September 30 also marks Orange Shirt Day, September 30 was the National Day for an Indigenous-led grassroots movement to raise awareness about the impact of residential schools. Former residential school student Phyllis (Jack) Webstad had her new orange shirt, bought by her grandmother, taken from her as a six-year-old girl on her first day of residential school. The orange shirt has come to be a symbol of the stripping away of culture, freedom and self-esteem experienced by Indig-

enous people over generations.

"The annual Orange Shirt Day on September 30 opens the door to global conversation on all aspects of residential schools... the date was chosen because it is the time of year in which children were taken from their homes to residential schools, and because it is an opportunity to set the stage for anti-racism and anti-bullying policies for the coming school year," reads the Orange Shirt Day website.

Upgrades to include a makerspace and recording studio

Valleywood residents will soon have a cutting-edge facility right on their doorsteps.

The Caledon Public Library (CPL) has announced construction will soon begin on the Margaret Dunn Valleywood branch of the CPL, transforming it into the Margaret Dunn Valleywood Collaboration Studio.

When complete, the branch will play host to a makerspace, which boasts tools like 3-D printers, audio and video recording and editing equipment, and traditional crafting supplies.

The branch will also be home to a recording studio and various meeting and collaborative work spaces — and the books will still be there too.

Mary Maw, the CPL's Manager of Communications, explained the upgrades to the Margaret Dunn Valleywood branch of the CPL are being made possible thanks to the federal and provincial government through the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program, and the Town of Caledon.

"Our collections will focus on supporting these new services with special collections for local businesses and entrepreneurs and an emphasis on technology, making, and creativity," said the CPL in a statement. The CPL plans to host a variety of maker, technology, and craft workshops at the upgraded Valleywood branch. It also plans to collaborate with the Town of Caledon's economic development team to host events for local businesses, and with the Town's recreation team to host events for residents.

Construction on the branch is set to begin in early November, meaning the branch will be closed for a minimum of three months. The exterior drop box at the branch will still be available for use, and the community room adjacent to the branch will also still be available.

Maw said, during the closure, library staff are happy to serve Valleywood residents at the CPL's other locations.

Groves said it's important that any debates held in Caledon be hosted by an unbiased group and have an unbiased moderator.


She said she's willing to participate in any such credible debates that are free from bias for any one candidate.

New memorandum of understanding between Caledon, MCFN to be signed this week

"It is an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come."

On September 30 in Caledon, Mayor Allan Thompson raised the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation flag at Caledon's Town Hall in Caledon East. The flag raising is meant to serve as a symbol to Caledon residents that the Town recognizes the history of Indigenous people in Canada, and that the Town is committed to working towards reconciliation.

Since September 24, Caledon's Town Hall has been lit up by orange lights to show respect to those impacted by the residential school system

The lights will remain on until October 7.

On that day, the Town of Caledon and Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN) will be signing a new memorandum of understanding.

The Town touts this memorandum as a significant step in formalizing ongoing efforts to create a mutually respectful relationship between the two groups. Mayor Thompson, MCFN Chief Stacey LaForme, representatives from MCFN, Caledon council, and members of the Town's senior leadership team are set to be in attendance at the signing.

Thompson said the memorandum means setting

up a relationship where the Town of Caledon will look at everything it does through an environmental lens and Indigenous lens.

"It's been a wonderful, great experience, I've learned so much," said Thompson.

He also explained the Caledon signs people see when they come into Town will soon say that Caledon is on the treaty lands and territories of the

"I have always felt that municipalities play an important role in the work of reconciliation in communities," said Thompson. "We are proud of the work we have done in Caledon to advance and include Indigenous culture into our plans, policies and service delivery."

Also happening on October 7 will be the unveiling of an orange crosswalk at the Caledon Centre for Recreation and Wellness. The crosswalk is being implemented to remember and honour the children who died in residential schools, as well as to acknowledge the strength and resilience of residential school survivors and their descendants.

The Town's chief administrative officer, Carey Herd, said with the crosswalk the Town wants to demonstrate that it's a partner and champion for equity in Caledon.

"The crosswalk serves as a reminder of the role that each of us play in advancing reconciliation within the Caledon community," said Herd.



ARMED ROBBERY INVESTIGATION

Officers from the Caledon Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have responded to a second armed robbery in Bolton in a week and are requesting the public's assistance

"On September 23, 2022, at approximately 5:27 p.m., Caledon OPP was alerted of a robbery that took place at a business at 18 King Street East in the Town of Caledon," said Police. "The investigation revealed that at approximately 5:12 p.m., two males entered the business, one of which was holding a firearm, and demanded the location where narcotics were kept. A third male waited outside in the driver seat of an older model black sedan. They fled the scene westbound on King Street East at a high rate of speed with a quantity of currency and narcotics."

The following descriptors were obtained:

Suspect 1: Male, black, thin built, 18-25 years old, 5'3", wearing a grey hoodie, dark blue pants, white shotes, a surgical mask, and yellow construction gloves. This suspect carried a black duffle bag and a black pistol

Suspect 2: Male black, thin built, 18-25 years old, 5'5", wearing a black hoodie, grey or camo pants, black shoes with red accents, a surgical mask, and yellow construction gloves

Suspect 3: Male, black, thin built, wearing a surgical mask and a black or dark grey hoodie

"A week later, on September 30, 2022, at apeximately 10:43 a.m., Caledon OPP responded to an additional armed robbery that had just taken place. Police have information to believe that the suspects and vehicle used are the same. They left with a quantity of narcotics and currency. The vehicle is believed to be an older model black Honda, possibly an Accord. Video surveillance is not yet available. 

Large day of action against 413 held along proposed highway's route

"We started at Countryside and Clarkway, next to a cow and sheep pasture, and went north to Mayfield, near where one of the future on-ramps is slated to be for the proposed 413. We crossed the intersection and continued north on Humber Station Road, where we stopped at Malhi Organic Farm to buy some produce and show appreciation for what this land currently does: feed people!" said de Groot. "Then we continued, passing by the 100-acre farm where I grew up. All of the buildings have been torn down, the laneway is overgrown and inaccessible, but the willow tree is still huge and gorgeous."

The fields on the farm where de Groot grew up are now mostly rented out by local farmers, who grow crops on them to try and make ends meet. However, de Groot said just behind the farm is Amazon and other warehouses, and that more are on their way thanks to the provincial government's promise to build the 413.

"We carried on north to Humber Station and Healey, the northwest corner of which is now officially slated as the grounds for a hospital campus, thanks to the donation of the Wilson family... then west to our route's end at Healey and The Gore, where another future on-ramp is slated to go. We passed many homes, some still in construction, along the way — we wondered how aware these new homeowners are of the looming threat of a highway on their doorstep. And though we passed many farm fields, strangely and sadly there are very few standing or occupied farm houses."

Trustee candidate Roman believes in equitable access to safe and inclusive education

Sheralyn Roman believes in everybody's equitable access to a safe and inclusive education.

And she's taking that belief on the hustings in a bid to be voted a trustee on the Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board. She's running against three candidates to represent the board's Dufferin-Caledon region.

Voters will make their choice October 24.

"Our goal must be one that emphasizes providing the resources necessary for every child to succeed," Roman said. "Further, I feel educators, in consultation with various experts, are the people best-positioned to determine curriculum content rather than single-focus special-interest groups."

She believes the role of school board trustee is about advocacy for families facing a challenging situation for a child or children. Trustees are advocates for the community of schools and parishes to various levels of government regarding funding, she said.

"They address matters of concern in education as an advocate for all teachers, staff, and administration," she said. "We work together to find solutions to the various challenges facing education."

Roman would like to see improvements in how and where education funding is allocated, how the funding is used, and "where the opportunities exist to do better to ensure every classroom has what it needs to foster student success," she said.

Students, teachers, and other school staff need to be kept safe from the novel coronavirus. Safety needs to be enhanced with better COVID-19 protocols.

Roman said the role and purpose of the provincial Education Equality and Accountability Office (EQAO) standardized testing needs to be reviewed.

"In a world where nothing is standard, I feel the significant funding allocated to EOAO could be better utilized elsewhere."

Roman said.

She said she's been involved in almost every aspect of the education system from parent volunteer, parish representative, and parent council chairperson to an emergency on-call supply teacher.

She also supported early learners reading one-on-one as part of the All-Star Reading Program.

"I've been hands-on in the school system for many years," she said.

She said her time as a parish representative and her parent council involvement through high school years provides her with valuable insight and understanding about the challenges facing education.

Roman is a former teacher with the Sheridan College School of Business. She has a background in human resources and she now works in communication and volunteers extensively in the community.

"These latter skills are critical to forming and maintaining relationships with my fellow trustees and working together with parents, the parish, teachers and administration to resolve concerns with mutual respect and that provide outcomes everyone can support," Roman said.





Things that should be taught to our children



We're all products of the education system. Some are recent graduates, others like us Boomers, are throw-backs to simpler times.

But we're all formed, molded and changed by those years in high school and post-secondary

Most of us remember those times, awkward moments and, yes, shenanigans, in high school.

Weird sentiments in our yearbooks stand as testaments to times enjoyed, but forgotten. I recommend dusting off those books and flipping through history if you get a chance. It's good for a laugh if nothing else.

In the 1980s, we had academics, but we also had shop class and yes, home ec. We even had the option of reversing these stereotypical classes. Kids learned some basic skills – how to change a tire or a car's oil; how to fix a hole in your jeans; how to cook a simple meal

Alas, all of these basic skills courses have fallen by the wayside, making room for more academic, more structured forms of learning.

Helping three children through the system has taught me a lot, let me tell you. I learned right along with them. And, I've discovered some disconcerting things.

One thing I just can't fathom is the "sameness" of it all. The course outlines, subjects and even assignments didn't change in the 10 years my kids were in high school. In fact, we can find all their essays and reports on their desktop and confirm the subjects are still the same.

There were reference articles that were decades old. Some are really bad quality photocopies, turned into PDFs. Why would anyone cite information from the early 2000s when so much has changed and come to light?

I hope it's not apathy or laziness on the part of the teachers or school boards. Some things do not of time itself. But we older, "wise guys" know the stand the test of time, trust me.

As a writer by profession, I find it odd that students – at all levels – have to follow strict essay formats, citation methods and reference checks. Sure, I understand it's a way to get them to research, take notes and document information. But not, they must. come on, who uses MLA or APA formats in the

They created the CAT-Kit program, which consists of various visual, interactive, and other customizable tools that teach kids how to communicate effectively with their peers, with adults, and with other authority figures.

Off-shoots of empathy are kindness and putting others ahead of oneself. Respect is another biggie.

Another "course" I'd like to see it Self-Esteem 101. Nothing is more important than building a sense of self-confidence and self-worth.

Everything begins there. High self-esteem matters because it helps you develop coping skills, handle adversity, and puts the negative into per-



New exhibition coming to Alton Mill Arts Centre

"Inside the Hive" to showcase encaustic and cold wax art

Caledon residents will "bee" able to see a unique new art exhibition this month.

"Inside the Hive" is a new exhibition that opened on October 5 in the Headwaters Arts Gallery at the Alton Mill Arts Centre.

It's showcasing the work of artists Kim Kool and Karen Brown, both of whom work in the encaustic and cold wax mediums.

Over 60 of the artists' works will be on display.

Kool and Brown have a close connection to the Alton Mill Arts Centre, since they both create and teach out of a studio there.

Encaustic paintings are created by mixing beeswax with pigments in various forms, and they've been created for a very long time.

"Examples of encaustic paintings have survived from the Roman empires and are still as vibrant and colourful today as they were when they were painted," said Brown, who grew up on a farm in the countryside. "It's not art until it becomes personal. That personal quality of life and art are what I am striving for. I want my life to reflect the best of me and my art to be an expression of who I am."

Kool discovered encaustic painting when she was delivering a weekly social recreation program at a women's prison. She said it was a serendipitous occurrence.

"The moment I dipped my paintbrush into that first pot of wax, I knew that my life was about to change," said Kool. "My love for encaustic painting has only grown since then and I am so grateful to have the opportunity to paint and teach throughout the province."

Brown said as part of "Inside the Hive", information about the lives of honeybees will be shared, considering that they're "collaborators" in the artists' work. Brown and Kool's artwork includes everything from smaller pieces like keepsake boxes and art cards, to fine art pieces of all sizes.

"The show is guaranteed to enchant and intrigue art enthusiasts and visitors to the Headwaters Arts Gallery," said Headwaters Arts in a media release. "Prepare to be amazed with the breadth

of creative expression that Brown and Kool have showcased in their collaboration with the

industrious bee."

An opening reception for "Inside the Hive" will be held on Saturday, October 8 from 1 to 5 p.m. at the Alton Mill Arts Centre. "Inside the Hive" will run until November 6.

ing and dangerous commute for residents, who are required to travel on our main arterial roads of Highway 50 and Coleraine Drive with an extensive amount of transport trucks. Trying to access the newly developed 427 Highway with inadequate road access is a challenge.

"This is a perfect example of poor public policy and lack of foresight from the Regional level, knowing well in advance that our community would be the primary users of this highway via Hwy. 50 and Coleraine Drive.

The advocate for Catholic education was first elected as trustee to the Toronto Catholic District School Board in 1988, serving through 1994.






"There's a lot of ups and downs in a year. Like you've seen in today's game, it was up

At the end of the day, it is all about the Just months after the Toronto Blizzard

began a historic partnership with FC Bayern Munich, one of the city's most prominent development academies did it again.

Just a few weeks ago, Toronto Blizzard began an exclusive partnership with FC Emery to promote the long-term development of young soccer players.

FC Emery, which currently houses a few players from Aurora, was established in 1991, originally as a men's futsal program. But over time, the club grew and became an academy, poised for competitive soccer. HFX Wanderers player Mohammad Omar, earned his trade in this system.

The Toronto Blizzard, on the other hand, formally competed in the North American Soccer League from 1979-1984. This elite academy is also where players in the past have earned full rides and their structure is one of the best around.

In speaking with the head of FC Emery, Angel Granja said when he spoke to the head of the Toronto Blizzard, Joe Parolini, he approached him with a plan and had numerous players in need of his infrastructure.

"It's more affordable for the kids and it works out for us as well. They have the coaching staff, they have the players. He has the accessibility for the USA that we needed. He has everything that we're looking for, for the next phase of our development," Granja said.

In his experience, Granja has seen players enroll into the Ontario Player Development League (OPDL) and opt out due to high costs, a key factor for many players who financially cannot pay to play in the league.

"It's about working together for the sport. Even though we're seeing the national team developed in Canada, promoting the game has never been our gold standard...Even if the kid can't play, do we have a development program? We generated a beginner's

program for U13 and up," Granja said.

"We're not looking for superstars. We're looking to make kids' opportunities better. That's all it is. If they continue the sport, we're growing the sport. If they get a degree, or if they continue professionally, that's even better."

With this merger, yes, more players will have flexibility with less monetary strain on

But in its totality, can we potentially see this to happen between clubs in the foreseeable future?

When asked, Granja said no. Each club might not be keen on merging with another. Lots of clubs can be competitive that way and want to have a better system than the other. The cold truth, unfortunately, but in reality, it can most certainly be the nature of a competitor.

If this is something that can happen in other communities, this isn't particularly a bad thing. If a player doesn't fit right at one club, they should be recommended to try out for another. The care into player development has most certainly grown. The players are looking for outlets and they are seeking clubs in prime positions for their services.

Canada Soccer has become a lot better in recent years. It is why we currently see the success of our national team. To finally return to the World Cup since their first and only appearance in 1986 speaks volumes on all of the work this country has been doing to get this nation there.

And there will be another in 2026 – the first time in the country's history to have back-to-back appearances. Now isn't that something?

To say every club should merge might be overstepping a fine line in some instances. But, if we're all in it for the development of the players and to further promote the game, is there truly a harm?

With the Toronto Blizzard merging with a second club – and this time a local one - can this happen with others? There are many questions. We'll have to wait to find





When a pastel painting is finished, it's framed with glass over it to protect its finish.


