

The Christmas in the Village will also be lighting up downtown Bolton by hosting their tree lighting ceremony.

## King-Vaughan MP Deb Schulte named Minister of Seniors

Local seniors may have found themselves have a stronger ally.

King-Vaughan MP Deb Schulte was welcomed into Cabinet by Prime Minister Trudeau last week, as Minister of Seniors.

Schulte said she's both honoured and privileged to serve in this capacity. She did work on seniors' issues in the early years of the previous government so she's no stranger to issues facing our seniors.

Her duties won't detract from her connection with the King-Vaughan community and she'll continue to work for her constituents. The riding, she said, "is where the rubber hits the road."

She's looking forward to getting feedback from seniors and stakeholders in the region as she moves forward in her ministry.

The post is under the larger umbrella of Employment and Social Development Canada, which also includes Employment, Workforce Development and Disability Inclusion Minister Carla Qualtrough; Families, Children and Social Development Minister Ahmed Hussen and Labour Minister Filomena Tassi.

While the mandate letters have yet to be issued, the Minister of Seniors typically deals with the needs of Canadian seniors and ensure that programs and services are developed that respond to Canada's aging population. Priorities have traditionally in-

cluded work on seniors programming, including the New Horizons for Seniors Program and benefiting from the work of the National Seniors Council.

In conjunction with the ministers of Finance and Families, Children and Social Development the seniors' minister brings forward options to improve financial security for Canada's seniors and those most in need.

This should include a particular focus on our commitments to index Old Age Security and Guaranteed Income Supplement payments to a new Seniors Price Index, and work with provinces and territories to ensure adequate and coordinated support programs to address seniors' poverty.

It has also included supporting the implementation of national pharmacare.

Schulte's appointment drew praise all around from her colleagues in King.

"Deb has always shows great compassion and is extremely well suited for this is very important portfolio," said King Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "King has an aging demographic and to have the Minister of Seniors as our Member of Parliament will ensure a great quality of life in King."

Vaughan Mayor Maurizio Bevilacqua echoed those sentiments:

"I am confident she will continue to serve the citizens of King-Vaughan and Canada with the same passion, commitment and dedication she has demonstrated throughout her public life."

## Toronto-born author coming to Caledon to discuss new war book

Toronto born Ted Barris found his love for history while in grade school, after writing a paper on the War of 1812.

Barris began his writing career 50 years ago. He started out as a journalist and broadcaster, freelancing for news corporations such as CBC, CTV, The Globe and Mail, The National Post, to name a few, before, eventually, finding his niche as an author. As of today, he has written and published 19 historical novels.

"I'm one of those people who can't keep a steady job. I'm everywhere and all over the place. The term used to be freelancer, today it's precarious work," says Barris. "I've been fortunate because there's always been plenty of work."

His interest for historical writing began when he was in fifth grade and was assigned to write a research paper on the War of 1812. With the inspiration from his teacher, his journey back in time got underway.

"I was fascinated with history probably because of a grade five teacher who turned me onto the subject and made it come to life," explains Barris. "I realized there was

lots more there than dates and facts and horrible textbooks. So, I decided to write some of my own."

Barris began researching, interviewing and writing his first book, 'First Canoe: Prairie Steamboat Days Revisited', which would be published in 1977. The book became a huge hit, especially in western Canada.

According to Barris' website, he "gained additional attention when the federal government decided to recognize western Canada steamers with a series of commemorative postage stamps."

While continuing his freelance work, Barris went on to write more historical books on various different parts of history; not just focusing on the military. Some of these include Rodeo Cowboys, The Last Heroes, Playing Overtime, A Celebration of Oldtimers' Hockey, Carved in Granite, 125 Years of Granite Club History.

He also completed several military pieces, including Deadlock in Korea, Canadians at War 1950-1953 and Breaking the Silence: Veterans' Untold Stories from the Great War of Afghanistan, just to name a few.

Barris has received several book awards and civic accomplishments for his work

including the Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee Medal in 2012, and the Minister of Veterans Affairs for Canada awarded Barris the commendation, which is an award presented to those who have contributed to the well-being of veterans, or who have dedicated themselves to helping the remembrance to those who have fought in armed conflict in the Canadian Armed Forces.

Ted Barris will be coming to Caledon on Dec 3 to speak to the community about his latest book, Rush to Danger which is written about the men and women medics in the military dating back to the first Civil War in 1862, all the way to the wars in Afghanistan.

"I can remember this book began almost exactly 56 years ago, when I was 14. My dad was at that time doing some freelance work and working at home, I was laid up after an accident and he was sort of amusing me with stories, as he often did, and I asked him 'what did you do in the war?' and he told me that he was a medic," explains Barris. "And a lot of people would be familiar with the name Alex Barris. He was a very well known newspaper writer, television host, broadcaster, journalist, author – he wrote 10 books himself. Dad was born in the United States, so

his experience in the Second World War was as a medic in the American army."

Barris's father told him all of the funny stuff he remembered from his time in the war, not ready to explain the harsh realities to 14-year-old Ted.

"My dad's story is a powerful one, but it's not the whole book. It's kind of like the spine to the book. I come back to his story at the beginning at each of the 10 chapters, but the majority of the book is an exploration of what it's like or has been like for nurses and surgeons, stretch bearers, ambulance drivers, military dentists, orderlies; all the military medical jobs, that you never see or hear about."

He added, "I go all the way to the present time, to men and women who are medics, modern medics in the military serving in Afghanistan and Iraq, highlighting some of the extraordinary experiences they have had, saving lives in the back of Blackhawk helicopters that are medevacking their patients out."

## Beckie and Lisa set the stage with books for Theatre's 'Little Women'

Little Women is on stage at Theatre Orangeville (TOV) from this evening until December 22. We thought it would be interesting to go back stage. So, we had a conversation with Beckie Morris, Production Manager and Set Designer for Little Women and Lisa Lahue, Technical Director and set builder

extraordinaire.

"It begins very early by reading the script," Beckie Morris started. "What's essential. A lot of plays don't have details of what the playwright wants."

"This set," she told us, "is made to look like stacks of leather books. When Westminster church was renovating, there were a lot of windows and Lisa had the forethought to

pick up some of the windows; we purchased three sets of windows and were given three more. And we're using them for this set."

"It's very abstract in the sense that you're not looking at a home but the interior of the book. We took some of the text from the original book and we made it gold and then hung it in the windows."

Lisa Lahue added, "We will be keeping this one to see if it has a chance to be played elsewhere but we have no idea at the moment."

The challenges in making this set were offset by the fact that "this is the third time we've done really big books. We've kind of figured out the formula. The most difficult part is the clean construction," Ms Lahue explained, "The biggest thing is being able to cart them around."

Said Ms. Morris, "We built the story land, a permanent installation at the Mill Street Library."

"Matilda was the first book set we've done on stage," from Ms. Lahue, "but this is truly the most spectacular we've done on stage."

It comes down to: "what this show absolutely needs is three pianos: one for the Music Director [John Hughes, off stage] but two on the stage and a full-sized mantel fireplace, Ms. Morris gave the details, "Because of the complexity of the set, one piano is actually backed by the fire place – and it moves very beautifully."

Designing sets is almost a state of mind with Ms. Morris, "I might store a concept in my head that is nothing to do with the current project and then find a place for it at a later date."

"Imaging the set's like reading a book and imaging what that world looks like in your head and then you get to create that world which is pretty exciting. It's about working with a team, here with Lisa. You come in with a really strange idea and we start working with ideas and we've been able to realize just about anything."

What makes it so good at TOV, "is the people are good and that's really important. We're a small team. A lot of people in the grand scheme of the theatre world might see TOV as a small town theatre but it's not. We produce world class productions and the actors that come here perform everywhere. I have so much respect for the work they do here."

Said Ms. Lahue, "We have a great partnership in our vision in what we do here and we're actually challenging each other [in every way]."

They use plywood, fabric, Durabond.

"It's the kind of construction in theatre; we're hardly ever looking for material that we'll use for the purpose it's intended. To buy

it means you'll spend hours looking for things that will work with what you're doing and on budget."

"When we go into Home Hardware, to the lumber yard, although we're picking up plywood, they'll ask us what we're building and we'll say books," laughed Ms. Lahue., adding, "It has to be portable."

Ms Lahue has been with TOV for seven years.

"Books are great; you lay it on its side and it's one thing – books are endless imagination. They're a good fit for Little Women. I needed to create a space that catered to lots of locations by way we stack the books."

Simply put, "You have to serve the play, There's no point in putting something up there unless it ties in. Create what's needed. It's all down to the team and skill," said Beckie Morris, "If that talent isn't there, it can't be realized; but with this team, the magic is there, with the lighting and the costumes."

Lisa Lahue added, "When you walk into the world of Little Women- the form piece is so close to the front of the stage that a person could touch it."

Reflecting on the theme, Ms. Morris commented, "We did a show, The Gentleman's Clothier, some year ago. All the walls were mahogany. I drew all the details for the design – some of it was hand milled; it was painted for the right look. We transformed this common building material you might find in your basement in to a magical world."

She said, "Nothing is as it seems."

"Because I read this book growing up and I think we've done it absolute justice; we've set it in a place; it's all very neutral so the audience will also imagine."

Ms Lahue told us, "You read a book and you imagine where they are – Beckie allows you to continue to imagine."

## Local animal rescue group creates shelters for stray animals over winter

As the weather proceeds to get colder, the small animals on the street are in danger of freezing, getting very ill, or worse, not surviving the winter. That's where Donate A Paw is lending their hand to help these animals.

Megan Chiodi began Donate A Paw this past January. With an extensive history in animal care herself, she took it upon herself to open up her own rescue.

"We're a non-profit organization that rescues cats and small animals. Our first rescue was a bunny that was dumped in one of the Caledon trails," says Chiodi. "That was our first rescue. I have a lot of animal history myself, I work at a vet clinic, shelters, and I also went to school for it."

She added, "Once I built myself up I started rescuing more cats that were outdoors, surrenders, small animals that have been abandoned or neglected."

The rescue group is foster-based, meaning it works solely on a voluntary basis where people agree to take care of the animals until adoption. Supplies such as food and litter are donated to give to the fosters when they run out.

"I realized a lot of shelters and non-profit organizations they rely so much on dona-

tions. That's when I started saying that I want to help other people and help as much as I can for the animals because they can't speak for themselves," says Chiodi.

Donate a Paw has put together a Cat Shelter Project, which builds small shelters for residents to put around their homes for stray cats to seek warmth during the winter season. The non-profit organization is asking for donations of storage bins and other supplies to help build these shelters.

Chiodi's father, Piero Chiodi, ended up building all the cat shelters himself. The supplies needed for these shelters were graciously donated by several members of the community, who share the same sympathy and desire to help these stray cats try to keep warm.

These shelters can be placed on residential properties, workplaces, farms, basically wherever a stray cat may be around. People who want to help these cats can also provide a plastic water bowl and checking it twice a day to make sure it doesn't freeze and keeping it near the shelter, as well as dry kibble or heated up canned food to help give them those extra calories to keep them warm.







## Goodwill towards children is absolutely vital

As we enter the holiday season, we should talk the talk when it comes to extending goodwill toward others, especially children.

Most of us would agree there's nothing on this planet as beautiful as the wide-eyed wonderment of kids on Christmas. Priceless.

And yet these moments are limited to the western world, developed nations wealthy enough to celebrate the holidays in all of their splendor.

I am reminded of the lyrics from "We Are the World," recorded by United Support of Artists for Africa in 1985. It was written by the legendary Michael Jackson and Lionel Richie.

*"We are the world  
We are the children  
We are the ones who make a brighter day  
So, let's start giving  
There's a choice we're making  
We're saving our own lives  
It's true we'll make a better day  
Just you and me."*

This was a U.S. effort to aid in famine relief, following on the success of "Do They Know It's Christmas."

The success of this song generated millions for foreign aid and hopefully it reached the needy.

"Do They Know It's Christmas?" was written in 1984 by Bob Geldof and Midge Ure in reaction to the 1983-1985 famine in Ethiopia. It was first recorded in a single day by Band Aid, a supergroup put together by Geldof and Ure and consisting mainly of the biggest British and Irish musical acts at the time.

Again, we are all keenly aware of the holidays, but are they?

*"And there won't be snow in Afri-*

*ca this Christmas time  
The greatest gift they'll get this year is life*

*Where nothing ever grows  
No rain or rivers flow  
Do they know it's Christmas time at all?"*

According to a recent report, progress is still needed, even though the Convention on the Rights of the Child was adopted 30 years ago.

Many of the poorest children have yet to feel the impact, according to "The Convention on the Rights of the Child at a Crossroads" report.

"There have been impressive gains for children over the past three decades, as more and more are living longer, better and healthier lives. However, the odds continue to be stacked against the poorest and most vulnerable," said UNICEF executive director Henrietta Fore. "In addition to the persistent challenges of health, nutrition and education, children today have to contend with new threats like climate change, online abuse and cyberbullying. Only with innovation, new technologies, political will and increased resources will we help translate the vision of the Convention on the Rights of the Child into a reality for all children everywhere."

Citing progress in child rights over the past three decades, the report notes that the global under-five mortality rate has fallen by about 60 per cent and the proportion of primary-school-aged children not in school decreased from 18 per cent to 8 per cent.

The guiding principles of the CRC – non-discrimination; the best interests of the child; the right to life, survival and development; and the right to protection – have in-

## Editorial

### Needed: mediators, arbitrators

THERE ARE TIMES when collective bargaining doesn't work, because the two sides are so far apart there is no hope of them reaching a settlement without the assistance of a neutral third party.

As we see it, that's precisely the situation facing the Ontario government and the province's teachers.

This week, thousands of those teachers launched a job action in public elementary and secondary schools, as their unions try to apply pressure on the Progressive Conservative government amid tense contract negotiations that seem to be going nowhere.

The twin work-to-rule campaigns are not expected to have an impact inside the classroom, but parents and students will likely be drawn into the unions' ongoing dispute with the government with "information pickets" outside schools.

Their union says public elementary teachers are starting each day by meeting outside the main school entrance and walking in together, 15 minutes before the morning school bell.

The teachers are no longer participating in EQAO testing, won't take the government's new math proficiency test and won't attend meetings outside the school day.

Meanwhile, at public high schools, teachers are handing out flyers to parents explaining the job action and highlighting the government's policies on education, which teachers are rallying against.

Those educators are no longer attending "unpaid" after-school staff meetings, won't participate in professional development required by the Ministry of Education and have also stopped taking part in EQAO testing.

The work-to-rule campaign will also affect student report cards as teachers largely leave it up to administrators to fill out, only providing basic information such as grades and brief remarks on student performance.

Both the Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation (OSSTF) and the Elementary Teachers Federation of Ontario (ETFO) will meet with government negotiators at least twice this week, but the unions' leaders are signaling that talks aren't heading in the right direction.

As usual, neither side in the dispute is saying a lot about the issues beyond agreeing that they are far apart.

Education Minister Stephen Lecce says the government has been making concessions at the bargaining table especially on class sizes and e-learning. He rejects the notion that his government should carry any of the blame for contract talks going off the rails.

"That would be true if we didn't make moves, significant moves at the table," he told reporters Monday. "We've made those moves every single day, week over week and even the days we've introduced those measures have been the days that unions have opted to escalate."

The reasons behind the apparent deadlock between the two sides are readily apparent.

The Ford government appears determined to balance its annual budgets in its first four-year term, and by cutting its costs rather than raising more revenue through tax increases.

Health care and education being the two biggest expense areas, the government has opted to overhaul the health care system by scrapping Liberal-founded Local Health Integration Networks and replacing them with a single unit, Ontario Health, and 24 local Ontario Health Teams (OHTs), the first of which was announced this week as being in Mississauga.

On the education front, the government wants to save money through larger classes, fewer subject choices and more online learning, all of which would mean fewer teachers.

In the circumstances, we see no hope of any resolution at the bargaining table and an urgent need for the appointment of mediators who would eventually become arbitrators if they are unable to find a middle ground acceptable to the government and the unions.

Although a decision by the arbitrators to hold the line on class sizes and course options would represent a defeat for the Ford government, they would undoubtedly prefer it to be imposed rather than have them simply cave in to the unions. As for the unions, they undoubtedly would prefer a settlement achieved at the bargaining table but likely already see that as an impossibility,

fluenced numerous constitutions, laws, policies and practices globally.

However, the report notes this progress has not been even.

In low and middle-income countries, children from the poorest households are twice as likely to die from preventable causes before their fifth birthday than children from the richest households.

According to available data, only half of children from the poorest households in sub-Saharan Africa are vaccinated against measles, compared to 85 per cent of children from the richest households. Measles vaccination coverage has stagnated since 2010, contributing to a resurgence of the deadly disease in many countries. Almost 350,000 cases of measles were recorded in 2018, more than double the total in 2017.

Despite a decline in child marriage rates globally, the poorest girls in some countries are more at risk today than they were in 1989.

Poverty, discrimination and marginalization continue to leave millions of the most disadvantaged children at risk. Armed conflicts,

rising xenophobia and the global migration and refugee crisis all have a devastating impact on global progress.

Children are physically, physiologically and epidemiologically most at risk of the impacts of the climate crisis. Rapid changes in climate are spreading disease, increasing the intensity and frequency of extreme weather events, and creating food and water insecurity. Unless urgent action is taken, the worst for many children is yet to come.

I am a father. And I have been privileged to meet and interact with less fortunate children from Haiti and the Dominican Republic. Take it from me, the need is as great as it ever was. I was there to help and deliver aid, albeit for a short time. I would volunteer again in a heartbeat and take my entire family with me.

We are the world, and it's incumbent upon us to share the wealth. Give of yourself this holiday season!

# Hong Kong - a risky victory

The 'silent majority' in Hong Kong, who regime supporters hoped would show that they are fed up with the pro-democracy protests that have shaken the city in the past five months, turns out to be not only silent but non-existent.

Going into the district council elections on Sunday, a majority of the councils were controlled by pro-Beijing parties. By the time almost three million votes were counted Sunday night, 17 out of 18 councils were in the hands of pro-democracy councillors. It was a great victory – but Hong Kongers are still not going to get democracy.

The district councils don't make important decisions – they mostly deal with things like bus schedules and garbage collection – and for precisely that reason the Beijing regime lets them be genuinely democratic. This time, however, the council elections became a sort of referendum on whether Hong Kongers still support the protesters – and they clearly do.

At the higher levels of the administration, where more important decisions get made, democracy is notable by its absence. The Chief Executive – the head of the government – is chosen by a committee of 1,200 members of whom fewer than one-tenth are elected by popular vote, and

their choice must then be approved by the Communist regime in Beijing.

That is not going to change, because the Chinese government's highest priority is always to preserve the Communist monopoly of power, and it will not accept full democracy anywhere on its territory. Democracy in Hong Kong might set a dangerous example for people elsewhere in the vast country, so it cannot be allowed.

True, Hong Kong people enjoy rights that no other Chinese have, like freedom of speech and independent courts. This 'one country, two systems' arrangement is guaranteed for 50 years by the Sino-British Joint Declaration of 1997, when Britain handed its Hong Kong colony back to China, but that did not include a commitment to unbridled democracy.

The ensuing Basic Law that acts as Hong Kong's constitution does say that the "ultimate aim" is for the chief executive to be selected by universal suffrage, but any lawyer will tell you that an ultimate aim is something you can postpone forever.

A better guarantee is the fact that it is in the Beijing regime's interest to preserve the city as a place where foreign businesses are happy to set up because the rule of law prevails and the courts are independent. But it's still just a conditional

guarantee, because Beijing's highest priority is not business. It is control.


The protesters have been remarkably determined and successful. They have already managed to force Chief Executive Carrie Lam to drop her proposed law that would have allowed Hong Kong residents to be extradited and tried in Chinese courts. That would have ended the rule of law in the city, since Chinese courts do whatever the regime wants.

It was not Lam's idea in the first place, and she probably warned Beijing that it was a bad idea, but she is not a free agent. As she said at a private business meeting several months ago, she has to serve two masters (Beijing and the people of Hong Kong), and her room for manoeuvring is "very, very, very limited."

She also said "If I have a choice, the first thing is to quit, having made a deep apology," but she does not have a choice in that. Neither does she have a choice in which concessions to make to the protesters, but Beijing has already let her drop the extradition law, and these striking election results might now convince it to let her go a little further.

If she were to grant two more of the protesters' demands – an amnesty for all arrested protesters and an independent

inquiry into alleged police brutality – the protesters would be well advised to declare a victory and go home. And it would really be a victory, for the strength of their reaction should act as a deterrent to any push by Beijing for greater control over Hong Kong for years to come.

If they go on demanding free elections under universal suffrage for the Chief Executive and the Legislative Assembly, however, sooner or later Beijing will feel compelled to intervene and crush them regardless of the financial and reputational damage it would suffer.

Which way will it go? Impossible to say, but a major obstacle to a negotiated outcome is that the protesters have deliberately avoided having recognised leaders.

That's understandable, because any identifiable leaders would promptly be arrested. But it makes it very difficult for Lam to negotiate a deal, or for the students at the heart of the protests to guarantee that a deal would definitely end them.

So it could go the distance, and end in tragedy. That would be a great pity.

## Nothing 'Domestic' about domestic violence

November 25th was the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women. What follows is 16 days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence, ending on December 10th with World Human Rights Day. On December 6th, it's the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence against Women, in remembrance of the 14 young women brutally murdered at l'Ecole Polytechnique de Montreal – murdered simply because they were women. It is almost 2020 yet women remain relentlessly hunted, persecuted, brutalized, used and abused. Right here at home human trafficking is growing exponentially and just in the last 24 hours a video has gone viral of a man kicking a woman – in full view of neighbours. When will enough be enough? When will we ever acknowledge that there is nothing "domestic" about domestic violence and instead, call it for what it is, assault, assault with a weapon, rape and/or all of these plus murder. A systemic failure that allows women to be abused or murdered in their own homes and even out on the street, in full view of neighbours.

Did you know that over half of women in Canada report experiencing at least one act of physical or sexual violence? That violence against women knows no ethnic, cultural, monetary or educational boundaries? Any woman can be a victim, and the chances are that a woman you know and love has been or is now. Domestic violence affects your friend who is a teacher just as easily as your work colleague who may have just recently arrived in Canada from abroad. Young, old, persons with disabilities and the able-bodied, there is no one "profile" of a victim. It's about power and control and it affects us all. What can we all do to stem the tide of violence? We can start by being honest about it and, as Status of Women Canada points out; listening to AND believing victims, speaking out and adding your voice to the call for action, intervening by finding a safe way to do so when you witness acts of gender-based violence and by acting – lending your time, energy and input to organizations that are working to end violence against women.

There is a growing movement to have gender-based violence referred to in media reports as Femicide. This is defined as "the killing of a woman or girl, in particular by a man and on account of her gender."

On the other hand, domestic violence is defined as "violence or abuse by one person against another, in a domestic setting." Certainly this is a broad umbrella term that allows ALL forms of violence to be investigated but murder is murder and if a woman is murdered by her partner – perhaps referring to the act as Femicide will bring more attention to the issue and allow the full weight of the law to prevail and stronger punitive action to be taken. A must read article in MacLean's, written by Anne Kingston called "We are the Dead," notes that clarity of language is crucial to holding men accountable. In it, front line workers like Sophia Hladik "reject terms like "spousal assault" and "domestic violence," saying they veil the fact that, in almost all cases, it's men's violence against women." (1) Further, as Elizabeth Leehy, a Professor of Law at U. Ottawa explains, "Language can obscure, and minimize, she says: "The more we use these euphemisms as opposed to 'women-killing' or 'femicide,' the easier it is to ignore and silence what is actually happening." (2)

The problem isn't just here at home of course, around the world where cultural attitudes vary, domestic violence is often seen as acceptable within the confines of a marriage. A recent article in the Toronto Star pointed to police in France who, it's alleged, "routinely ignore domestic violence calls." I'm sure there are similar stories and quotes from around the world. We all

need to do better. Perhaps you recall a recent case in Scarborough where a woman was hunted down and killed with a machete on the street in front of her own home. Sure we expressed shock but where was the outrage? Had that been a random attack, stranger on stranger, I venture to suggest the outrage factor would have been significantly louder and the calls for action more urgent. Instead there were a few "tut tut," and some shaking of the heads and wringing of the hands but otherwise.... not much else. The woman's ex-husband had previously been charged with assault, charges for which he was later acquitted. At the time of the attack he was on a peace bond to stay away from his ex-wife. Still, she wasn't safe. Her name was Tharshika Jeganathan. We should remember her.

Not as a victim of domestic violence but as a victim of murder, of femicide. It's been 30 years since the massacre at L'Ecole Polytechnique – it appears we've changed very little.

## OPP officers do their part in reducing impaired driving in Caledon

On Wednesday, Nov. 20, at approximately 11:39 p.m. uniformed officers from the OPP Caledon Detachment were conducting Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (RIDE) spot check in the area of Mayfield Road and Robertson Davies Drive in the town of Caledon.

While speaking to one of the drivers, the officer noticed strong odour of alcoholic beverage emitting from the driver's breath. The driver was then asked to provide a sample of their breath into the approved roadside screening device, which resulted in a

"fail" reading. The driver was transported to the Caledon Detachment OPP, where further tests were conducted.

As a result, Damaninder Dhanoa, 30, of Brampton, was charged with:

- Operation while impaired - Blood Alcohol Concentration Exceeding 80 mgs.

The driver received a 90-day driver's license suspension and a 7-day vehicle impound.

The accused is expected to appear at the Orangeville Court of Justice on December 12, 2019, to answer to the charge.

Festive RIDE Campaign starts on Novem-

ber 23rd and goes until January 2nd. During the campaign, OPP officers will be highly visible as they conduct RIDE initiatives 24 hours a day, 7 days a week throughout the province.

Caledon OPP wants to remind drivers of the following:

- Don't drive impaired - plan ahead;
- If you see a RIDE program in front of you, slow down and continue forward;
- Mandatory Alcohol Screening law allows police with an approved alcohol screening device to demand a roadside breath sample from any lawfully stopped driver without having reasonable suspicion that a driver is alcohol impaired;

• Don't assume that you have a zero blood alcohol just because it is morning time after a few hours of sleep. Officers conduct RIDE at any time of day, and

• If you know or suspect that a driver is impaired by alcohol or drugs, call 9-1-1. In doing so, you may be saving lives.

The OPP remains committed to ensuring Ontario roads are safe from alcohol-impaired and drug-impaired drivers.





## King artist John Panopoulos takes direction from past when reinventing historic monoliths

A King artist's imagination is sparked by the "mystery of history."

John Panopoulos takes his direction from the past, those faint whispers that reverberate around some of humankind's most amazing, and often mysterious, monoliths.

Paying homage to the ancients, Panopoulos has taken his sculpting to another level, using modern techniques, materials and finishes to recreate the look of stone with less weight.

From large rocks and statues, to some familiar "faces," Panopoulos creates both whimsical and functional stone-like works.

His journey to establishing Classic Artisan Sculptures was a little unpredictable. While Panopoulos has always had a creative eye and thirst for knowledge and self-expression, the artist within really emerged from the stone in the past couple of years. He's perhaps a modern architect of sorts, resurrecting structures and evoking tales from our past.

Romanian sculptor Brancusi always referenced something recognizable in nature, believing in "truth to materials."

Panopoulos, too, understand the purity and

simplicity of form.

Panopoulos's "eureka moment" came just two years ago, while he and his wife Charmaigne were visiting ancient passage tombs in a remote part of Ireland. This Neolithic structure, which has stood for more than 5,000 years, caught his attention and lit that proverbial fire. His love of history and appreciation of design gave him the jolt necessary for this newest leap of faith.

Prior to diving into his sculpture endeavours, John fell in love with 3 dimensional art early on as a creative director for over 2 decades in package design and displays for global retailers. He then formed a faux decorative company for interior and exterior finishes, expanding his creative play with new-found materials and textures.

During contracts with landscaping companies, he realized their projects with real stone had limitations – weight, cost and practical accessibility. He knew there must be an alternative to real, earth-dug rock.

John recreated the infamous Easter Island monoliths and then began creating statues and faux stone furniture like benches and tables. Some are adorned with ancient symbols, per-

haps Runic, maybe Ogham or even cuneiform.

Often, people's first impressions of his sculptures, beg the question "just how did you get that huge rock in there?"

John's "gallery" is the rustic landscaping he and his wife Charmaigne designed for their Lloydtown yard, which is populated with his creations. They seem quite natural, nestled among the gardens, as if they've stood there for thousands of years.

John has done commission work, but prefers to simply create his own pieces. He goes where his vision takes him. And that vision had led him literally down the garden path in his own back yard.

Moving things up a notch, John joined Arts Society King (ASK) and participated in this year's Schomberg Street Gallery, displayed his work during the Schomberg Horticultural Society tour. He also provided a megalithic style "bench" for photos during the Food Bank's recent Sip & Savour fundraiser.

"I build what inspires me," he said, adding he's starting to get his "voice" out there. John firmly believes his creations are an ideal alternative for homeowners and landscape companies, extending their creativity with options

that weren't available before.

John continues to leverage history and human ingenuity with each piece he creates, experimenting and exploring creative form all the time. "I'm having fun with this," he said.

Panopoulos has spent a great deal of time studying actual rock forms and textures, even splitting some open to reveal Mother Nature's handiwork. He replicates those very lines, formed over the centuries, with meticulous detail and colour. He's developed a great relationship with the family owned DuROCK company a leading manufacturer in specialty coatings. John discovered how to mix various coatings, with quartz, crushed glass and other natural granulars, for that authentic look and feel of stone with much less weight.

Moving on to some faux stone coffee and entrance tables, John said he's begun to create a line of furniture that is well suited to high-end luxury condos, cottages and homes. He really enjoys the marriage of those fractured natural contours with clean, polished lines.

# Impressive Robert F. Hall team claims ROPSSAA football title

The Robert F. Hall Wolfpack Football team just completed our season with a 19 - 14 victory over St. Thomas Aquinas to win the ROPSSAA Tier 2 Varsity Boys Football Championship.

The Pack had a strong season, going 5 - 1 in the regular season, with our only loss coming at the hands of Aquinas.

Led by a strong offensive line, anchored by Adam Milian, Andrew Wilson, Timothy Atkinson, Matthew Kocialek, Graden Grandison and Daniel Dove, the Pack offence this year was able to operate effectively. They led the way for Grade 10 Running backs Joey Santarossa and Roy van der Veen. Quarterback Brody Kirkham had ample time to work in the pocket all season, dishing out to talented receivers Layomi Ojutalayo, Sam Dizon, Danny Flynn, Nicholas Moretta and Andrew Steko. The Defence was led by Nathan Konwirsz, Adam Burgos, David Munoz, Nicolas Gray, Kyle Prieur and rookie Delroy Njongo.

In the quarterfinals, the Wolfpack had a 13 - 0 lead heading into the 2nd half vs. Mayfield, with the strength of the team's defense on show for all to see. The team forced three safeties, before a TD by van der Veen sealed the game. But the Mavericks never gave up. They battled back with a TD by Joshua Long. Then, with 1:43 left in the game, Quinn Sullivan would make an amazing one handed catch to put the Mavs up 14 - 13. But the Wolfpack would not waver. Kirkham would lead them down the field. He would twice find Andrew Steko on deep passes to bring the ball within field goal range. Then, with time expiring on the clock, Steko would drill a 20 yard field goal to send the Wolfpack to the Semifinals with the 16 - 14 victory.

In the semifinal game, Robert F. Hall traveled down to Mississauga to face the undefeated 1st place team in the South, Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Carmel would jump out to an early lead, on the strength of their Fullback, Dylan Fallavollita, and their kicker Andrew Kaszuba would drill a pair of field goals. The Wolfpack answered back with a touchdown by Steko on a long pass from Kirkham. But Carmel was controlling the game and went into halftime with a 23 - 8 lead. However, the Pack don't know when to give up. An injury to Fallavollita crippled the Crusaders offence, and their number one Lineman, Eddie Burville got himself ejected. With those two out of the game, Carmel could not control the flow of the game any longer. Van der Veen and Santarossa started

to control the ground game, while Kirkham found Sam Dizon in the endzone to start the comeback. Kirkham would also score a TD with a goal line plunge, set up by an interception by Steko on defense.

Michael Cross would round out the scoring, and the defense allowed no points in the second half, causing turnover after turnover by the Carmel offense. Robert F. Hall would punch their ticket to the finals with the 27 to 23 victory.

In the finals, the Wolfpack squared off against the unbeaten Aquinas team, fresh off their semifinal victory over St. Martins, 32 - 8. The local team kept practicing all week in the cold and snow. Over 500 hometown fans showed up at Etobicoke Centennial Stadium for the game. The Pack went down early, with Aquinas scoring a TD on their opening drive to silence the crowd.

Then the defense began to take over: Paul

Ansah sacked the Cardinals QB in the end zone for a safety to put Hall on the board, down 7 - 2. Later, Steko would drill a field goal to bring the Wolfpack within 2, down 7 to 5. Steko then would intercept a ball and bring it back 50 yards for a TD to put Hall up 12 to 7 going into Halftime. The team's offence would continue to roll behind the running of van der Veen and Danny Flynn. Layomi Ojutalayo would make a pair of amazing catches to give Hall great field position. So would Sam Dizon. This would set up a TD pass from Kirkham to Steko to give Hall the 19 to 7 lead.

Yet the Cardinals would not give up, scoring again to pull within 19 - 14. Keion Charles would stop their onside kick attempt however, stopping their momentum. But the Cardinals' D would make the Hall offense go 2 and out, forcing a punt, all with only two minutes left in the game. Aquinas would

begin to march the field, but great pass protection from Kyle Prieur and Michael Maglio would thwart the air attack.

With only 2 seconds left on the clock, Aquinas would line up for the final play of the game. On an attempted rugby-style pitch and go, linebacker Adam Burgos would strip the ball to seal the game and give the Pack the 2019 Championship.





## Caledon Golden Hawks top Terriers to gain ground in PJHL

Three of a possible four points in the week's Provincial Junior Hockey League schedule, and the Caledon Golden Hawks are soaring.

The junior C hockey club bounced back from two straight losses for a victory over the Orillia Terriers and a trip to overtime with the Stayner Siskins over the weekend, to gain back a .500 record.

Hosting the Terriers for the first time this year in a rare Friday game at Caledon East Arena, the Golden Hawks were looking to gain ground on a team just one spot above their position in the Carruthers division standings.

Caledon was able to take an early lead in what turned into a shootout for both sides, combining for a whopping 84 shots in an eventual 4 - 2 Golden Hawks victory.

Vito Sica continued his success since moving to the Hawks after a trade from the Schomberg Cougars last month, posting his fourth goal in eight games in the red and gold.

Orillia was able to best Caledon keeper Aidan Spooner just fourteen seconds into the middle frame, though Caledon came storming back with markers from both Alex Mourani and Keeegan Hoover to take a 3 - 1 lead heading into the final twenty minutes.

Brother Logan Hoover found his name on the scoresheet in the third period, as did Orillia's Jack Beck with his second of the game, to close out the match and snap the Golden Hawks' losing skid.

Spooner made 39 stops on 41 shots, further cementing his name as one of the top goaltenders in the division with his fifth win.

Veteran Jason Cumbo was handed the reins between the pipes the following night in a visit with the streaking Stayner Siskins, where a last minute goal landed Caledon a crucial point in the standings.

Daniel Butt continued his torrid scoring pace in posting goals number fifteen and sixteen in the second period, though Stayner managed to take a 3 - 2 lead with just under eight minutes left to play.

Stayner was able to hold onto the one-goal cushion until the final thirty seconds of regulation, when Sica was once again able to prove his worth to his new team in tying the score.

Yet the Siskins bested Cumbo just over twenty seconds into the overtime, for a 4 - 3 win on their 28th shot of the contest.

With his pair of goals, Butt managed to sneak to within two of the division lead, behind Orillia's Kyle Heitzner.

The extra point proved crucial for the Golden Hawks, with a shakeup in the Car-

ruthers standings after a busy weekend. Caledon sits in fifth in the eight-team division with a record of 9-9-1-2, one point up on the Penetang Kings, and two points back of Orillia.

The upcoming week's schedule features a trio of matchups, with Caledon kicking it off on Thursday to visit the Schomberg Cougars (12-9-1-2).

They then visit the Terriers (11-8-0-1) for a rematch in Orillia on Saturday, before hosting the Siskins (15-7-0-0) at Caledon East Arena on Sunday.

Puck drop is scheduled for 7pm.



Former Orangeville Mayor, Gordon Courtney passed away peacefully at Trillium Health Partners at Mississauga Hospital on Friday, November 22, 2019 at the age of 92. He was predeceased by his loving wife and best friend Jessie (nee Rusk).



Gord had a colorful life, much of which was spent in Orangeville, where he was born and still lived at the time of his death. Together with Jessie he opened Coffee Corner Restaurant. 
