
Jones is taking over the role of Minis-

Albion-Bolton library staff excited to welcome people back to newly-renovated branch

Branch had been closed since February 2020 due to COVID-19, renovations

A new chapter has begun at the library branch

On June 20, the Caledon Public Library (CPL) proudly reopened its Albion-Bolton branch to the public. The branch had been closed since Febru-

ary of 2020, due to both the COVID-19 pandemic ral light from the outdoors. and renovations.

The renovations are now complete and CPL Citizen a tour of the refreshed branch on June 24, explaining the changes implemented over the past couple of years.

People have missed coming into their hometown library branch, said Maw, and the staff have missed welcoming them in just as much.

Maw said the branch has been busy since it reopened, especially in the evenings. She's been especially happy to see students visiting and hanging out — they seem to be enjoying the reading area on the first floor that features trees and natu-

In a June 17 media release, CPL's chief librarian and CEO Colleen Lipp commended Albicommunications manager Mary Maw gave the on-Bolton library staff for their hard work while the branch was closed. While people could not come into the branch during the closure, people could still check out items and come and pick them up at the library branch door.

> "It's been a long and complex project..." said Lipp. "Library staff deserve endless praise for providing such a high level of service during the construction and pandemic restrictions. We are also grateful for the community's patience as we worked to improve the branch.'

> The inside of the Albion-Bolton library branch now has a completely modern feel, and after one walks through the entranceway they are greeted by a bright, open room. The service desk at the branch is now right by its entrance, and it's been redesigned. Private meeting rooms have been added with technology to facilitate hybrid online/ in-person meetings and presentations.

> Meanwhile, all public spaces on both floors of the library have been treated to new paint, carpets, and furniture. Maw said the comfy new chairs are the perfect place to sit and read.

There is ample space left open on branch walls for local artists — who can become part of CPL's Artful Caledon program for free — to display

Maw emphasized the modern library offers more than books too. At the Albion-Bolton branch people can get musical instruments, seeds for their garden, and even a GoPro camera, for example, all as part of CPL's "Library of Things"

Maw said improvements at the Albion-Bolton branch represent the CPL's commitment to adapt and provide a place where Caledon residents of all ages can come together to learn and connect.

She added branch renovations contribute to the Caledon Public Library Board's mission to have CPL be the heart of the Caledon community.

Maw has been working for the CPL since its last master plan was implemented, and said it was cool to see the things planned for the Albion-Bolton branch years ago come to fruition.

An official ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the Albion-Bolton branch reopening is planned for July 18 and the public is invited to attend.

Caledon East's Rock Garden Farms fundraising in memory of **Orangeville teen**

A local farm is fundraising to help kids go to summer camp and enroll in recreational sports and activities.

On July 3, a portion of the proceeds of all strawberry sales at Rock Garden Farms in Caledon East will be donated to Caledon Community Services' Kidz in Caledon initiative.

"Summer should be a time for fun. However, for children and families living in poverty, it is a time of worry and increased struggle," says Caledon Community Services.

Kidz in Caledon is an initiative to ensure Caledon children are not left out of summer camps or organized sports. It also ensures children have the nutritious food they need to enjoy the aforementioned activities so they can make friends and memories.

Rock Garden Farms manager Margaret Galati is fundraising for Kidz in Caledon in memory of Orangeville teen Edward Malette-Matthews, who was killed in a car crash in 2020 when he was just 16.

"He was... a lovely soul, an old soul," said Malette-Matthews.

Galati.

She explained after the tragic accident Malette-Matthews' mom came to Rock Garden Farms looking for flowers for her son's burial site. "I gave her flowers and I gave her strawberries... I just said, our prayers are with you," said

This year, Edward's mom returned and tried to give money to Galati for her to donate to a charity, as a way of thanking her. Galati at first didn't want to take it, but then thought of doing an event in Edward's honour.

"He always helped everyone... he was a doer and he was always trying to help," said Galati. "I thought he would probably want to see another young soul go and do something fun who just [isn't] as privileged. He's that type of a person, he would be right in there trying to help somebody else... we thought Kidz in Caledon would represent him."

Rock Garden Farms offers u-pick strawberries as well as the strawberries it has for sale.

Proceeds from both will be going to Kidz in Caledon during the July 3 event in memory of

Ted Webb of Terra Cotta is a trailblazing fundraiser for Velocity Ride

Webb is a leader in the local cycling scene

Ted Webb is known as a friendly and welcoming leader in the Terra Cotta cycling scene.

He's also known for leading a group of dedicated community members in fundraising for Caledon seniors.

His team, Ted's Terra Cotta Trailblazers, is currently the top fundraising team for Caledon Community Services' (CCS) upcoming Velocity Ride in Support of Caledon Seniors.

Anne Marie Hayes has been riding with Ted's team for three years and recently became a member of the CCS Board of Directors in March.

She explained she co-named the Trailblaz-

"[Ted's] our neighbour and he's the one actually that got me interested in riding," said Hayes. "He taught me how to ride, he taught me how to ride safely. He has taught lots of people how to ride safely, and to be interested. That was the genesis of the name."

When she was learning how to ride, Hayes would go out on group rides with Webb and friends. She said they'd always take turns leading the pack and coaching from the back of the pack, with her in the middle. When a car would pass, they'd go into a formation to keep her safe.

"I get to see parts of Caledon that you don't see, and you see it differently when you're on a bike than when you're in a car," said Hayes. "Somebody was leading, so I didn't have to be thinking about where to turn in the route and all that... I have a busy week and then I just go out and I just enjoy Caledon."

Hayes said each member of the Trailblazers reaches out to people to fundraise, but like to tell people to sponsor Webb.

"We all kind of like to help get his fundraising up there. He's just such an icon, right? And he's such an inspiration and we're just grateful to him," said Hayes. As of June 29, the Trailblazers had raised \$4,087 for Caledon seniors, \$3,283 of that coming from those sponsoring Webb. It's more than worth noting that Webb himself made a sizable \$2,500 donation to CCS this year.

Working in health care for her entire life, and in home care for a large part of that, Hayes said seniors are close to her heart. She moved to Caledon 10 years ago and once she discovered CCS, fundraising for the organization became close to her heart too.

"Helping seniors age in place is just core to how we spent a lot of our professional lives," said Hayes of her and her husband, who worked in health care before retiring. Hayes' husband has been riding with Ted's team for four years. "We just really, truly believe that the best thing is to give our seniors the option, the choice to age in place. They do better when they have autonomy, when they can stay somewhere familiar, when they have a network... it's important that we do what we can as a community to help them

Hayes said the COVID-19 pandemic has put such a burden on the health care system and non-profits and that it is more important than ever for people and communities to

do what they can to help out. She explained in times of crisis, people often can't donate like normal to non-profits like CCS, while the crisis requires non-profits to expand their services.

"CCS I think has done a really nice job of doing everything they can to make sure that our seniors weren't isolated, that they



ARMED ROBBERY IN BOLTON

Officers from the Caledon Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have responded to an armed robbery in Bolton and are now requesting the public's assistance in identifying two suspects.

"On June 22, 2022, at approximately 2:37 p.m., Caledon OPP was alerted of an armed robbery in progress," say Police. "At 2:41 p.m., officers arrived and attempted to locate the suspects who had already fled on foot with a quantity of iPhones. Descriptions of two suspects were obtained from security video footage at the retail store on McEwan Drive in Bolton. A handgun was used in the commission of the offence. No injuries were sustained."

The investigation is ongoing by Caledon OPP's Major Crime Unit. The OPP's Forensic Identification Unit also assisted with the investigation.

"The same suspects attempted to enter a different retail store in Bolton just prior to this incident, however entry was not successful. Caledon OPP responded to this separate location due to the panic alarm being activated by store staff.

"They were last seen walking around Hwy 50 and Healey Rd in Bolton, as well as around the Walmart and Home Depot plazas. They would stand out since they were walking around in full track suits, masks, and hoods up despite the extremely hot summer temperatures. It is also believed that they are operating a white BMW SUV."

Suspect 1 is described by Police as a male, black, late teens or 20ss and is of average height (approximately 5'10") and has a slim build. He was wearing an all-grey Nike track suit, black and blue mask, and white running shoes.

Suspect 2 is described as a male, black, late teens or 20s, over 6' tall, and has a muscular build. The male was wearing a dark blue hoodie and dark pants that were worn low on the waist exposing grey underwear at the back. He wore a dark mask and black Nike running shoes.

STOLEN VEHICLES RECOVERED

Officers from the Caledon Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have recovered three high-end vehicles from a shipping container slated to be shipped overseas.

"On June 20, 2022, Caledon OPP was dispatched to a shipping yard on Coleraine Drive in Bolton to recover a stolen vehicle," say Police. "The initial investigation revealed that the vehicle was in a shipping container scheduled to be shipped overseas."

The Caledon Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) was engaged, and a judicial authorization was obtained to search the container. The search was conducted that same day and the following vehicles were recovered:

- 2020 Land Rover Range Rover SVR
- 2020 Lexus NX
- 2019 Maserati Levante 61G

All vehicles were reported stolen from the Toronto area.

The investigation is ongoing, and no arrests have been made in relation to this incident.

Crime prevention tips:

Today's auto thieves are increasingly turning to technology that bypasses security systems allowing vehicles to be stolen. Electronic auto theft is on the rise as more vehicles are equipped with technology such as keyless entry fobs. In fact, the insurance industry has seen the growing trend that thieves are able to copy fob information and steal cars right from your driveway. The term "relay thefts" involves the use of equipment designed to boost and exploit the signals sent out by a vehicle's legitimate key fob. This allows for a thief to unlock and start an engine of a vehicle remotely.

Residents can help protect their vehicles by taking any of the following crime prevention measures:

- Ensure your vehicle keys are kept well away from doors and windows
- Use a signal blocking pouch/box they can block your key fob from transmitting its code to the vehicle as the pouch is lined with layers or metallic material
- Turn off the keyless fob wireless signal at night (refer to your car manual for instructions)
- Use a steering wheel lock or car alarm this could add a significantly delay or be a deterrent for thieves



Police and its insurance industry partners also want to raise public awareness about the opportunities for criminals who intend to steal personal identification from unsecured vehicles.

Licenses, insurance, vehicle ownerships, passports, as well as mobile devices or laptops, offer criminals the opportunity to further victimize individuals who do not lock their vehicles, or who leave their valuables in plain view.

Vehicle owners/passengers can do simple things to decrease the risk of being victimized, such as:

- Never leave a running vehicle unattended
- Lock your doors
- Roll up your windows

There are now 16 more people in Caledon who are trained and ready to answer the call in people's time of need.

On Tuesday, June 28, the Town of Caledon's Fire and Emergency Services Department held a graduation ceremony at Station 302 in Bolton to welcome 16 new volunteer firefighters into its ranks. The firefighters all had to undergo extensive training in order to earn their place on the team.

Caledon's Deputy Fire Chief of Community Safety, Samantha Hoffman, said at the graduation ceremony for the new recruits that everyone was very impressed with them.

"Our training branch worked really hard to pull this together and the connection between the training officers and the firefighters was really, really visible," said Hoffman.

She explained the recruits have dedicated every Tuesday evening and every Saturday since January to training. "Considering they all have jobs, full-time jobs that they're doing, it's pretty impressive," said

As part of their training, the new recruits all participated in the Coldest Night of the Year charity fundraiser event. They were told they had to raise \$50 each and walk the event in their bunker gear (the personal protective equipment firefighters wear).

"They raised \$14,000," said Hoffman. "They were the group in Caledon that raised the most amount of money. Even while they're in recruit training, they're already giving back to their community."

Caledon's Fire Chief Dave Forfar said the Caledon Fire and Emergency Services team is very proud of the new graduates and excited to work with them.

"These new recruits have worked hard during their training program to not only complete the mandatory 250 hours of training, but to also earn their National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 1001 certification," said Forfar.

Tuesday's graduating class of volunteer firefighters consisted of people from all kinds of backgrounds, including fire service families, the military, professional and junior sports, paramedicine, the automotive industry, business, and forestry. Two women and 14 men make up the new recruits.

Caledon Mayor Allan Thompson offered his words of thanks and encouragement to the new recruits, who have been assigned to teams at eight different fire stations across the Town of Caledon.

"It's an exciting time for these new recruits, and I'm happy to welcome them to the Town of Caledon and the Fire and Emergency Services team," said Thompson. "The value of dedicated, well-trained first responders has never been more apparent than it has been during the pandemic. Under Chief Forfar and the deputy chiefs, these new team members will thrive, while working to protect our residents."

The Town of Caledon's Fire and Emergency Services Department is looking to start training its next round of firefighter recruits in September.

Action-packed Bolton Truck and Tractor pull draws huge crowds

If you like the sound of engines, then you would have loved the symphony playing at the Albion-Bolton Fairgrounds last Friday night.

The Bolton Truck and Tractor Pull ran for the 44th time that evening, June 24, and people traveled from all around to compete and spectate. The grandstands lining the track were full of fans young and old, and many more fans occupied the standing room.

There were food trucks and local food vendors, and a beer garden that got lots of business too.

Rob Boyes was one of the competitors at the pull. He grew up just outside of Caledon East and said he's been pulling

tractors since he was just a kid. Most pullers start out pulling modified garden tractors, and Boyes and his family actually ran the Ontario Truck and Tractor Pull Association's (OTTPA) garden tractor division for a while.

Now, Boyes lives in Arthur and is the OTTPA's representative for the Pro Street Diesel 4X4 class.

On June 24 however, he was competing in the 2.6 Super Street Diesel class.

It was a closely-contested class, and Boyes took home second place with a pull of 278.10 feet in his vehicle "with a name that wouldn't be published".

The first place pull, from Brandon Mauro in the truck "Max'd Out" was a short distance further at 278.16 feet.

"It was good, really good. It's a good

time always in Bolton... always a good show at the Bolton Fairgrounds, lots of people there and lots of vehicles," said Boyes. "The time we get to run down the track, that 20 or 30 seconds, whatever it takes, that's why we're all there. That's why we do it."

Tractor pulling runs in the Boyes family. Boyes said his brother and dad were also at the Bolton Truck and Tractor Pull competing, in the Hot Stock 4x4 Truck and 9,000 Pound Pro Stock Tractor classes respectively.

Rod Cochrane was competing in the Bolton pull in a class that has to be seen to be believed, the Multi-Engine Modified Tractor class. He's a veteran of the Bolton Truck and Tractor Pull, and has been coming to it "since 1991 or 2". Cochrane came

in second place in his class.

Cochrane and his wife Barb also entered two machines into the Super Modified 2 Wheel Drive Trucks class, of which Barb is the OTTPA representative for. They had a successful night and took home first and

Cochrane actually builds all of his own engines and chassis, and said it's crazy the amount of man hours that goes into the sport of tractor pulling. In the summer, he spends every night of the week working on his vehicles.

Prior to the 44th Annual Bolton Truck and Tractor Pull, the Citizen incorrectly published that tickets to the event for adults were \$20. Tickets for adults were \$20 if bought in advance online, and \$25 at the event gate. The Citizen apologizes for this error.



Schedule'C'Municipal Class Environmental Assessment Notice of Public Information Centre No. 1

THE PROJECT

The Town of Caledon through their consultant Ainley Group is undertaking a Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (EA) for improvements to Chinguacousy Road from Mayfield Road to Old School Road (see the image). This project is being carried out under the planning and design process for a Schedule C project as outlined in the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (October 2000, as amended in 2007, 2011 and 2015) which is approved under the Ontario Environmental Assessment Act.



Through the 2051 planning horizon, Caledon is forecasted to grow from a population of approximately 80,000 residents to approximately 300,000. The Caledon Transportation Master Plan (TMP) has identified the corridor of Chinguacousy Road from Mayfield Road to Old School Road as an area needing road improvements to service the current growth in the area and the future planned Peel Region's urban boundary expansion. Recommendations for the corridor will consider road widening, geometric and intersection improvements, active transportation and transit facilities, and access management.

PUBLIC INFORMATION CENTRE

Consultation with stakeholders is a key element of this Class EA. To facilitate this a virtual Public Information Centre (PIC) will be held on Tuesday, July 5th, 2022 from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. The purpose of the PIC is to provide information regarding the existing conditions in the study area and the identification, evaluation and selection of alternative solutions. The PIC will provide an opportunity for you to ask questions and discuss the project with the Project Team.

Notice of Passing of Parkland Conveyance Bylaw 2022-042

TAKE NOTICE that the Council for The Corporation of the Town of Caledon passed Bylaw No. 2022-042 on Tuesday, June 28, 2022, under Section 42 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13. This Bylaw pertains to Parkland Conveyance. This Bylaw applies to all lands within the Town of Caledon.

The purpose and effect of Bylaw No. 2022-042 is to require the conveyance of land for park or other public recreation purposes as a condition of the development or redevelopment of land within the Town of Caledon or, in the discretion of the Town of Caledon, the payment of money in lieu of such conveyance, pursuant to the Planning Act, RSO 1990, c P.13, as amended, and to repeal Bylaw-2013-104 (Parkland Dedication Bylaw).

The basis for this Bylaw is contained in Staff Report 2022-0132, as received by the General Committee on June 21, 2022 and approved by Council on June 28, 2022.

All oral and written submission relating to the Bylaw were considered by Council before this

This Bylaw may be appealed by any person or organization to the Ontario Land Tribunal under subsection 42(4.9) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13. The last date for filing a notice of appeal is Tuesday, August 16, 2022. Such notice of appeal must be filed with the Town Clerk of the Corporation of the Town of Caledon and must:

- 1. be in writing;
- 2. set out the objection to the by-law and reasons supporting the objection;
- 3. be accompanied by the Ontario Land Tribunal fee in the amount of \$1,100.00, which can only be paid by certified cheque or money order made payable to the Minister of Finance, Province of Ontario; and,
- 4. be accompanied by the Town's fee in the amount of \$213.18*, which can be paid by cheque made payable to The Corporation of the Town of Caledon.

*Note that there is also a fee for cost recovery of preparing the appeal packages for the Ontario Land Tribunal. This portion of the fee is required to be paid upon the Town informing the appellant of

The appeal form is available from the Ontario Land Tribunal on their website at https://olt.gov.on.ca/appeals-process/forms/ or by contacting the Town Clerk.

Only legal persons (including individuals and corporations) and public bodies may appeal a by-law to the Ontario Land Tribunal. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Land Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.



Rising food costs



I don't really know a whole lot about farmtion and citizens of this country depend on farmers to feed cities.

Although I did date a farmer's daughter fertilizer. for about a year at one time, so that should count for something, even though she taught me absolutely nothing about plowing a field or raising cattle, I did find out that farm girls are fun to be around with good attitudes, and seem to enjoy staying in shape.

I learned quite a bit about the science of the industry when I worked for a national farming magazine on a freelance basis several years ago.

At the time, I was given all sorts of assignments on a variety of differing farming topics like why a certain herbicide would not kill some kinds of weeds and I covered news on the chicken farming segment and the cattle and pork industries.

Quite often when doing research, I couldn't find an answer. At those times I would call the University of Guelph - a university renowned for its agricultural programs - and speak to a professor there.

There were two or three professors who I routinely called for help. They were very accommodating, friendly, and very eager to share their knowledge. These professors are experts in their field.

Most of the times when I spoke to them, they had an answer for me on the spot. Either they were already aware of a problem that was taking place in farming, or they had an immediate answer for whatever question

I learned a lot about the science of farming and what it takes to produce a successful crop through those professors. There's a lot more to it than planting seeds and waiting for them to grow.

Every time a plant grows, it takes nutrients from the ground - that's just basic science. Sooner or later those nutrients will be gone and you won't be able to grow anything.

At one time, a field was left fallow for a season to allow the soil to regenerate. That practice is still done in some countries.

In the west, the loss of nutrients in the soil is countered by applying fertilizer. One farmer told me that if you don't fertilize the land, you won't grow a crop - at least not the type government for relief. of crop that makes a farm viable. Your yields

Many Canadian farmers get their fertilizer ing other than it's hard work and the popula- from Russian sources. There are reasons for this, most notably the fact that Russia has the resources and production facilities to make

> While there are notable potash producers in Canada, the other ingredients that go into making fertilizers are not as quite readily

As the war in Ukraine rages on, the federal government is creating sanctions to punish Russia for its militaristic endeavours. One of those sanctions is a tariff applied to Russian

The problem is the tariff is levied against Canadian farmers who buy the fertilizer. The Russians aren't being punished, Canadian farmers are the ones paying out an additional 35 per cent for the fertilizer to grow their crop. The idea is that if you apply a tariff against Canadian farmers, they will be forced to buy products from another market.

To make matters worse, the tariff is being backdated to apply to shipments purchased before that war even started.

No other western countries have applied a tariff to Russian fertilizer.

Sanctions are supposed to punish another country, not your own. By charging Canadian farmers this tariff, you are adding an extra 35 per cent to their bottom line. Guess who's going to be paying that extra when those products start showing up on the grocery store

Add to that the rising cost of fuel, and you have the makings of some serious price increases when this current crop starts showing up on grocery store shelves.

During the American Civil War, William Tecumseth Sherman's march to the sea demonstrated the best way to defeat an enemy is to destroy the food supply. If you want a population to give up, cut off their food and you'll soon be in control.

However, the idea is to do it to the other guy, not your own people.

Whether Ontario farmers can find an alternate source for the majority of their fertilizers remains to be seen. Local co-ops and the farming associations are already lobbying the



Town of Caledon updating, renaming its Green Fund

Fund allows community groups to apply for money to put towards climate change projects

Caledon residents have shown they care about the environment.


The Town of Caledon has a fund that community groups can apply for a grant from: the Green Fund. According to a June 21 Town staff report, \$354,085 has been dispersed from the fund since its inception in 2006, helping fund 136 environmental projects across the Town.

One example of a project funded by Caledon's Green Fund is the Inglewood Pollinator Garden featured on the front page of last week's Citizen. Other examples of funded projects include: tree planting events; community education workshops; salmon hatchery projects; invasive species removal; the building of outdoor classrooms; the installation of water refill stations in schools; and the installation of rain gardens.

Since 2006, the Green Fund has invited registered non-profit and charitable organizations to apply for up to \$5,000; or, participate in a "fast track" stream for grant requests of

\$1,000 or less. In 2012, a School Green Fund was created to provide up to \$2,000 for environment committee, The Peel District projects at schools in Caledon. The application to the fund has been streamlined by Town staff so as to reduce the administrative burden on applicants, and the maximum amount one applicant

can receive will now be \$8,000 instead of \$5,000. This is to account for rising project costs, since the maximum funding amount for any one project had not changed since

Town of Caledon Council approved updates to the Green Fund on consent at its June 21 General Committee meeting, then gave it final approval at its June 28 Council meeting. The new Climate Action Fund will launch this fall and the first successful applicants to the refreshed fund can expect to see their projects come to council in the first quarter of 2023. A total of \$35,000 will be available to applicants to start, but Town staff are working on setting up an online process for public donations to bolster the fund. This is because requested grant funds usually exceed fund availability.

Interesting facts about Canada

Each year on the first day of July, people across Canada celebrate Canada Day.

CANADA DAY commemorates the anniversary of the Canadian Confederation. On July 1, 1867, the separate colonies of Upper Canada, Lower Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick were united, forming a single dominion within the British Empire. That dominion was named Canada, which is why Canada Day is often described as "Canada's birthday."

Canada Day marks a great time to learn more about this beautiful, prosperous country.

- \bullet Canada is the second-largest country by total area in the world. Only Russia has more total area than Canada.
- Despite its size, much of Canada is uninhabited. Specific estimates vary, but it's widely accepted that more than 80 percent of Canada is uninhabited. Occupying the northern region of North America, Canada is, particularly in its northernmost regions, cold, rocky and snowy. That makes much of its northernmost regions unsuitable for human inhabitants.
- Canada is often considered the northernmost part of North America, though that's not necessarily accurate. Greenland lies on the eastern edge of the North American tectonic plate, which means it is technically part of North America, even though its cultural influences are decidedly European. The World Atlas notes that, if Greenland is considered part of Europe, then Cape Columbia in Nunavut, Canada, is the northernmost point in North America.
- Though metrics vary, data from the World Bank indicates that Canada has the ninth-largest economy in the world as measured by nominal gross domestic product.
- Canada Day is a day to celebrate throughout much of the country, but the day is a little different in Quebec. July 1 is Moving Day in Quebec because that's when leases in the province typically expire. Changes in the COVID-19 restrictions at Headwaters Health Care Centre

Kim Delahunt, President and CEO of Headwaters Health Care Centre and Dr. Peter Cino, Chief of Staff and Vice President of Medical Affairs issued the following statement on Wednesday, June 29:

"As we continue to experience a significant decrease in hospital as well as community COVID-19 infections, we are pleased to share that we will be easing some of the restrictions we have in place. These changes will be effective as of July 6, 2022."

Moving to passive screening

"We will be moving to a passive screening model. Screeners will no longer be located at any of our entrances. Designated Care Partners are asked to self-screen before entering our facility. A Designated Care Partner is a person who has been identified by the patient or substitute decision maker, who can provide support to a patient during their visit with us (e.g. a patient under 18 years of age)."

Designated Care Partners will be not be allowed in if any of the symptoms listed below are present:

- fever
- new or unexplained cough
- unexplained shortness of breath and/or difficulty breathing
- diarrhea or vomiting
- runny nose/sneezing

"While we strongly encourage vaccinations, proof will no longer be required as a condition of entry for Designated Care Partners. Anyone seeking medical attention does not need to self-screen. You will find signage at our entrances to support this new process."

Opening our entrances

"We will be opening the main entrance as an entrance and exit to our facility. Our Ambulatory Care entrance will change to an exit only. Entrances to our facility are locked from 9 p.m. -6 a.m. We ask that you enter through the Emer-

gency Department during this time. There is an intercom system located at the main entrance if you experience any difficulty entering the hospital."

Masking mandate remains in place

"Patients and Designated Care Partners are required to put on a hospital provided surgical mask following self-screening at entrances and wear the mask for the duration of their time in the hospital."

Access changes for Designated Care Partners

"While we will not be moving to open visitation at this time, we do plan to further expand access for Designated Care Partners.

"All inpatients will be permitted two Designated Care Partners with the exception of end-of-life patients who are permitted four family members with only two at the beside at a time. For those that qualify as a Designated Care Partner, visits must be pre-scheduled by calling the inpatient unit no later than 4:30pm the day before the visit.

"All Emergency Department and Ambulatory Care patients will be permitted one Designated Care Partner."

COVID-19 testing

"As a reminder, the COVID-19 Assessment Centre at Headwaters Health Care Centre and the Dufferin Cold & Flu Clinic will be amalgamating and relocating to the Orangeville Pharmacy at Unit 5 – 50 Rolling Hills Drive for appointments beginning on July 4, 2022. Hospital patients coming for surgery will continue to complete pre-operative COVID-19 testing at the hospital.

"These changes are welcomed news and we are grateful to each member of our team that helped bring us to this milestone. We will continue to navigate the impacts of COVID-19 and remain ready to mobilize and ramp up our collective response if needed at any point."

Bolton British Bites celebrates a year in business

It's not often that a business celebrates its grand opening and one-year anniversary on the same weekend.

But that's what happened at Bolton British Bites, located at 62 Queen St. South, on June 24 and 25.

Owner Nicola Kreuzwiesner explained that since she opened her store with business partner Glenn Allen in the middle of a pandemic, the official ribbon-cutting ceremony with Caledon's Mayor Allan Thompson had to be delayed. And it just so happened Thompson's visit ended up coin-

ciding with the businesses' one-year anniversary weekend.

Thompson visited on June 24 for the grand opening ceremony, and British Bites held a one-year anniversary cele-

bration barbeque on June 25.

Kreuzwiesner was born in Norwich, England, and moved to Canada when she was eight years old. She has lived in Bolton since the 1980s and went to Humberview

High School.

She jokes that nobody believes she's from Norwich because she doesn't have an accent. Even though she moved to Canada at a young age, Kreuzwiesner said she was raised on British food and was always going out to British stores in the GTA to get it.

Before British Bites, Kreuzwiesner and Allen were working together in the restaurant industry. They were looking for a new business opportunity, and Allen — who Kreuzwiesner said is a phenomenal chef — really wanted to focus on hand pies.

"I said to him, we can't really open a place just making hand pies, so how about I put a little British shop in and just carry a few products to try to bring people in that way as well. And the British part has kind of taken off," said Kreuzwiesner.

And taken off it has. Kreuzwiesner explained she wanted to start small with the business, thinking of long-term success. She originally stocked around 100 different products. Since opening, she has done her best to accommodate requests for products from customers, and now boasts an inventory of around 500 products.


She also keeps a running list where people can request the import of specific items.

"It's been fantastic, It's been more than we expected," said Kreuzwiesner. She's always trying to learn more about British products and share that information with customers, and said customers often teach her new things too.

"We get more than just British people in here... most people, when they try the chocolate or try the candy, they come back," said Kreuzwiesner. "The big difference between British goods and Canadian goods is even in the candy... there is no artificial colours or flavours. Everything is done with fruit and vegetable concentrate."

It's not just about the sweets and treats at British Bites either, as Kreuzwiesner brings in frozen British products like pasties, bacon and sausages. And Allen's hand pies, while not actually British, can be cooked at home or at the store.

"We get people in here from Brampton, I get people from Woodbridge, I get people from King City. I get people from (all over) Caledon. I've had somebody come in here from Mississauga looking for our hand pies because somebody in their lunch room was eating one and they were saying how good it was. And they drove all the way from Mississauga to come pick them up, they picked up 20 of them," said Kreuzwiesner. "It's a slow, long process to get your name out there and get established as a business. But we're hoping by starting small and growing it that we'll do it right, rather than the other way around, not being able to cover bills. So, we plan to be here for a long time."

York United fell 2-1 to the Vancouver Whitecaps in the Canadian Championship semifinals last week and returned home to York Lions Stadium over the weekend to fall 3-1 to Valour FC.

As reported last week, the Canadian Championship semi-final was the final match for York United fullback Diyaeddine Abzi.

Abzi is off to Ligue 2 to join Pau FC.

The Nine Stripes put on a display of their defensive talents and abilities, however this game was all about the Vancouver Whitecaps.

The 61st minute was York United's first real chance to score a goal and it was Abzi on the tail end of that chance. From a freekick, Abzi whipped the ball low around the wall, forcing Cody Cropper to make a good stop.

In the 73rd minute, Brian White found the back of the net this time on the half-volley from a cross into the box from Ryan Gauld to extend the lead.

In the 84th minute, a wonderful creative play from Isaiah Johnston put York United in striking

Indiana loves Canada: Pacers draft two Canadians in 2022 NBA Draft

Not only did the Indiana Pacers marvel at the talent of all four Canadians available at this year's NBA Draft, the organization's front office stuck to their guns and brought a few of them on board.

With the sixth overall selection, the Pacers selected Montreal, QC native Bennedict Mathurin and then with the No. 31 overall pick, the Pacers went on to select Aurora's own Andrew Nembhard.

For the fourth time in NBA Draft history, four or more Canadians were selected in a single year.

With the seventh overall selection the Portland Trail Blazers took London, ON, native Shaedon Sharpe and with the No. 32 pick, the Orlando Magic snagged Mississauga, ON, native Caleb Houstan.

Mathurin, a 6-foot-7 guard out of Arizona is coming off an incredible season. Mathurin averaged 17.7 points, 5.6 rebounds and 2.5 assists per game. He was named Pac-12 player of the year and even made the All-Pac-12 first-team at the end of the season.

The highly touted wing will surely be quite an impact player.

And the same goes for Andrew Nembhard. The 6-foot-5-point guard was named a Bob Cousy Point Guard Award finalist and helped lead the Gonzaga Bulldogs to the No. 1 ranked team in all of the NCAA last season.

When he transferred from the Florida Gators to the Gonzaga Bulldogs, it was seemingly the perfect fit for Nembhard. In 32 games this past season, Nembhard averaged 11.8 points, 3.4 rebounds and 5.8 assists.

With these draft picks, the Pacers will now house four Canadian players on their roster.

Both Mathurin and Nembhard, will join Toronto native Oshae Brissett and Dominican Republic-born guard who was raised in Montreal, Chris Duarte.

According to reports ahead of the 2022 NBA Draft, the Pacers were testing the trade market involving star centre Myles Turner and guard Malcolm Brogdon.

After trading versatile forward Domantas Sabonis in a six-player deal with the Sacramento Kings at the trade deadline last year, it was clear to everyone the Pacers are interested in rebuilding.





Highway 413: **Death of the Farm**

BY DAN O'REILLY

Stretching from Highway 401 near Milton and deadening at Highway 400 just south of the King Sideroad, the 59-kilometre-long mega highway will have profound and detrimental impacts on their lives, livelihoods, and communities.

Especially hard hit will be the Orr Family of Mill Road, whose future in farming is in

Approximately one-quarter of the land Peter Orr rents for his cash crop operation are in the direct path of the highway's route.

And 40 acres of that land is dedicated to an organic farm his son Dean started in 2020. On that land, he grows soya and kidney beans and last year planted quinoa on a 1.4-acre plot in a test experiment in partnership with, and supported by, the Ecological Farmers Association of Ontario.

"It (the test) didn't work out very well. I planted the grain in June which is probably too late."

"Quinoa is more of a cold climate crop," he says, noting they were originally cultivated in

Certified by the Canada Organic Regime, Dean's plan this year is to plant three test sections, one in late April, the second in late May, and the third in early June.

Although graduating from the University of Guelph in 2018 with a Bachelor of Science in Psychology, a Bachelor of Science in Human Kinetics, and a Minor in Neuroscience, Dean returned to his agricultural roots and works part-time for his father.

"I am concerned about climate change and thought I could do something about it being

His entry into organic farming opened after his father acquired the 40-acre rental property which had been used solely for haying for decades and did not have any residual pesticides. As such, he was able to meet the Canada Organic Regime's rigorous standards.

All that effort and investment will be lost if construction of Highway 413 proceeds. The highway will have particularly severe impact on his father's operation and will wipe out his business. The larger overarching concern is the impact it will have on the Greater Toronto Area, he says.

"I think what concerns me as much as having our business get pushed into a cor-

ner is that it says a lot about the provincial government's approach to food security. All that land that is in the proposed highway as well as what is being developed in the GTA is great farmland, and habitat, but it's also the farmland and habitat closest to Toronto and the rest of the GTA. The government and local municipalities seem to be okay with building [negative] equity in the form of food insecurity and instability. Not to mention a reduction in the ecological systems that allow us to do our jobs. They are setting [us] up for a real disaster."

In Laskay, well-known activist and Highway 413 opponent Sherry Draisey is "downright frightened" about the future of the historic community where she and her husband Mayes Mullins have lived for the past 40 years in, what is believed to be, the hamlet's oldest house.

"It (the highway) will be the end of Las-

Apart from the loss of several of its original buildings, such as the relocation of Laskay Hall to the King Township Museum in King City in 2017, the community has to contend with traffic bottle necks at the Weston Road/King Sideroad intersection. Drivers use Weston Road on weekends to bypass Highway 400 and that traffic congestion will be

multiplied if Highway 413 is built, she says. Similar fears are shared by Nancy and Alan Hopkinson. Residents of Nobleton since 1974, they have watched it swell from a small village with one traffic light to one with more than its share of traffic congestion on both Highway 27 and the King Sideroad. As Highway 413 includes a planned Highway 27 interchange just south of the King-Vaughan Townline, more traffic will be funneled into the community, says Nancy.

"We are in a climate emergency and we need to reduce our CO2 emissions and make public transit more attractive," she says, adding that living in Nobleton requires "getting into your car to drive anywhere."

Apart from the traffic escalation, Highway 413 will severely limit spaces to enjoy nature, says Nancy. The retired couple like to hike in nearby conservation areas such as Cold Creek and the Nashville Conservation Tract- which, like Dean Orr's organic farm- is in the direct route of the Highway 413 corridor.





"It's not our fault" - don't blame farmers for rising food prices

If you think that food prices have risen too much and too fast over the past year, just wait until the next crop is harvested and you may be in for another shock.

Rising food prices have been a real concern as families are starting to feel the squeeze when it comes to putting dinner on the table.

While farmers may be responsible for growing the crops, raising cattle, and feeding the nation, they are not responsible for the rise in prices you see at the grocery store.

Like everything in trade, commerce, and production, the end cost is eventually determined by the cost of producing goods in the first place.

Local Beeton farmer, John Alexiou, places the blame on federal government policies that have placed a tariff on fertilizers as well as fuel prices which have more than doubled over the past two years.

John raises cash crops like wheat, potatoes, beans, and corn on his farms in Beeton and Cobdon. John and other farmer want the public to know it's not farmers who are raising the cost of food.

A lot of the fertilizers that farmers need to grow crops originates in Russia. The Federal government has placed a tariff on Russian fertilizers as a response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine, however the tariff is levied against Canadian farmers – not the Russians.

"The government has put some nasty tariffs on us that the consumer doesn't know about," John explained. "The majority of our fertilizer comes from Russia. That's where all the deposits are – potash, nitrogen, phosphorous. There is a lot of potash in Saskatchewan, but nitrogen and potassium, a lot of that comes from Russia. It's a good practice for farmers to buy fertilizer in the winter before the price goes up in the spring. The government put a 35 per cent tariff on us to slow us down

from buying fertilizer. It's punishing us. If we don't put fertilizer down we're not going to have a crop, then you're going to get food shortages for sure. If you don't put fertilizer down, it's a recipe for disaster. My fertilizer bill is up 48 per cent before the tariff, and the tariff is 35 per cent, so we're pushing over 80 per cent on production just to grow. Last year for potatoes I was spending \$300 per acre on fertilizer, this year it's \$600, now add the 35 per cent tariff on top of that."

In addition, tractors and machinery required to run a farm need fuel. With fuel prices doubled over the past year, farmers are spending that much more every time they need to plow a field or harvest a crop.

All this is forcing the cost of production up. John predicts that you can expect to see prices in grocery stores increase dramatically in the near future.

"The grocery store – the price there hasn't increased accordingly, because the crop that we are growing and that is costing double, hasn't made it to the shelf yet. For example, right now, there's no money in potatoes. I'm doing a Hail Mary hoping they will pay more. Farmers are price takers, not price makers. We don't make the prices, we have to take what they pay. Our government is punishing us, while thinking they are punishing them. At the end of the day, that's our livelihood. We depend on fertilizer to grow our crops. We're still going to buy it – we need it. It's a need, not a want. I'd like to know where the tariff money is going. It's not that Putin is charging us more, it's Canada saying, if you want to buy Russian fertilizer you're going to pay 35 per cent more."

To make the situation even worse, the government backdated the tariff six months, so farmers have to pay extra for fertilizer they bought even before the Russian invasion of Ukraine began.

izer supplier to Ontario farmers, urges farmers to contact local elected officials and MPs to explain that the tariffs do not penalize the Russian producers but place an unfair burden on Ontario farmers.

The letter goes on to say, "The challenge we now face, is the 35% tariff on existing purchase orders made prior to March 2nd. Since the purchase contracts were done months ago, this tariff does not penalize the Russian business but only impacts the Ontar-

John said farming associations have been lobbying the federal government without success. They have had more understanding at the provincial level, but the provincial government does not have any kind of real jurisdiction on the matter.

"This is something consumers have to understand. If we're at 80 per cent higher in production, once these crops get harvested and processed it's going to be a rude awakening for consumers."
