## Traffic changes approved on Olde Base Line

Motorists are soon going to have to drive slower along stretches of Olde Base Line Road.

Peel Regional councillors last week approved staff recommendations to reduce the speed limit from 60 km-h to 50 on the stretch from Winston Churchill Boulevard to a point 180 metres east of Creditview Road. It will also drop from 60 to 50 km-h from a point 400 metres west of McLaughlin Road to 100 metres east of McLaughlin.

The staff report to council stated the Region completed an environmental study report about three years ago on roads in an area bordered roughly by Olde Base Line, Bush Street

in Belfountain, Mississauga Road and Winston Churchill. It was determined sight lines between Winston Churchill and Mississauga could be improved with road reconstruction. But it was also determined that such reconstruction would be restricted by various cultural heritage, environmental, aesthetic and property constraints.

Staff also suggested stretching the 50 km-h zone further to the east. That would allow for an easier transition when the speed limit drops to 40 in the area of the Cheltenham Badlands.

There are also plans to make the road easier to use for cyclists.

Staff pointed out the Region's Active Transportation Plan calls for the creation of attractive, safe accessible and integrated bicycle-friendly environments. Meetings were held last year, as part of the consultations regarding the proposed Badlands parking lot, and the Region was asked to look into "sharrow" of shared use lane markings along the road, as well as "no passing" signs.

Paved shoulders are planned between Creditview

and Mississauga Roads as part of this year's resurfacing project. Such shoulders are not possible between Creditview and McLaughlin because of constraints to the right-of-way.

## Charges withdrawn against McClure

Allegations had been made by Kelly Darnley against both McClure and Mayor Allan Thompson. The charges against Thompson made it to the Superior Court of Justice, where he was cleared in December, and awarded costs amounting to more than \$78,000.

cool Credit River waters to compete in the Tube Race.

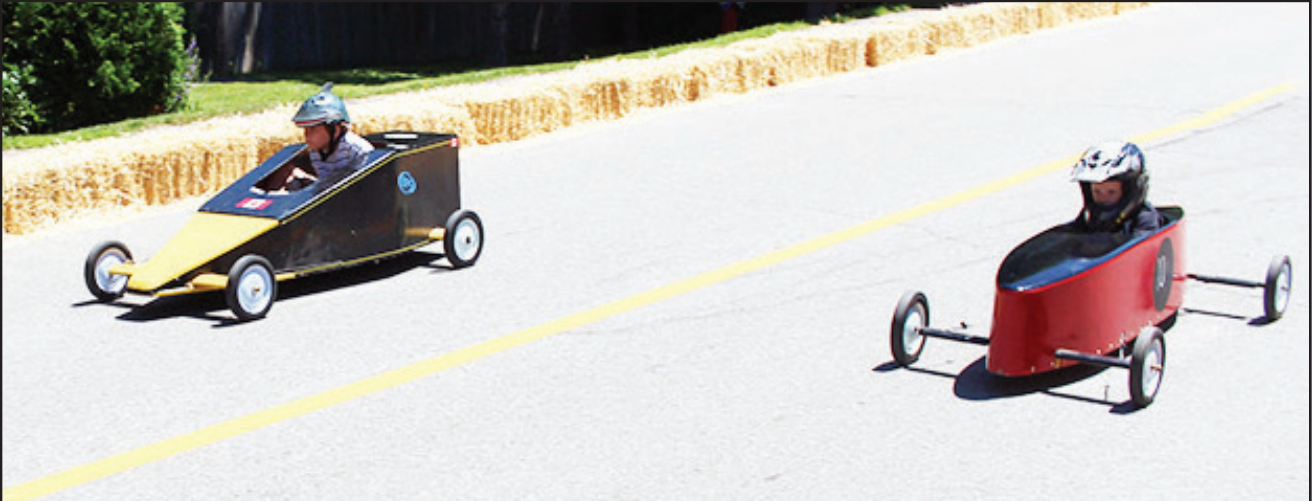

# The Laws Have Changed

A new type of pedestrian crossing has been approved for use in Ontario. Two new pedestrian crossovers are coming to Caledon.

These pedestrian crossovers are identified with signs on both sides of the roadway. Pedestrian crossovers may also include:

- flashing lights
- an overhead sign

Crossovers will also be added to right-turn channels, where pedestrians cross to an island before pushing the pedestrian push button.

By law, drivers are required to stop at the white triangles and wait for pedestrians to cross the entire roadway. **Failure to follow this law can result in 3 demerit points and a fine of \$150 to \$500.**

# Woman charged with fleeing from RIDE spot check

A 35-year-old Bolton resident is facing a number of charges after an incident early last Thursday (July 6) at a Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (RIDE) spot check.

## Caledon OPP repeating their reminder to ‘Lock It or Lose It’

Theft from and theft of vehicles is an ongoing crime which directly impacts victims and places a strain on valuable police resources.

This type of crime is not new, but is very often preventable through community engagement.

Lock It or Lose It is an award winning crime prevention initiative developed with the support from the Insurance Bureau of Canada to encourage drivers to take simple precautions to help prevent crime and victimization.

Follow these simple tips to help prevent your vehicle from becoming a target of crime:

- Always roll up your vehicle’s windows and lock the doors;
- Never leave your vehicle unattended while running;
- If you have a garage, use it and lock both your vehicle and the garage;
- Never leave your vehicle keys in plain view or in an easily accessible area;
- Do not leave your vehicle registration certificate and proof of insurance in your vehicle;
- Always park your vehicle in a well-lit area;
- Never leave valuable items or merchandise in plain view — use your trunk instead.

Caledon OPP reports the spot check was set up on Albion Vaughan Road, east of Regional Road 50.

Shortly after midnight, a black 2007 Cadillac Escalade approached, moving erratically. An officer was checking on the sobriety of the driver and detected alcohol on her breath. The woman was told to pull over for further investigation, but she sped off.

Police said she was driving in a dangerous manner as she tried to get away, and went to a residence in Bolton. An officer arriving at the scene tried to arrest her, but she resisted. A second

officer arrived, and they succeeded in making the arrest.

The woman was charged with impaired driving, driving with more than the legal limit of alcohol in her system, dangerous operation of a motor vehicle, taking flight while being pursued by a peace officer, resisting a peace officer, two counts of failing to comply with the conditions of an undertaking given by an officer in charge, failing to comply with an undertaking and breach of recognizance.

Her licence was suspended for 90 days and the car was impounded for seven.

## Canada Day weekend was a deadly one on OPP-patrolled roads

The Canada Day long weekend ended on a tragic note with five people dying in collisions on OPP-patrolled roads.

Two of the fatal collisions involved motorcycles, resulting in the deaths of both motorcycle drivers. Excessive speed was reported as a factor in one of the incidents.

The weekend collisions bring the total number of 2017 deaths on OPP-pa-

trolled roads to 113. Speed remains the lead causal factor, with 31 deaths attributed to this driving behaviour.

OPP officers heightened their focus on speeders and drivers engaged in other forms of aggressive driving during the weekend, laying more than 5,800 speeding charges across the province.

No fatal boating or off-road vehicle incidents were reported.

## WNV-positive mosquito pool found in Brampton

Peel Public Health’s adult mosquito surveillance program found a batch that tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV) last week in Brampton.

This was the second positive finding in Peel Region since this year’s edition of the program started in June. The other positive find was last month in Mississauga.

Adult mosquitoes are collected weekly from mosquito traps at 33 fixed locations throughout the region until late September. To date, 99 mosquito batches have been tested.

There have also been positive batches found in Toronto and Windsor-Essex

County, but they are the only ones in Canada so far this year. There have been no human cases of WNV reported in Ontario or the rest of the country.

The larviciding program started June 1 in Peel and will continue until Sept. 30. Larviciding involves applying environmentally friendly products to reduce mosquito larvae in stagnant water.

The first round of roadside catch basin larviciding has been completed and the second round is ongoing. The first round is indicated by a blue dot on the catch basin grate and the second round is indicated by a purple dot.

It takes at least three weeks to complete a round of larviciding. There will be three rounds of roadside catch basin larviciding this year.

Larviciding of catch basins in the green spaces of parks in Peel has been completed.

The treatment of surface water sites on public lands is ongoing.

Residents are advised to reduce the risk of WNV by removing stagnant water on their property, by emptying or disposing of containers that can hold water, such as old tires, wheelbarrows, barrels, pails, toys and recycling bins; and turning over wading pools, removing water that collects on pool covers and making sure the pool’s pump is circulating

There are also steps to be taken to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes.

- Avoiding areas with large numbers of mosquitoes.
- Wearing light-coloured clothing, including long sleeves, long pants, socks and a hat whenever you are outdoors (even when you are in your backyard), especially at dusk and at dawn.
- Use an insect repellent and apply it according to the manufacturer’s directions.

# Historic helicopter take-off for Global Odyssey

As Canadians gathered to celebrate a milestone national birthday, history was in the making for King Township.

The crew of C150 Global Odyssey, led by Kingscross resident Steven Dengler, took off from National Helicopters in Bolton bright and early last Saturday morning (July 1).

Dozens of supporters, sponsors and residents gathered to witness the start of this historic adventure — a first in Canadian aviation.

It will be the world's first Canadian around-the-world helicopter flight, and the first-ever father-son global circumnavigation by any light aircraft.

Among those on hand to wish the crew godspeed were King Mayor Steve Pellegrini, Councillor Cleve Mortelliti, King—Vaughan MP Deb Schulte and members of both Caledon and King Fire and Emergency Services.

The crew, comprised of Bob and Steven Dengler, and helicopter ace Rob “Dugal” MacDuff, are flying the Bell 429 helicopter more than 39,000 kilo-

metres in just over one month. From Bolton, they travelled to Ottawa to join in Canada Day celebrations.

They are now zigzagging the globe, and will visit more than 100 airports in 14 countries. Dave Williams, astronaut and CEO of Southlake Hospital, joined them on their first leg. He reminded the crowd about the importance of dreams, noting he was 13 in 1967 during Canada's centennial, and he hoped to become an astronaut. He's made two flights into space and joined C150GO.

Steven Dengler noted the odyssey is a team effort and he's grateful to all of the sponsors. The trip has cultural and historic significance and the crew is live-streaming images from across the nation. They are bringing Canada to the world.

150GO is a registered Canadian not-for-profit organization, supporting both the Southlake Regional Health Centre Foundation and True Patriot Love Foundation.

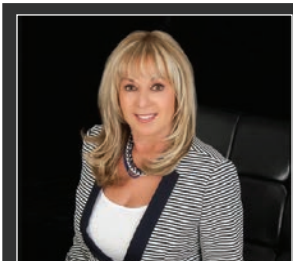

## Do you have what it takes to be country’s next superstar? Get your audition videos ready

Just one year ago, Mac Shepherd was simply going through his paces as a high school student in Keswick — but those 12 months have been transformative for the 16-year-old.

Now, when he’s not hitting the books, he is hitting the stage and hitting the recording studio with established country music stars as he makes significant inroads on the country music scene.

From a simple video audition strumming his guitar and showcasing his “buttery” voice, he was crowned the 2016 winner of the Hoedown Showdown in front of thousands of country music fans.

Now, Magna International is looking for their next country superstar and applications are being accepted.

“If you believe you can sing, you’re the next country music rising star, you dream of performing in front of thousands of fans and you want your career to be in coun-

try music, this is the competition for you,” Magna’s Erin Cerenzia said. “We have a fabulous grand prize that will kick-start anyone’s career in the music industry and we encourage you to apply.”

Since Magna revived its annual tradition just a few years ago, the Hoedown Showdown competition has grown by leaps and bounds every year, both in terms of the talent it attracts, but also the prize pack.

This year, the winner will receive a grand prize pack valued at almost \$25,000. The prize pack includes a full Yamaha guitar, amp and case package, two full days of recording at Metal Works Studios where the winner will have a chance to work with industry professionals as they record and produce their songs, as well a cash prize. New this year is the Ultimate Artists Package, which brings in a component of industry management and song writing.

“PR is a big piece we have added to our package this year to really help once the song is written, recorded and produced,” Cerenzia observed. “It will help take that song to market and hopefully get it playing on the radios. But the best part in my mind is the winner gets to come out and perform at Hoedown on Saturday, September 16 in front of thousands of country music fans.”

The Hoedown Showdown is an Ontario-wide competition, and anyone with a love of music — as long as they are 13 or older by the time applications are due — are welcome to step up. Last year, their youngest contestant was 13 and the eldest was in his late 70s.

“From the contestants, we have heard nothing but positive feedback for our process,” Cerenzia said. “It is not a hokey, karaoke talent competition; this competition has real substance. We put a lot of time and effort into it. If you come to the Hoedown on Friday and see the finals, you might not realize that there are two other stages of the competition prior to that.”

Once applications are received July 21, the Top 40 will meet in Aurora, home of Magna, for the preliminary round. From there, the Top 20 semi-finalists will have a chance to perform for the crowds Aug. 26 as a highlight of Aurora’s Ribfest. From there, the Top 10 are bound for Hoedown, York Region’s largest annual party Sept. 15 and 16.

“We bring them in the week before the Hoedown and they get to rehearse and practise with the showdown band, have one-on-one time with Beverley Mahood, who is a country music professional and

star, as well as industry professionals and management who really give finalists the opportunity to perform to the best of their ability,” Cerenzia commented. “We try very hard to give the competitors as many opportunities as possible to be successful and to also produce an amazing show.”

“Last year, Alan Doyle (Great Big Sea) was our headliner on Friday night and he actually said he was nervous after hearing the performances of the Hoedown finalists, he was nervous to play after them and they all produced a high quality show for everyone who was there,” she added. “It is not just that you think small, rinky-dink talent competition. This is a big deal talent contest.”

With just more than a week to get applications in, Cerenzia said it is always an amazing experience to get to know all the competitors involved. It is also an emotional process, she observed, because all the contestants are working so hard with a lot of stress.

“You get to know the people and the personalities in these scenarios and situations,” she remarked. “I love getting to meet and work with all these different people and watch them grow through this competition. We have people who come to us in the preliminary rounds and they are incredibly talented and by the time they get through to the finals, you feel like you are watching a true country music headliner.”

Vehicles parked in driveways shall not block a sidewalk. This is to ensure that vehicles don't pose a danger to those using the sidewalk by getting in the way of strollers, wheelchairs and pedestrians.



### CURBS

Parked vehicles shall not overhang the curb, grassed areas or obstruct the boulevard in any way. Doing this can cause a dangerous problem for traffic. If necessary, the vehicle may be parked parallel to the curb on the part of the driveway between the sidewalk and the road so long as it does not block the road or the sidewalk and is not on the grass or landscaped area.



### LAWNS

Parking on the front lawn or any grassed area of a property is not permitted. Vehicles parked on the front lawn can damage the lawn, detract from the streetscape and allow automotive fluids (i.e. gas, oil) to leak into the soil and groundwater.

## 2017 Tax assistance program for low income seniors and persons with disabilities

To provide financial assistance to low-income elderly homeowners and low-income persons with disabilities, Town of Caledon By-law 2015-019 allows for a residential property tax credit of \$468 subject to the following conditions.

To qualify, the property owner or spouse of the owner must:

#### FOR SENIORS:

1. Be 65 years of age or older by the application date; and
2. Be in receipt of the monthly guaranteed income supplement as provided under the Old Age Security Act (Canada); and
3. Be continuously assessed as the owner and reside on residential real property within the Town of Caledon for a period of not less than one year immediately preceding the application date.

#### FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES:

1. Be in receipt of benefits under the Ontario Disability Support Program Act (ODSPA); and
2. Be continuously assessed as the owner and reside on residential real property within the Town of Caledon for a period of not less than one year immediately preceding the application date.

In addition, all owners of the property must either be a qualifying senior or qualifying person with disabilities or their spouse.

This residential property tax rebate, where allowed, will be an outright grant made by the Town and will not entail repayment of any kind. # The Khadr payout: bad politics

The outrage that followed disclosure of the federal government’s decision to settle a lawsuit launched by lawyers for Omar Khadr for a rumored \$10.5 million plus a formal apology should have been expected.

There’s little doubt that the Trudeau government chose the July 4 timing in hopes of minimizing the damage, and equally little doubt that the public statements by Attorney General Jody Wilson-Raybould and Public Safety Minister Ralph Goodale had been carefully crafted with the same purpose in mind.

However, their suggestion that the payout would cost taxpayers less than a continued legal battle, which the government saw as hopeless, seems to have fallen on deaf ears, with polls suggesting most Canadians oppose the out-of-court settlement.

As we see it, the government’s choice, while based on sound legal principles, was clearly bad politics.

Although there’s little doubt that prolonging the legal action, in which the Khadr lawyers were seeking \$20 million in damages, would have involved millions more in legal bills for the government beyond the \$5 million already spent, having the matter ultimately determined by a jury would have got the government off the hook, no matter how big the ultimate award.

To that extent, we’re in full agreement with some of the critics of the deal, albeit not with those, like Conservative Leader Andrew Scheer, who called the settlement “a slap in the face to the men and women in uniform,” or portrayed the deal as rewarding a “convicted terrorist.”

All we really know is that the only issue in the lawsuit is the Canadian government’s involvement in the unique treatment Khadr received after being treated for potentially lethal wounds received in a firefight during which an estimated 100 U.S.-led troops raided a house containing militant supporters of the Islamist Taliban regime that had taken control of Afghanistan following the removal of Russian invaders.

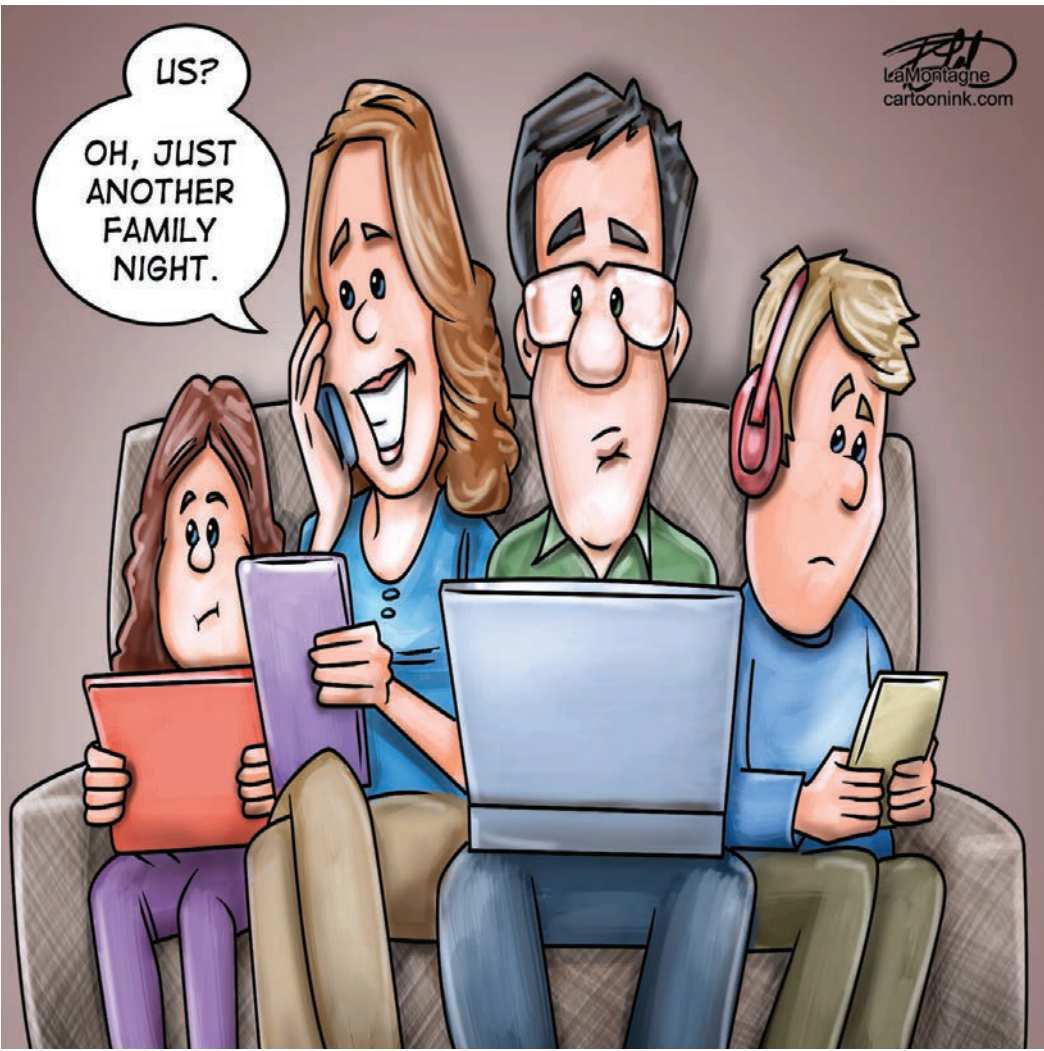
At the time of the firefight, Khadr was 15, and although born in Toronto, he had spent nearly half of his life in Afghanistan, where his father had been helping refugees while allying himself with Osama Bin Laden. In the circumstances, only Omar knows whether he saw himself as helping terrorists or defending Afghanistan from new foreign invaders.

The “odious” settlement is apparently not precedent-setting. In 2007, then prime minister Stephen Harper formally apologized to Maher Arar for the torture he suffered in a Syrian prison and said the government would pay him and his family \$10.5-million, plus legal fees, to compensate them for the “terrible ordeal.”

Granted, there is no evidence that Arar was guilty of anything, but he was an adult, and the award’s current value might be close to \$15 million. As well, it’s known that both Australia and the United Kingdom have made similar payments in settlements with their citizens who were tortured at Guantanamo Bay.

Is Omar Khadr a continuing security threat as a potential terrorist? Well, only he knows what his current beliefs really are, and he alone is in a position to plan his future life. Proceeds from the settlement have apparently been banked, and only time will tell what portion of the \$10.5 million will be kept by Khadr.

One would hope that most of the money will go to the Canadian lawyers who have thus far received nothing for the seemingly endless work on his behalf for nearly 15 years, as well as that none will wind up with his family. In an ideal world, some of the proceeds would go to organizations like Innocence Canada (formerly the Association in Defence of the Wrongly Convicted or AID-WYC), and Khadr would keep just enough to proceed with his plan to marry, buy a home and pursue a career in nursing.



## Future looking good

The end of another school year means graduations, and plenty of young people starting another phase of their lives.

While my wife and I don’t have children, her brother does, and the proud aunt and uncle recently watched our nephew accept his Grade 8 papers and now looks in the direction of high school.

I’ve also got to meet, over the last week or so, some of the top scholars from the local secondary schools.

There have been a host of other recent examples as I have encountered school students getting ready to move on to the next stages of their lives. At the risk of sounding like one of those representatives of the proverbial older generation (kind of hard to cover up when you have the abundance of grey hair and creaking joints as I), I have to say I’m looking at what’s coming with quite a bit of confidence and optimism.

We have all been hearing complaints about kids today. I have heard people complain they don’t understand the meaning of a day’s work or responsibility or the value of money. They seem to spend the bulk of their time with their devices, texting all the time. There are some who wonder if they are capable of having a normal conversation, as we older folks would understand the concept.

And there are always stories about young people who have been caught doing some particularly dumb things. The problem is they have been caught being dumb for centuries.

On the other hand, it has been my experience that age doesn’t always make one smart, and there are plenty of stupid people out there with more grey hairs than me. And I think just about all of us did a couple of acts in our youth that we shudder about when we think of them today.

That’s one of the main reasons why I get a little angry when I hear people around my age group or older criticizing those who are younger, because the same quotes were applied to me and those in my age group, and they have been used for more than 2,000 years. I refer you to the quote I used to open this piece. Socrates wasn’t always right, you know.

Since we have to assume that the people who are going to be running things around here 10 or 20 years from now are not going to be much worse than those they will replace, I think I can feel a certain amount of confidence, and a lot of envy. And I think thoughts like that are expressed a lot around this time of year, especially at school Commencements.

There was an interesting example just recently, as United States Chief Justice John Roberts addressed his son’s Commencement.

I have never been terribly impressed with Roberts. I think the main memory I carry of the man dates to January 2009, when he swore in Barack Obama to the Presidency for the first time. It seems Roberts committed the Presidential Oath to memory, or at least that’s what he tried to do (it really shouldn’t have been that difficult a task). But in fact, he blew it, and just about everyone watching knew it, including Roberts himself.

But we all sometimes fail, and indeed, that was one of the points he was trying to make to the young grads he was addressing. I found the address on YouTube, and I have said to my opinion of the man went up sharply after I watched it.

It was an address filled with the usual soppy stuff one expects for such an occasion. But rather than wishing the graduates plenty of luck and good times in the years to come, he took a different, and somewhat more realistic approach. He wished them a certain amount of tough times and hard luck.

“From time to time in the years to come, I hope you will be treated unfairly, so you will come to know the value of justice,” he told the grads. “I hope you will suffer betrayal, because that will teach you the importance of loyalty.”

“I hope you will be lonely from time to time, so that you don’t take friends for granted,” he went on to say. “I wish you bad luck from time to time, so that you will be conscious of the role of chance in life, and understand that your success is not completely deserved, or that the failure of others is not completely deserved either.”

“I hope you’ll be ignored, so you know the importance of listening to others,” Roberts added. “And I hope you will have just enough pain to learn compassion.”

Like I stated above, he used that platform to be pragmatic and realistic, and give those in his audience a glimpse of what’s to come, no matter whether they deserve it or not.

We have all heard the expression that life is not fair, and you don’t get through too many years without learning just how true that is.

It is true there have been a few occasions over the years when fortune has been particularly good to me. I accept those times, without shame or feeling an inclination to apologize for my good luck. There have been the other times, when I have taken a good, solid sucker punch from the hands of fortune.

We all have similar stories, and we learn to deal with them, if for no other reason than we have no choice.

I guess Roberts had the idea that there’s no better time for these people to get used to that reality than the present.

His words were wise and the meaning was clear. And people have been learning all about the message for thousands of years.

# \$10.5 million awarded to Omar Khadr

The government of Canada Friday issued a formal apology along with a reported \$10.5 million settlement payment to convicted terrorist Omar Khadr for abuses he suffered while being imprisoned at the U.S. military prison in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

Canadians from all across the country are rightfully appalled at this reported settlement. It is one thing to acknowledge alleged mistreatments; however, it is an entirely different thing to award a convicted terrorist who murdered an allied soldier and wounded another. Moreover, it calls into question about the true motivations of the Prime Minister and the current Liberal government in making such a settlement and not allowing the legal processes in place to finish.

Canadians across the country know this reported \$10.5 million settlement to Khadr is wrong. He admitted that he killed a U.S. Army Medic (Sergeant Christopher Speer) and was convicted by the American government for this and other terrorist-related charges. He later appealed his conviction in the U.S. and also re-launched a civil suit against the Canadian government, claiming several of his Charter rights were violated. Both of these legal proceedings were in progress, but now Canadians are learning through the media that several weeks ago, the current Liberal government negotiated a reported settlement of \$10.5 million with Khadr instead of waiting for the legal processes to run their course.

Valid arguments can be made as to why it would've been appropriate to have waited for the legal processes to finish, including an opportunity for the courts to

examine the alleged offenses of the parties involved. Khadr's brother is on record as saying their father was "old friends" with al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden and that he and Omar "attended terrorist training camps." It has also been reported that the Khadr family lived in the Osama bin Laden compound for a period of time. Following the terrorist attack of Sept. 11, 2001 in the U.S., it has also been reported the Khadr family left the bin Laden compound and took up arms against the Americans and their allies (including Canadians) who were fighting al-Qaida under the first-ever NATO-invoked (and approved) Article 5 action that the Liberal government of that time supported. It was during this time Khadr threw a grenade from the compound which killed Sergeant Speer and maimed another U.S. soldier.

Khadr's lawyer has argued Khadr suffered torture at the hands of the U.S. military that violated his human rights while he was detained at Guantanamo Bay and that the Canadian government was complicit. These allegations should be heard and addressed in the courts, where this

was taking place until the current Liberal government made the reported \$10.5 million settlement.

Arguments have been made that by settling with Khadr now, it would've saved the taxpayer more money in the long run because his lawsuit ultimately would've succeeded and he would've been awarded more than \$10.5 million. There is no way of knowing that with any degree of certainty, as my colleague Michelle Rempel has raised along with other valid points. I agree with her that it is difficult to believe the Prime Minister's motivations were to save the Canadian taxpayer money in the long run. This is a Prime Minister who doesn't blink at uncontrolled spending and running up deficits. He could've allowed the suit to go through the legal process. If the court had decided in Khadr's favour, the Prime Minister and his government could've explored appeal options. If those efforts failed, his government would at least have a compelling reason for making a payment to Khadr at that point.

One of the more likely motivations behind Prime Minister Trudeau's decision to settle the lawsuit with Khadr is to

avoid being forced to take a decisive stand on this controversial issue that would require him to explain and revisit that stance with Canadians over the long run, as Rempel has suggested. We've all come to learn that the Prime Minister prefers selfies and photo ops over tackling tough issues, which opens him up to scrutiny that he wishes to avoid. Another possible motivation raised by Rempel is that he's attempting to gain favour with a segment of voters; albeit, at a huge cost to the taxpayer. Regardless, if the Prime Minister thought the \$10.5 million settlement was necessary, he should've, at the very least, stood by his convictions and provided an explanation to the Canadian taxpayer instead of completely skirting the issue while visiting Ireland.

Our thoughts continue to be with Speer's widow and family who must relive their ordeal every time this issue comes up in the media. Given Khadr's admission of guilt, the Conservative Official Opposition is calling on him to give any settlement money to Speer's widow and two children.

When a Canadian soldier is killed or injured in battle, the government provides a lump sum payment up to a maximum of \$360,000. Despite this, the current Liberal government is willing to provide \$10.5 million to a convicted terrorist who actively sought to kill Canadian and allied soldiers, murdered one U.S. soldier, and permanently maimed another. Such a settlement making a convicted terrorist one of the wealthiest men in Canada isn't acceptable to the Canadian taxpayer, nor to our Canadian values. Canadians deserve better from their government.

The vision of Special Olympics was set in motion by American President John F. Kennedy's sister Eunice Kennedy Shriver, who formed Camp Shriver in 1962 by inviting people with intellectual disabilities to a daycamp in her backyard. The inaugural Special Olympics was held at Soldier Field in Chicago July 20, 1968 with athletes with intellectual disabili-

## Rewarding terrorist at widow's expense

You may recall an old tea commercial where the plaintive catch phrase had an English tea connoisseur lamenting, "Only in Canada, you say? Pity."

Well, that same phrase could aptly be applied to Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's appalling decision to write a \$10.5 million cheque to convicted terrorist Omar Khadr.

It is extremely unlikely that any other country in the world would reward a man who left his country and joined a terrorist group fighting against it, actually video-taped converting land mines into improvised explosive devices to be used against NATO forces in Afghanistan — which included Canadian forces — and at one point pleading guilty to tossing a grenade which killed U.S. Army Sergeant Christopher Speer.

In a move that makes Donald Trump look classy by comparison, Trudeau's government — waiting until Trudeau himself was out of the country — quickly and secretly sealed the deal in order to stop an effort by the widow of Speer to freeze any payment to Khadr pending their attempt to have our courts enforce a wrongful death suit against him.

So much for Liberal concerns about widows and children. Better to pay off a man who was trying to kill our guys than accommodate the widow of one of his victims.

To compound their sleaze, the Liberals have claimed — and much of the mainline media have sadly echoed it — that the 2010 Supreme Court rulings that Khadr's rights were violated during his incarceration at Gitmo meant they had no choice but to compensate him.

This is a bald-faced lie. The Court made no mention whatsoever of compensation. None.

The court did indeed suggest that Khadr should have been repatriated to Canada to serve the rest of his term for his crimes — some of which, by the way, he later recanted, claiming to have been trying to avoid further torture, a plea of innocence widely accepted by his legion of apologists.

Last week, Public Safety Minister Ralph Goodale — apparently oblivious to the irony of his cabinet title in rewarding a convicted terrorist — tried to blame Stephen

Harper's former Tory administration.

In fact, Liberal Jean Chrétien was prime minister when Khadr — who was wounded in battle and saved by the American fighters — was taken prisoner and sent to Cuba.

Goodale is quoted as saying, "Despite the Supreme Court of Canada, the Harper government refused to repatriate Mr. Khadr or otherwise resolve the matter. They could have but they didn't."

This too is a lie. Harper, albeit reluctantly, did indeed patriate Khadr, a fact that current Tory Leader Andrew Scheer correctly points out met the court's requirements. "That's where this story should have ended," he said. Absolutely.

Much has been made of the fact that Khadr — the spawn of a dedicated terrorist family — was 15 years old at the time of the firefight. His supporters claim that as a "child soldier," he was due special privileges not available to others.

This would be true of course if Khadr had met the technical UN definition of a "child soldier." But once again, the fact are at odds with the constant claims. He was not a member of a recognized uniformed fighting force at the time and therefore does not qualify. Nor was he dragged kicking and screaming by the bad guys and forced to try to kill NATO troops. He went there on his own and, even if you accept his revised version of events, there's no changing the video showing him happily making bombs designed to kill our guys.

Perhaps the most distasteful part of this whole episode was it was done in secret and in undue haste in order to stop a widow from collecting compensation for the death of her husband.

You'd think even politicians would cringe at the notion of rushing to judgment in order to do a widow out of compensation. But there you are. These Liberals apparently see no shame in giving money to a convicted terrorist and at the same time making it almost impossible for the widow and her lawyers to enforce a U.S. civil court ruling in their favor.

The good news is that while the Liberals and most of the mainstream media —although not the National Post — are buying into the false rationale offered by the Liberals, it seems that the general public is genuinely outraged over the fact that they're paying for a man who was fighting against us to become rich at their expense.

Only in Canada. And only under the Trudeau Liberals.

## Bi-weekly yard waste collection

Starting last week until Sept. 29, the Region of Peel will collect yard waste every-other-week in Brampton and Mississauga.

Urban areas in Caledon will continue to receive yard waste collection every-other-week. Rural residents of Caledon are reminded that they will continue to have their yard waste picked up designated Fridays.

Residents are encouraged to visit [peel-region.ca/waste](http://peel-region.ca/waste) and use When Does It Go to check their waste management calendar or download their schedule to a personal electronic device.

Yard waste must be at the curb by 7 a.m. on residents' collection day in acceptable bins, containers and/or bags.

A bin/container used for yard waste collection must be clearly labelled "Yard Waste," rigid and reusable with handles that are attached or molded to the exterior; smaller than 60 centimetres (24 inches) wide, 95 cm. (38 inches) high; and weigh less than 20 kilograms (44 pounds) when full.

A Kraft brown paper bag used for yard waste collection must support a maximum weight of 20 kg (44 pounds) when lifted, without tearing; securely closed when full; and be smaller than 66 cm. (26 inches) wide and 90 cm. (35 inches) high.

Residents can also use their old garbage container or blue/grey box to set out yard waste for collection. All repurposed containers must be in good condition and clearly labelled "Yard Waste" to be collected.

Residents who use the services of a lawn maintenance company should inform them of the yard waste schedule so the company can co-ordinate the timing of their service delivery to ensure yard waste is only set out on the scheduled yard waste collection days. Yard waste can also be dropped off at the Region's Community Recycling Centres (CRCs). Yard waste drop off is always free of charge at the Bolton and Caledon locations. At all other CRC locations, a \$5 flat rate applies for loads up to and including 50 kg (110 pounds). A fee of 10 cents per kilogram applies for loads greater than 50 kg.

Hundreds gathered to open the Bruce Trail, a hiking trail spanning the Escarpment from Niagara to Tobermory, June 10, 1967. Fast forward 50 years and on the same date, in the same spot, hundreds of members of the next generation celebrated 50 years of Canada's longest and oldest marked footpath.

The Bruce Trail has always been more than a simple footpath. The founding members truly designed the Bruce Trail as a means for conservation. Their idea was to create a footpath along the Escarpment so that people could explore and appreciate the Escarpment's unique beauty and ecological importance first hand. In their minds, once people had the opportunity to experience the Niagara Escarpment they too would want to join in the effort to preserve its irreplaceable landscape.

Today, the Bruce Trail is enjoyed by hundreds of thousands of people annually. Understanding the importance of protecting the land they love to explore, Bruce Trail Conservancy supporters have spent that last 50 years working to ensure the next generation of explorers have access to the most special of places along the Niagara Escarpment. All stand committed to ensuring that these lands are forever preserved and cared for, for all to

enjoy and benefit from. The Bruce Trail Conservancy is now responsible for the preservation of more than 11,000 acres along the Niagara Escarpment, and each year more preserved land is added to the trail's conservation corridor.

During his address June 10, Dr. Philip Gosling, Order of Canada recipient and founding member of the Bruce Trail, recalled the early years and the local families who provided outstanding support in creating the Trail in the most remote region of the Niagara Escarpment. He spoke passionately about the dedication of the volunteers and landowners over the past 50 years, and the need to diligently move forward with the Bruce Trail Conservancy's mission of a permanently protected corridor along the Niagara Escarpment that contains the Trail.

Speaking to the future, Bruce Trail Conservancy CEO Beth Gilhespy told the impassioned crowd, "Our challenge in the next 50 years will be to ensure that our ribbon of wilderness along the Niagara Escarpment prevails. Our success will depend on the same things it depended on 50 years ago: a dedicated corps of volunteers, landowners and donors who will work with us to ensure a route for our footpath is secure, and a Bruce Trail that still inspires people of all ages, and especially young people, to explore and find the same passion we all have found on the Bruce Trail . . . that ribbon of wilderness, that wild and beautiful refuge."
