Youth Activists Inc. launches environmental education campaign

On July 22, the highest ever average global temperature was recorded: 17.16 degrees Celsius.

The hottest days in human history have all happened within the last decade.

A local non-profit, non-partisan organization called Youth Activists Inc. wants to bring attention to the fact the earth is warming and counter a rising tide of climate change denial.

On July 26, Youth Activists announced the launch of a new environmental education campaign called "Ignorance Isn't Bliss".

Dmytro Basmat, President of Youth Activists, said he's seen firsthand how climate misinformation can spread rapidly among young people and lead to confusion and inaction.

ecoCaledon promotes water conservation through rain barrel program

Barrels can be purchased at Davis Feed & Farm Supply

Caledon residents have a unique opportunity to conserve water thanks to efforts from a local non-profit.

For those who don't know, local non-profit ecoCaledon has been running a rain barrel program for nearly 30 years. The program was initially a collaboration with the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority and saw rain barrels sent out to local high schools. Students at the schools would decorate the barrels and they would then be auctioned off.

While that no longer happens, the rain barrel program is still very much alive. Lucrezia Chiappetta, co-chair of ecoCaledon, explained the program is one of ecoCaledon's most popular initiatives.

"People are looking to find ways to conserve water that they can then use to water their gardens and their plants," said Chiappetta. "We repurpose food-grade barrels (into rain barrels) so there's a recycling element to it, too... these barrels probably wouldn't have been used again but we've found a new purpose for them."

Volunteers with ecoCaledon create the barrels, and residents can purchase them for \$70 at Davis Feed & Farm Supply which carries the barrels on ecoCaledon's behalf. The \$70 covers the cost of the barrel, with anything left over going towards a bursary for local high school students pursuing higher education.

Guidance counsellors and teachers recommend students who have displayed environmental leadership for the bursaries, Chiappetta added. "It highlights their contribution to the community," said Chiappetta.

While local high school students no longer paint the barrels, Chiappetta noted painting them can be a very fun activity for families to do together.

She painted her rain barrel with her kids.

Chiappetta said ecoCaledon wants to promote their rain barrel project this year and make it more well-known in the community. She said many people place their rain barrels right by their gardens for easy access. Rain barrels are a great way to conserve water and are used in places across Caledon such as at the Albion Hills Community Farm.

"Our goal is to equip Canadian youth with the knowledge and tools they need to recognize and counter false information about climate change," said Basat.

Basmat said as the earth continues to warm, climate events are getting increasingly dangerous. He said the Ignorance Isn't Bliss campaign focuses on educating young Canadians on the everyday impacts of climate change and how misinformation contributes to climate change denial.

The campaign consists of a series of videos that educate with a light-hearted and comedic approach. Basmat said it's a by-youth, for-youth campaign that provides youth with fact-based resources to fight misinformation.

Olena Kania, Project Coordinator of the Ignorance Isn't Bliss campaign, said cli-

mate change is one of the most pressing issues of our time.

"It's crucial that young Canadians understand its real impacts," said Kania. "With this campaign, we hope to inspire a generation of informed and proactive environmental advocates who can drive meaningful change for their communities and for the country."

Youth Activists Inc. has launched seven advocacy campaigns since its inception and has reached over 155,000 youth across Canada. Its campaigns are primarily funded through community grants from the Town of Caledon and County of Dufferin.

Largest-ever Midnight Madness event in the works

Student volunteers stepping up to help with annual street party

Midnight Madness, Bolton's signature street party, just keeps getting bigger.

The event returns on August 9 this year in Downtown Bolton and will feature double the number of vendors, an expanded stage and entertainment area, and more food vendors than ever before.

The event is being held by the Downtown Bolton Business Improvement Area (BIA) with support from the Bolton Community Crew (BCC) and a large contingent of dedicated volunteers.

Sarah Leslie, a volunteer with the BCC who's been helping to run the event for years, saluted the growth.

"Usually we have around 35 vendors, this year we have over 70," said Leslie. "Queen Street and Stern Street will be full of vendors, and I'll have a DJ on Queen Street to keep the party going... the municipal parking lot will be the entertainment zone and have a bigger stage."

Leslie said there will be 14 food vendors at the event and a massive kids' zone in the Tim

Hortons parking lot. There will be two inflatables, a magic show, face painting, cotton candy and more for kids.

Headlining the new bigger stage in the entertainment zone will be a 12-piece band called the Soul of Motown. Supporting acts include saxophone soloist Marco Marrone and local band Ramblin' Soul.

Leslie said Midnight Madness is always a big success and an event the community looks forward to. She said something that's enabled the event to grow this year is the fact that so many student volunteers have stepped up to help.

"They're trying to get their volunteer hours and help out the community, so we have a lot of extra help this year, which is great. I think that's what's going to make this even more successful than it has been in the past," said Leslie.

Leslie said there's some new businesses in Downtown Bolton and that this year's Midnight Madness will be great for introducing the community to them.

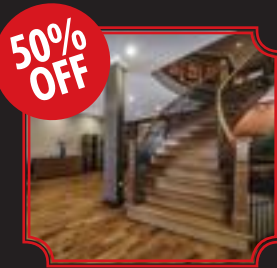

IMPAIRED CHARGES

Officers from the Caledon Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have charged a driver involved in a two-vehicle collision with impaired operation.

“On July 26, 2024, shortly after 4:00 p.m., Caledon OPP responded to a two-vehicle collision on Mayfield Road, near McLaughlin Road, in the Town of Caledon,” say Police. “Minor injuries were reported. During the investigation, officers formed grounds that one of the drivers’ ability to operate a motor vehicle was impaired by alcohol and was subsequently arrested.”

As a result of the investigation, Sherpap Singh, 25, of Brantford, was charged with:

- Operation while impaired - blood alcohol concentration (80 plus)

The accused is scheduled to attend the Ontario Court of Justice in Orangeville on August 15, 2024, to answer to the charge. The driver’s licence was also suspended for 90 days, and the vehicle impounded for seven.

The charge has not been proven.

“If you plan on drinking or consuming drugs, plan to not drive. Instead, arrange for a designated driver, take a taxi or public transit, or come up with another plan that takes impaired driving out of the picture. If you suspect that someone is driving while impaired by alcohol or drugs, it is important to call 9-1-1 to report it.”

OPP TO HOST RECRUITMENT EVENT FOR WOMEN

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is hosting a recruitment event to further support women on their journey to becoming police officers.

OPP’s Women’s Symposium is being held on August 17, 2024, at OPP General Headquarters (GHQ) in Orillia.

“The OPP hosts interactive recruitment events periodically and throughout the province to support individuals who are interested in becoming police officers,” say Police. “OPP Women’s Symposium will focus on eliminating and demystifying some of the perceived barriers that women (including those who are cis, trans, assigned female at birth and non-binary) may face when considering a career in policing.

“After receiving overwhelmingly positive feedback and requests for additional events following OPP Bound, Women’s Edition, the OPP

Women’s Symposium will provide participants with the opportunity to hear from and interact with women in various ranks within the OPP. The event concludes with a shuttle run and will allow participants to prequalify their fitness level for their application.”

The event will take place Saturday, August 17, at OPP’s General Headquarters at 777 Memorial Avenue, Orillia.

Anyone interested in attending must pre-register. Attendees must adhere to the cancellation policy, dress code and instructions on the registration page. Parking will be available onsite.

INCREASED REPORTS OF “GRANDPARENT SCAMS”

The Dufferin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is warning the public that there has been an increase in reports of emer-

gency/grandparent scams. The scammers target vulnerable persons and seniors by playing upon their emotions and fear of a loved one being hurt or in trouble.

“In the typical emergency scam, the victim will receive a frantic phone call from someone claiming to be a grandchild or loved one,” say Police. “The caller will explain that they are involved in some sort of mishap like a car accident or are having trouble returning from a foreign country and need money right away. The scammer will often insist that the victim does not tell anyone. The call could also involve someone claiming to be a law enforcement official, lawyer, or bailiff.

“Be careful what you post online. Scammers can use details shared on social media platforms and dating sites. They can search your online accounts to find real names, real interests, real phone numbers and when you are going to be home or away.”

Be aware of some warning signs:

- Urgency – The scammer always makes the request sound very urgent, which

may cause the victim to not verify the story;

- Fear – The scammer plays on the victim’s emotions by generating a sense of fear. For instance, they may say, “I am scared, and I need help from you.”
- Secrecy – The scammer pleads with the victim not to tell anyone about the situation, such as, “Please don’t tell Dad, he would be so mad.”
- Request for Money – Money can be requested by money transfer or in some cases the scammer sends someone to your home to pick up the payment.

To avoid becoming a victim, check with another family member or trusted friend to verify the information before sending money or providing credit card information by phone or e-mail.

If you or someone you know may have been the victim of an ‘emergency’ scam, or any other scam report it to the OPP at 1-888-310-1122 and to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC) at www.antifraudcentre-centreantifraude.ca.

“I know that all Caledon residents are grateful for their dedication to serving our community and keeping us safe,” said Groves.

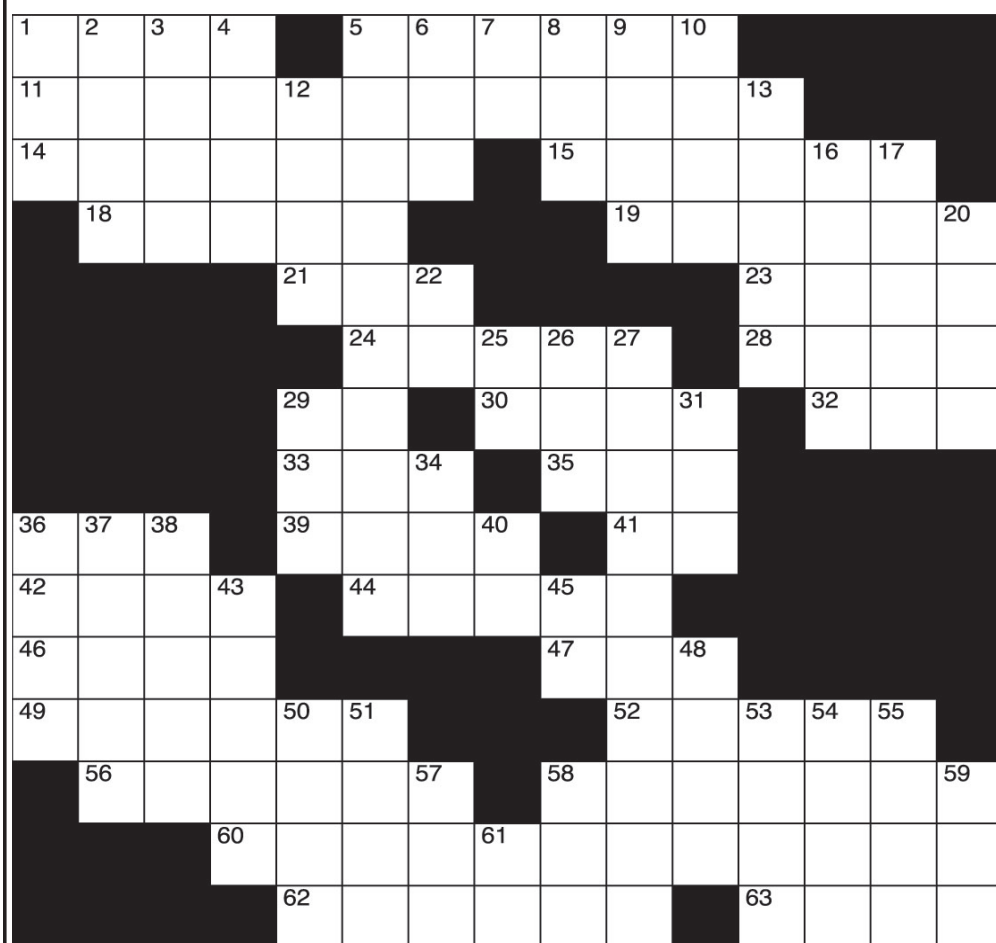
The 21 new volunteer firefighters had to undergo an extensive training program in order to graduate — they each completed 393 hours of coursework and obtained numerous certifications.

Greg Sweetnam, Executive Vice President of James Dick Construction, has been working there for 43 years. He said the company was very happy to host Ford and Jones, and that he was grateful for the kind words Ford shared while he was visiting.

"It was a pleasure to host them," said Sweetnam.

James Dick Construction will officially celebrate its 60th anniversary on September 6.

Sweetnam said the company has been proud to be one of Caledon's largest employers for the last 60 years. He said the company has provided over 100 million tons of aggregate to build cities and more during that time.

Local youth raises funds for hospitals through Walk Club

Following in the footsteps of his father who is known for his charitable efforts, Rajvir Khanuja decided that he would start a campaign and raise funds for local hospitals.

Rajvir's dad, Dr. Raj Khanuja, is known in the community for his annual free dental day he offers at several clinics in the region, and Rajvir decided he could also help the community by raising donations for a good cause.

Rajvir started the 100kms Walk Club and challenged others to join him in a series of walks to raise funds.

The walks either started or ended at Headwaters Health Care Centre.

Rajvir got the idea of raising funds for hospitals after his grandfather became ill and had to be transported to one.

His grandfather has since recovered.

The walks took place on long weekends over the course of a year and ended up raising \$11,000.

"We did 10 walks in total, and they were all done during long weekends," Rajvir explained. "It started

when my grandpa got sick, and I wanted to show appreciation."

Rajvir and his family couldn't visit his grandfather at the hospital due to COVID-19 restrictions at the time.

"From there, I was thinking about the healthcare workers and how everyone had to deal with COVID," Rajvir said. "We created a website and promoted it on social media as the 100kms Walk Club. Even if you didn't join us, you could just do the walk on your own. Each walk was 10 kilometres. Sometimes it was a little more, but never less than 10 kilometres. We raised around \$11,000, and donated to two hospitals."

The group, sometimes consisting of just three or four people, made the walk in all sorts of weather conditions.

"Once I started it, I was committed," Rajvir said, of walking in the bad weather, even when he was sick. "I still did it, otherwise I'd be lying to myself."

Sylvia Jones, MPP for Dufferin-Caledon, presented Rajvir with a certificate of recognition for his efforts at the Headwaters Dental office in Orangeville on Friday, July 26.

Beautiful fields of sunflowers are in bloom at a local farm.

Davis Family Farm, which is located in Caledon East, is hosting its annual sunflower festival now until August 18. The farm has 60 acres of sunflower fields which are perfect for strolling through and taking pictures in.

Sean Davis said the sunflowers are looking amazing this year. The festival opened on July 27, and large crowds have already been coming to the farm.

The farm is open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. every day and on Tuesdays, it stays open until 9 p.m. — though professional photographers can book time at the farm between 6 and 9 p.m. on other days of the week. There's numerous props out in the fields for photographers to use such as couches, grand pianos, and old trucks and tractors.

On August 2, Davis Family Farm will host a "Sunflower Soirée," bringing live music and a wine wagon to the farm. Davis said it will be a big fun community party out in the sunflower fields.

On August 7, Davis Family Farm will host the Caledon Music Festival for a beautiful con-

cert among the flowers.

The annual sunflower festival at Davis Family Farm serves as a fundraiser for Celiac Canada, as one dollar from every ticket to the festival sold goes to the non-profit.

On August 6, the farm will be taken over by the under-10 Caledon Hawks A hockey team for a fundraising event.

Davis said his family likes to add new and exciting things to the farm each year, and one of the new offerings in 2024 is a mini golf course.

One of the great things about the festival is how it brings people from all over Ontario, and even the world, together, said Davis. He said each year the festival brings in many people who are visiting Toronto but want to come out to the country and see the farm.

"It always makes us feel nice to see that Caledon's on the map," said Davis.

The family has created a big map on the farm, and visitors can place a pin on it to share where they are visiting from. Davis said it's amazing to see the map fill up with pins from all over.

"We love the people that come to visit and the stories they have," said Davis. "Some people are visiting a farm for the first time in their life and we explain what we do and all the work we put into it... others are people who have come from a country where they used to farm, and don't anymore, and we share stories. The best part is visiting with people."

Davis said rain has been a bit of a challenge this year, as sunflowers do indeed enjoy sunnier conditions. Still, it ultimately did not impact the sunflowers that much and the farm was able to successfully grow its fields of flowers as usual. Some flowers are actually even taller than usual

TAKE NOTICE that the Town of Caledon intends to designate the following properties as being of cultural heritage value or interest under Section 29 of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter 0.18:

18473 MAIN STREET

The property is located on the east side of Main Street, north of Charleston Sideroad, being Part of Lot 16, Concession 3 WHS, within the former geographic Township of Caledon.

The design value or physical value of the property at 18473 Main Street is linked to its one-and-a-half storey red brick farmhouse. Constructed in the early 1880s, it is a well-designed Gothic Revival Cottage-style structure that incorporates pointed arched gable windows, a grand front entrance with transom flanked by rectangular, two-over-two sash windows, and decorative dichromatic brickwork. Overall, its detailing and craftsmanship are representative of a house constructed for a prosperous farming family of the late 19th century.

The property has historical and associative value for its long-standing association with the Coulter family, who owned and lived in the farmhouse from the early 1880s to 1959. William Coulter, the son of early landowner Andrew Coulter of Etobicoke, was the first of the family to reside on the lands and farm full time. The property also has historical value and associative value for its early use as a tourism event centre in Caledon Township. From the late 1920s to the late 1950s, William's son Robert Coulter and family hosted highly popular garden parties on the farm, in addition to offering seasonal cottaging, camping and fishing activities. Attendees and musicians from across the province and northern United States would visit the property to take advantage of events on site.

The property has contextual value for its contribution in defining, maintaining and visually supporting the rural character of Caledon Township. It is also physically, visually, and historically linked to its immediate surroundings and other nearby historic properties, especially those that were part of the informal hamlet of Coulterville. The Coulter farmhouse, sitting atop a rise of land, surrounded by landscape features including dry stone walls and mature tree rows, is a landmark in the area for residents both past and present.

18906 MAIN STREET

The property is located on the west side of Main Street, north of Charleston Sideroad, being Part of lots 18 and 19, Concession 4 WHS, within the former geographic Township of Caledon.

The Dodswood Farm complex at 18906 Main Street has design and physical value for its rare examples of c.1920s Tudor Revival style dwellings and its representative early 20th century barn. Homes in the Tudor Revival style are uncommon in rural areas and more specifically in the Town of Caledon. This early 20th

century style of architecture was more common in urban contexts and is indicative of the Dods family's connections to Toronto. Both the farmhouse and gatehouse display a high degree of integrity and feature several hallmarks of the Tudor Revival style, including asymmetrical proportions, steeply sloped roofs, decorative brick infilling, windows in multiple assemblies, and stucco inlays. The central portion of the main house also retains elements of its original c.1858 Georgian structure, including its rectangular form and underlying brick construction, and six over six pane sash windows; later Neoclassical features include a grand central covered porch and porte-cochère featuring a stone base and Ionic columns.

The property has historical and associative value due to its long-standing ownership by the Dod(d)s family, who were prominent early landowners in Caledon Township and industrialists in the nearby mill village of Alton. John M. Dods, grandson of patriarch William Dods who had emigrated to the area in the 1830s, was born on and lived at the property, and was, at one time, owner of two woolen mills in Alton. His brother, Andrew Dods, became a prolific businessman and lawyer in Toronto, and was responsible for the transformation of Dodswood Farm into a country estate in the 1920s. Amongst many achievements, Andrew was also notable as founder of the Union Stock Yards in Toronto.

The property has contextual value as it helps to define, maintain, and visually support the rural character of Caledon Township. It is visually and historically connected with other nearby historic farmsteads, and, through the Dods family, is also more broadly associated with the evolution of the village of Alton. The property is a well-known historic landmark in Caledon, known since the mid 19th century as 'Dodswood Farm'.

Caledon Citizen's Student Athlete of the Week: Tri-sportsman Holleran named Mayfield's Junior Athlete of the Year

Grade 10 Mayfield Secondary School student-athlete William Holleran left for summer holidays after the 2023-24 school year with much accomplished.

Holleran served a successful term as Vice President of the school's Athletic Association and he achieved Honor Roll status with a 90+ average for the second consecutive year.

His stellar performance in cross-country, hockey, and lacrosse earned him Junior Athlete of the Year honors at Mayfield and the admiration of Mavericks' Coach Tyler Grant.

Coach Grant nominated Holleran for our paper's Student-Athlete of the Week due to "William's outstanding performance across multiple sports and his consistent dedication to improvement."

"His achievements in cross country, where he placed 3rd and 4th at ROPSSAA in consecutive years, and his role as assistant captain of the varsity hockey team demonstrate his leadership and high-level performance. Additionally, his contributions to the varsity lacrosse team's success in winning ROPSSAA and qualifying for OFSAA further highlight his versatility and commitment. William's ability to excel in both individual and team sports, along with his impressive average pace in cross country, showcases his endurance, speed, and overall athletic prowess."

The veteran Mavericks' bench boss also noted Holleran's hard work in the classroom and his Honor Roll status.

"As a student at Mayfield Secondary School, William exemplifies dedication, leadership, and academic excellence. He is actively involved in the school's athletic programs, playing hockey, lacrosse, and running cross country. His role as the vice president of the Mayfield Athletic Association reflects his leadership abilities and commitment to fostering a positive athletic environment. Academically, William maintains a high average (90+) and has been on the Honour Roll for the past two years, demonstrating his strong work ethic and ability to balance rigorous academic and athletic schedules. His dedication to both academics and athletics makes him a well-rounded and exemplary student."

Coach Grant is also impressed by "William's unwavering determination and his ability to lead by example."

"His leadership roles, both as assistant captain of the varsity hockey team and vice president of the Mayfield Athletic Association, show his commitment to guiding and inspiring his peers. William's consistent academic excellence, maintaining a high average while being heavily involved in sports, reflects his exceptional time management skills and dedication to personal growth."

Holleran's most memorable performance from the past school year was in cross-country, but Coach Grant smuggled in some hockey highlights, too.

"One key performance moment that stands out is William's average pace of 3:28 minutes per kilometer in a 5k cross country race. This achievement is not only a testament to his physical endurance and speed, but also to his mental fortitude and training discipline. Additionally, his leadership and defensive play as assistant captain of the varsity hockey team during critical games have been instrumental in the team's success, showcasing his ability to perform under pressure and lead his team effectively."

William Holleran, a sportsman for all seasons at Mayfield Secondary School, took time from his summer holidays and community sports obligations to answer our interview questions:

Caledon Citizen: What qualities did you demonstrate in your sports seasons to earn Student-Athlete of the Week honours?

William Holleran: "I ran cross country in Grade 9 placing 3rd at ROPSSAA and in Grade 10 placing 4th at ROPSSAA. Both years, the two positions qualified me for OFSAA where I competed. I played varsity hockey both in Grade 9 and Grade 10. In Grade 10, I was named the assistant captain of the varsity hockey team. Additionally, I also played on the varsity lacrosse team for the two seasons. The lacrosse team won ROPSSAA and qualified for OFSAA both years, coming 10th and 5th."

Caledon Citizen: What were your key statistics and performance moments from the 2023-

24 seasons that you are most proud of?

William Holleran: "Cross Country: Maintained an average pace of 3:28 minutes per kilometer in 5k races, showcasing endurance and dedication. Hockey: As assistant captain, led the varsity team through a tough playoff game with crucial defensive plays and assists. Lacrosse: Contributed to the varsity team's ROPSSAA win and 5th place finish at OFSAA with significant offensive and defensive efforts."

Caledon Citizen: In addition to your high school sports team(s), what other community teams do you play for and at what level?

William Holleran: "In my community, I play AA Hockey and last year I played competitive soccer in the Golden Horseshoe League and competed in the Ontario Cup. I also played competitive tennis with my tennis team in the OTA."

Caledon Citizen: How would you describe yourself as a student at Mayfield? To which sports teams and clubs do you belong? Honor Roll?

William Holleran: "At Mayfield, I played hockey, lacrosse and I ran cross country. I am also the Vice President of the Mayfield Athletic Association. While being heavily involved in the school's athletics program, I maintained a high academic average (90+) and I have been on the Honour Roll for the last two years."

Caledon Citizen: What are your post-secondary plans regarding prospective academic/athletic destinations?

William Holleran: "In the future, I hope to study in the field of mathematics and science. However, having the opportunity to play a sport at a university level would be phenomenal."

Caledon Citizen: Who is your role model in terms of the person you admire the most?

William Holleran: "One of my role models is my Uncle Joe McGuire, who was a very successful Canadian marathon runner."

Caledon Citizen: How do you feel about being nominated as The Caledon Citizen's Student-Athlete of the Week?

William Holleran: "It would be a true honor to be nominated for this award as it acknowledges the hard work and tremendous dedication put forth both on and off."

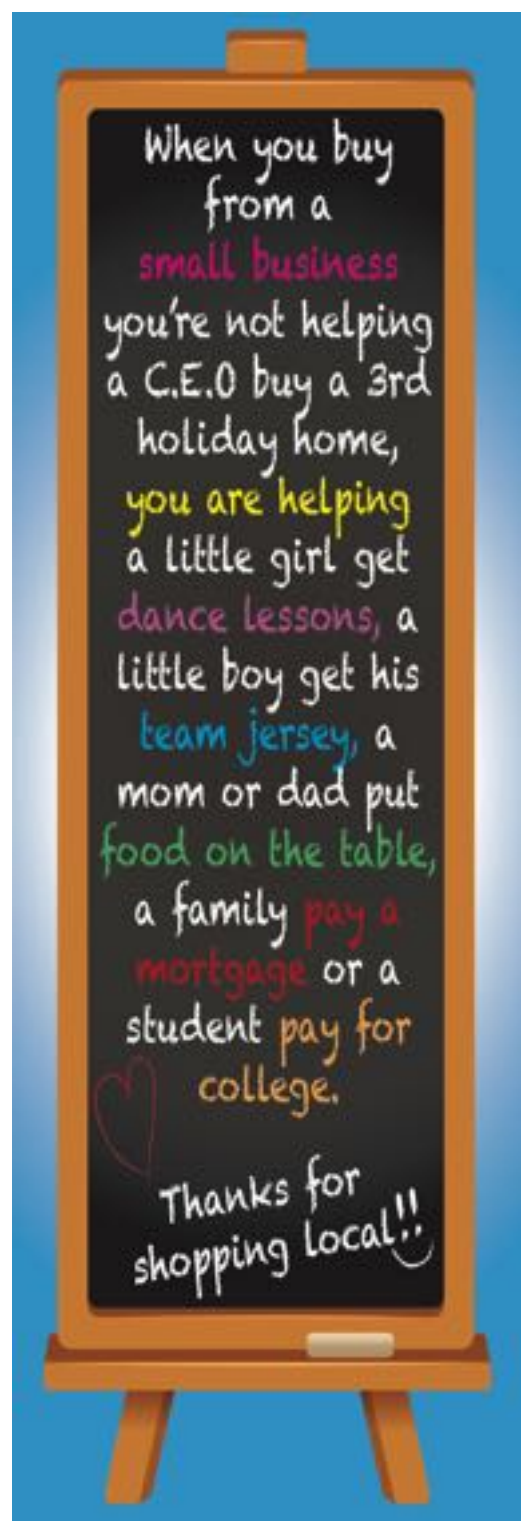

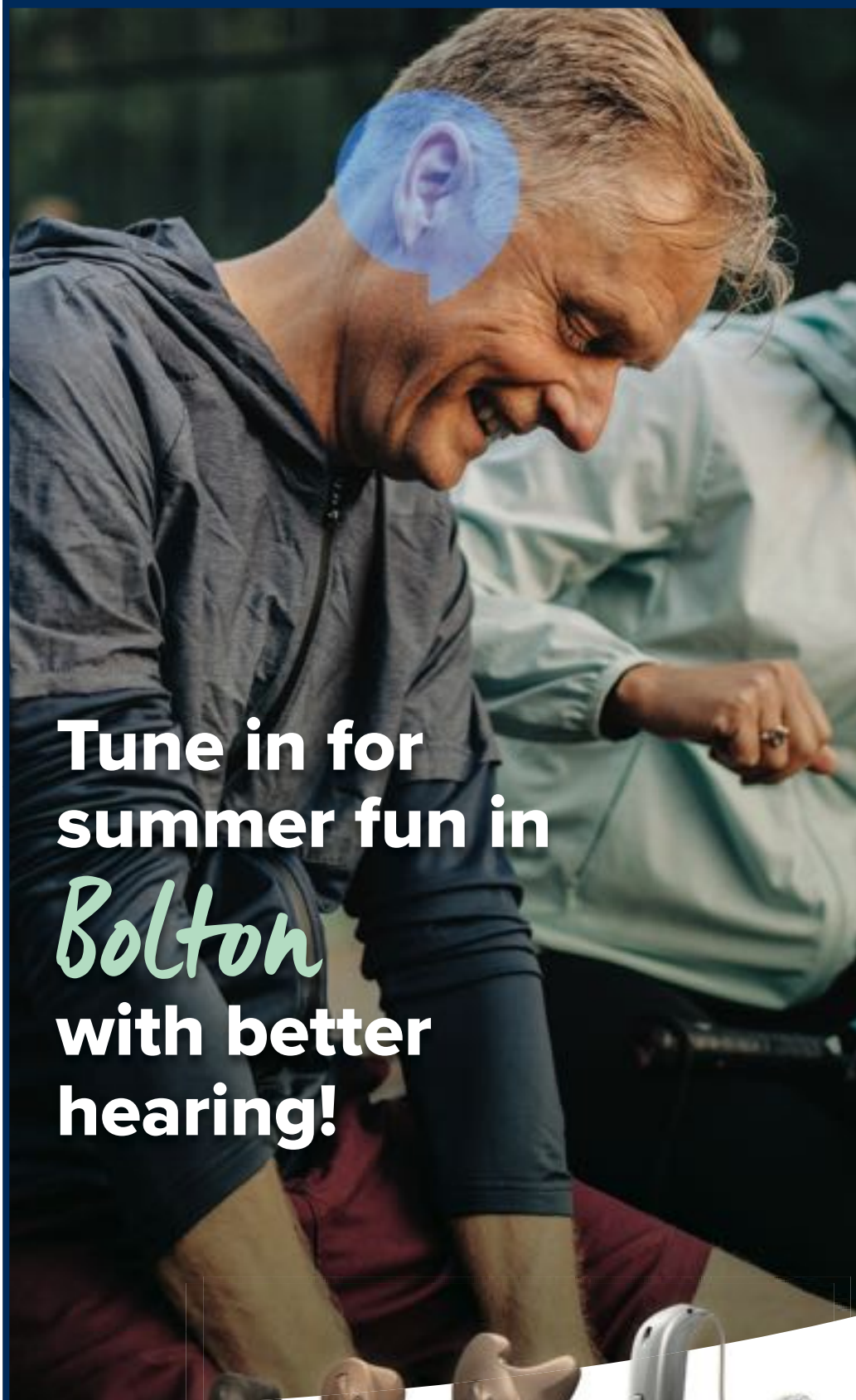

Two-time Olympian Bingham reflects in Rhode Island after preparing for Paris

Caledon's Khamica Bingham was Canada's fastest female sprinter in 2023 as she cruised to her third title at the Bell Canadian National Track and Field Championships in Vancouver.

One of her heats featured a winning time of 11.14 seconds—a personal best that year. In the 100-metre finals, the lightning-fast Bingham won with a time of 11.25, a winning margin of 0.07 seconds, to defend her national title in the marquee event last July.

It was a meaningful victory for Bingham. “It was close and dear to my heart after everything I had endured. It was also so unconventional in terms of how I prepared for the championships. My husband [Damar Forbes] became my coach. I never had a family member at any of my national championships due to distance or travel logistics. I felt that family support present at the meet with my husband as my coach.”

Flash-forward one year and the two-time Olympian is in reflective mode in Rhode Island where she is coaching the Brown University sprinters and hurdlers.

On the picture-perfect, 260-year-old campus, the personable track star is also recovering from a recurring Achilles injury that short-circuited her quest for a third successive berth on Canada's Olympic Track and Field team.

Despite the disappointment of missing her opportunity to represent Canada at the Paris Olympics, Bingham was grateful for the support she has received from her community in Caledon.

The gracious track star also extolled the virtues of the “Quest for Gold” lottery and the OLG's support of athletes across the country.

“OLG has provided direct personal support and I've been able to benefit significantly. Without financial support from the Quest for Gold lottery, I wouldn't have been able to stay in Ontario or get assistance with my education, equipment, and training.”

The fastest female sprinter in Canada discussed the importance of OLG's ongoing support of Ontario's athletes: “Training and competing are costly. The program has contributed over \$100M and athletes have been able to utilize the funds from the lottery's proceeds. 100% of the profits go back to the Quest for Gold Athletes to support them in training and competition. My neighbors in Caledon even bought hundreds of dollars of tickets to support the funding of athletes when they realized I was on the ticket.

I'm so thankful and grateful about the OLG's help and my neighbors' impact.”

Bingham, who moved to Caledon when she was in Grade 5, offered insights into the levels of local support she has received from town-folk: “I love Caledon. It's so peaceful. I really enjoy mentoring young athletes in so many of the town's organizations. The support system in my neighborhood is also the best. We have a close-knit relationship and my neighbors have supported me during the highs and the lows.”

One of those lows took place alongside a high as Bingham experienced an epiphanic moment in the starting blocks at the COVID-postponed 2020 Olympics in Tokyo.

“Four months after I lost my mom to an autoimmune illness, I realized how big my sup-

port system was in 2021. I was on the starting line by myself, looking at the finish line, and had this peaceful feeling about who had been there for me.”

She also reflected fondly on the support she received and the collegiality she enjoyed during her formative days sprinting for the University of Toronto Blues.

“Competing for UT was a building block that showed me how important team was. We had an amazing sense of team. You were doing it for the team, not just for yourself. My favorite memory of competing for the Blues was winning the 4 X 200 relay at the CIS championships. We weren't favored to win, but we did.”

Bingham also feels a similar connection to team in her current position as Operations Coordinator on the Track and Field Coaching Staff at Brown University in Rhode Island.

“It's the best job in the world. Brown's been really flexible and has given me lots of freedom to be a coach and an athlete. I get to help behind the scenes to help take the stress off the Head Coaching staff. I'm also able to train at the same time. This team has brought back the fun and childlike love of track that I enjoy. Everyone has been so kind and everyone performs for the team.”

The importance of being part of a team contributed significantly to Bingham's development as a high-performance athlete. Surprisingly, her athletic roots as a child and teenager were not in track, but on a local gymnastics team. However, Bingham delineated how the rigor of gymnastics set the building blocks for her transition to track at 15.

“Gymnastics is the greatest sport to build foundations. Gymnastics made me ‘Fit, Flexible, and Disciplined.’ There was lots of sacrifice involved, too. Most importantly, gymnastics also created powerful, explosive movement, especially during my floor routine. It created a strong core for me. My floor routine replicated the same kind of energy and power needed to run the 400.”

Teaching track athletes at Brown to be explosive and powerful is part of Bingham's new coaching role at the Ivy League school in Providence, Rhode Island, but the mental side of training high performance athletes is also a significant factor.

When asked what she would do to help the 2024 Canadian Track team maintain focus during the Drone Scandal afflicting all our national athletes in Paris, the current Bears' coach offered insights into the art of coaching and high-performance athletes.

“The biggest thing they are taught is the ability to adjust to and manage problems. I would remind them that there are things that you cannot control. I would narrow their focus. We'd focus on eliminating the noise.”

Canada's reigning sprint champion's focus is evident in her techniques both as a coach and athlete. So is her gratitude and indomitable spirit as she recovers in Providence and attempts another comeback from nagging Achilles injuries.

Khamica Bingham's story about “perseverance in the storm” is inspirational to all Canadians as we praise our Olympic heroes in Paris this summer.

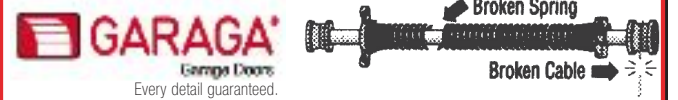

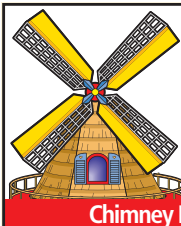

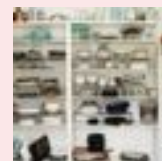

Bolton Brewers walk off Owen Sound Baysox 5-4 in Battle for NDBL Pennant

In an epic battle for the NDBL's regular season pennant, the first-place Bolton Brewers walked off the second-place Owen Sound Baysox on Thursday night at North Hill Park.

The Brewers' dramatic 5-4 win was keyed by veteran John Hutchinson whose game-winning hit off Baysox starter Kevin Zettler plated Chris Fafalios and set off a celebration by the 19-4 Brewers.

It was Hutchinson's second game-winning, walk-off hit in two weeks and Head Coach Mike Wallace was taken by the moment.

"It was exciting. We haven't been playing our best baseball of late, but we've been pulling out these types of games. A win is a win. We've been getting a full-team effort and we're using the bulk of our roster to find the right combinations. Hutch has come up with two huge hits for us in the last few games. Faf scored the big run. This gives us momentum heading into our final two games of the regular season. We have a chance to clinch a pen-

nant in Creemore on Sunday afternoon."

The bottom of the seventh outburst by the Brewers made a winner of relief pitcher Carson Burns who struck out five Baysox in his four innings of work. Burns relieved starter Victor Moguel who went three scoreless innings and yielded only one hit to Owen Sound.

Moguel pitched masterfully, throwing only 34 pitches to get nine outs.

However, with the playoffs imminent, Coach Wallace was taking no chances with his Game 1 starter.

"We erred on the side of caution. Victor felt a little tightness so we pulled him earlier than usual. His arm was fine after. Carson and Victor combined on a good team win."

Carter Burnside, Logan Hart, and Brett Chater had two hits each to lead the Brewers' offence. Burnside also chipped in two RBI and Fafalios scored two runs, including the game winner. Coach Wallace was pleased about the timely win, but felt that the offence needs to turn it up a notch with the

playoffs just around the corner.

"It's going to come down to hitting the way we should. We only had five runs tonight. We're capable of more. We have to drive in runs when we have our opportunities against Creemore and Owen Sound to finish off the regular season."

With 194 runs scored in 23 games, the Brewers have done their Head Coach's bidding almost without exception in 2024. Bolton has averaged 8.43 runs per game versus their ten NDBL opponents and hold a four-point lead over the second-place Baysox heading into the final week of the regular season.
