

Councillors Annette Groves and Jennifer Innis both put their names forward the very first day they were able to, May 2. Each hopes to succeed Allan Thompson, Caledon's current mayor, who announced he would not seek re-election earlier this year.

Groves is currently the Ward 5 Regional Councillor, representing the community of Bolton. She was first elected to that position in October of the year 2000. She has also spent two terms as a Regional Councillor with the Region of Peel.


Innis is currently the Regional Councillor

People living in the Caledon Village area will see increased access to highspeed internet in the future thanks to Federal government funding.

In a May 3 statement, Canada's Minister of Rural Economic Development Gudie Hutchings announced over \$5.3 million will be distributed between Bell Canada, Golden Rural High Speed and HuronTel, so the companies can bring

high-speed internet to 1,662 rural Ontar-

In addition to Caledon Village, other communities benefiting from the funding are the following: Alberton, Bogies Beach, Burnt River, Glen Orchard, Jerseyville, Juddhaven, Kinmount, Minett, Mount Pleasant, Port Carling, Port Sandfield and Tower Manor.

The Government of Canada procured the \$5.3 million from its Universal

In January of 1993, Shelburne District Hospital voluntarily amalgamated with the renamed Dufferin Area Hospital becoming known as the Dufferin-Caledon Health Care Corporation.

A new hospital opened at 100 Rolling Hills Drive on May 3, 1997, and in October 2002, was officially changed to Headwaters Health Care Centre (HHCC).

Since opening in 1997, Headwaters has undergone various upgrades. Most recently, it saw the construction of an 8,000 square foot Ambulatory Care Centre, which opened in 2017 to provide high demand clinics and programs such as dialysis, chemotherapy, minor procedures, orthopedics, and plastics.

Headwaters is keeping with the celebration of their milestone anniversary with "Cheers to 25 Years" content including videos, stories, and baby photos from the last quadranscentennial.

The public is encouraged to continue sharing their stories and photos with the hospital.

Headwaters Health Care Centre (HHCC) marked a significant milestone in the hospital's history on Tuesday, May 3, celebrating the 25th anniversary of their site on Rolling Hills Drive.

"Over the past 25 years, Headwaters has continued to grow and evolve to meet the changing needs of the communities we serve," said Kim Delahunt, president and CEO of Headwaters Hospital. "We are so proud of our history of providing health care services close to home for our community and we will continue to adapt as we look ahead to the next 25 years."

While celebrations were low-key this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Headwaters brought together key figures from its history both past and present on Friday, April 28, at the hospital's main entrance in a reunion to honour the quarter century anniversary.

Among the attendees at Friday's reunion where three instrumental people in developing the Rolling Hills Drive site: Nancy Ross, former president and CEO; Dr. Gord Willans, former hospital chief of staff; and Lynn Gibson, former mayor of Mono and hospital board chair.

Speaking with The Citizen, Ross affectionally refers to their trio as the "three legs of the stool".

"I haven't been back; this is the first time. It's very heartening that I was able to be part of this, and then see that it grew and became this amazing facility," said Ross. "It still is what we hoped it would be. I'm very grateful that I was a part of it along with Dr. Willans and Lynn Gibson."

A medical specialist with Orangeville's original hospital, Dr. Gord Willans helped develop many of the early services that are now staples within Headwaters. Services he's credited with helping bring to the local hospital include outpatient services, cancer care, and the intensive care unit.

"I'm very proud of what our community has done health wise, both professional and as a patient," said Dr. Willans.

The Orangeville-based hospital has had a long history that now spans over a century.

The first hospital in Orangeville opened in 1912 as the Lord Dufferin Hospital and came into existence after 53 women founded the Lord Dufferin Chapter of the IODE charitable organization and raised over \$7,000 that was needed to set up the hospital.

During this time, they also established a training school for nurses.

While the IODE transferred governance of the hospital to a board of local community members in 1954, 42 years after originally establishing it, the charitable group to this day continues to fundraise for the hospital.

"We have been raising money and helping the





## **SUSPICIOUS DEATH RULED HOMICIDE**

The suspicious death investigation reported in Caledon on April 22, 2022 is now classified as a homicide.

"On April 22, 2022, at approximately 5:00 a.m., officers from the Caledon Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a reported sudden death in the area of Neil Promenade, in the Town of Caledon," say Police. "Officers located a deceased male inside the residence with apparent gunshot wounds."

The deceased has been identified as Tessio. Hanna, age 39, of Caledon.

"A post-mortem examination was conducted by the Ontario Forensic Pathology Service in Toronto. The death was ruled a homicide. The investigation is ongoing by the Caledon Detachment Major Crime Unit, under the direction of the Criminal Investigation Branch, and with the assistance of OPP Forensic Identification Services and in conjunction with the Office of the Chief Coroner for Ontario and the Ontario Forensic Pathology Service.

"Anyone with information, particularly those that were in the area of Chinguacousy Road and Mayfield Road on April 22, 2022 between the hours of 4 a.m. and 5 a.m. are urged to contact the Caledon OPP at (905) 584-2241 or toll-free at 1-888-310-1122. Dash cam footage during that period is of particular interest."

You can also provide information anonymously by contacting Peel Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477) or online at www. peelcrimestroppers.ca. When you contact Crime Stoppers, you stay anonymous, you never have to testify, and you could receive a cash reward of up to \$2,000 upon an arrest.

# **IMPAIRED DRIVING CHARGES**

Officers from the Caledon Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have charged the driver who collided with a traffic light pole with impaired operation.

"On April 26, 2022, at approximately 10:48 p.m., officers responded to a single motor vehicle collision on Highway 10 in Caledon Village," say Police. "The vehicle knocked down a traffic light pole. No injuries were reported.

"During the interaction, officers formed grounds that the driver's abilities were impaired. As a result, the driver was arrested for impaired operation and transported to the Caledon OPP detachment where breath tests were conducted."

Consequently, Rupender Singh, 26, of Brampton was changed with:

- Operation while impaired alcohol
- Operation while impaired blood alcohol concentration (80 plus)
- Drive vehicle with cannabis readily available
- Driver fail to surrender licence
  The accused is scheduled to appea

The accused is scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Orangeville on July 7, 2022, to answer to the charges.

The charges have not been proven.

In addition to having to attend court, the involved vehicle was impounded for seven days and the driver's licence was suspended for a period of 90 days.

"Whether you are impaired by alcohol or drugs, impaired is impaired and driving under the influence of either is a criminal offence," Police added. "If you plan on drinking or consuming drugs, plan to not drive. Instead, arrange for a designated driver, take a taxi or public transit, or come up with another plan that takes impaired driving out of the picture."

#### **NATIONAL VOLUNTEER WEEK**

During National Volunteer Week (April 24-30), the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) thanked their nearly 600 Auxiliary members for their exemplary service and commitment to community safety.

"OPP Auxiliary members are dedicated volunteers who work with frontline OPP officers to ensure safety and well-being in the province of Ontario," say Police. "They receive customized training and a unique uniform. Their duties may include assisting regular members with patrols, community events, seat belt clinics, RIDE initiatives, safety displays, presentations, victim assistance and ceremonial events.

"One important role of the OPP Auxiliary members is supporting crime prevention. Beginning in March 2022, Auxiliary members began providing fraud prevention presentations across Ontario. With rates of fraud increasing each year, the goal of the presentations is to prevent victimization and support community

safety.

"In 2021, OPP Auxiliary members generously contributed approximately 70,000 hours to communities across Ontario. They also raised more than 16,000 lbs of food donations and \$42,000 in cash donations for local food banks. Since 2012, OPP Auxiliary members have logged more than 1.3 million hours of service."

# TRAFFIC COMPLAINT LEADS TO ARREST

Members of the Nottawasaga Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a traffic complaint in Alliston, which resulted in an arrest.

"On Saturday, April 30, 2022 at approximately 12:45 a.m. police responded to a call reported by a concerned citizen," say Police. "The vehicle was quickly located and police began their investigation."

As a result of the investigation, 24-year-old Connor Brown of Alliston was arrested and charged with the following:

- Operation while impaired- alcohol and drugs
- Operation while impaired-blood alcohol concentration-80 plus
- Having care or control of a motor vehicle with open container of liquor
- Having care or control of a vehicle or boat with cannabis readily available
- Obstruct peace officer

The accused had their driver's licence suspended for 90 days and vehicle impounded for seven days.

The accused is scheduled to appear in the Ontario Court of Justice in Bradford on May 19, 2022.

The charges have not been proven.

"Everyone has a role to play in keeping our roads safe. If you plan on drinking, arrange for a designated driver, take a taxi or public transit, or come up with another plan that takes impaired driving out of the picture. Citizens are also encouraged to call police if they suspect that someone is driving while impaired by alcohol or drugs. These measures can go a long way in keeping impaired drivers off our roads."

# Bolton man charged in OPP drug raid

Police have charged a Bolton man several drug-related charges, following an investigation into an illegal cannabis production and distribution network.

The OPP report they seized more than \$6-million in illegal cannabis and cannabis related products.

Three people have been charged under the Cannabis Act (CA), Criminal Code (CC) and the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (CDSA).

On April 21, OPP-led Provincial Joint Forces Cannabis Enforcement Team (PJFCET), City of Kawartha Lakes and Peterborough Community Street Crime Units, Emergency Response Team, Provincial Asset Forfeiture Unit (PAFU) and Canine Unit, with assistance from Durham Regional Police Service, executed five CA search warrants, which included three residential properties and two motor vehicles.

As a result of the search warrants, police seized approximately: 470 kilograms of processed cannabis; 100 kilograms of hash; 80 kilograms of cannabis resin; 100 kilograms of cannabis edi-

bles; seven kilograms of cannabis shatter; 80 kilograms of cannabis distillate and 700 grams psilocybin. In addition, the PAFU assisted with the seizure of three motor vehicles as offence-related property valued at \$75,000, as well as approximately \$400,000 in Canadian currency.

The total value of assets, illegal cannabis, and cannabis related products seized is estimated at more than \$67-million.


Bolton's Kabilan Anura, 26, was charged with: Possession of Property Obtained by Crime Over \$5,000; Possession for the Purpose of Distributing; Possessing Cannabis for the Purpose of Selling; Alter or offer to alter the chemical or physical properties of cannabis by the use of an organic solvent; Possess, produce, sell, distribute or import anything with intention to use it to produce, sell or distribute illicit cannabis; Possession of a Schedule II Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking.

The charges have not been proven.

A 60-year-old Omemee man, and a 27-year-old Claremont man were also charged.



# Competition on the canvas in Caledon

# Hometown artist defeated 11 others who were painting to win at live Alton art battle

The talent and confidence of 12 artists were on display for all to see last weekend.

On May 1, from 1 to 4 p.m., "The Competition Vol. One" was held at the Alton Mill Arts Centre.

The Competition was a live painting battle between 12 artists played out over 30-minute rounds. Four distinguished guest judges were on hand to provide critiques to artists, and the audience voted for which competitor's painting they liked best at the end of each round.

There was music playing, food and drinks served, and attendees were encouraged to walk around the room and chat as the artists worked.

All these factors combined to create a lively, social atmosphere. At the end of each round, event host Sam King would lead the crowd in a countdown from 10 before artists had to put down their paint brushes.

The 12 artists competing in the competition were Amanda Busby, Nicole Popo, Lydia Panart, Harley Duck, Wendy Mitchell, Andie Trepanier, Kate Nova, Jennifer Osborn, Kay, Kayla Jackson, Alex Leikermoser, and Haley Marfleet.

The four judges for the competition were

Emilia Perri, Steve Wilson, Ricky Schaede, and Kelly McNeil.

Only four competitors made it to the final round: Busby, Panart, Jackson, and Marfleet.

After the final round, each judge was given \$50 to award to their favourite painting. There was also a trophy made by the Alton Mills Arts Centre's blacksmith Jason Duclos that was to be given to the artist whose painting got the most votes from event attendees.

The trophy featured a piece of the Alton Mill Arts Centre itself embedded in iron.

Jackson's final painting incorporated the room the competition was taking place in, utilized light and space well, and featured great colours. For these reasons and more it ended up being the favourite of three judges: Emilia Perri, Ricky Schaede, and Kelly McNeil.

All the judges were very impressed with all competing artists' confidence, speed, and artistic ability.

Perri said seeing what the artists made in just 30 minutes was spectacular.

"I was blown away," she said.

Marfleet painted a colourful and well-composed landscape that included a barn, and a fence that stretched across the canvas. Judge Steve Wilson was impressed with Marfleet's

colour choice and subject placement and awarded Marfleet his \$50.

Jackson received the most votes from event attendees and won "The Competition Vol. One" trophy, capping off an impressive day for the artist, who grew up in Alton.

Jackson, a Sheridan College illustration graduate, has done some theatre and singing in the past and said she wasn't fazed by the amount of people in the room watching her paint.

"I didn't even realize how many people were behind me," she said. "...I didn't feel any stage pressure, which was an advantage."

Jackson said she had an idea of what her finished paintings would look like before she started, which helped her get paint on the canvas quicker and leave space for what was coming.

"Since we had to do it in just 30 minutes, I couldn't let my layers dry in between, so I couldn't really sketch (the painting) out. I just had to trust myself, which is a really good exercise," said Jackson.

"Just place the paint where it was going to go, and then make a couple adjustments at the end."

Jackson said growing up in Alton, she would often visit the Arts Centre which enabled her

to be immersed in all different kinds of art.

She takes inspiration from the town she grew up in and enjoys painting old, heritage buildings and bringing their colours to life.

Last summer, she hosted her first exhibition at the Arts Centre, called "Vivid Memories, Vivid Moments." Her paintings at that exhibition featured many of the old buildings in the area as subjects. She said it was a full circle moment and exciting to share with her community.

Jackson wanted to thank King and everyone else involved in making the painting competition happen.

"It was a really friendly competition and I liked it a lot," she said.

All paintings made by all 12 artists at the competition were available for purchase after the competition by silent auction, with bidding starting at \$75. An exception was made for Jackson's winning painting, as it was announced before the final round the winner would be able to keep their painting to put finishing touches on and perhaps sell on commission later.

King said there will be more events coming in "The Competition" series across all art disciplines and invited people to stay tuned for the next one.

# Multi-Modal Transportation Master Plan

The Town of Caledon (Town) is undertaking a study to develop a Multi-Modal Transportation Master Plan (MMTMP) for Caledon. The MMTMP will expand upon the 2017 Transportation Master Plan (TMP), the Province and the Region's plans and initiatives to address mobility needs to 2051, which is consistent with the new Official Plan planning horizon (currently under development).

The MMMTP is a long-term strategy that guides the planning, policies, and infrastructure needs of the Town's multi-modal transportation system to accommodate future growth and development.

The Study will inform the process of creating a transportation system that meets the varying needs for different residential areas and businesses through creation of a vision and goals for all modes of travel. The aim of the MMTMP will be to ensure that by 2051, the Town will manage future transportation demand with a well-connected, convenient, reliable, safe, and accessible network and provides a diversity of travel choices that supports livable communities and complete streets. The Study will identify active transportation system constraints and opportunities. It will define required infrastructure to ensure the continued safe and efficient movement of people and goods to year 2051 and will form the basis to guide future transportation decisions for the development of streets, trails/paths and transit service to fully align with the Town's vision and goals.

#### **PROCESS**

The Study is being carried out in accordance the requirements of Phases 1 and 2 of the *Municipal Class Environmental Assessment* (October 2000, as amended in 2007 and 2011), which is approved under the *Ontario Environmental Assessment Act*. The MMTP Study will consider and evaluate solutions to determine an efficient, environmentally, and economically sustainable, and efficient transportation network.

We want to hear from you, as your involvement is key to the success of the MMTMP. If you have interests or concerns related to transportation in the Town, we encourage you to become involved.

# Bylaw update means residents must now maintain boulevards

Caledon residents must keep the grass in check on boulevards adjacent to their properties, as well as make sure they're free of refuse.

That's because Town of Caledon staff have created an Encroachment Bylaw and amended the Town's clean yards bylaw. Town Council voted in favour of adopting the bylaw changes at its April 26 meeting.

In the bylaws, boulevard is defined as "the portion of a highway which may be paved, unpaved, grassed or landscaped with other materials, and is situated between the curb or edge of pavement and the adjacent property line on both sides of a highway."

In a presentation at a previous Council meeting, Caledon Building and Municipal Law Enforcement Director Mark Sraga said most Caledon residents choose to maintain municipal boulevards adjacent to their properties, despite the lack of rules requiring them to do so.

The Town's amended Clean Yards bylaw requires residents to "maintain the grass portion of boulevards that are immediately adjacent to their property, excluding rural/agricultural properties," according to Sraga.

Town Operations staff will continue to maintain all the boulevards they already do, he added.

This change was made as Sraga said the Town's had some instances where property owners, as well as property owners of vacant development properties, have not been maintaining

their adjacent boulevards, leading to complaints. Maintaining adjacent boulevards under the new bylaw means keeping them free of refuse and tall grass.

Councillor Lynn Kiernan asked Sraga if the Town was responsible for maintaining the adjacent boulevards in the case of a non-compliant property owner. Sraga said the Town's contractor would do that work, then the cost of it would be put back on the non-compliant property owner in their property taxes.

The Town's new encroachment bylaw means minor encroachments on Town-owned boulevards are no longer prohibited. Sraga said old rules prohibited all encroachments on boulevards adjacent to Caledon residents' properties, which is very restrictive. Further, he said many minor encroachments have no negative impact from an operational or safety perspective and in fact improve streetscapes, benefiting the community.

An example of a minor encroachment would be the planting of flowers on a boulevard, or the placing of mulch or tree ring edging around boulevard trees. In the past, Town staff have had to tell people to remove such beautifications despite them not really being a problem, said Sraga.

The new Encroachment Bylaw allows Caledon residents to make these sorts of minor aesthetic improvements to boulevards adjacent to their properties, while still prohibiting anything deemed to be an operational or safety hazard. Those wishing to make a major encroachment will now need to go through a permit process.

# Candidates come forward for fall election

Two incumbent councillors have registered as candidates for the new Regional Councillor, Ward 1, 2, 3 position: Christina Early and Johanna Downey.

Early is currently Caledon's Ward 2 Area Councillor and registered as a candidate on May 2. She was elected for that position in October of 2018 and is currently a board member with the Caledon Public Library and Caledon Community Services.

Downey is currently Cale-

don's Ward 2 Regional Councillor, a position she was first elected to in October 2014.

She registered as a candidate on May 4. She's currently part of the Region of Peel's Diversity, Equity and Anti-Racism committee and Credit Valley Conservation, among other roles.

As of May 4, no one had put their name forward for the Regional Councillor, Ward 4, 5, 6 position; or, for the Councillor positions in Wards 3, 4, 5 and 6.

One person put their name forward for the Ward 1 Councillor position so far, incumbent

Ward 1 councillor Lynn Kiernan. She was first elected to that position in October 2018, and is currently the vice-chair of the Town of Caledon's planning and development committee.

The only two non-incumbents registered as candidates for Caledon's October 2022 election so far are running for Ward 2 Councillor. Their names are Mihramat (Ramat) Gill and Hunar Kahlon respectively.

Incumbent Peel District School Board trustee Stan Cameron registered as a candidate for the same position he currently holds on May 2.

# Boston Mills Road residents team up to pick up trash

# Group of Caledon hikers are tired of the amount of littering on their road

Caledon residents tired of the amount of litter on the side of the road they live on are taking matters into their own hands.

The residents, who all live close to each other on Boston Mills Road, call themselves the "Boston Millers." Janice Reed is one such resident and explained to The Citizen why she and her neighbours decided to undertake their cleaning mission.

Reed said she and her neighbours have been picking up trash on the side of their road for years now and that littering is reckless behaviour

On April 24, the Boston Millers got together and collected a pickup truck-full of garbage between Highway 10 and Creditview Road, as well as between Chinguacousy and Boston Mills Roads.

Reed said the items picked up ranged from liquor and wine bottles to baby and adult diapers. She issued the following plea to residents of and visitors to Caledon:

"It's atrocious, the amount of garbage that Caledon is seeing in this beautiful region," said Reed.

"It's a privilege to visit Caledon. It's a rare pleasure to be able to bicycle ride, hike, walk the trails and float down the Credit River. If you visit here, don't leave your garbage behind. If you live here, take care of your garbage and collect it before it scatters to the river, the fields, the forests and hills."

According to Reed, the Boston Millers that went out to pick up garbage on Earth Day were Blair and Kathy Smith, Jonathan Weeden, Frazer Torode, Wendy Boughton, Janice and Dave Reed, and Ken and Lindsay Tucker.

Earlier this year, Boston Mills Road residents Cynthia Wood and Alexis Fraser delegated to Town of Caledon Council about problems with littering, and other undesirable behaviour, on their road.

The delegation sparked conversation from Council about how littering was a Townwide problem.

Addressing Council, Wood said she and her family often pick up trash on the road. In doing this, some of the items they've found include needles, batteries, dead chickens and used condoms.

Wood also reported to council three instances of stolen vehicles being brought to Boston Mills Road and burned. She was worried the fires could have spread under the right conditions and caused loss of property or life.

Town staff have been directed to create a report on the issue and bring it back to Council.

# **MPP Sylvia** Jones says 2022 **budget puts** people first

Dufferin-Caledon's Member of Provincial Parliament, Sylvia Jones, says she is pleased with her party's 2022 Budget.

Announced on April 28, the Conservatives' "Ontario's Plan to Build" budget document outlines a five-pillared plan for the province that Jones is happy with.

"Our budget focuses on building a province that invests in people, infrastructure and the economy," said Jones in a media release. "This is a plan that puts people first, plans for the future, and invests in critical infrastructure and programs that residents in Dufferin-Caledon rely on every day."

The five pillars the budget is based on are the following: Rebuilding Ontario's economy; working for workers; building highways and key infrastructure; keeping costs down; and planning to stay open.

Ontario's Minister of Finance Peter Bethlenfalvy said the budget is Doug Ford's vision and will "cut through the excuses and act right away on the priorities of the people of Ontario."

"...the work is not over, and the job is not done. We are ready to get it done for the people of Ontario," said Bethlenfalvy.

The Conservatives plan to spend \$4 billion to bring high-speed internet to every community in Ontario by 2025. They also plan to spend \$114.4 million over the next three years in "Skilled Trades Strategy" as they look to break down any stigma associated with the skilled trades and simplify the process for Ontarians getting into them.

The Conservatives have also committed to investing \$1 billion each year in employment and training programs for workers who are looking to upgrade their skills.


The Conservatives' budget accounts for the proposed Highway 413 being built, as part of a \$25.1 billion investment in highway projects across the province over the next 10 years. Projects included in that investment are: Highway 413; the Bradford Bypass; the first steps to the future widening of Highway 401; improvement of the QEW Garden City Highway; the next phase of the construction of Highway 7 between Kitchener and Guelph; and reconstructing Highway 101, the Timmins connecting link. The budget also includes a planned \$61.6 billion investment in public transit over the next ten years.

Ontario's 2022 budget includes plans to provide an extra \$300 in personal income tax relief for low-income families. A media release on budget details also outlines big plans for Ontario's hospitals, with the Conservatives saying they'd be "Investing more than \$40 billion over the next 10 years in hospital and health care infrastructure, supporting more than 50 major hospital projects that would add 3,000 new beds over 10 years."

The release also said the government would be "making historic investments in hospitals with an additional \$3.3 billion in 2022-23, bringing the total additional investments in hospitals to \$8.8 billion since 2018-19.

The Government is also investing \$3.5 billion over three years to support the continuation of over 3,000 hospital beds put in place during the pandemic and \$1.1 billion over three years to support the continuation of hundreds of new adult, pediatric and neonatal critical care beds added during COVID-19.

According to Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada, "the \$2.75 billion Universal Broadband Fund supports high-speed internet projects across the country. These projects will bring internet at speeds of 50/10 megabits per second to rural and remote communities."

The Government of Canada is looking to connect 98 per cent of Canadians to high-speed internet by 2026, and 100 per

cent by 2030.

We still don't have a public baseball diamond and are dependent on the good grace of the Agricultural Society.

We lost the popular annual Winter Fest at the Fair Ground. The Village recently even had the

Village Santa Claus parade cancelled, again due to questionable safety concerns.

We only recently acquired an outdoor skating rink.

Do I need to go on?

Even though some of these events were privately organized, the Town showed no interest or investment in supporting their continuation.

From my perspective as a community and clinical social worker having been involved in numerous community youth planning initiatives, and from my personal childhood experiences celebrating "Fire Cracker Day" in my family backyard in Scarborough, I consider enjoyment of fireworks celebrations to be a "rite of passage" for Canadian youth.

We live on a 1.5-acre property in the Caledon Village and as grandparents enjoy having our grandchildren along with other extended family (two of whom are firefighters) over to our home every Canada Day to safely enjoy a family fireworks display. I have seen no reported evidence of significant damage to property or fires in the community to justify such a draconian move as to essentially ban domestic family fireworks.

It seems inconsistent with Council's relaxed position on allowing residents to keep chickens in their back yard with obvious community health concerns.

The last time I looked a few years ago, Caledon already was unique in Ontario in its rigid restrictions by not allowing even a single rain day back up provision for fireworks displays.

There seems to be a distinct longstanding unjustifiable bias by the Town dividuals with PTSD and other disorders, against fireworks demonstrations.

The only complaint I've personally heard from residents is the noise disturbance affecting their pets. While the rest of us non-pet owners are generally tolerant of nightly and early morning dog barking and droppings on our boulevards, we should expect some reasonable consideration and tolerance of fireworks two nights out of the whole year.

This is a real slippery slope by Town Council in its apparent overzealous concerns for community safety trumping family and cultural/religious traditions.

What next? Will Council ban tobogganing, ice fishing, road hockey, outdoor Christmas lighting displays as potential safety hazards, putting Christmas lights up before Veteran's Day, or restrict Halloween audio displays and trick-or-treating after dark?


