft of torque is scary fast. Late last year, on a Nevada highway closed to the public, the Agera RS was clocked at



As you can see by the photo, this ride isn't just styled for speed, but looks stunning. None of this, of course, comes cheap, as one of these limited-run vehicles (25 in total) would set you back around \$2.5 million.

Which brings me to something a little more attainable.

## **Corvette ZR1**

The 2019 ZR1 may not deliver on the scale of Koenigsegg, but it's the fastest production Corvette ever. Under its long hood is a supercharged 6.2-litre LT5 V8 that delivers 755 hp and 715 lb/ft of torque – with 600 lb/ft on tap from 2200 rpm to redline.

They've cut weight through the extensive use of carbon fibre, and to control all this fire and fury, the ZR1 comes standard with six-piston Brembo brakes up front (four-piston in rear) with rotors the size of large serving trays: 15.5-inch in front, 15.3-inch in rear. And keeping things cool are 13 radiators!

I don't vet have pricing on this 'Vette, but will assume that it may overstretch some of our budgets. So here's something a little more affordable, but also a blast if, like me, you're a fan of the hot hatch.

Hyundai took the wraps off a vehicle that is long overdue. The current Veloster Turbo is peppy enough, with its 201-hp, 1.6-litre turbo, but the 2019 Veloster N dials it up with more promising numbers. The kind that will challenge the likes of Focus ST and Golf GTI.



The N's larger 2.0-litre turbo four cylinder provides up to 275 hp, and up to 260 lb/ft of torque from a low 1,450 rpm. And it has the looks to match with exclusive front fascia and grille, side sills and 19-inch, machine-finished alloys. In back is a larger rear spoiler and wide-bore dual exhausts.

The same company also presented its Genesis GV80 Concept. To be fair, Genesis is now a standalone marque, and this particular concept looks extremely high-end.

The GV80 is a hydrogen fuel cell-powered SUV, and a glimpse into the future that I hope will someday make it to production. That is, without the bean counters dumbing down its striking sheet metal and exterior flourishes.

I love the massive, but still tasteful front grille, and 23-inch mesh wheels. On the inside, you'll find a 22-inch curved OLED touchscreen, and diamondstitched, semi-aniline leather.

## **Prototype 9 Concept**

Infiniti's Prototype 9 Concept is even more of a design study, representing the reimagining of a 1930s race car. Truly retro, but with modern cues - like the grille - this seriously sleek, open-wheeled roadster is powered by a prototype electric motor and battery that produces 148 hp and 236 lb/ft of torque. Drive is to the rear wheels via single-speed transmission. The Prototype 9 will go from rest to 100 km/h in 5.5 seconds, and reach a top speed of 170 km/h. **BMW i8 Roadster** 

Here's an electric roadster you'll actually be able to find in showrooms. The 2019 BMW i8 Roadster is a droptop version of the matching hybrid coupe.



It runs on the same powertrain, a 1.5-litre threecylinder mated to an electric motor and battery, with a combined output of 369 hp. This will launch the all-wheel drive i8 from zero to 100 km/h in just 4.6 seconds. Keeping it light is an extensive use of aluminum and carbon fibre-reinforced polymer in the chassis and body panels.

## **Mercedes-AMG Project One Hypercar**

Let's wrap up with perhaps the most eye-catching ride at the Show. Or maybe number two, as I really, really liked the Prototype 9 Concept.

That aside, the Project One brought together teams from AMG, alongside the company's Formula One operations, to produce a hypercar that can rocket from zero to 200 km/h in less than six seconds. Using a hybrid powertrain.

But this is not one of those tree-hugging units that delivers a balance between power and eco friendliness. Engineers have transplanted a high-performance plug-in system from their F1 car - a midmounted V6 that produces 1,000 hp, and will spin up to a screaming 11,000 rpm.

Top speed is 350 km/h, and although it's still a concept, the Project One will be built, according to Mercedes-AMG. Production will be limited to 275 units. Which doesn't leave much time to make my fortune - and place an order – before these cars are snapped up!

That original version featured blacked-out grille, fog lamps and a side racing stripe that ended ahead of a new rear fender scoop. It wore a Shelby-inspired spoiler, custom taillamps and twist-lock hood fasteners. Impressed, Ford put a limited number of California Special cars into production for 1968. Before long, the California Special had joined the ranks of Shelby, Boss and Mach 1 special-edition Mustangs.

Today, the 2019 California Special for Mustang GT is a visual standout, featuring a trademark fading stripe that traces from the 5.0 side badge to the rear fender scoop. A signature Ebony Black and Race Red script California Special badge adorns the trunk lid. At the front, the car follows the blacked-out open grille and picks up the Mustang Performance Pack 1 splitter. The California Special wears unique fivespoke painted machined wheels.

Inside are rich black Miko\* suede-trimmed seats with embossed GT/CS insignia and contrast red accent stitching, along with custom embroidered GT/CS floor mats. Signature California Special script badging appears on the passenger-side dash panel.

"Few things are more satisfying than dropping the top on a California Special and taking a drive down the majestic Pacific Coast Highway," said Mark Conforzi, Ford designer. "This signature design takes its cues from the original California Special, while enhancing the personality of today's Mustang."

Rev-matching to level the field

**TOYOTA SUPRA GR RACING CONCEPT** 

After the eventful North American International Auto Show, Chicago and Toronto Auto Shows, many new 2019 and future models have been revealed. March promises to be another busy month as well, with the Geneva Auto Show being held this week with many reveals, along with the New York Auto Show later this month just before Easter.

Freshly revealed this month, GMC has taken the wraps off of its 2019 Sierra SLT and Denali models at a private event last week. The new truck is all-new from the ground up and features many firsts in the pickup truck segment. The new Sierra has the first optional Carbon-Fibre bed to reduce weight and also has many new towing technologies that are a first. Plenty of new infotainment options as well as new powertrains make the Sierra even more competitive in the segment. A cool new tailgate design is also equipped with a dual-type tailgate opening for many different purposes.

Other trims will be revealed at New York Auto Show this month. Buick also released images of the redesigned 2019 Buick Envision, which features a revised front and rear fascia, more in-line with the current Buick design language. A new 9-speed transmission has also been added to reduce fuel consumption and the base price has been lowered about \$2000.


We expect to see many other new models hitting showrooms this spring, such as the F-150 diesel and more reveals at the New York Auto Show such as the all-new 2019 Nissan Altima, the all-new 2019 Cadillac XT4 crossover, the Lexus UX crossover as well as

potentially a new Toyota RAV4 reveal.

At Geneva, some other new models have made a reveal in Switzerland and while not all the new models released there will make it over to our shores, these vehicles will. Mercedes revealed the all-new Mercedes-AMG GT 4-Door Coupe, a beautiful sleek new exotic for the family. This beautiful sedan features a 4.0L twin turbo V8 with up to 630hp in the GT 63 S or a 3.0L turbo I-6 with 429hp in the GT 53. Mercedes wants this car to be viewed as a 4-door version of its AMG GT coupe and it certainly does well to appeal to the same buyers. BMW also followed suit, revealing a concept M8 Gran Coupe, a sedan version of their upcoming, unreleased 8-series coupe. This beautiful sedan, alike the Mercedes, is very striking but details are scarce about powertrain. The new M5 powertrain however is very likely. The 8 Coupe and Gran Coupe will be shown sometime next year.

Lastly, Toyota previewed the vehicle many enthusiasts have been waiting for, the Toyota Supra. The concept shown at Geneva in race guise shows the new styling of the modern Supra, which has been co-developed with BMW on their new Z4 platform. The new Supra pays homage to the original with a turbo inline-6, now likely with 50-50 weight distribution but the drawback to many purists, no manual gearbox in the Supra. The production vehicle will make its launch sometime this year and expect a lot of interest when Toyota does so.

The cabin was inspired by an aircraft cockpit and the front seats wrap around the pilot with easy to reach controls and a convenient centre console.

With a standard full-width premium sunroof overhead, there are many luxury features such as available premium Nappa leather seating and a choice of carbon fibre or aluminum style



# How can you secure your road safety this spring?



- Check for uneven tread wear, shallow tread, and damaged areas.
- Pay attention to the "feel" of your tires while driving (ex: vibrations).
- When in doubt, see a professional!



When people think about driving, they often think about the car and forget about the tires that connect and transport the vehicle's performance.

here are proactive steps any vehicle owner can take once a month to make sure they are safeguarding themselves from tire related issues. Inspecting your tires is an inexpensive and easy act that could be lifesaving and there are three essential steps to doing it right.

First, start with a visual inspection of your tire. This means checking for uneven wear and cuts or bulges that could affect your tire's relationship to the road and consequently, affect your driving in a surprising and unwanted way.

Second, you're going to convert quintessential pocket change, the trusty Canadian quarter, into a precious tool to help you check tread depth. Holding the quarter between your thumb and forefinger with the quarter's figurehead pointing downward, find a point on your tire where tread appears the lowest. Insert the quarter with the figurehead first into one of the grooves and if the top of the figurehead is covered by tread, you're driving with the legal and safe amount of tread. If your tread depth gets below that, your car's ability to grip the road is substantially reduced. Having the right amount of tread, especially as spring approaches, is essential because drivers are going to be facing more rain and therefore, more risk of hydroplaning.

Third, checking your tire's pressure is crucial because having your tires inflated to the correct pressure affects their performance and safety. The maximum load of the vehicle is the main factor used in establishing the recommended pressure, but there are many others that are taken into consideration.

Tires have been known to lose up to 1 psi (pounds per square inch) of pressure every month. So use a proper pressure gauge to check pressure when tires are 'cold' (before driving or three hours after driving). Make sure your tires are inflated to the psi on the sticker inside the driver's door of your car. This number has been carefully chosen for your vehicle, so respecting it is very important.

Once you've taken these measures, you will be better equipped to spring forward this March. However, the changes in temperature and road conditions may still send some unknowns your ways, so here are two additional safety tips to keep in mind:

- · Slow down to dramatically decrease the risk of accidents in rain.
- If hydroplaning, do not accelerate or brake suddenly. Keep your foot lightly on the gas and steer the car forward until your tires regain traction.

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
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
