## Tokyo Police Club to headline Caledon Day

Newmarket's Tokyo Police Club (TPC) will headline this year's Caledon Day on Saturday, June 15.

The four-time JUNO nominated band perform on the Husky Main Stage starting at 8:30 p.m. at the Caledon Civic Campus in Caledon East.

"This is the best front-to-back program we have ever put together for Caledon Day,"

said Mayor Allan Thompson. "This celebration has become our signature event, attracting people from across the GTA."

TPC has been a mainstay in the Canadian indie rock scene for the last thirteen years. Fronted by bassist David Monks, keyboardist Graham Wright, guitarist Josh Hook and drummer Greg Alsop, TPC was recently honoured with a JUNO nomination for the 2019 Alternative Album of the Year.

Opening for TPC on the main stage at 7 p.m. will be alternative-country band Blackie Jackett Jr., whose style has been described as "whiskey-drenched lyrics rolled up in a cloud of honky tonk smoke." Blackie Jackett Jr. was born in the minds of Finger Eleven guitarists James Black and Rick Jackett and is beautifully balanced by the vocals of the Dolly-inspired Sandra Dee.

Festivities for the day begin at 2 p.m. with a number of fun zones.

# Caledon chief Librarian concerned over provincial cuts to libraries

An immediate change has come to the Caledon Public Library with fears of more forthcoming.

Delivery of the library's inter-library loan program, where Caledon libraries collect thousands of books from other libraries, has freeze as the service has been postponed. It is distributed by the Southern Ontario Library Services (SOLS), where the Province slashed 50 per cent of their budget.

"We have access to over 70,000 titles on behalf of Caledon residents through that shared collection and that's larger than some large municipalities have access to," said Colleen Lipp, CEO and chief librarian of the Caledon Public Library. "We really rely on their purchasing power and ability to negotiate book purchases on our behalf. It really is a far more efficient way to get more bang for tax payer dollars than every library trying to negotiate those deals on their own."

Lipp said they received correspondence from SOLS stating they're working with the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport who are looking at all their services and that there will be more information forthcoming. "I hope it will be in the coming days, but

I don't know what that is going to look like yet," said Lipp.

Lipp thinks the Ford Government was not aware of the implications cutting services to libraries would have on patrons. She said the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport assured the day-to-day operations of libraries will not change, which she believes is not true.

"I don't think they specifically targeted libraries," said Lipp. "I think they are making cuts across a wide dearth of sectors, and that's one of the reasons why it's so challenging. It's very difficult for us to rally troops in support of this, where there are cuts going on across education and services for autism and flood plain management and healthcare; sadly, we're in good company."

People may think of libraries as a soft service but Lipp said it's essential to residents and patrons, who use it for many reasons like searching for job or researching a diagnosis from a doctor.

"I think what a library does now, is so much more than what a lot of people might think of as a library, if they haven't been in the library for a long time," said Lipp. "We still do the traditional services that people

would come to think of, when they come to the library, but really we're evolving and shifting to the answer to what people need in any point of transition.

"When somebody moves to a new community, whether they're new to Canada or new to a neighbourhood, very often their local library branch is the first place they stop. When somebody is a new parent, and they're at home with a new baby and they want to come out and be part of a community and see some grown-ups for a change and bring their child to story time. That's as much for the baby as it is for the parent."

Although the Caledon Public Library receives 97 per cent of their budget from the Town, they do receive an annual public library operating grant from the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport. She heard that it is safe for now and they will continue to receive it.

"While we are not ungrateful for that, that funding has not changed in over 20 years," said Lipp. "The purchasing power of what we receive, which is \$58,171, in 2019 versus what we received at the end of the 90s, has

significantly weakened."

Further, she is more concerned that the Town will be downloading provincial expenses to municipalities, which in turn will have implications on how the library receives their money to operation.

"With various cuts and changes to legislation across so many sectors that has implications for downloading to the municipality and therefore there is simply less funds to go around at that level," said Lipp.

"the size of the pie is not getting any bigger, but the way it is divided up has certainly changed over time."

She said there has been a lot of media awareness raised and discussions across a number of other libraries.

"We are supportive of SOLS and are very appreciative of the work that SOLS has done in supporting libraries, and I think they've allowed us to be as efficient as we could be and they've always allowed us to deliver the best service we could, and I think we're just disappointed that we're not going to be able to always get what we could for patrons, in the way that we had previously," said Lipp.

# Jack Ride for mental health scheduled for Caledon

About 1000 participants in 85 teams will peddle their way through Caledon for the 10th annual Jack Ride on Saturday, May 25th.

Individuals in the Jack Ride, known as Canada's Ride for Youth Mental Health, have raised \$819,779.97 as of press time with a goal of \$1,000,000.00. They've achieved 82 per cent of their goal from 5031 donors.

"Jack Ride is our biggest fundraiser to help empower our programs across the country," said Jesse Hayman, director of development and communication of Jack.org. "This is a big year, since we are going into our 10th Jack Ride, and we shot for an extremely ambitious goal of having 1,000 riders raise \$1 million, which is the most the Jack Ride will have ever raised. Within about one month, we sold out, with 1,000 riders, which is the most we ever had and we're well on track to \$1 million raised with about \$800,000 currently raised, with two weeks left to go."

Top donors were an anonymous contributor with \$32,500, The McFarlane Family Foundation with \$20,000 and ARON Industries with \$10,010.00.

Top teams were Soul Pedaler with \$58,707.10, Team BMO with \$49,783.75 and Team Jack with \$44,876.10.

Top Fundraisers were Michael Fitzhenry with \$39,530, Eric Windeler with \$36,692.00 and Dale Leeper with \$15,603.00

"Jack.org is the only Canadian charity that trains and empowers young leaders to revolutionize mental health, which essentially means trying to create a country, where young people are comfortable talking about their mental health and understand how to recognize it if it's them or their friends struggling and have access to the support they deserve, as they need it," said Hayman.

Funds from fundraiser are directed to the four programs at the organization, Jack Talks, Jack Chapters, Jack Summits and Be There. They plan to eradicate suicide and bring awareness to mental health.

"The leading cause of death for young people is suicide, which is quite frankly completely unacceptable," said Hayman. "Young people aren't getting the help they need, when they need it, and we need to treat mental health like a right, and not a privilege. Right now, it is a privilege and it takes a significant amount of time, up to a year for some, depending where you are in Canada, to get professional help, when you need it."

"A lot of young people are only getting help, when they're in absolute crisis and

then, by that point, we're reaching people too late," said Hayman. "We're doing what we can, at Jack.org, to ensure that young leaders have the tools to break down barriers in their communities to get involved and ensure our young people get the support

they need, so we can try to break down barriers and decrease youth suicide in Canada because it is too high, alarming and it is a crisis and we need to recognize as that."

Jack Talks is aimed at training young lead-

ers. They go through 50 hours of training to become Jack Talks speakers and then go to different high schools and universities to deliver 15-minute mental health presentations to help people understand mental health and start a conversation to reach out to those struggling with mental health issues.

"We'll deliver about 400 Jack Talks throughout Canada, reaching out to over 80,000 people in the audience," said Hayman. "Those are always delivered by two young speakers. That starts the conversation."

The second program is Jack's Chapters. They go through a significant training and it's less about public speaking and more so how to identify barriers with the community and how to break those barriers.

"Once they build a plan to break those barriers down, we'll work with them and make sure they're attacking the barriers they're hoping to see diminished and then they'll work year-round to run initiatives to break those barriers," said Hayman. "We have about 210-chapter programs across the country, in every province and territory."

The third program is Jack Summits, that was derived from the national summit. They brought 257 leaders from every province and territory to Toronto, where they learned from each other and from people within this space who are solving problems in creative ways.

"They also collaborate on what they can do better, across the country and also how they can work better in their local markets, so they can have a greater impact," said Hayman. "We have 29 regional summits across the country that are run by young people, bringing people together within their regions. A typical summit will see one high school bring together all the high schools within the region that are doing work in mental health to talk to each other and learn from each other, for people in this space."

Underpinning it all is a new program at the organization that launched on May 6 called, Be There. It can be accessed at [www.jack.org](http://www.jack.org) or at [www.bethere.org](http://www.bethere.org).

"Essentially, it's a platform and resource for people to learn how to support people in their lives that are struggling with their mental health," said Hayman. "We created it because we realized all these conversations is happening around mental health, within

North America, in a really significant way, but people are waiting a significant time for the help they need professionally. Their friends or family or not educated on how to, Be There, for them and there wasn't a resource to find that education. We created it."

Riders will depart from Caledon Ski Club, at 17431 Mississauga Rd, just outside Bel-fountain, between 8 to 9:30 a.m. and make their way around town, sharing the road with vehicle drivers, until the event ends at about 1 to 2 p.m. Main roads include Mississauga Road (between King and Cataract Road, Main Street (from Queen Street to Orangeville-Caledon Townline) and Winston Churchill Boulevard (between Orangeville-Caledon Town Line and Olde Base Line Road) among many others.

There will be a road closure on Mississauga Road between Forks of the Credit Road and Cataract Road.

There will be four routes. The Jack 25, which is suitable for families and new riders. It features a hilly terrain, but is manageable for new and young riders. It will take about 1 to 2 and a half hours depending on individual pace.

The Jack 50. This is a reasonable chal-

lenge for youth, families and inexperienced riders. It has some hilly terrain. It will take about two to four hours depending on individual pace.

The Jack 100 is for experienced riders. It is good for several pace groups. It has hilly terrain but is a good challenge for experienced riders. The route goes through the Badlands. It will take about four to six hours depending on individual pace.

The Big Jack is a 125-kilometre trek. This journey is for serious and experienced riders. It features a challenging pace and hilly terrain. The route goes through the Badlands and it will take about four to six hours to complete.

"It's very much a community ride," said Hayman. "We call it Canada's Ride for youth and mental health with 1,000 riders coming together at the Caledon Ski Club and every rider is either doing 25 kilometres, 50 kilometres, 100 kilometres or 125-kilometre rides. It's a great day in that it's not a race, so the atmosphere is very community friendly and we'll just get together for a good cause and have some fun."

# D-C is 'a riding we can win,' said likely Green candidate

While he has yet to be officially approved as the Green Party candidate in Dufferin-Caledon, local entrepreneur Stefan Wiesen is harbouring lofty ambitions ahead of the fall

federal election.

The Green Party is hoping to ride a wave of momentum into this year's election. In the early hours of Monday (May 6), it was revealed that Paul Manly had secured the party's second Commons seat in a Nanaimo-Ladysmith byelection in British Columbia. Watching those results filter through from his home just outside Orangeville, Mr. Wiesen started to dream about what could happen in Dufferin-Caledon.

"I believe this is a riding we can win. I firmly believe we can take this thing home," Mr. Wiesen said. "I have a feeling that this is a good combination of right time, right policies and, maybe the people are starting to change a little bit with their thinking patterns. When you think about what the Green Party stands for, and what it offers to voters, we are a natural fit."

Mr. Wiesen is thus far the only candidate to step forward for the Green Party in the local riding. He is expected to be confirmed as the official candidate at the Dufferin-Caledon Green Party AGM and nomination meeting on May 29.

It is sure to be an interesting campaign locally. For the first time in 15 years, Dufferin-Caledon is guaranteed to have a different

representative in Ottawa following the vote, with incumbent David Tilson revealing late last year that he plans to retire at the conclu-

sion of the current term.

## Green candidate would like to serve as Minister of Foreign Affairs if elected

While the Dufferin-Caledon Conservative Association sought to get a head start on campaigning, holding a nomination vote of their own back on March 19, the Party's National Council has upheld a decision by the National Candidate Selection Committee disqualifying the winner, Harzadan Singh Khattra, over concerns that he or his team had broken Party rules when registering new members.

Mr. Khattra was formally disqualified two weeks ago, yet no decision has been made regarding the party's next steps in Dufferin-Caledon. That, in Mr. Wiesen's mind, presents something of an opportunity to the other parties in the riding.

Asked how he intends to present the Green Party as a viable option to local voters ahead of the October vote, Mr. Wiesen said he will appeal to local residents' hearts and minds on the campaign trail.

"The issue people have, or have previously had, with voting for the Green Party, is that they consider it a wasted vote. In the polls, the Green Party candidates typically do quite well, yet, for some reason, when the vote comes around, not so much," Mr. Wiesen explained. "This has been a big problem for the Green Party for a long time, but I believe we have finally broken the curse. The Greens are electable on all levels, in all jurisdictions in this country."

Mr. Wiesen played an important role in the election of Mike Schreiner, who secured the Green Party of Ontario's first ever seat, representing the riding of Guelph, during last summer's provincial election. It was through meeting Mr. Schreiner that Stefan realized he was a Green at heart.

Born and raised in West Germany, Mr. Wiesen and his wife Pia emigrated to Canada in 1993. During his early years as a teenager and young adult, Stefan spent much of his free time volunteering on the executive of the Christian Democratic Union of Germany, a centre-right political party.

After moving to Canada, Mr. Wiesen, who admitted he has both liberal and conservative beliefs, spent time getting to know the different parties, and political players in the Great White North. After putting his political aspirations to one side for several years while he focused on building his own business, Intrigue Media, Stefan caught the bug again in 2015. Four years ago, he had the opportunity to shadow current Dufferin-Caledon MP Sylvia Jones for a day down at Queen's Park. While he enjoyed the experience, he didn't think too highly of the way the political game is played in this country.

"I realized pretty quickly that, for the established parties, members are simply a puppet on a piece of string. They only do what their leaders tell them to do, vote in ways their leader tells to vote," Mr. Wiesen said. "I was speaking to a friend of mine, who is involved in politics, and he told me out of every 10,000 votes on Parliament Hill, maybe one goes against the party line. That is incredibly frustrating for me."

After learning more about the Green Party, and how leader Elizabeth May promotes independent thinking on campaign issues among candidates, he decided to put his name forward to try to bring about "real change" in Dufferin-Caledon, and, on a greater scale, in Canada.

Stefan's dream job would be to serve as Minister of Foreign Affairs, meeting with representatives from other countries to

come up with "real solutions" for some of the environmental problems we're facing today. He believes the development of a geo-engineering program, the deliberate, large-scale intervention in Earth's natural systems to counteract climate change, should be a priority for Canada over the next few years.

Referencing some of the issues likely to come up during this year's election, Mr. Wiesen said he is against anti-gun legislation, noting that weapons such as sporting rifles have an important part to play in rural Canada, where hunters help to keep the deer population to manageable levels.

He would like to see a national movement towards embracing the "jobs of tomorrow", calling on the federal government to provide funding opportunities that will encourage people to study newer technologies and professions.

Mr. Wiesen criticized the Liberal government's carbon tax, stating that while the Party's intentions may have been good, the result has been anything but.

"What they have come out with is an idiotic tax. For most people in this riding, we are normal people. We have farmers here. Working people who commute. I assume most people don't drive around just because gas is cheap, they drive around because they have to drive around," Mr. Wiesen said. "What this Liberal government is doing is punishing people, but getting very little (benefit from doing so)."

While maintaining that Canada needs to do its part to reduce its carbon footprint – Mr. Wiesen offered something of an alternative to the carbon tax, that being government intervention in the free market.

He suggested that the Canadian government implement hefty taxes to encourage

businesses not to use cement when constructing new buildings.

"For every ton of cement, there are eight tons of carbon dioxide created. Out of driving cars, flying planes or heating homes, making cement is huge, a bigger (contributor) to emissions," Mr. Wiesen said. "If we were to tax cement like crazy, then we could perhaps use other, better materials, that right now are more expensive, to build our skyscrapers."

The material Mr. Wiesen would like to see used is cross laminated timber. The product, he says, is used quite frequently in countries like Norway, but currently cannot be used in parts of Canada – Ontario specifically – due to restrictions in the provincial building code prohibiting high-rise structures made out of wood. If elected, Stefan promised to put forward a private member's bill requesting a change to the National Building Code, which he says would override each province's individual building code.

Over the coming months, Mr. Wiesen promises to engage with the community and show them why a vote for Green won't be a wasted one.

"I feel people are disenfranchised with the mainstream parties. We have to try and connect with the undecided people, as well as those who are not traditionally Green, while supporting our base voters," Mr. Wiesen said. "I have to have a positive campaign, and I will have a positive campaign. I don't know yet who my opponents are, but I'm looking forward to having some good, honest debates along the way and seeing who has the better arguments."

## Town of Caledon launches traffic calming program

A traffic calming study has been developed by the Town of Caledon.

Dubbed 'Putting the Brakes on Speeding,' It will be used to help address issue of excessing speeding including cut-through traffic across the town and improvements to road safety for all users.

"Traffic calming is important when traffic volumes, vehicle speeds and or driver behavior are considered to be inappropriate for the type of adjacent land uses and the pedestrian, cyclist and other activities that occurs along their streets," states a Town release. "Traffic calming is important to ensure continued safety of all road users, motorist, cyclists and pedestrians. It is a method of

encouraging responsible driving and continued awareness of all road users

An interactive map was developed where users are able to either a 'green thumbs up' icon indicating where speed limits are working and a 'blue car' icon noting where people speed. They can then add comments and attach a photo for support. It can be accessed by visiting [www.caledon.ca/trafficcalming](http://www.caledon.ca/trafficcalming).

Troubling areas include downtown Bolton with 34 issues in the area. One user wrote, 'Way too fast moving north towards downtown. Needs 50kmh enforcement,' and another wrote 'Cars race up the hill going over 100.'

The area of Mayfield West and Southfields Village with 46 issues in the area. One user wrote, 'Dougall and Kennedy is awful - peo-

ple don't stop at the stop signs, don't wait for people to finish crossing at the crosswalk (school zone), and speed,' and another wrote, 'On Kennedy Road between Larson Peak and Dougall, there is an incredible amount of speeding at all times of the day. It is very dangerous and loud.'

Funds in the 2019 budget were specifically designated for traffic calming measures. A new staff co-ordinator was hired to deal with the number of requests to implement stop signs, crossing guards and other resources.

Council and Town staff receive a number of public complaints regarding traffic infiltration, volumes, collision frequency and excessive speeds. The Town will consider imple-

menting traffic calming measures.

The Town is seeking public input to understand the community's perspectives and current behaviours. They state the study and eventual strategy could be tailored to addressing the specific needs of Caledon residents.

Feedback will be summarized into a 'What we Heard' community engagement report that will be put together by the consultants and delivered to the Town. It will be available at the Town's website in September 2019.

Community feedback will continue to be sought until June 2019.





My family was here and so when I came back in 2015, I got licensed in Ontario and I'm also licensed in Michigan in the U.S. as well."

Before this, she received an undergraduate degree of Kinesiology in Health Sciences at York University.

One of the first changes she made was bring in a new walk-in clinic to the pharmacy. They use telemedicine, in partnership with Good Doctors Medical Clinics to help their clients.

"You'll have somebody on site who's going to take your vitals, do the assessment and ask you questions on what your ailments are," said Nasiri. "They'll collect and present it

to a physician who is on the screen. This physician is a licensed Ontario doctor. The neat thing about our set up is our person, who is taking the assessment, is an international medical graduate. He is a doctor by training and he knows what doctors will ask for ahead. If a prescription is required, it'll be the physician on screen who will write the prescription."

Good Doctors believes in providing health care to every Ontario where and when they need it through virtual care. This makes accessing health care more convenient, minimizes time spent traveling and provides better support for people living with chronic diseases, according to their website.

Doctors will be able to help those with a cough, runny nose, a sore throat or even pain when urinating, if they suspect they have a urinary tract infection.

"They can definitely help you or refill your prescriptions if you don't have time to see your doctor, but they do not do narcotics or controlled substances, like most walk-in clinics," said Nasiri.

"We decided to partner with Good Doctors mainly because the feedback we heard from a lot of the population, especially in our surrounding areas, is there are very long wait times," said Nasiri. "On average, our wait time is about 30 minutes to see the doctor in and out. It's very quick and very fast. We are open most days of the week.

The hours are similar to our own store hours."

Her team wanted to open walk in clinic but found it hard to bring a doctor to the town. They figured it would be a lot easier to have a doctor on screen.

"We thought what was the best we can deliver this service, to the people of Bolton, and it was to have this process, to partner up with Good Doctors," Nasiri said. "It's been quite a hit up north, with even less doctors out there, but there are locations in Mississauga, Etobicoke, closer to the GTA area."

Prior to working with Pharmasave, Nasiri admits that she worked for their competitors, part-time at multiple locations across the GTA. She would then work for an adjudicator insurance provider as a full-time job.

"I was a clinical pharmacist there, and I was in the special authorizations department," Nasiri said. "When people wanted high cost medication, or more premium cost drugs, I was the unfortunate person who had to say no you can't have it. That ate up at me inside because I got into pharmacy to help people and I had to be that person that said, 'sorry, you can't have this', when I knew deep down, people needed it."

She says she tries to use what she learned, with the adjudicator, to help her patients cover the cost of their medications. "In the Pharmasave world, adherence and compliance is really huge," said Nasiri. "One huge barrier though, is cost. Patients can't afford it. I try my best to find ways where they can try to get coverage. I educate my senior patients as well, because a lot of them don't know if you make less than a certain amount of money, you can

get your copayment and deductible waived. I print out the forms for them, so they can go about and try to get that."

She loves her staff at Pharmasave noting that they're very supportive. She tries to make it seem like they are a family at the store.

"My staff is very important to me," said Nasiri. "I try my best to treat them as well as I can. When I hire pharmacists, in case I can't be here, my staff and how they feel about that pharmacist is very important to me, because with happy staff, comes happy patients."

## New record for Headwaters

The Headwaters Health Care Foundation celebrated yet another monumental milestone last week, announcing a new record fundraising total through its 22nd annual hospital gala, held at Hockley Valley Resort on May 4.

Over the course of a single evening, the organization raked in a net total north of \$380,000 – money that will be used to help pay for much-needed equipment at our local hospital.

After engaging with various members of our community over the past week, it became clear to members of the Citizen's newsroom that there is a misconception amongst the general public, here in Dufferin County and, likely, the rest of Ontario, over who, exactly, is responsible for fronting the money for important pieces of medical infrastructure. Long story short, the answer is simple. We are.

Headwaters Health Care Centre President and CEO Stacey Daub said it best when, in a previous interview with the Citizen, she said the provincial government pays for the “bricks and mortar”, while the community covers the costs of necessary improvements and enhancements.

It has been this way for as long as we can remember.

Looking at the most recent financial report posted to the HHCC website, for the year between April 1, 2017 and March 31, 2018, our local hospital received just over \$48 million in funding from the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care. The bulk of that money, \$43 million in fact, went towards what was defined in the report as patient care, with the remaining \$5 million designated as one-time costs (\$3.5 million) and physician programs (\$1.6 million).

When looking deeper into the report, HHCC declares that it spent just under \$40 million on employee salaries and benefits in 2017/18. Meaning, after covering pay, HHCC had just \$8 million leftover in government funding to pay for programming, drugs and other day-to-day supplies.

It is easy to see then why there is often nothing leftover in the hospital's annual budget to pay for various enhancements, needed or wanted, at the facility. The provincial government simply does not provide enough money to allow our hospitals to keep up with equipment and technology advances.


This is where the Headwaters Health Care Foundation steps in. As the main fundraising arm of the hospital, the Foundation's sole purpose is to raise money year after year to help pay for some of the upgrades hospital staff deem as necessary to continue allowing them to do what they do on a daily basis. Last year, the Foundation managed to raise more than \$2 million, which allowed the hospital to purchase a slew of new state-of-the-art beds, a fetal monitor and a specialized bassinet for the hospital's Labour and Delivery Unit. In years gone by, the gala has helped pay for upgrades to the facility's IT department, new vital sign monitors, specialized stretchers, new defibrillators and an electrosurgical unit.

The Foundation is, once again, on course to donate more than \$2 million to the hospital this fiscal year.

While the Foundation has done a phenomenal job in recent years rallying support for the facility, there is a lingering question over how long we can continue to rely on those with deep pockets within our community to carry on subsidizing our hospital. Is this something the Government of Ontario, rather than individual community's across the province, should be on the hook for? We believe so.

Alas, with Ontario currently carrying a debt load in the region of \$350 billion we are realistic enough to know that such a scenario, at least in the short-term, is never likely to happen.

So, to our community, and, indeed, the people over at Headwaters Health Care Foundation, we say ‘keep up the good work’. Your contributions to improving our local hospital will likely be needed, and relied upon, for years to come.



## Holding hands instead of clenching fists

It's disheartening that in this current age of instant enlightenment, messages and facts are still somewhat skewed.

We're constantly bombarded by news clips and snippets, claiming the Province is heading into the abyss, slicing and dicing our social fabric. We hear about union unrest, outcries from teachers and students, and health practitioners warning of the end to health care as we know it.

Who's telling the truth, and who's tailoring the facts to suit their needs?

I've been at the journalism game for more than 30 years, so I've picked up a few things along the way. Some may help clear the air, others may keep things murky, but here you go.

In my opinion, any government in power has good intentions. In our democracy, it does no good to step into power and unplug the life support to our amazing system that boasts high standards in health care and education. Our premier and MPPs are not evil – they got into politics with the same intentions as all others – to do good and make a difference.

I firmly believe that.

Another fact is that politicians and ministers surround themselves with experts – intelligent professionals who know how to get things done.

These scientists, medical experts, educators, engineers, architects, legal experts and number crunchers all have an area of expertise, and can give sound advice and recommendations.

So when the government says they're cutting back here, giving there, and creating new funding way over there, it's not done out of malice or retribution.

It's often done out of necessity, and of course, sometimes to give into public opinion.

The citizens of Ontario overwhelmingly elected this PC provincial government on its declared mandate, plans, projects and promises. Nothing that's been done in recent months should come as a surprise to anyone who was paying attention.

Over the past few decades, our bureaucracy has grown exponentially, to the point where it's quite unmanageable. It is a tangled web that we've woven to create a very expensive system that caters to almost every need and desire. We can't keep writing blank cheques for every social issue, every sad case, every citizen's wants. It's too expensive.

Just 10 years ago, regional budgets of \$1 billion were unheard of. I watched as municipalities and regional governments grew, but I never in a million years thought budgets would top \$1 billion. Even 20 years ago, membership in the “century club” as it was known (civil servants earning \$100K a year), was in the hundreds. Today it's in the tens of thousands. The PCs have noted that almost half of the annual provincial budget consists of salaries!

With that unfathomable burden, how are we supposed to get anything done with what's left over? How are we to build roads, hospitals, fund education and keep our water clean when we are at the mercy of teachers' unions, iron clad contracts, legislated pay increases and indexed pensions?

There's no question, and they will all agree, that most of our civil servants (teachers included) have the sweetest deal on the planet.

Poland just went through some turmoil over teachers' salaries. Teachers' average net monthly earnings range between 1,800 zlotys and 3,000 zlotys (\$470 to \$780.)

They get some additional pay for being in charge of a specific class.

Data released by the OECD reveals that Canadian teachers are the third highest paid in the world, next only to Germany and Luxembourg.

Full day learning (or free babysitting as I like to call it) was brought in by the Wynne Liberals only a decade ago. This costs us \$1 billion annually for a vote-getting, social service. It decimated the private day care industry. I can tell you dozens other things I'd rather see this money go to each and every year. Maybe building a few hospitals; fixing the Gardiner; extending the subway to the North Pole!

King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce said something recently that caught my attention.

In reference to the battle over the carbon tax, Lecce said the feds prefer to “pick a fight instead of picking up a shovel.” And there's the crux of the matter.

Opposition politicians are just that – they oppose everything the government does, whether or not it's valid or makes sense. Unions are often at odds with any mention of government cutbacks or savings. Every social service organization cries foul when the government hints at clawbacks. It seems that people prefer to fight, rather than take a seat at the table and hash things out.

Most of us know there's give and take in our relationships, in our home lives and with our children. It continues at our jobs. Cordiality works when expecting good service at a restaurant and we all know full well that being amenable is far better than being confrontational.

So what gives, people?

Is it that we all have vested interests and all we care about is our bread being properly buttered? Are we always looking out for number one, and damn the rest of them?

Governments routinely announce new funding prior to elections, to buy votes. And we eat it up. An increase in the child tax credit? Whoopee! Where's the money coming from? Our own pay cheques! Boo!

Most of us also have a pretty good handle on our household expenses and since we've just done our income taxes, we're quite familiar with some of the realities. We know exactly what we need to pay our mortgage, grocery bills, cable and Internet, gas, and kids' stuff.

If our children threatened to strike, demanding double the allowance, what do we tell them? If our Internet provider doubled its rates, what would we do? If the price of celery rises to \$6 do we simply absorb it?

## Spring 2019 Reports of the Auditor General of Canada

On May 07, 2019, the Auditor General tabled his Spring 2019 Reports, which reviewed call centre performance, the processing of asylum claims, the taxation of e-commerce, oversight of government advertising, and the sufficiency of equipment and training for the RCMP. His reports confirmed a number of serious issues, which highlight Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's incompetence, poor judgement, and that he lacks a plan to fix them or the leadership required. The Auditor General's audit of the call centres found that half of 16 million callers could not speak to an agent at Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) or for Employment Insurance, the Canada Pension Plan (CPP), or Old Age Security (OAS). Seven million callers were redirected to an automated system or to a website or were disconnected. Another million callers hung up. The situation is unlikely to improve in the near future, given that a five-year modernization project has resulted in upgrades to only eight of the government's 221 call centres. It's unacceptable that it takes, on average, 32 minutes to reach an agent at IRCC. The Prime Minister needs to outline a clear plan to address the many concerns laid out in the Auditor General's report and provide the accessible and timely service Canadians expect and deserve. The audit of asylum claims found that Canada's refugee system has been unable to adjust to spikes in volume. Claims are not being processed within the two-month target set by the government and backlogs and wait times are worse now than when the system was reformed in 2012. It's clear that Prime Minister Trudeau has no plan to address the problems he has created at our border. This is costing Canadians over a billion dollars and counting and there is a human cost to this incompetence. We have increasing backlogs and delays that stretch across the entire immigration system, particularly for those fleeing violence and persecution. The Prime Minister has spent the last three years demonizing and personally attacking Canadians for raising these concerns. This divisive approach ignores the problems that need to be fixed. We, the Conservative Official Opposition, in stark contrast, have a plan to ensure Canada's immigration system is safe, orderly, and compassionate. The audit of e-commerce found that the Canadian sales tax system had not kept pace with the rapidly evolving digital marketplace and that the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) and the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) had not done enough work to ensure that all sales taxes are collected and remitted to the government. It's most unfortunate Prime Minister Trudeau has targeted small businesses in Canada when he should begin addressing the realities of

foreign e-commerce and its tax consequences. The audit focusing on the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) found that officers did not always have access to the hard-body armour and carbines they need to protect themselves and the public. The audit also showed that a lack of planning around the addition of the carbine to the RCMP's inventory had impacted the maintenance of these semi-automatic rifles and the annual retraining of officers. This report showed that under the Trudeau government's leadership, the RCMP is not meeting the support and maintenance requirements of adding new firearms to the RCMP. Additionally, the Office of the Auditor General found that many RCMP officers lack access to the hard body armour that could save their lives in the most dangerous encounters they face. It's clear that the Liberals failed to address the problems that occurred with the roll-out of new equipment for the RCMP. We, the Official Opposition, believe that our frontline officers should have the tools they need to keep us safe. We're pleased the RCMP is working diligently to address this issue. The audit of the mechanism the government has put in place to prevent taxpayer dollars from being used for partisan advertising found that there was

little documentation to show that reviews had been conducted

with sufficient rigour to address the risk of partisanship.

The accused was held in custody for a bail hearing, and will appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Orangeville on May 10, 2019 to answer to the charges.

## Headwaters Health Care Foundation Gala raises \$380,000 for local hospital

An air of French culture drifted through the ballroom at the annual Headwaters Health Care Foundation Gala held at the Hockley Valley Resort last Saturday (May 4) evening.

The theme was Spring Time in Paris and many guests donned appropriate continental attire, which added a flare of fashion and frivolity to the event.

The Gala is the Foundation's largest fundraiser of the year.

Many people do not realize that capital equipment for Ontario hospitals is not provided through government funding, but is supplied through the fundraising efforts of the local hospital foundations and generous donors.

"The Gala is our premier fundraiser in terms of raising money for priority equipment at the hospital, both new and replacement equipment," explained Foundation executive director, Dora Boylen-Pabst. "We have four events each year. This is our largest by far in terms of size and revenue. We have a 'field hospital' here tonight. Those are smaller pieces of equipment usually under \$3,500, that are needed across the hospital. We have a live auction tonight with a goal of \$150,000 for larger scale pieces including five new beds, bassinets, and telemetry systems which are critical for heart patients. This is part of our annual effort to raise over \$2 million for priority equipment at the hospital."

Around 400 guests attended the gala. The event was sold out early this year.

"The \$2 million is the Foundation's goal for equipment specifically," Ms. Boylen-Pabst explained. "We also have other fundraising efforts we are working on. We as a foundation are hoping to raise over \$3,500,000. This year there are a couple of special projects. The largest is a complete lobby redesign and refresh to introduce a better registration process for patients and their families and improve the flow of the hospital."

The Gala takes a year to plan with committee members putting their efforts into next year's function soon after this year's event is over.

"We've heard several themes over the years," explained Sarah Mailhot, Foundation board and Gala Committee member. "We've had the Kentucky Derby and Hollywood – that was last year. We had the Roaring 20's because we celebrated 20 years of the Gala. In the end, the job is to raise money for the

hospital. The different departments of the hospital will submit a list of the most urgent needs that they have. The hospital services a lot of people and a lot of needs. The Gala raises a lot of money and I love seeing our community be generous. No one has to give, but this brings out the best in people."

At the Field Hospital display, nurse Denise Erskine, who works in the administrative side of nursing at the hospital, showed visitors some of the equipment the hospital needs to purchase. The display featured bassinets for babies, and different tables and units that are specifically designed for hospital use.

Because the need is for specialty items designed to be used in a hospital setting, they are expensive.

"They need to hold the equipment properly. They need to be cleaned properly after use due to blood exposure," Ms. Erskine explained. "These are specifically designed for health care."

Ms. Erskine pointed out features that are specific to a hospital setting and showed how even a bassinet is uniquely designed for a specific function.

"Even something like this bassinet – the only way babies are allowed to be moved through the hospital is if they are in one of these. It's a safety precaution. It has to be able to roll properly. The shape and design are important. The type of plastic has to be able to be wiped regularly with bleach. A lot of products can't hold up to the level of sterility and cleanliness that is hospital grade clean."

Ms. Erskine pointed out that hospital's never use real wood-based products as the porous material would allow germs and bacteria to collect.

The Gala is an opportunity for guests to help support their local hospital but at the same time it's a fun event that many people look forward to every year.

Chair of the Gala Committee, Jenn Conroy, said the Committee works hard to make sure people enjoy the evening and want to come back every year.

"We love it because our guests embrace the theme and they always want to know what we are doing this year," Ms. Conroy explained. "This year we decided to do something fun and flirty and we came up with Spring Time in Paris. We started planning in September. It takes a big committee. There's 16 of us. At our auction and silent auction everything is donated."

## Kay MacGregor, at 90, continues to be an inspiration

Do you know who came to my party?" Kay MacGregor asked rhetorically, speaking of her recently celebrated 90th birthday. "It was Brian Hall. He was in the first show at Theatre Orangeville and he stayed with me during that show. Every year at Christmas they [he and his wife] send me a hand made Christmas card. He writes, 'You made my stay in Orangeville a home away from home.'"

It was 1997. "Well," she recounted, "I had that house on Broadway. I remember someone called me from the theatre - I think it was Pam Claridge - and asked if I could billet some of the actors in my house [during the theatre's season] and I said sure and I think that's how I got involved with volunteering."

"I was an usher to start with, when we used to actually usher people to their seats. Linda Addy was house manager at the time. When she left, they asked me if I was interested in the job. I still had my drapery business; I didn't retire until I was 72, when I moved out here [to her present home] 20 years ago."

"That time, there weren't many people around at the beginning, working for the theatre. I used to look after the wardrobe too, which was mostly what people had given us. I sorted them out. I wasn't the ward-

robe mistress, I just tidied them up.

"At that time, I was also the volunteer coordinator. I loved that job."

She told us why and how she thought the job should be done: "So, I phoned everybody and I spoke to them and I got to know them and chat to them each time. I knew about their kids and their lives."

"I used to run a tight ship; it's the only way to run a place well; it's the only way to keep things going. It's maybe the way I survived. It [the volunteers] was run well. There were the right number of ushers and they had to be there by 7pm. If one was late, I would say so, very gently. And they had to wear just black. When someone showed up with a black and white shirt, I said, 'Well, you can wear that tonight since you're here but, next time, it's just black. But I said it with a smile. If you're going to criticize someone, do it with it with a smile.'"

Ms MacGregor had her own spin on the main stage of Theatre Orangeville. "I was in a play, David [Nairn] cast me as a grandmother in one of the Christmas stories. It was a one liner."

"Then, a very important man came into the town and he won a 'walk on'. He ended up to be the show I was in [for one performance]. I was still on stage but I had to keep my mouth shut and he got my line."

Humorously, she continued, "Mind you,

he paid big money for it at the live auction at the Victorian Christmas Gala. The kids thought it was terrible that they took Grandma's one line and one little boy came and gave his box of chocolates to make up for it."

She joked, "I guess I wasn't that hot because he never asked me to do it again."

We chatted about her tremendous birthday party at the Mill Croft in Alton, "There were people coming to my birthday hadn't seen each other for 40 years. I think about 100 people came. So, it was wonderful to see everybody. The sad part was I couldn't sit and chat and reminisce with anybody but it was great. Beforehand, I had people calling me to say hi and how are you."

As to how many people have stayed with her over the 25 theatre seasons, she counted, "Nearly every show. They come and use the spare bedroom; they bring their own food and they always do clean up after themselves. I keep my kitchen spotless and I've never had anybody that I've had to say, can you put your stuff away."

She admits freely, "I just loved the company. It works out well and it's fun."

"I love the theatre," said she, "It's been my life, my life has been really wrapped around the theatre and the people in it. It's helped me get to my 90th birthday; kept me young at heart. At my birthday, David made a little

speech and he said, 'We've shared a lot of things and things we can't talk about.'" And she laughed at him for it.

We had the chance to speak to David Nairn about Kay MacGregor and he was all appreciation. "She basically trained and developed a whole generation of house managers. She had strong opinions about things should be done and, as a result, things were done with professionalism and the way she inspires excellence."


"I've learned a lot from her about how to welcome people into the theatre. We've had some crazy nights in the theatre. When the public is involved, anything can happen."

"She's a force of nature and an inspiration; she's always been like that. Her mental agility and opinions."

He related, "She had a fall and broke her hip. She was in recovery and she rediscovered her joy in her painting." He recalled, "She was sitting in her chair painting - the vibrancy and the colours - she brought such joie de vive and colour and passion. She was at the Lord Dufferin. It was not long after that she and her daughter-in-law, Karen, were at the Alton Mill."

Said Kay MacGregor of her life within the theatre, "It's meant a lot to me - I've enjoyed everybody and everything."

The Region of Peel's Garbage Exemption Periods have changed. The new dates for 2019 and early 2020 are:

- OLD DATES NEW DATES**  
 May 2019 (two weeks following Victoria Day holiday) June 17-28, 2019  
 September 2019 (two weeks following Labour Day holiday) September 16-27, 2019  
 December 2019 (Christmas/New Year) January 27-31, 2020 February 3-7, 2020  
 Check your downloadable waste collection calendar <<http://www.peelregion.ca/waste-scripts/when-does-it-go/default.asp>> at peelregion.ca/waste to find out your NEW garbage exemption dates.

During an exemption period there is no maximum amount of acceptable <<http://www.peelregion.ca/waste/garbage#garbage-acceptable-items>> (check the website for a full list) garbage you can put on the curb. Garbage bag tags are not required during exemption periods.

- Each excess garbage bag cannot:
- Weigh more than 20 kg (44 lbs).
  - Be larger than 66 cm (26 in) wide and 90 cm (35 in) high.

Place your extra garbage out on your garbage collection day, not on your recycling collection day. Put your excess garbage close to but not on top of your garbage bins, leaving at least 1 m (3 ft.) of clear space between your extra garbage item(s) and your bins.




