



Commissioner rules Shaughnessy breached Code of Conduct

It looks like Councillor Barb Shaughnessy is going to be docked a week's pay from the Town, and attend a special training session dealing with rules, protocols and procedures pertaining to councillors.

These were the recommendations contained in a report from John Fleming, integrity commissioner for the Town of Caledon, dealing with Code of Conduct complaints against Shaughnessy. The report was received by council Tuesday after lengthy and sometimes heated discussion.

Shaughnessy excused herself from these in the day, she called the report "biased and unprofessional."

In his report, Fleming said Councillor Johanna Downey had launched a complaint her approach, adding that if this conduct regarding a letter Shaughnessy sent to a local newspaper dealing with confidential matters involving a case before the Ontario Municipal Board (OMB). In another complaint, Downey said there had been a lack of respect shown for the decision-making process of council, charging accurate information was not reflected in public blog mittee, handed that task over to Mezzapelcomments.

Councillor Jennifer Innis had launched complaints stating that Shaughnessy had made it appear that Town staff were not following standard procedures regarding the matter before OMB, as well as concerns there had been a violation of confidentiality involving requests for information regarding the hearing.

Town CAO Mike Galloway had launched complaints alleging Shaughnessy had repeatedly portrayed staff in a negative manner, requested confidential information that was not appropriate for her to have and had undermined staff, using her position to try to influence staff.

Regarding Downey's complaint about respect for the decision-making process, Fleming concluded there had been a breach of the Code.

"Numerous incidents have been related to me, describing occasions when Councillor Shaughnessy, during meetings of council or committees, has used unparliamentary language, engaged in name-calling and stormed out of meetings," he wrote. "Such behaviour does not reflect respect for the decision-making process of council, nor does it promote public confidence."

Fleming was not completely negative in his assessment of Shaughnessy.

"I have come to know her as a dedicated, discussions, but in a statement issued late hard-working and highly determined representative of her community," he wrote.

But he also expressed a concern that Shaughnessy might have trouble changing continues, he anticipates more complaints. In that event, "I will impose more onerous sanctions," he stated.

"Anyone who knows Barb knows that she is open to accepting the tough assignments," he remarked. "She is a champion of the little guy, and isn't afraid to go that extra mile when something is amiss, or there is a problem to fix."

He added she doesn't bring up issues "on a whim or in isolation."

Editorial

'Fair' or 'free'? It's complicated! Trade between Canada and the United States has been an

issue since even before Confederation 150 years ago, and if Donald Trump has his way, it's an issue that certainly won't go away.

However, like health care, it's also pretty complicated, and we doubt the U.S. president realizes either that trade between the two countries isn't always "free" or that what's "fair" to one party might be seen as terribly unfair by the

At this point, all we really know is that Trump sees the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) as one-sided, favouring Mexico at the expense of U.S. workers.

Thus far, he has had little to say about Canada-U.S. trade, perhaps because we are not only his country's major trading partner or because there's neither the trade imbalance the U.S. has with Mexico nor any reports of U.S. manufacturers moving their operations north.

Long before there was talk of "free trade," there was the concept of "reciprocity," embodied in the Canadian-American Reciprocity Treaty of 1854, which was really a trade treaty between the United Kingdom and the United States that also applied to British possessions in North America, including the Province of Canada (now Ontario and Quebec), New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. It covered only raw materials and was in effect only from 1854 to 1865. But since it was a move toward free trade it was opposed by protectionist elements in the U.S. and after the conclusion of the American Civil War, the protectionist elements were joined by Americans angry at alleged British collaboration with the Confederate States during the war, and the alliance was successful in terminating the treaty in 1866.

The response north of the border was Confederation, seen as primarily a bulwark against a possible U.S. invasion and as a means of stimulating inter-provincial trade.

Attempts by the Liberal party to revive free trade with the U.S. in 1911 led to a political victory for the Conservatives, who warned that it would lead to Canada being annexed by the Americans.

Talk of reciprocity ended for decades, but tariffs between the two countries gradually declined and the 1960s saw creation of the Canada-U.S. auto pact that permitted cars built in either country to be sold in the other without any tariffs.

And it was ironically the Conservative government of Brian Mulroney that negotiated the Canada-U.S. Free Trade Agreement of 1987 that in 1994 was replaced by NAFTA.

As we see it, there's precious little doubt that the Trump administration will find pressure from lots of lobbyists in the U.S. apart from the softwood lumber industry, which has so successfully moved to restrict the export of Canadian lumber products by claiming the British Columbia and Alberta governments don't charge enough for trees cut from crown lands in the two provinces.

We would also expect to hear criticism of Canada's marketing boards and limits that have been placed on imports of things like U.S. beef and eggs.

However, Trump and his negotiators might be surprised to find that free trade has led to thousands of Canadian jobs being moved to the U.S., not just to Mexico.

A couple of examples are Stelco and Caterpillar. Stelco, once Canada's biggest steel producer, has all but disappeared since its purchase by U.S. Steel. And the huge Caterpillar plant in Brampton is long gone, with all its manufacturing now in the U.S., thanks to free trade.

Perhaps most complicated of all is the situation now found in the automotive industry, where virtually every vehicle assembled on both sides of the border has parts that can come from just about everywhere in the world.







Construction on Headwaters' new wing is in FULL SWING!

Scheduled to open doors to the public this July, construction on Headwaters Health Care Centre's (Headwaters) new 8,700 square foot expansion is well underway and moving steadily towards completion.

The transformative project is a significant step forward in increasing access to important health care services for the growing community. The addition of the new space is the first major expansion of the hospital since it opened at its current location in 1997. The new wing will be home to much-needed clinics, services and



programs like chemotherapy, minor procedures, orthopaedics and telemedicine. Headwaters is also taking on an exciting renovation of 11,800 square feet of existing hospital space to add another operating room, improve reception and expand pre- and postsurgical recovery areas.



Earlier this year, the Central West Community Care Access Centre (CCAC) was honoured for its innovative Palliative Patient Early Identification Program at the Central West LHIN's inaugural Quality Awards.

The Quality Awards shine a spotlight on quality and excellence by celebrating the innovative achievements of local teams as they focus on putting patients at the centre of the health care system.

The Palliative Patient Early Identification Program was selected as a winner from 17 award submissions from health care organizations across the Central West region. The program focused on identifying patients

with palliative care needs earlier in their illnesses, giving them access to well-coordinated, high quality palliative care sooner and improving their quality of life. The project was a partnership between the Central West CCAC and the Central West Palliative Care Network, with support from Osler, Health Links leadership, Dufferin County Paramedic Service, local primary care teams, and the IDEAS leadership program.

Properly dispose of household medical waste

The Region of Peel would like to remind residents who generate household medical waste and sharps that they need to properly dispose of them.

Plastics that have been used for household medical waste cannot go in recycling. They must be double-bagged and placed in the garbage.

"The Region of Peel has seen a spike in the amount of this type of waste that is being placed in recycling since we introduced our carts," Manager of Waste Program Planning Erwin Pascual said. "If you're not sure how to dispose of an item, visit peelregion.ca/waste and use our 'how to sort your waste' tool."

Household medical waste (other than sharps) includes dialysis tubing, filters, and disposable towels and sheets, colostomy bags, IV bags and tubing, gastric and nasal tubes, and soiled dressings and incontinence products.

Residents who use sharps (needles, syringes and lancets) should obtain a free biohazard container from one of the Region's six Community Recycling Centres (CRCs) so that they can:

• place their sharps in it,

 return the biohazard container filled with the sharps to a CRC for free disposal, and

· get a free replacement biohazard container.

The sharps should not be placed in any other container or cart.

Residents can also visit pharmacies participating in the Ontario Sharps Collection Program for a similar biohazard container service. (Check: healthsteward.ca/returns/Ontario)

If residents have more household medical waste than will fit in their garbage, they should contact the Region at 905-584-2216 or wasteinquiry@ peelregion.ca to inquire about how to be added to the Region's medical waste exemption list.




